### Students To Register On August 27

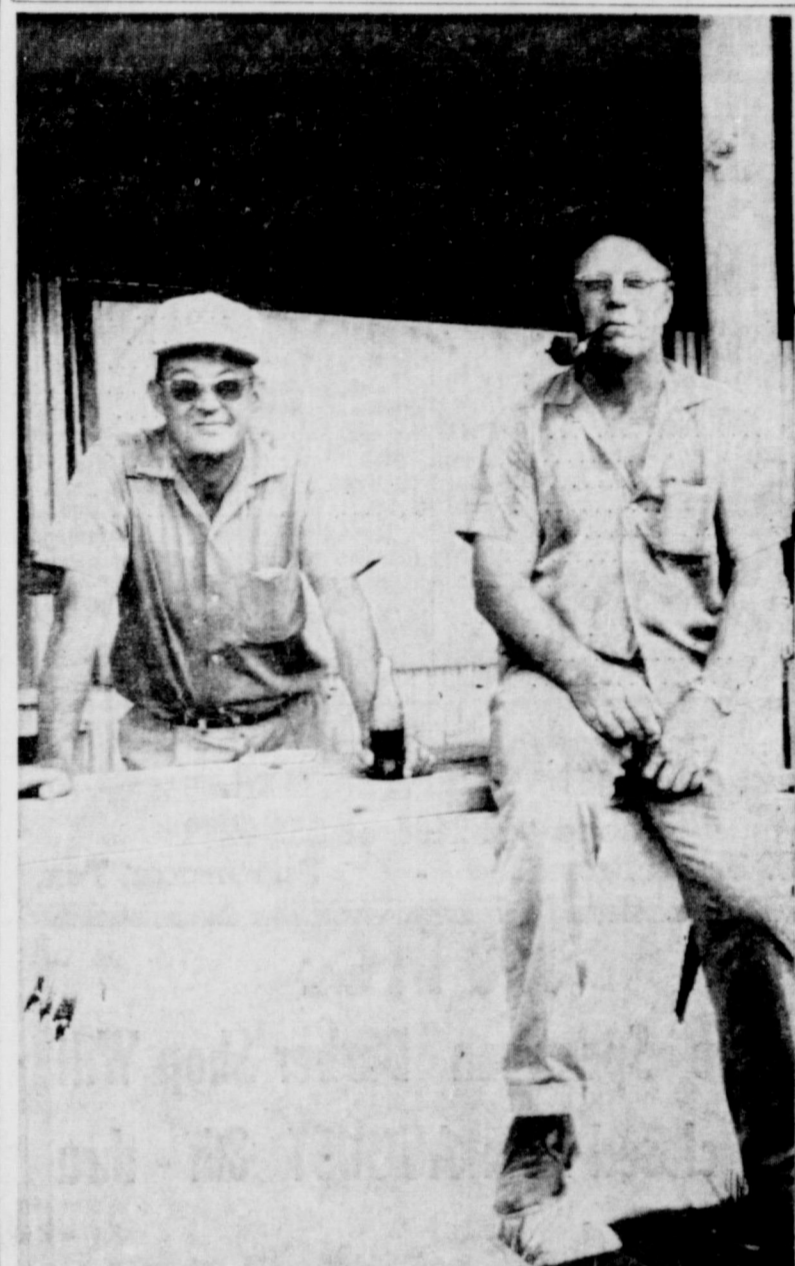
Summer vacation days for school students are near an end and all students in the Spearman schools will register August 27. There will be a general faculty meeting in the high school auditorium, followed by principals & teachers meeting, August 26 at 9:00 a. m.  
Registration of students in grades one through eight will be August 27 from 9:00 to 11:00 a. m. The school busses will run their regular routes.  
The high school students will register also on August 27. Seniors will enroll from 9:00 to 10:30 a. m.; Juniors, 10:30 to 12:00 noon; Sophomores, 1:00 to 2:00 p. m. and Freshmen, 2:00 to 3:00 p. m.  
August 30 through October 8 will be the first six weeks which consists of 29 days. October 11 through November 19 will be the second six weeks which will be thirty days. November 23 through January 14 will be the third six weeks, 30 days. January 17 starts the second semester and the fourth six weeks which will end February 25 and have a total of thirty days. February 28 through April 7 will be the fifth six weeks with 28 days and April 11 through May 24, sixth six weeks with 31 days. Total days of school will be 178.  
Holidays this school term will be: Labor Day, September 6; Thanksgiving, November 25 through November 28; Christmas, December 22 through January 2; District IX T.S.T.A. meeting in Amarillo, March 11 and Easter, April 8 through April 11.  
Baccalaureate will be held May 22 at 8:00 p. m. Report cards will be issued May 26, 2:00 p. m. Buses will run and will return students at 2:30 p. m.  
Junior high graduation, May 26, 8:00 p. m. Teachers available to consult with parents and students, May 27, 9:00 to 11:00 a. m. High school graduation May 27, 8:00 p. m. and May 27 teachers may attend high school graduation and receive their check afterwards.

### Parents Should Plan Ahead For School Expenses

Parents of youngsters who will enter school for the first time this fall may be surprised at some of the changes which have taken place in recent years.  
These changes are particularly evident in the areas of cost and supplies. They emphasize sharply that the days of the little red schoolhouse are far behind us.  
Families should plan ahead to meet these school expenses. Expenses for two to three children can easily add up to \$30 to \$50 for the first week.  
Public school systems have a list of supplies and fees for each grade. This includes items such as scissors, a plastic bottle of glue, markers, pencils, eraser, art and music fees and work books. Costs vary from \$3 to \$6 per pupil in the various grades.  
Physical examinations for first graders may add another expense. School lunches will probably average 25 to 27 cents per day. Prepare now for these school expenses.

of a little more than four thousand dollars for the six months of 1965. Floyd stated that the chamber faced a deficit of approximately two thousand five hundred dollars if the budgeted program is carried out. This means that members will have to be asked for additional funds as they have for the past six years.

With a bank balance of \$48.13 July 1, unless a lot of new members came in in July, the salaries of the organization will have to wait for more money.

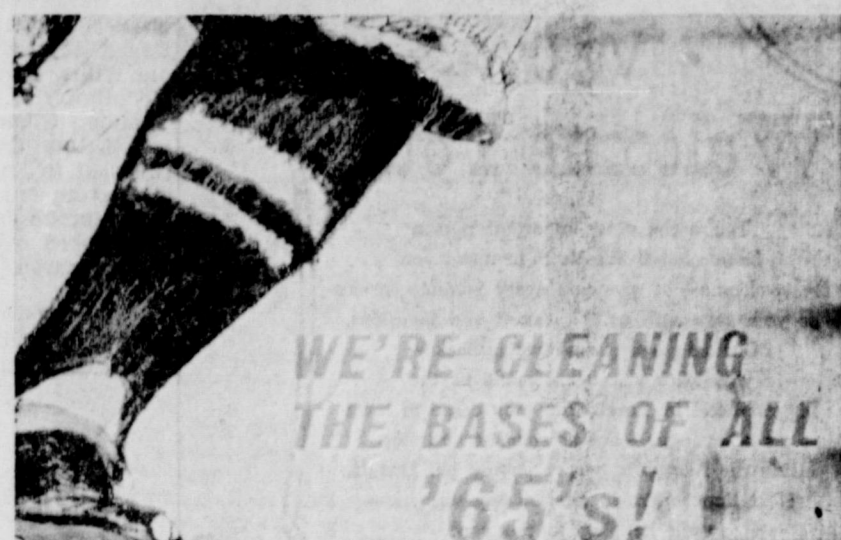

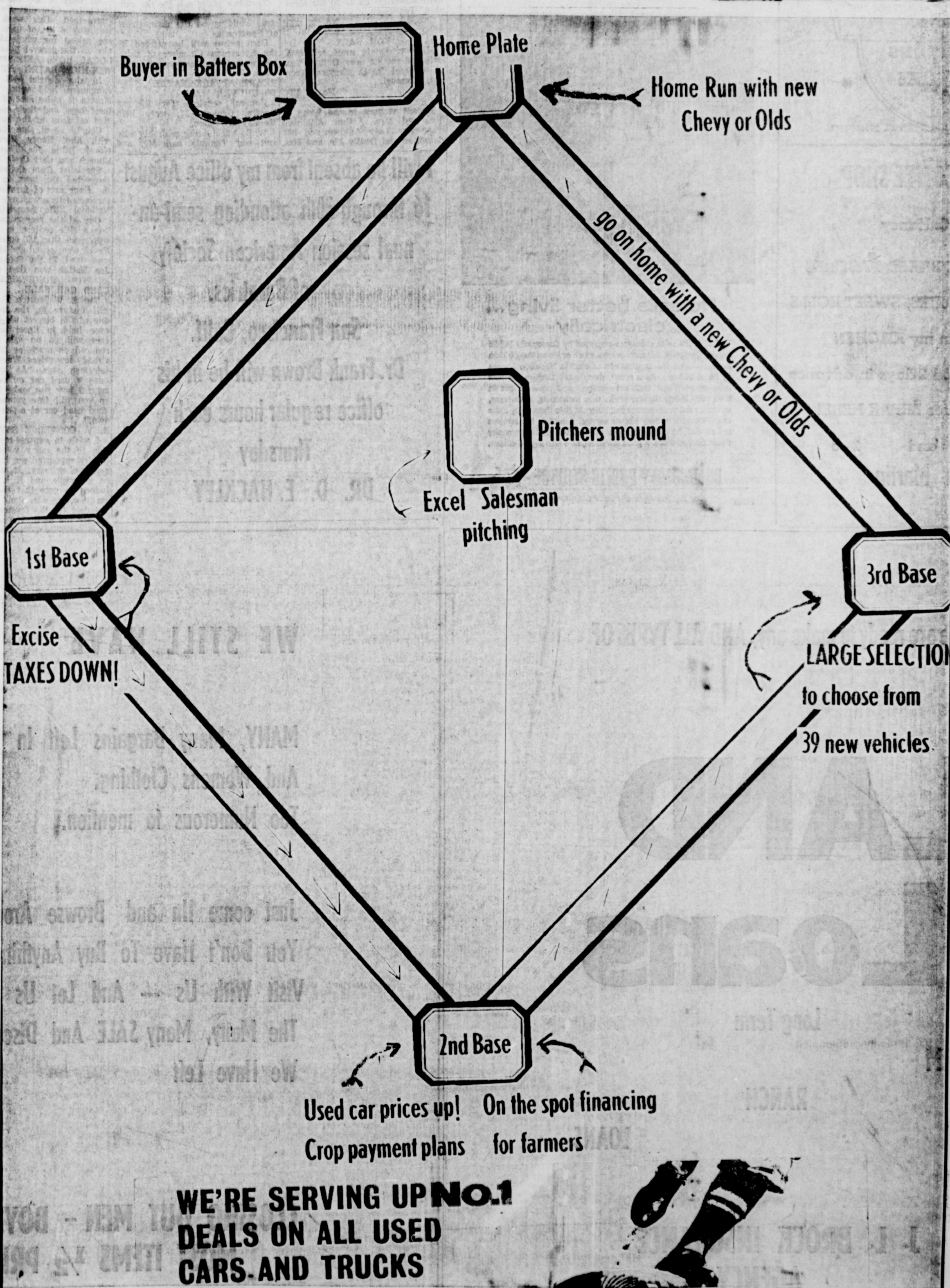
