Billy Graham Evangelistic Crusade Underway With First Services Wed. Blackout For Christmas?

First service of the long-planned and planned for evangelistic crusade for our city was held Wednesday night at the High School auditorium to an overflowing crowd.

Graham Association team of Gustafson, evangelist, and his wife, Mrs. Wesley, and Rev. Billy Clarke will conduct services a 7:30 p.m. through Sunday at 3 p.m. through October 21.

Members, which number 120, and ushers and Countesses, which number around 150, are youth from 15 different churches in this area will be on duty each evening to carry out various tasks, assigned to them. This team of people has been working for many long weeks in preparation for this event.

The widely published crusade is the result of some 3 years planning by members of the Ministerial Alliance of Spearman Churches. Perryton, Gruver, Morse, and Spearman have cooperated to bring this team to our

Spearman High School auditorium, which seats 745 persons, but with additional chairs were set up at the back of the building to seat in the hall. This seating arrangement for 945 people, plus 12 choir members is filling the auditorium to capacity and is expected to be filled for each evening.

Evangelistic team members have a full schedule of meetings speaking engagements during the 12 days they will be in Spearman. They plan visits to the neighboring towns before various groups.

Speaker, Rev. Roy Gustafson, a strong speaker, is a world traveler, musician and Bible teacher. He has just returned from his many tours of the world.

Dotty Jones, of Gruver, probably Hansford county's best book publisher. On July 23, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. "Doc" Jones, has published a book on the history of Hansford county. The 208 page book, titled "A Search For Opportunity" came to press just 2 weeks ago. It contains hundreds of pictures and stories of many of the old days of the county. Miss Jones conceived the idea of publishing such a book while she was editor of the Gruver paper. She did a weekly feature featuring some pioneer of the county, and folks thought so much they suggested she put them together in book form. The information for the

majority of features in the book was obtained through personal interviews with the pioneers, as county officials. "A Search For Opportunity" is dedicated to Dotty's parents, Joseph Clifford and Claudia Irene Claypool Jones, who have both passed away, and were pioneers themselves. The book is for sale and can be purchased in Spearman from Mrs. Gwenfred Lackey or Joel Lee Lackey. If you want one of these books let them know at once, as they are selling fast. Much work has gone into this compilation of historical facts and data concerning the organization of Hansford county, and its early settlers.

Everyone seems to enjoy the wide variety the double menue changed each day offers. At present we use about six dozen eggs, 5 lbs. butter, 45 quarts of milk, 6pts. of buttermilk, 4 pecks of potatoes, and fifty pounds of meats of various kinds each week besides all the vegetables our local markets offer. Visitors are welcome at any time and questions regarding this enterprise which is yours are cheerfully answered.

God allowed dark and gloomy days to come to His people. But the Kingdom had to go on. So today the Church Militant must continue until the Church Triumphant comes. Is this not our greatest need today? We have so little faith, so little hope, so little confidence in God's final victory. We have forgotten the road back to God is the brave road. Homemakers Notes

November 11, 1965 Holidays are right around the corner - or need you be reminded? For those on tight budgets and those on low calorie diets, the temptations will be equally hard to resist.

Some of your family on reducing diets? They needn't forgo the pleasure of taste-tempting foods this year, if you will set before them the following low calorie (but delicious) treats. APPLESAUCE Pumpkin Pie 1 cup canned pumpkin 1 cup unsweetened applesauce 4 tablespoons Sucaryl solution 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1 and 1/2 teaspoons nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon ginger 1-2 teaspoon allspice 4 eggs beaten 1 cup skim milk 1 9-inch unbaked pie shell Combine pumpkin, applesauce, Sucaryl, salt and spices; blend well, add beaten eggs, and milk, mixing well. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake in hot oven 425 degrees F.

JELLIED CRANBERRY SAUCE 1 cup water 2 cups raw cranberries 1 envelope gelatin 1-4 cup cold water 2 tablespoons Sucaryl solution Combine cranberries and the 1 cup water; cook until skins pop. Soften gelatin in the 1-4 cup cold water. Add cooked cranberries, stirring to dissolve gelatin. Add Sucaryl. Pour into two cup molds. Chill until set. To make plain cranberry jelly, force cooked cranberries through food mill or strainer; add to softened gelatin and process as above. ORANGE EGGNOG 3 cups orange juice

4 eggs separated 1 table spoon Sucaryl 1 cup skimmed milk Heat orange juice; combine egg yolks and Sucaryl; beat on high speed of mixer until thick and lemon colored. Gradually add hot orange juice and milk. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form; fold into egg yolk mixture. Chill. These recipes prove that foods don't have to be "fattening" to be good, even if you aren't on a diet.

New foods to look for in the market: (1) a new soft type margarine, packaged by the half lb. in plastic tubes, is readily spreadable from the refrigerator or freezer. Made from liquid safflower oils, the new spread is said to have less saturated fat than other spreads.

(2) Corn flakes and blueberries are now cereal-mates. The berries are freeze dried (quick frozen and then dried under vacuum) With the addition of liquid they regain their original juiciness and flavor. (3) a concentrated fresh fruit drink made of peaches will soon be on the market. To reconstitute the drink, add an equal amount of water to the concentrate. Undiluted it can be used as a dessert topping and in salads.

THE LAST NOTE: Christmas is just around the corner. Those who remember last year's bills may vote to keep it there.

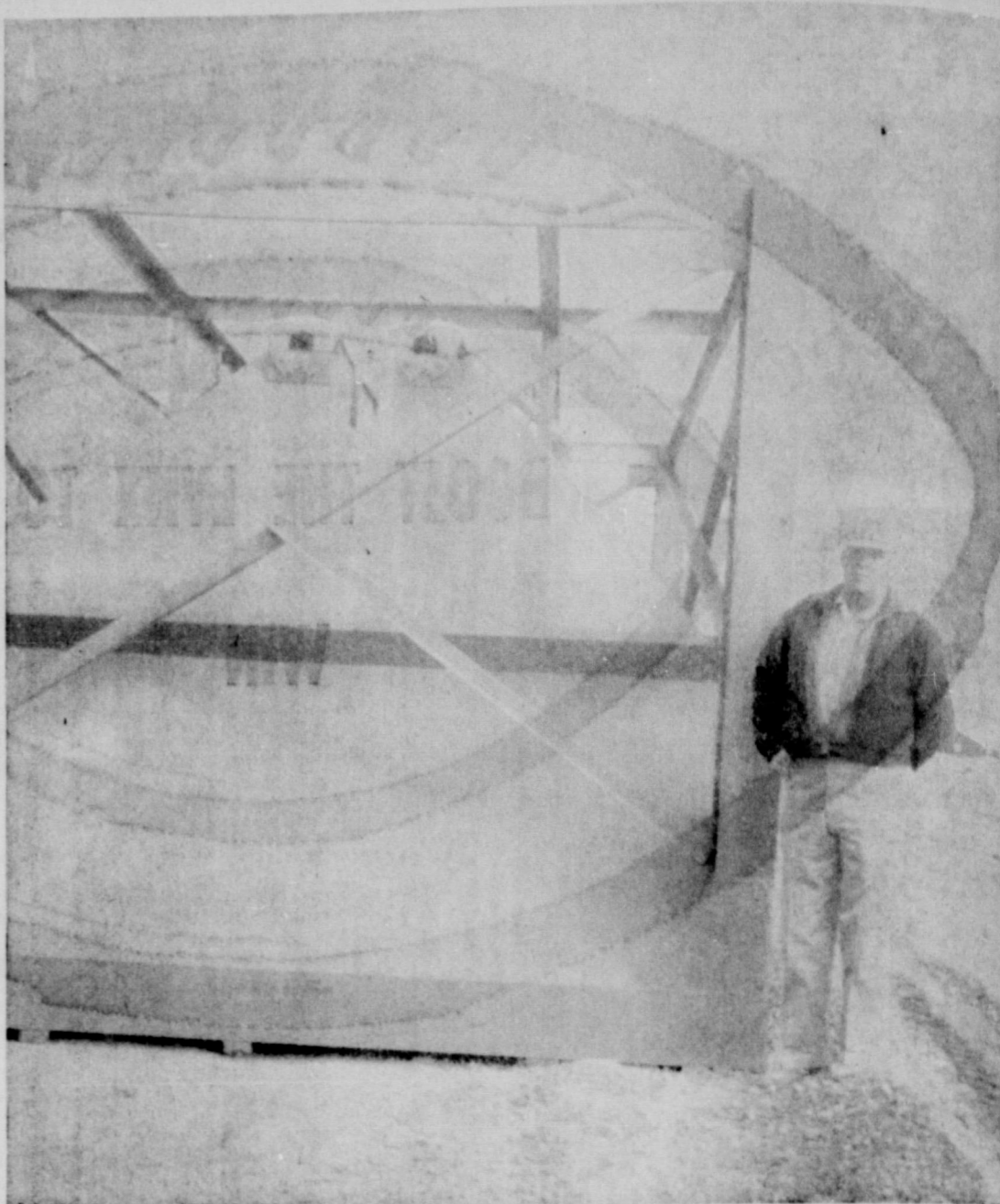

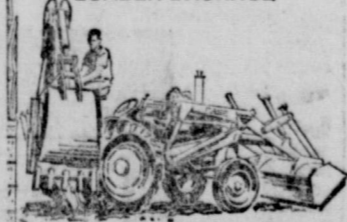
