The reason for this is, the library has run out of space! In fact the past year, 5 shelves have been added, more need to be added, but there is no room for them.

Back in 1934, on December 14, the Twentieth Century Club of this city organized the library by giving a tea and asking everyone to donate a book. Anna Lee Morton was the librarian, and was assisted by Miss Ethel Deskin, a school teacher. The library was given a small space in the City Hall, and continued with no assistance, until 1950 when the County started helping financially. This was the year when, under the leadership of Virginia Allen, all books were classified under the Dewey decimal system.

Tommy Cook, 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Cook of 211 Louisa Drive, Spearman, is in very critical condition in St. Anthony hospital in Amarillo, where he has been for two weeks. The lad has been undergoing tests for brain infection and Tuesday of this week when Doctors were making the dye test for tumor, his heart stopped beating. Open heart surgery was performed immediately, and Doctors found a water sack surrounding his heart. This had to be removed before heart massage could be administered, and the beating restored. Tommy, a first grader in Spearman schools, has less than a 50-50 chance, according to physicians. He is in the Intensive Care Unit at the hospital.

## Farm Laborer Is Critically Ill

A 46 year old Juarez, Mexico man remains in critical condition in Hansford Hospital suffering from what Doctors said was smoke inhalation. Sarto Gonzales, a farm laborer, was found Tuesday morning this week in the small house where he lived alone on the Robert Ownbey ranch southwest of Morse. Pete Vera, ranch foreman, had gone by to pick him up for work and as he opened the door, found the house full of smoke. Vera pulled the unconscious man out of the house. He said a pan of water had boiled dry on the stove and then burned, causing the smoke. Gonzales had lived there since August.

Some 200 farmers and guests attended the 7th annual Hansford Soil Conservation Bankers Award held last Thursday night at the school cafeteria. Wesley Garnett of Spearman was named the "Outstanding Conservation Farmer" and W. L. Johnson of the Oslo community was named the "Outstanding Conservation Supervisor" for the 1965 year. Garnett farms 610 irrigated acres three miles south of Spearman and practices a complete soil conservation plan, Johnson, who was awarded the conservation farmer award three years ago, works with the conservation district in the northwest part of Hansford County. ## Hansford Voters Not Paying Tax To Vote Next Year

Records at the County tax office this week show only 350 Poll Tax payments have been received! This is out of a 2,500 potential in the County. Last year the office sold 1954 Poll taxes. Evidently, some of the voters may be waiting to see what happens to the threat of a "No Poll Tax" law now being kicked around in our Nation's capital. However, if any action is taken on this it will be after the first of the year when it will be too late to pay your tax in order to participate in the 1966 elections. In May of 1966 both Democrats and Republicans will have primary elections for State and County officers. In November, both parties will vote in the General election for State and County officials. County residents will be voting for Justice of the Peace, County Judge, County Treasurer, County and District Clerk and Commissioners for precincts two and four, School and City board members, bond elections, etc. will be coming up in 1966, and you must show your Poll Tax in order to vote. On the State level, we will be voting for: State Representative, Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, State Senator, State Representative.

Professor Roy Dawson, of Murfreesboro, Arkansas, was in Spearman December 2 and 3rd, where he conducted a mathematics work-

shop for teachers in the Spearman schools, to further aid them with the new math program.

Prof. Dawson holds BS and MA degrees from George Peabody College, Nashville, and has done additional graduate work at Vanderbilt University and the Univ. of Minnesota. Until recently, he was a professor of mathematics and director of teacher training for mathematics majors at Arkansas State College. He has served on the mathematics faculties of Peabody College and Lambert College, Jackson, Tenn. He was also chairman of this department at Jacksonville, Florida Junior College where he served as academic dean.

His special interest in math for the past 12 years has been working with elementary teachers making a National Science Foundation Workshop transition from the "traditional" to the "modern". He has 7 yrs. experience in conducting National Science Foundation Workshops in Mathematics for elementary and secondary teachers.

Professor Dawson who has taught mathematics from the first grade through the graduate level, is required from full-time teaching, and from the U. S. Army for whom he once served as educational director of the armed forces dependent schools in Europe. He and his wife live in their

hometown of Murfreesboro, Arkansas from which he travels as a consultant for the Addison-Wesley Publishing Company.

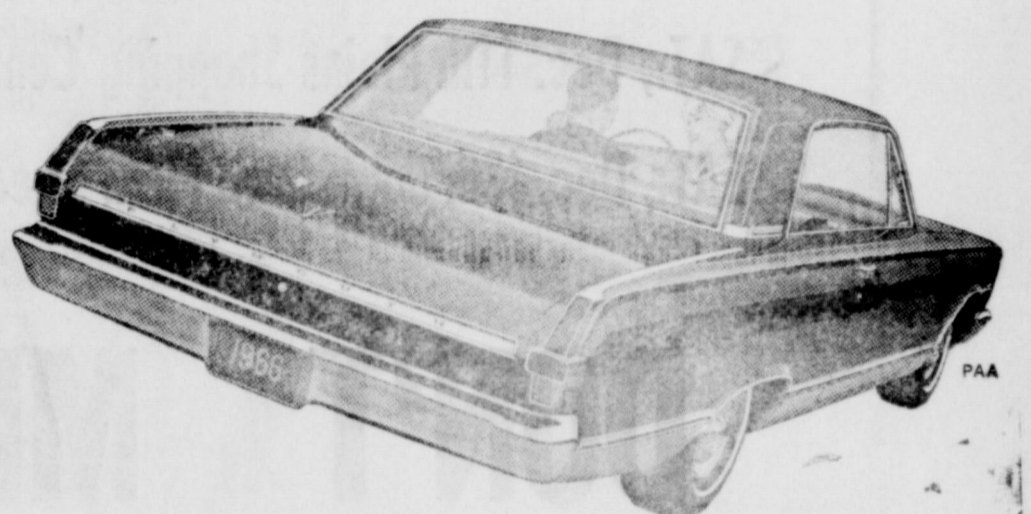

They played 42 and Mrs. McWhirter won ladies high and J.R. Keim won men's high.

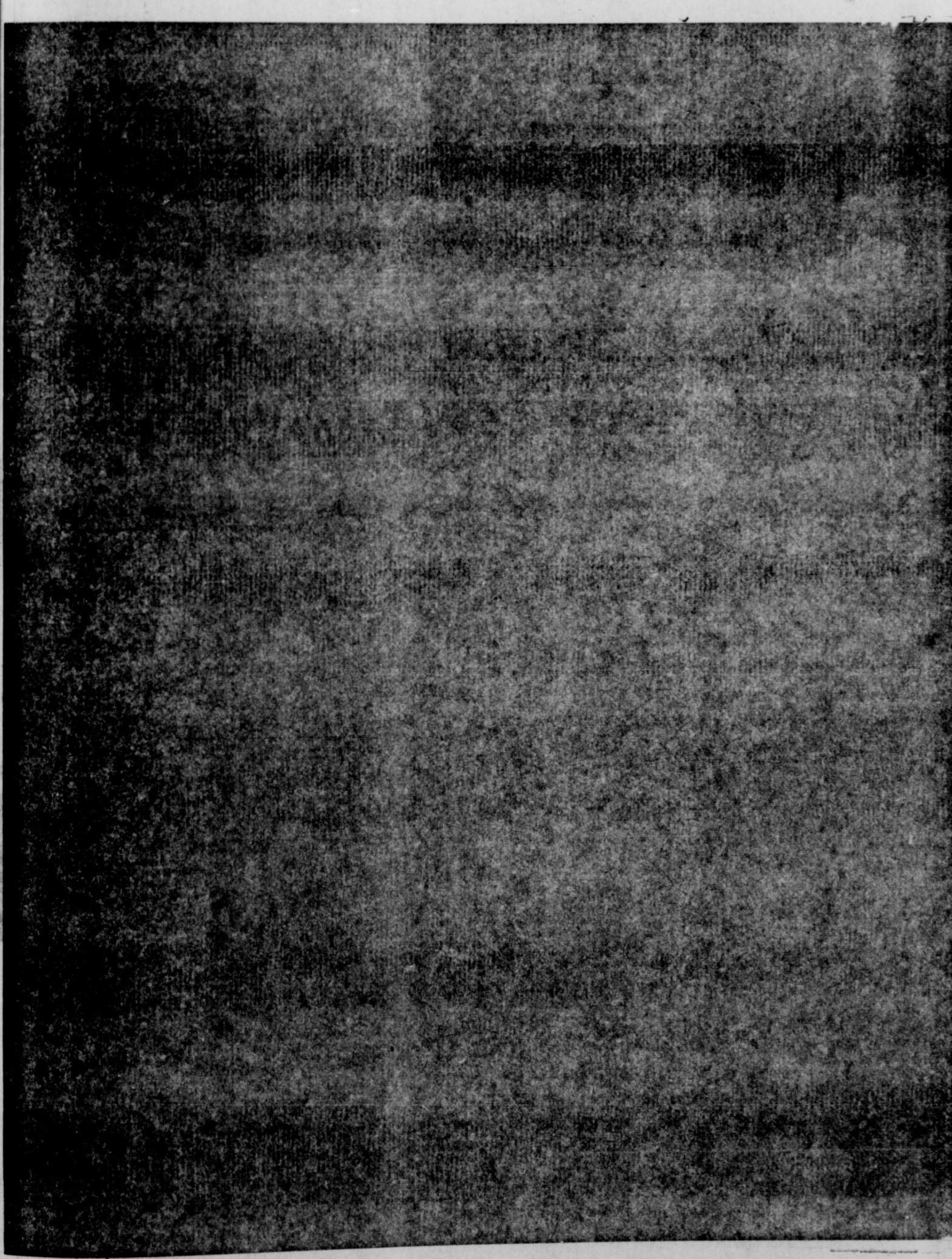
