Brandt's Son-In-Law In Sea Ordeal

Five Portales fisherman spent 52 hours drifting helplessly in a 21-foot boat after the motor conked out 18 miles from shore in the Gulf of California, early this month.

The men telling of their ordeal were W. G. Kenyon, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Brandt of Spearman. Mr. Kenyon is the husband of the former Jewel Brandt, R. O. Zahn and his son, F. H. Zahn, Dick Watkins and Harold Stockard.

With them in the boat was a native guide named Raul. "Nobody panicked," R. O. Zahn said. "We were never out of sight of land but it was too far to swim."

He said the men had food and a half-gallon of water in the craft but that they were so sea-sick that there was very little eating or drinking.

A sea anchor was rigged with a tub which had been used to hold fish. A sail was fashioned out of a tarpaulin, but the only oar was a 1-by-12 plank.

The men expected a search boat to be sent out by dark on the first day. After the second day in the water, however, none had been sighted.

They were finally sighted by a shrimp boat 48 miles down the coast and eight miles offshore from their starting point at Gayamas, Mexico. When they were towed back to Gayamas, Mexico they learned that a search craft was preparing to begin a search at the request of Raul's wife. Salt water in the fuel tank was blamed for the motor trouble.

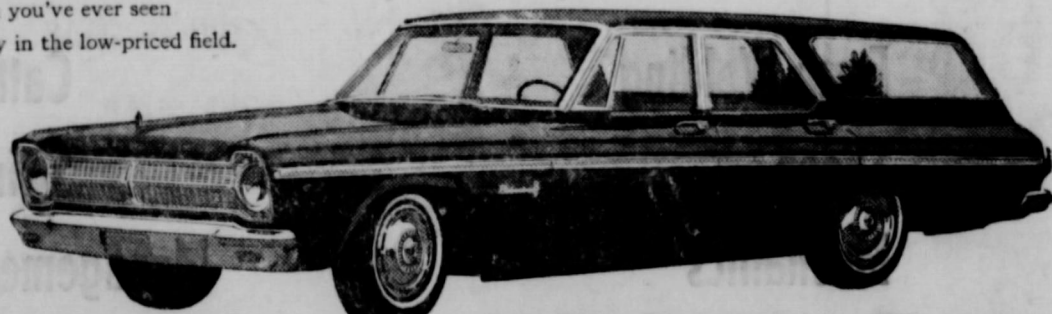

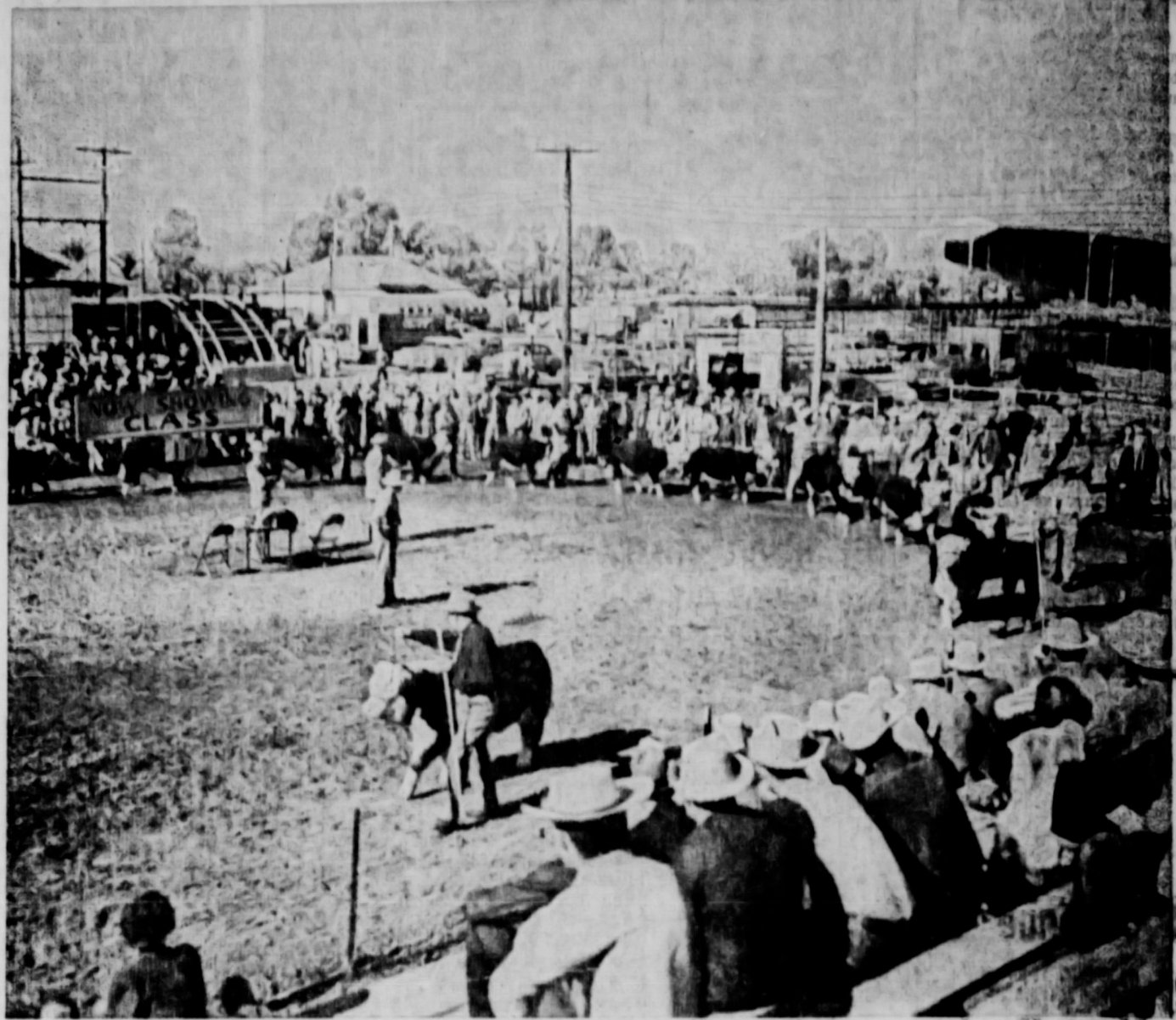

MR. JOHN WORR, A PROFESSIONAL ARCHITECT FROM AMARILLO, WAS EMPLOYED TO PREPARE A COMPLETE EVALUATION OF THE IMPROVEMENT NEEDS OF THE ELEMENTARY AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING. AN APPROXIMATE FIGURE OF \$180,000.00 FOR THE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING WAS REACHED ALONG WITH AN ESTIMATED \$118,000.00 NEEDED FOR THE ATHLETIC PLANT, AND AN ESTIMATED \$62,000.00 FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL.

MANY OF THE IMPROVEMENTS NOW PROPOSED HAD TO BE OMITTED FROM THE ORIGINAL HIGH SCHOOL CONTRACT OF 1962: WHEN THE BIDS SUBMITTED WERE MUCH HIGHER THAN HAD BEEN ANTICIPATED. THEREFORE, IT WAS DECIDED TO CALL A BOND ELECTION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$360,000 ON FEBRUARY 20, 1965. THE ISSUE WILL BE DIVIDED INTO THREE (3) PROPOSITIONS, WHEREBY EACH VOTER WILL VOTE ON EACH PROPOSITION SEPARATELY. IT IS HOPED THAT EVERY QUALIFIED VOTER IN THE SPEARMAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT WILL GIVE DUE THOUGHT TO THIS PROPOSED BOND ISSUE, SINCE IT IS SO VITALLY NEEDED FOR OUR SCHOOL SYSTEM.

THE FOLLOWING IS AN OUTLINE OF WHAT THE ARCHITECT AND SCHOOL BOARD BELIEVES IS NECESSARY TO PUT OUR SCHOOL SYSTEM IN SATISFACTORY CONDITION.

GRADE SCHOOL AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS ----- Approximate Cost \$180,000

1. RENOVATE AND REMODEL THE PRESENT BUILDING. THIS BUILDING IS STRUCTURALLY SOUND, WITH SOME EXCEPTIONS, AND, WITH PROPER RENOVATION AND REPAIR IT CAN BE MADE SERVICEABLE FOR MANY YEARS.
2. REPAIR AND PAVE BUS TURNAROUND AND PARKING AREAS.
3. REPAIR OR REPLACE PRESENT HEATING SYSTEM.

HIGH SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS ----- Approximate Cost \$62,000

1. WATERING SYSTEM AND PURCHASE EQUIPMENT FOR MAINTAINING SCHOOL GROUNDS.
2. PAVE ADDITIONAL PARKING AREAS WITH PROPER LIGHTING INSTALLED FOR PARKING AREAS.
3. INSTALLATION OF TENNIS COURTS ON A PORTION OF THE PARKING AREA.

ATHLETIC FIELD INCLUDING TRACK FACILITIES ----- Approximate Cost \$118,000

THERE HAS BEEN A GROWING PROBLEM OF TRAFFIC BETWEEN THE HIGH SCHOOL, JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL AND ATHLETIC FIELD. IT WAS FIRST THOUGHT OF ADDING DRESSING ROOMS, LIGHTS AND ADDITIONAL SEATS TO THE PRESENT STADIUM PLUS A PRACTICE FIELD AND TRACK AT THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL. IT WAS FOUND THAT FOR AN ADDITIONAL \$40,000 TO \$50,000 WE COULD BUILD A COMPLETE ATHLETIC FIELD CONSISTING OF 3,900 SEATS, DRESSING ROOMS, ADEQUATE RESTROOMS, AND CONCESSION STANDS. THIS WOULD SERVE FOOTBALL, TRACK, BAND, PHYSICAL EDUCATION, ETC. UNDER THIS PLAN THE OLD BLEACHERS WILL BE MOVED TO THE NEW STADIUM. WITH THE COMPLETION OF THIS IMPROVEMENT, WE WILL HAVE A MODERN UP-TO-DATE ATHLETIC FIELD.

Robert Adamson Will Take Farm And Ranch Tour

Through the compliments of B. and B. Grain, McClellan Grain, Equity and Spearman Grain Co. of Spearman, the Chamber of Commerce will send Hansford County Agent Robert Adamson on the Farm & Ranch Management tour, March 16 at Palm Springs, California.

This will be the West Texas Chamber of Commerce tour into the productive agricultural valleys of Arizona and Southern California.

Two hundred persons are expected to take a first-hand look at diversified farming and ranching operations in the Riverside, Sun City, Indio, Palm Springs, El Centro, Brawley and Blythe areas of California and the Parker Valley in Arizona.

The group will see the fabulous irrigation project and lush farming areas which were once deserts and water conservation principles in actual practice. How cotton, grain sorghum, vegetables, sugar beets, and small grain crops are grown in the Southern California and Arizona valleys. They will talk to the farm operators & managers and learn how these agriculture enterprises are managed. Valuable ideas on improving operations will be picked up.

One Rural Accident In County For Jan.

There was one rural accident in Hansford County during the month of January, according to Sergeant W. J. McLean, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

From these crashes resulted two persons injured and an estimated property damage loss of \$1100.00.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months only 1,800,000 or 40% of the 4,500,000 registered vehicles in Texas have been inspected. This leaves 2,700,000 vehicles to be inspected in approximately two months. If the number of uninspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas each would have approximately 520 vehicles to inspect in about 47 working days, or 13 vehicles per day. The stations in heavily populated areas will have many more than this average number to inspect. In areas where there are only a few stations you may have many miles to travel.

The Sergeant urges motorists to have their vehicles inspected without delay to avoid the inconveniences of waiting lines.

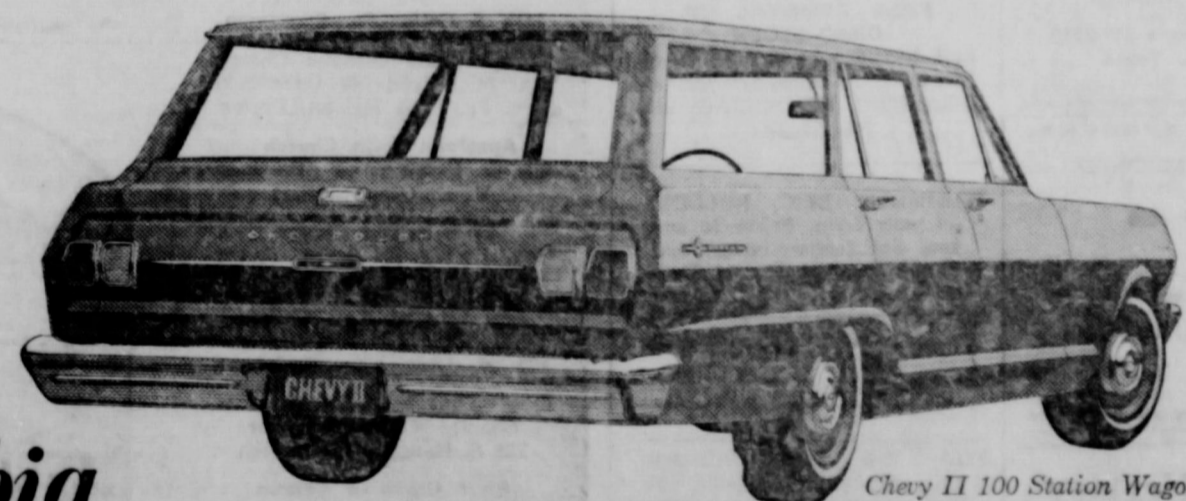

NEW CROP MEETINGS
I attended the meeting of the Spearman young farmers last Thursday night and the Castor Bean meeting last Friday. I have information pertaining to the production of Soybeans and Castorbeans, so if anyone did not attend either of these meetings and want some information on the production of these crops, feel free to come by the office and visit with me.

CATTLE LICE
Cattle on wheat pasture in Hansford County have been bothered with lice and it costs money to feed cattle lice. These parasites are among the most damaging to beef cattle. Cattle infested with lice spend a lot of time rubbing against fences, posts, or other objects due to the annoyances caused by the insects. Cattle on feed do not gain as they should and require more feed for a pound of gain when infested.

Infested cows lose weight and their calves become prime targets for the pests. Reduced weights of calves is one spot that really hits the pocketbook hard. Cattle lice are common over the entire state and their populations build up rapidly after cool weather arrives in the fall, and include both biting and sucking types.

Sucking lice, short and long nosed, pierce the animal's skin and feed by sucking blood. They are usually found on the sides of the animal's neck, on the brisket, back, inner surface of the thighs, tail and around the nose, eyes and ears. Chewing lice are smaller and are usually found on the top of the shoulders and around the root of the tail but may also infest other parts of the body.

Many chemicals are available for controlling lice as well as other external parasites of farm livestock.

Pre-registration for the advanced clothing workshop will be held Friday, February 19, at 10 a.m. in the Home Demonstration Club Room, Spearman. Tentative dates for the workshop are February 22, 24, 26 March 1, 3, and 5th. Permanent dates will be set at the February 19 meeting, so if you plan to attend the workshop please be present at this meeting.

Problems to be worked on at this workshop are pattern adjustment, laying patterns, putting collars and sleeves, interfacing, making machine and bound button holes and belts. Advanced skills in clothing construction help any seamstress achieve a "well-made" look. Any interested homemaker who has had training in basic construction, is invited to come to the workshop.

With spring right around the corner, it brings to mind plans for house cleaning to rid the home of drap winter dirt and air. Of course, in most homes, a good cleaning is no longer confined to spring and fall. The smart homemaker divides her energy into the remainder of the year as well. When a good cleaning is needed, take only one room at a time, perhaps just one per week and do a thorough cleaning of each before beginning another.

Many household items today are washable, which is a boon to the homemaker - such things as drapes, curtains, slip covers, and throw rugs. Some of these especially the small rugs, may have foam rubber backing which can be fire hazards if dried in a dryer.

These are best air dried since the foam may build up heat in the dryer and catch fire if left at a high temperature for along period of time.

If these items are accidentally dried in the dryer, lay them aside to cool away from the rest of the laundry. Otherwise folding and stacking them with other items will hold heat, which may continue to build up in the foam until there are flames from spontaneous combustion. So, be careful.

To give sparkle to your treasured glass (or plastic household accessories) which give your home its personality, a good sudsing in soap and water will make all the difference in the world. We don't realize how much dirt and grease from the air sticks to furniture and accessories until we see for ourselves what a difference a good cleaning makes.

Keep these hints in mind for a satisfying and successful "spring" house-cleaning.

Wichita Falls, Longview and Spearman are the only schools in Texas that have gone to the finals in typewriting the last two years in succession.

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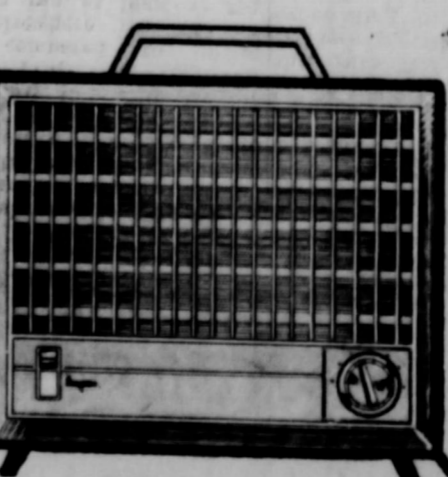

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Survey Of County For Pesticides

A survey of pesticides used by farmers and how they are made will be made in Hansford County during February and March according to Cary D. Palmer, District Statistician, Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Hansford County is one of 10 counties in the U. S. included in a national study of farm uses of pesticides. The results will be used to help assess the economic impact of present and future uses of chemical control measures. This study, the first of its kind, is part of the USDA research program to develop more effective and safer pest control methods.

Farm operators living in selected areas of the county will be asked to report on the types and amounts of pesticides used in 1964 and to answer questions on the materials used, costs and method of application, and other related characteristics.
