Property owners will have to spend about \$12,000 for curb and gutter, plus some money for the city, but the state will spend \$94,000 on the Spearman street, if property owners will cooperate. The home town boys came back, however, and tallies by John Wayne Amos and Ray Debord and a two point conversion by Amos early in the final quarter tied it up at 22 all early in the fourth quarter.

Debord got the clincher and Amos kicked the point of victory, but Spearman was not through. With only seconds remaining Meeks scored again from 10 yards out and the homecoming held their breath as he was stopped short of the goal on an extra point run that would have killed the spirit of homecoming.

Trick-or-Treat For Overseas Relief

Ghosts and goblins of Spearman are scheduling a trick-or-treat collection for overseas relief under the sponsorship of the Methodist and First Christian Churches. Young people of the community plan to make Halowe'en of 1958 an occasion for sharing with hungry people overseas through CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program). Replacing the usual trick-or-treat for candy, apples, doughnuts, etc., the young people will make house to house calls seeking contributions for the CROP campaign.

Juniors of the Methodist Church will make calls after school Friday. They will work in small groups, wear identification badges, and be accompanied by adults. Afterwards they will enjoy a Halowe'en party at the Church. Senior young people of the First Christian and the First Methodist Churches will ring doorbells early Saturday evening. They will later enjoy a party. Proceeds will send government surplus food overseas through Church World Service to feed hungry people. Such surplus foods are supplied free of charge to approved voluntary relief agencies. Last year every \$1.00 collected distributed over 300 pounds of food to starving people in other countries. Young people in Texas collected \$49,058.67 in the 1957 Halowe'en trick-or-treat campaign and hope to do much better this year.

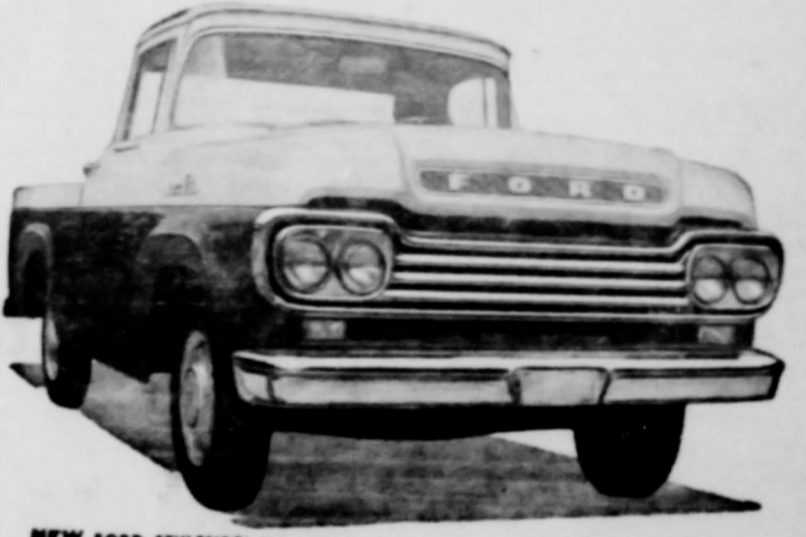

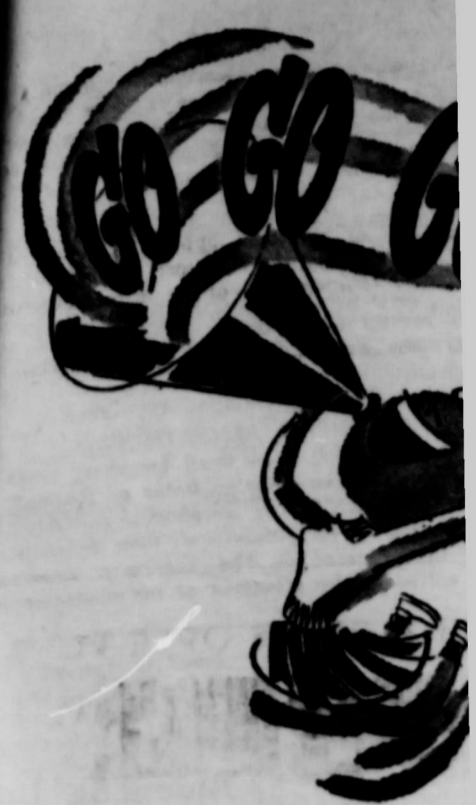

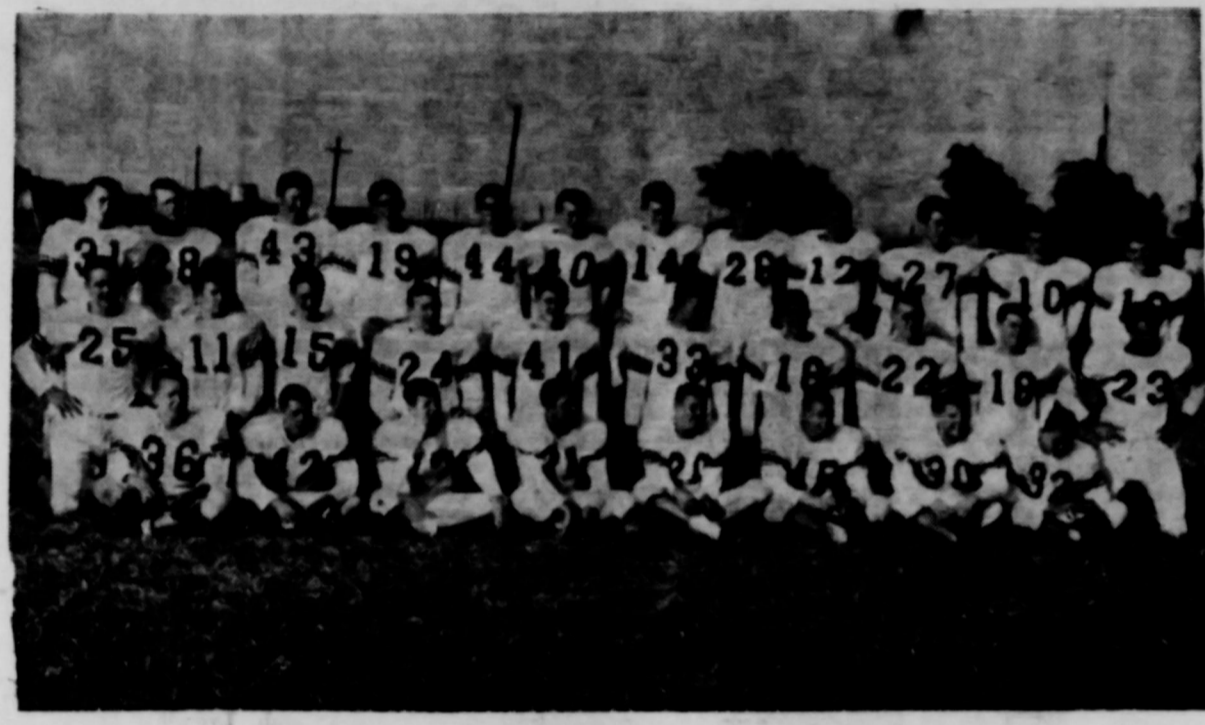

Washington News Letter From Your Congressman Walter Rogers

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT

SWITCHBLADE KNIVES
This is a subject with which I hope very few of you are familiar. Unfortunately, this is not the case in some sections of the United States.

A switchblade knife is defined as one whose blade opens automatically, either by hand pressure applied to a button or other device, or by the operation of inertia gravity. These instruments have been the subject of considerable concern in the Congress for several years, but legislation affecting their distribution was not enacted until this past session. Public Law 85-623 passed the Congress in July and was signed by the President on August 12, 1958. This law prohibits the introduction, or manufacture for introduction, or interstate commerce, or the transportation or distribution in interstate commerce with certain exceptions of such knives. The hearings on this legislation conducted by the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which I am a

member, revealed some appalling facts. Over one million switchblade knives are distributed and sold each year in this country and of these some twenty thousand are imported. Over five million of these knives have been sold in the past five years, principally to the juveniles, and a large portion of them are sold at a price within the reach of teenagers. It was discovered that this situation, particularly in the cities of the nation, created an urgent need for action in this field. It is not uncommon to read daily in the press of the country reports of numerous muggings and attacks, many of them involving knives. It was brought out in the committee hearings that the abolition of switchblade knives would not be a cure-all for any one of the favorite weapons of the juvenile delinquent and criminal element. It will afford the public and give valuable assistance to our hard-pressed local law enforcement agencies.

It was felt that Federal legis-

lation to prohibit switchblade knives was necessary since only a limited number of the states have any laws relating to such knives. As a result, these weapons are bootlegged into these States from other States which have no prohibitory statutes, or they are sent through the mails elsewhere, they are sold openly. It was reported that city ordinances are somewhat of a deterrent, but they are by no means sufficiently effective. It appeared the only solution to the switchblade and gravity knife menace was to pass Federal legislation, therefore to prohibit the introduction of these instruments into interstate commerce; to close the mails to them, and ban their importation.

A Senate Judiciary Subcommittee investigating juvenile delinquency in the United States recently conducted an investigation into the use of dangerous weapons by juveniles, with special emphasis on the interstate traffic and importation of switchblade knives and, in an effort to determine the severity of the problem on a community level, sent questionnaires to the major police departments of the United States and others. This investigation disclosed that many of these knives were manufactured abroad and distributed by firms in this country

which handle numerous items in addition to switchblade knives. It was established that these items through the mails by manufacturers in the various States which had local laws prohibiting possession, sale, or distribution of switchblade knives. It was felt that this pointed to the need for Federal control of these knives, since local legislation was being systematically circumvented through the mail-order device. In the United States two manufacturers have a combined production of over one million switchblade knives each year. Both concerns are prominent cutlery manufacturers so switchblade knives represent only a small portion of their business.

The questionnaires returned by police chiefs throughout the country indicated that many switchblade knives have been confiscated from juveniles, and these authorities, almost without exception, indicated that these weapons are on many occasions used by juveniles in the commission of robberies and assaults. Of the robberies committed in 1956, 43.2 percent were by persons under 21 years of age, and a switchblade knife is frequently part of the perpetrator's equipment in this type of crime.

This, therefore, is one Federal

control which is, I believe, necessary and I earnestly hope it will provide a curb in this ugly situation.

PUMPKIN CAKE
Mrs. Richard Holton
2 1/2 cup sifted cake flour
3 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon allspice
1 cup Crisco
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 egg and 2 egg yolks, unbeaten
1/2 cup buttermilk or sour milk
1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts
Measure sifted flour, add baking powder, salt, soda, and spices. Sift together three times.
Cream Crisco; add sugar gradually and cream well. Add egg and egg yolks, one at a time, beating until light. Add flour, alternately with buttermilk in small amounts, beating after each addition until smooth.
Add Pumpkin and nuts, mix well.

Bake in two round 8-inch layer pans, lined on bottom with wax paper, or can be baked in oblong - 12 1/2 x 9 1/2 inch pan.
