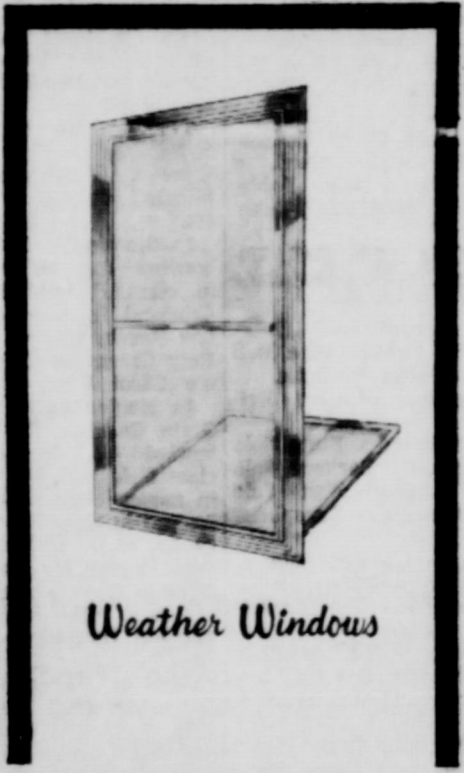

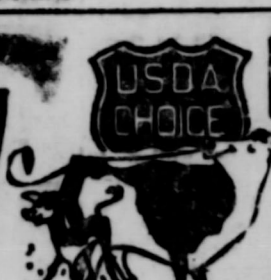

Checking Returns

The Percentage of correctly prepared Federal tax returns has increased sharply in the past few years. But says Hubert B. Hamill Administrative officer of the Amarillo office of Internal Revenue numerous simple mistakes continue to show up.

Mr. Hubert B. Hamill said: "The best advice we can give on filing a return is that when you complete it, don't put it in the mail right away. Set it aside for a day or two. Then

give it a thorough review for omitted income or deductions, errors in arithmetic, printed name and current address, social security number, correct copies of W-2's, and signatures."

Quite often, Mr. Hubert B. Hamill pointed out, the taxpayer will find that a review of his return will turn up mistakes he did not notice previously. "A careful review by the taxpayer before mailing may prevent delays in processing your return or the issuance of a tax refund check or savings bond."

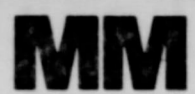

SCREW WORM ERADICATION
Texas farmers and ranchers have been asked to raise \$300,000 to keep the screw worm eradication program in operation through June.

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation set the two-week period beginning March 29 for committees in all Texas counties to ask livestock producers for contributions to keep the popular insect eradication project alive until the Federal government can assume full financial responsibility. Livestock industry leaders are hopeful that with Congress considering a U. S. Department of Agriculture request for \$5 million, this will come about July 1.

Dolph Briscoe, Jr. SWAHRF president of Uvalde, stated his organization had investigated alternatives before deciding to ask for additional contributions from producers and assured the livestock industry that its funds are vital to the continuation of the eradication project.

Eradication experts have estimated that during April, May and June, which in the past has been a time of heavy screw worm activity, 100 million sterile screw worm flies will be needed each week to keep fertile insects from

Mexico from reinfesting the Southwest where the livestock pest has been eradicated through use of the sterile male fly technique. Cost of operating at this level will be \$12,000 a day or approximately \$1.1 million for the three-month period.

The \$300,000 to be raised by livestockmen, along with \$250,000 already appropriated by the Texas Legislature, will match an equal amount of Federal funds to supply the total required.

Livestockmen have been asked

to contribute 10 cents for each head of beef or dairy cattle, horse and two cents for each head of sheep, goats or swine. A similar campaign conducted by the Foundation earlier resulted in more than \$3 million being raised for the eradication program.

HOMEMAKING NOTES

Piece-good departments are a maze of colors, designs and textures that tempt the home sewer to starting her spring and summer wardrobe.

With the endless array of fabrics today, it is often difficult for the home seamstress to know that she's buying simply by working and feeling.

Information concerning fiber content and care of the fabric is usually tucked deep into the bolt of material, where buyers don't always see it and of course, this information stays at the store.

A lot of time and work goes into making an outfit. To keep it looking nice, the garment must have proper care. So, read the labels on the fabrics you are buying, and write down special instructions for future reference. This will save headaches, later on and save your garments for longer wear.

Here's a tip for shoe shoppers: leather linings in the new spring shoes will give both comfort and long lasting fashion.

Leather linings in shoes are making a tremendous comeback this year, and for good reason. Leather "breathes" to keep feet dry and cool. Leather lining also wards against chafing and irritation of burning feet. It adds body to the shoe without weight and helps the shoe hold its shape longer.

Imaginative shoe designers are using leather linings to help set off the beauty of their shoes this spring. Look for leather linings colored or tinted to match or contrast with the shoe upper leather color. Or, smooth lining used on set off suede or brushed leather uppers.

How many extra unnecessary steps do you take each day in your kitchen? 44% of a homemaker's time is spent in the kitchen. A working homemaker spends 52% of her at-home time in the kitchen, which makes her time there even more valuable than that of the full-time homemaker.

What am I getting at? Just this - any kitchen can be, and should be arranged for the greatest convenience for a saving of time and energy.

Your time is valuable - so is our energy. Here are a few suggestions to help you arrange or rearrange your kitchen, and decide where everything should be placed to give you the greatest saving of time and energy.

(1) You work in your kitchen in 3 places: Mixing center (centered around the refrigerator, sink center and cooking center. Store utensils, dishes and supplies

at the places where you first use them. In a few cases this may call for duplications of things such as measuring cups & spoons, or salt and pepper; but, this rule, applied correctly, can save you more steps than any of the rest.

(2) Store things at convenient heights to save stooping and stretching. Place things used every day in the most convenient spots. Store seldom-used items in the harder to reach places. (3) Store things together that are used together. For instance, in the mix center, keep salt, leavenings, flour, sugar and flavorings in one part of the cabinet so they are together when baking time comes around. (4) Make use of handy storage devices to add to the amount of useable storage space. These can be purchased or made at home, but they can double your storage space.
