WE CAN STOP COURT'S ABUSE!

Neither intregration nor education is the paramount issue at Little Rock. The issue which overshadows all other issues involved at Little Rock is whether or not the Supreme Court establishes itself as Supreme Power in an absolute dictatorship. If states cannot control their schools, what can they control? If intregation is forced from the federal level. those on both sides of the issue will lose more

In 1896 the Supreme Court made the "separate but equal interpretation of the Consti-tution. In 1954 the Supreme Court reversed that decision and in effect amended our Constitution. When the Court reverses itself on a question of constitutionality, the Court in effect amends the Constitution and abrogates states' rights, and usurps the power of the people to amend their own Constitution through their state legislatures, which is the only autorised method. When the Court reverses one of its interpretations of a legislative act, the Court in effect legislates, and isurps legislatice powers from Congress. which is the only branch of our federal government authorized to legislate Our founding fathers, many of whom were lawbelieved that judges could be relied upon to follow the Supreme Court's precedent decisions. The Supreme Court has shown a complete luck of patience to await the sice working amendment process specified in the Constitution. Our founding fathers never intended that the Court would amend by re-versal and usurpation. The Court can do this at its slightest whim. Such may occur in a to 4 decision. On the other hand, it is mendments favored even by majorities of

gated states rights, to make secure the bless mal self-government, the United States that future federal judges be elected by the people. Any other approach will prove imade-quate. The Supreme Court amwers to none for its misdeeds. The Supreme Court should not be above the final authority of the people and their constitutional law Lifetime or no judicial experience and not of judicial temperament. No qualifications are specified at present. The question of qualification is left strictly to the discretion of those con terned with appointments. Appointment of judges to our federal courts poses an intoler able threat to states' rights and self-government Judges elected to federal courts would pose no such threat to self-government, the most important earthly ally to Christianity

If Congress were to submit such an amendment to the people for ratification. Congress would be doing its part in bringing the Su-weine Cours back into its proper place. Any other approach by Congress promises very mited relief. Very probably the Court women stion when finally tested, meant steething rely different from congressional intent

Choatic decisions are the result of domina-tion of the Supreme Court by appointees determined to promote social, economic, and political objectives contrary to the Constitution and in opposition to the desires of Congress and the great majority of United States

Most all agree that something must be done Most all agree that something must be done to stop this abuse. In spite of this, my op-ponent is against state anti-subversive laws. He voted against restoring states' rights to enforce anti-subversive laws. His one vote was the margin of defeat, but could and should have been a one vote margin of vic-tory in the Senate for Texas and all of these United States. We must elect future federal United States. We must elect future federal judges for a limited term. Can there be another effective plan? Has anyone offered a proposal which, even though adopted would protect states' rights and self-government?
