### Southwest Wind Loosens Ground Up For Big Norther Here Tues. - Wed!

Hansford County residents had a real taste of wind dust, snow and cold Monday and Tuesday of this week. A hard Southwest wind started the pulverized dry-land fields to moving North, and a sur-enough an "old-time" Norther blew in Tuesday morning about 1:00 a.m., and started the land blowing back South! Farmers were surveying the damage Wednesday of this week, and many are getting ready to chisel and work their land, so they can save their dry land crops. The North wind, blowing from 30 to 50 miles per hour paralyzed travel in the county much of the day Tuesday, and the Gruver schools were dismissed all day. Spearman schools were turned out early as the high wind was accompanied by an almost unbelievable 10 degree temperature. Housewives, business-men, and just about everyone in the county is digging out from under Wednesday. This was one of the most severe dusters in recent years, and most observers believe that the only hope, is some moisture so the wheat will begin to grow and cover the ground.

### Science Fair Will Conclude Public School Visitation Day In Spearman

A county wide Science Fair will conclude the Spearman Public School Week, March 1 through 6 and will be held in the Community Building.

Director of the Fair Robert Barker, who is head of the Spearman Science Department is expecting the fair to be larger than last year. There will be a number of displays from the Gruver school as well as Spearman.

Students will begin setting up their displays Thursday and a team of judges from Panhandle A. & M. College at Goodwell, Oklahoma will begin judging the exhibits Friday morning.

Following the completion of the judging the exhibits will be opened to the public for viewing Friday afternoon and night. It will also be open Saturday.

Winners in the fair will go on to competition to other fairs in the area. Many entries have scored high in the Panhandle Science Fair in Amarillo in the past years.

### No Increase In Gas Rate For Spearman Residents

There will not be no increase in gas rates for Spearman residents as a result of the rare increase granted this week to the city supplier, High Plains Gas.

Officials of the city said the city will try to absorb the increase in price and keep the burn tip rate to the local users at 60 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas. The rate will stay the same as it has for many years.

Spearman owns the gas and water utilities and granted High Plains Gas a three cent per thousand cubic feet increase which will become effective in graduation steps from March 31, 1965 until 1971.

The first one cent increase will become effective March 31, the next, for 1/2 cent, will come or September 30, 1967, and the next 1/2 cent will be effective September 30, 1969 with the final increase of one cent to become effective September 30, 1971.

The contract with High Plains expires on March 19, 1964.



**PANHANDLE OUTDOOR LIFE BY STARKE WHITEHORN**  
For years I advocated the raising of channel catfish in small ponds and feeding them much like you would a pen full of pigs or a battery of frying chickens. Feeding them out like one would a steer in a feed lot and expecting a certain number of pounds of dressed catfish for each hundred pounds of feed.  
It was a good idea to present and think about. Just imagine placing a couple hundred five-inch catfish in a quarter-acre pond and feeding them daily, watching them grow, and harvesting a few hundred pounds in a year or so. It's enough to create interest in any angler.

Finally the idea sold. A friend called and said that he was ready to start raising channel cats and wanted to know more about the operation. I had to take my flag down because about all that I knew was that it was feasible, practical and was being done by others on a profitable basis, period. I didn't have the knowledge to follow through on the idea. It isn't possible to give a blueprint in my few lines each week.  
It was indeed a pleasure to read a feature by Jerry Sinise in the

12 January issue of the TEXAS GAME AND FISH MAGAZINE, which was an illustrated report of W. J. "Bill" Thompson's catfish factory near Wichita Falls, Texas. Mr. Sinise said that there are usually from 30,000 to 50,000 one pound, forked-tailed channels raised and marketed per year by Thompson. Also, he said that Mr. Thompson remarked, "We could sell 200,000 annually if we wanted to, but we'd rather keep the business small and the profits reasonable."  
If you care twenty cents worth, then mail it in to the Parks and Wildlife Department, Austin, Texas, and request the January issue. Better still, subscribe for only \$2.00 per year, or you may send \$3.00 for a two-year's subscription. This non-profit outdoor publication is filled with outdoor features pertaining not to some of the northeastern states, or northwestern area or other area, but, rather, local enough that it is strictly Texas outdoor hunting and fishing.

Send in your order today if you wish to keep abreast in the outdoor activities of the state. There is also a feature your youngsters will enjoy. It is listed as "Junior Sportsmen" and includes letters from teenagers and even younger hunters and fishermen showing photos of the bucks they killed or maybe catfish they caught.

**Lake Meredith**  
The falling weather last week, blowing snow and freezing rain, added but a fraction to the size of the lake but, nevertheless, it is growing daily. Inch by inch the lake is backing up behind the dam. About two miles is the distance at this time. Already there is ample room for water skiing if the temperature permitted. By the time water skiing time gets here, the water will be backed up around the bend.  
According to Paul Timmons, Amarillo outdoor scribe, there is more snow on the mountains in New Mexico, which are on the watershed, than at any time since 1954. Mr. Timmons mentioned from four to five feet of snow. It probably won't melt until warm weather but it will send downstream a steady flow during the summer months to add to the natural rainfall runoff.

My guess is that by January 1, 1966, there will be not less than 6,000 acres of surface water will be a blue water lake, a see water until the next bend, practically pure water lake, which will be deep and rough during the windy months. Whitecaps will be featured from cold January to warm July.  
CORN  
From best barbershop reports,

the fish that we placed in the lake a few weeks ago have really grown. They were about six inches long then. Report now is that they were about a foot and a half long when stocked. Another report is that there is a fisherman who has out a few lines in the lake & he is taking off whoppers from his hooks each day. Pure corn, is my evaluation.  
The Canadian River does contain many large channel catfish, from two to perhaps fifteen pounders, in the holes upstream between the dam and Lake Conchas, and quite often some of these fish come downstream. This is nothing new except now we have the dam and reservoir to stop their downstream movement. Remember, members of the Parks and Wildlife Department also placed 1,200 six-inch blue catfish in some of those deep holes in the Canadian River in December of 1963. They should be two pounders or more at this date. Many of them will probably come down with a rise.

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



**Avoid Tail Water Loss**

What value do you place on your tail water, ask Darrell Renfro, Field Rep., North Plains Water District.

According to a recent tail water study conducted by the High Plains Underground Water District, tail water losses average 100 gallons per minute per well. Calculations from the most reliable records available shows that from 4 to 160 gallons per minute were lost per well. Mr. Renfro estimates that the tail water losses in Hansford and the surrounding counties is greater than the figures shown above, because of generally higher pumping levels.

This study shows that 1 - 800 gallons per minute well will lose 1,000 gallons per hour, or during the course of the season where four irrigations are applied, 37 acre feet of water would be enough to put 1 - 6" application on 74 acres, or enough to water 8 acres entirely with tail water.

**ECONOMICS - FUEL COST**  
The average cost of fuel (butane and electricity) of the tail water return systems is about \$1.90 per acre-foot of water recovered, contrasted with a cost of 3.20 per acre-foot for natural gas for water pumped from the contributing irrigation wells. Assuming that for each acre-foot of water recovered that this is an acre-foot not required to be pumped from storage, then the savings in fuel cost alone would be \$1.28 per acre-foot of salvaged water, or an average of \$104.00 on the average of 80 acre-feet of tail water salvaged.

**ECONOMICS - VALUE OF WATER SALVAGED**  
Economists have estimated that in acre-foot of water, when applied for irrigation, will increase the yields above dryland yields about \$40.00 worth of product. Average of wheat, grain sorghum and cotton grown in the Farmer County Area. Therefore, the average of 80 acre-feet of irrigation all water recovered would have a potential net value of \$3,200.00.

On three farms, the water from the irrigation wells was measured to determine the percentage of water salvaged. This study showed almost 20 percent of the water pumped from the irrigation wells recirculated by the return systems. It is conceivable, then, but if the irrigation tail water salvaged results in 20 percent less pumped from storage, then every five years, one year would be gained on the life of the reservoir. For example, if the expected life of the water in the reservoir was 20 years, then the benefits of salvaged water could

result in four additional years of irrigation.

The greatest benefits will be the landowner from this salvaged water, for the life of his investment will be extended. The tenant will be the next greatest recipient of benefits. He can be more assured of a return on his investment when farming under irrigation than by dryland farming. The community and area will also be helped by these individuals' foresight. It has been estimated by economists that each dollar's worth of farm product adds seven dollars to the economy of the area before the product is consumed.





With the first shirt-sleeve weather of the year comes the impulse to start pruning rose bushes and other shrubs. We should, however, resist the urge to start pruning trees and shrubs until we are relatively sure all danger of severe freeze is past.

Warm weather in January and February frequently forces the terminal buds to begin growing. If this growth is removed by early pruning, the lateral buds begin to grow during the next warm spell. Then, a late cold snap may cause serious damage to these buds.

The only justification for prun-

ing plants is to remove dead or diseased wood; to repair storm damage or other injury; to balance the top with the root system when transplanting; to develop and keep a desired shape or size; to rejuvenate older plants; or, to improve or increase flowers and fruit.

Flowering trees and shrubs which bloom early in the spring, such as flowering quince, spiraea, forsythia, lilac, and redbud, should not be pruned until after flowering. This is because flowering is produced on old or last year's woody growth.

Trees and shrubs which flower from early summer through the fall months, such as Crepe myrtle, hybrid tea roses, and shrub althea, usually produce their flower buds on new wood. They should be pruned in late winter or early spring after frost danger is over and new growth begins.

Complete information and illustrations on pruning trees and shrubs can be obtained from the County Extension Offices by requesting Extension bulletin B-977, "Modern Pruning Methods".

A new Southern chocolate pie creation is presenting to you and yours a new taste thrill for the making. Here it is for your recipe file:

**Southern Sweet Chocolate Pie**  
1 package (4 oz.) german chocolate  
1/4 cup butter  
1 2/3 cups evaporated milk  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
3 tablespoons cornstarch  
1/8 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell, fluted  
1 1/3 cups (about) angel flake coconut

Melt chocolate with butter in a saucepan over low heat, stirring until blended. Remove from heat, then gradually blend in evaporated milk.

Mix sugar, cornstarch, and salt thoroughly. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Gradually blend in the chocolate mixture. Pour into pie shell.

Combine coconut and nuts; sprinkle over filling. Bake at 375 degrees F. until top is puffed and begins to crack-about 50 minutes. (Center of pie should be soft.) Cool at least 3 hours before serving. Makes 8-10 servings.

Note: Since there is a generous amount of filling in this pie, the pie shell should be highly fluted.
