John Lincoln Grissam of Gruver has been indicted on charges of murder with malice by the 84th Judicial District grand jury.

Grissam, an ex-convict, is charged with the February 26 murder of Gruver businessman P. H. (Mickey) Westerfield, who was found shot to death in the Westerfield Dry Goods.

Sheriff of Hansford County, J. B. Cooke arrested Grissam about 5 p.m., February 27 at the home of his employer. Grissam led officers to a pond where he had discarded the murder weapon, a 22 caliber pistol.

He was charged with murder with malice and arraigned within 24 hours of the murder. Grissam is being held in the Hansford County Jail.

Attorneys Charles Ballman of Borger and Don H. Teavis of Perryton were appointed to defend Grissam.

April 9 Deadline For Wheat Measurement

Copies of the aerial map on farms has been sent to the producer. Everyone is requested to be sure to keep these maps. They can be used to plot a producers wheat and bring one in to the A.S.C. office to replot the acreage.

Notice that your wheat (and barley) must be reported to the A.S.C. office by no later than April 9. You need to report your wheat acreage right away. Then you will have until May to destroy any excess wheat and make an amended report to the A.S.C. office.

A reporter will not come to your farm to measure your wheat unless you come in and request it and pay the cost of measurement service. You just measure the distance of wheat and bring it in to the office and the A.S.C. office will assist you in computing the acres. If you want to request that this office measure your wheat, you must do so by April.

After disposition date, at least one fourth of the farms in the county will be spot checked. If found to be incorrect, no payment will be made.

The A.S.C. office Manager, Ellrey D. Vanderburg urges every producer to sign up in the Feed Grain now and report your wheat right away. Avoid a last minute rush in the office and come in now.
