

returned from Houston where the new officers were elected for the coming year.

are the members of the Executive Committee elected from the previous year. This committee is composed of a chairman, a boy and a girl vice chairman, a secretary-treasurer, for 1965, I was able to attend the Annual Meeting and Workshop both last year and this year, too.

The theme of our council this year was "Understanding and Utilizing the Texas 4-H Council". The overall purpose for each council member was to better understand himself and others, and to learn to work and live more effectively with his own age group, and with the other age group at council, toward improved self-other relations. In order to accomplish this purpose, each council member became involved in activities where he took real responsibility for believing in and carrying out the program of annual meeting and workshop with structure and guidance from qualified leaders (youth and adults).

Preparatory Assemblies were held each day where the State Extension Service Staff gave key-

notes and prepared us in being able to fill our role as young leaders now and for later on in life. The 24 new council members then worked in 4 committees with each of the Executive Committee members as apprentice leaders. Those 4 committees were then responsible for completely carrying out all activities during council with the help of the State Advisors and Consultants.

By trying to learn to live and work together and to meet new people, we were able to enjoy various activities in and around Houston. One night we saw the Houston Astros in the Astrodome and spent an hour just touring the Dome.

We took a tour and saw the San Jacinto Monument, the Battleship Texas, the water front, the shipping channel, ate supper at the San Jacinto Inn, and saw NASA, one of the main centers for the development of the United States' aerospace projects. We attended a banquet at the Warwick Hotel, and visited Sakowitz where we had lunch, attended a fashion show,

and were given talks by 2 of their personnel on the latest in men's and women's fashions. Also, 2 boys and 2 girls were selected to appear on "Young Houston Speaks" a question and answer radio program, which helped to acquaint the people in the Houston area with the 4-H program.

The United Gas Corporation, whose headquarters are in Houston, paid for all the expenses of the council members

in order for us to attend council. Although United Gas does not serve this area, this corporation is very interested in the development of youth and are especially interested in 4-H because of this interest and concern in young people. United Gas spends thousands of dollars each year in making it possible for outstanding 4-H members to participate in activities held in Dallas, Brownwood, Houston, Washington D. C., and Michigan. They not only help to support us financially but send representatives to all these activities in order to see the development of the youth as they work.

The main purpose of the banquet held at the Warwick Hotel was to provide an opportunity for us to meet some of the United Gas representatives and for them to meet us.



### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.



## Proper Pasture Use

Soil Conservation Service The importance of using a tame pasture properly cannot be over emphasized. Proper Pasture Use is an important factor in determining the profits received from a tame pasture.

A farmer who goes to the expense of establishing a tame pasture should strive to carry out management practices necessary to make his investment a profitable one.

A systematic grazing plan is necessary for optimum utilization of forage, to prevent excess forage loss from trampling and to allow irrigation and fertilization schedules to be carried out. These requirements can be met by the use of a rotation grazing system, four plots should be the minimum divisions used for one pasture.

Grazing should not begin until the grass reaches a height of about 10 inches in the case of Bermuda grass or a height of 14-18 inches if tall grasses such as Switchgrass are used. Bermuda grass should be grazed to a height of 4-6 inches; Switchgrass or tall grasses should not be grazed below a height of 10-12 inches. Grazing to these heights will help maintain the stand and vigor of the pasture plants. This grazing procedure will also enable the farmer or rancher to maintain an adequate ground cover for protection against soil and water losses.

The farmer or rancher who practices proper use on his tame pasture will certainly realize profits from his pasture that far exceed those of his neighbor who does not carry out this important management practice.

Use your pasture properly and increase your profits.





### 25 Years Ago In Spearman

July 4, 1940.

**WEATHER HERE VIES WITH EVERYTHING THAT HAS BEEN SAID TO THE CONTRARY, THE WEATHER THIS SUMMER HAS BEEN EXCEEDINGLY GOOD SO FAR.**

Fred Brandt, who checks the climate conditions each day with special measuring instruments, reports a general fair weather average for the month of June. With a 60 degree difference, the official record ranges from a maximum of 107 to a minimum of 47. The total rainfall is 2.29.

In explaining how he checks the weather, Mr. Brandt offers proof that he knows what he is talking about when he makes comments on the weather.

A small house is built to shelter the instruments which consist of delicate accurate thermometers which give the high and low of the weather, a measuring stick and a special water container for catching rain.

This apparatus consists of a tall pipe-like container inside a large one. The rain comes in a special funnel at the top of the apparatus. The inside pipe overflows into the larger pipe when the rain fall exceeds 2 inches. It is then measured by a narrow measuring stick which is divided into hundredths.

Although there has been evidence of hot dry winds this month, comparison of this June and last shows a marked difference in the heat conditions.

Out of the 35 carloads of No. 1 wheat shipped from the McClellan Grain Co., 80 percent of them have tested from 61 to 62 and one half pounds per bushel which is very unusual. Never before has so much wheat tested so high in this part of the country. About 150,000 bushels of wheat have been received at the McClellan Grain Co., with approximately 75 box cars being shipped out.

When we have a blizzard in the west, some will say this is the worst one we have ever had. This is the deepest snow I have ever seen. This is the worst dust storm I have ever seen. This is the longest dry spell I've ever seen. This is the biggest rain I have ever seen. I could go on down the line with many things people in the west have forgotten. We are living too fast to remember the past.

### I have been here thirty-eight years and to my own knowledge I have never seen the lakes as full and the creeks out of banks like they have been during this rain. Water has got in peoples houses that was never known to

### Be there before.

Some of the most colorful history of the west is in the memory of the early cowboys and their many runs back to when they have seen more rain than they have had and is still falling. I have seen more rain than I have had. But this rain is still coming. God only knows when it will stop. Three then, it started raining the first of September and not stop until December. One had an experience working an old rancher, when the way they could sow wheat. He put a tow sack over a pair of ears so they would not get grain of wheat in their ears. He rode the horses and brood wheat out of a sack and he in some places were going down in the mud to their knees. I sowed the wheat in mud and rain beat the wheat into the mud. They got a good yield of this experience. With wheat going down in this rain horses gone they could not ride a horse and harvest wheat crop. 


