The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation set the twoweek period beginning March 29 or committees in all Texas counties to ask livestock producers for contributations to keep the popular insect eradication project live until the Federal gouverment an assume full financial resoonsibility. Livestock industry eaders are hopeful that with congress considering a U.S. Deptirtment of Agriculture request for \$5 million, this will come about July 1.
