#### (Matt. 16: 18 )

Jesus at Ceasarea Philippi asked his apostles who men said he was. They answered that some said John the Baptist, some Elias and others Jeremias or one of the Prophets. But Jesus was more "Who do you say that I am?' ' Peter said, "Thou personal. art the Christ, the son of the living God." Jesus told Peter that God had revealed this to him and that he would build his church, (not on Peter) but on the confession that Peter had made that Jesus Christ was the Son of God. The gates of Hell, Jesus said, would not prevail against it, and he would give to Peter the keys of the kingdom, the church. What he would bind on earth would be bound in heaven; and what he would loose on earth would be loosed in heaven. (Matt. 16:13-19.)

Keys are used to open doors. Jesus simply meant that Peter would open the doors to the church, which he did on the day of Pentecost when he preached the sermon recorded in Acts 2:1140. Just after Christ's resurrection he appeared to the chosen eleven whom he was soon going to send out on the great commission (Mat. 28:19-20; Mk. 16:15-16). He said to them, "Peace be unto you" and breathed on them and said, "receive ye the Holy Ghost: whosoever sins ye remit, they are remitted unto them; and whosoever sins ye retain, they are retained" (John 20:21). By this he meant that the condition of pardon that would be taught by the apostles, guided by the Holy Spirit, when obeyed, would be the condition of pardon from heaven.

Most religious people today agree that there was just the one church at the beginning of the Christian age. In Jesus prayer for unity he prayed that his followers might be one, even as he and his father were one, that the world might believe that God has sent him (John 17:20-22). Then in I Cor. 1:10-13 Paul shows that division among God's followers is wrong

If it Was our dear Lord's desire that we should be one then, is It not the desire of Christ that true followers of Him should be one today, in faith and in practice? Should we not then be more concerned about finding the true church of Our Lord and striving to bring about unity among all religious people?

It is well for us to keep in mind that when we become members of the church built by our Lord, we become members of his body. In Col. 1:24 Paul said, "Now I rejoice in my suffering for your sake and fill up that which is lacking of the afflictions of Christ for His body's sake which is the church." Paul made a similar statement in Rom. 6:4-5 also similar in Col. 2:12 as well as Gal. 3:27. Now in the New Testament time he did not just pick out certain ones and say you are members of my church, but he laid down certain rules which a person must comply, if he would become a member of the Lord's church. Those rules may be found in your Bible as you read the cases of conversions as recorded in the book of Acts of the Apostles. One thing that was evident in all the preaching was that the gospel was preached and it was the sa
