### Wagon Train To Leave Today!

The famous Rolling Plains Wagon Train will pull of Spearman at 8:30 a.m. Thurs., June 10 headed for Oklahoma City, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and the dedication of the Nat'l Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center.

Approximately 20 wagons will leave in the early morning for the trek that will take fifteen days to reach the city. Dedication and grand opening ceremonies will be held at the Center at 2:30 p.m. June 26 at 1800 N. E. 63rd Street. It will be free to everyone and visitors are asked to dress western and help lend color to the event. Admission to the Museum will also be free for the remainder of the day until 6 p.m.

From 6 to 8 p.m. on June 26, a Chuck Wagon Feed will be held with the Rolling Plains Wagon Train at the Hall of Fame grounds at \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for children. Tickets may be ordered in advance by a post card to Rolling Plains Wagon Train, 200 Skirvin Tower, Oklahoma City. (Send no money-you can pay at the site)

The train will make the first overnight stop 21 miles east of Spearman at the intersection of F. M. road 759 and Highway 70. The second night, June 11 they will stop south of Canadian at the river. June 12, the third night the Train will spend the night at Miami and also stay over Sunday, June 13. June 14 Mobeetie; June 15, Shamrock; June 16, Erick, Oklahoma; June 17, Sayre, Oklahoma; June 18, Elk City, Oklahoma; June 19 they will stop at Clinton and participate in the Annual Celebration and also stay over Sunday, June 20; 21 Weatherford, Oklahoma; June 22; Cherokee Village; June 23, El Reno; June 24, Yukon, Oklahoma; June 25 arrive in Oklahoma City and participate in an all day celebration in honor of the Wagon Train.

The Wagon Train will be a feature in the Parade of the Western States the morning of June 26. All the governors of the 17 western states are expected to be present for the parade and dedication. Former President Eisenhower is expected to raise the Kansas flag at the ceremony. Tentative plans are for John Wayne to present awards at the dedication dinner and Eddy Arnold has been invited to be in attendance.

L. issued his own marriage license.

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His own 50th anniversary was the 7th golden wedding anniversary he has attended of couples in which he issued the license while serving as County Clerk. R. L.'s transportation, while courting Vera Beatrice, was a motorcycle with a side car and on his wedding day he found the motorcycle would not run and he rented a Model T to take him to the wedding. He then resided at the hotel which was the community of Old Hansford. The couple was married by Samuel Walsh Franklin, Methodist Minister.

R. L. first came to this area in 1906 when he helped his father drive cattle through from Greer County, Okla. The oldest of ten children, he was serving as County Clerk when the town of Hansford moved to Spearman and he also moved to Spearman in 1920 and took a position with Equity. He established his own business in 1924.

Mr. McClellan has most certainly been very active in civic organizations and a civic leader all his life. He served on the city commission from 1921 until 1950 as mayor, alderman and commissioner. He is very active in the Methodist church, at times serving as Sunday School superintendent, steward and has been on every building committee of the church.

Mrs. McClellan is still very active in missionary work of the church and attends when her health permits.

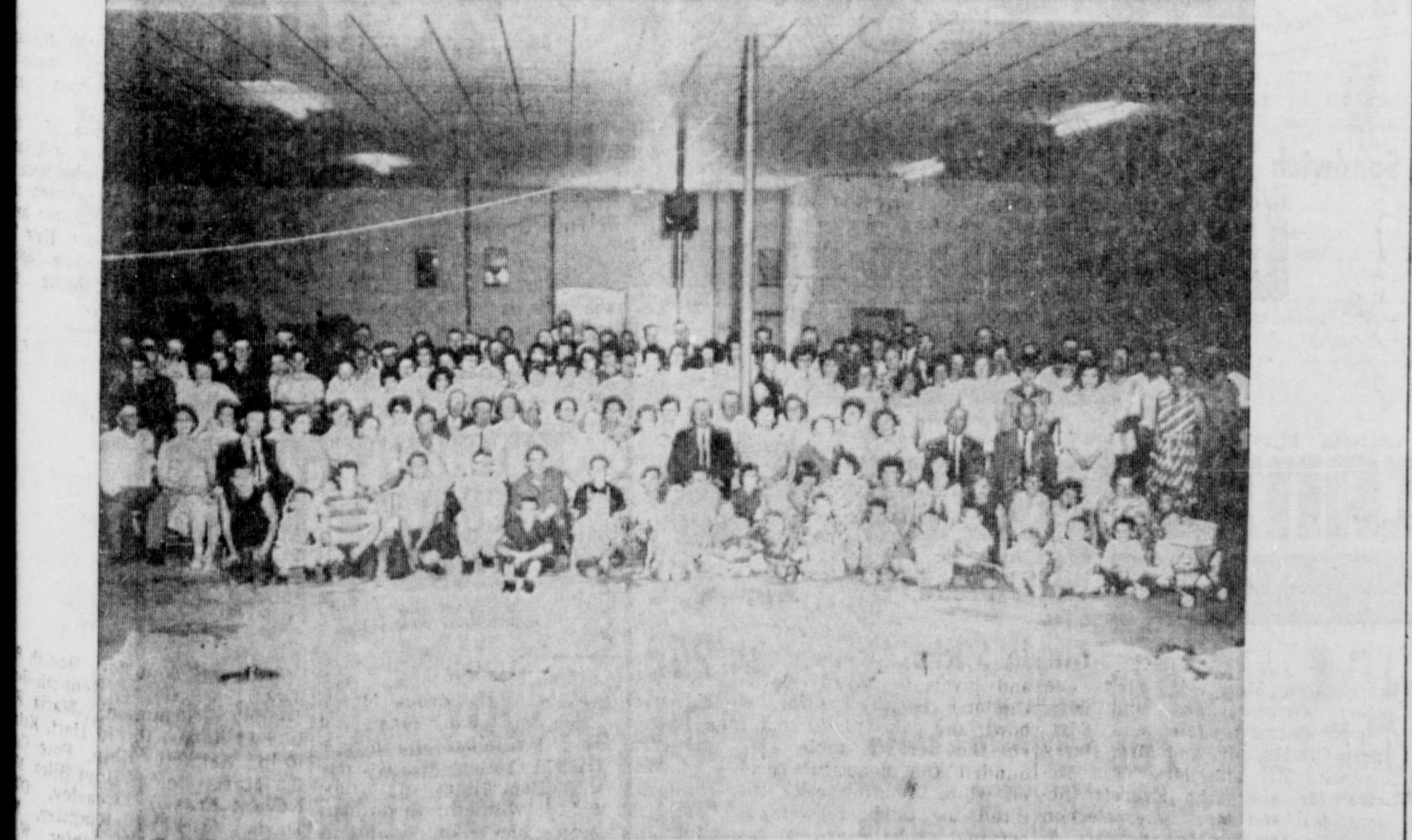

According to reports being circulated, Mr. Boyer has received much commendation for the frank and open manner in which he has publicly presented his candidacy.

Boyer will be heard over KGNC at Amarillo on Saturday morning, June 29th at 7:30 a.m. **JULY 4th. PROGRAM WILL OPEN McCLELLAN LAKE** County Judge A. F. Barkley and Honest Bill Miller of the program committee are planning the official opening of Lake McClellan in Gray County for July 4th.

This word comes from Bob Holloway, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor, serving Hansford, Hutchinson, Lipscomb and Ochiltree Counties.

Holloway said citizens who are 62 years and over, living in a rural community of 2,500 or less, may be eligible for a 33 year loan bearing 4 percent interest to buy an older home or build a new one.

The FHA supervisor said elderly residents may also be eligible for smaller loans for home repairs.

He pointed out the increasing demand in small towns for rental units designed to meet the housing needs of older folks.

Funds for construction of senior citizen rental housing units may also be provided by private investors with FHA guaranteeing repayment.

This fiscal year through April 30 Farmers Home Administration has advanced \$5,586, No. 876 to senior citizens for construction, buying and repairing of individual homes. The total loaned is up 17 percent over a similar period last fiscal year.

Over 1,200 elderly people in the 50 states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands were able to get loans for new or improved housing through the senior citizen rural housing program of Farmers Home Administration.

Another \$1,248,510 was advanced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture agency for the construction of rental housing units for senior citizens during the same period, July 1, 1964 through April 30, 1965.

"Farmers Home Administration's senior citizen housing loan program offers citizens, 62 years and older, an opportunity to have housing suited to their needs in the community in which they have spent their working years," Holloway said. "This program also stimulates the local economy by providing jobs for workers engaged in the construction industry and customers for local trades and services."

In 1962 Congress authorized Farmers Home Administration to make direct loans and insured loans to individuals and corporations to finance rental housing for the elderly.

FHA direct loans for senior citizen rental housing in rural communities bear 3.75 percent interest, with up to 50 years to repayment.

But loans insured by the agency for rental housing currently bear 5.75 percent interest. Borrowers have up to 40 years to repay.

Additional information about the senior citizen rural housing loan program is available at the Farmers Home Administration office 510 South Main, Perryton, Texas 79070.

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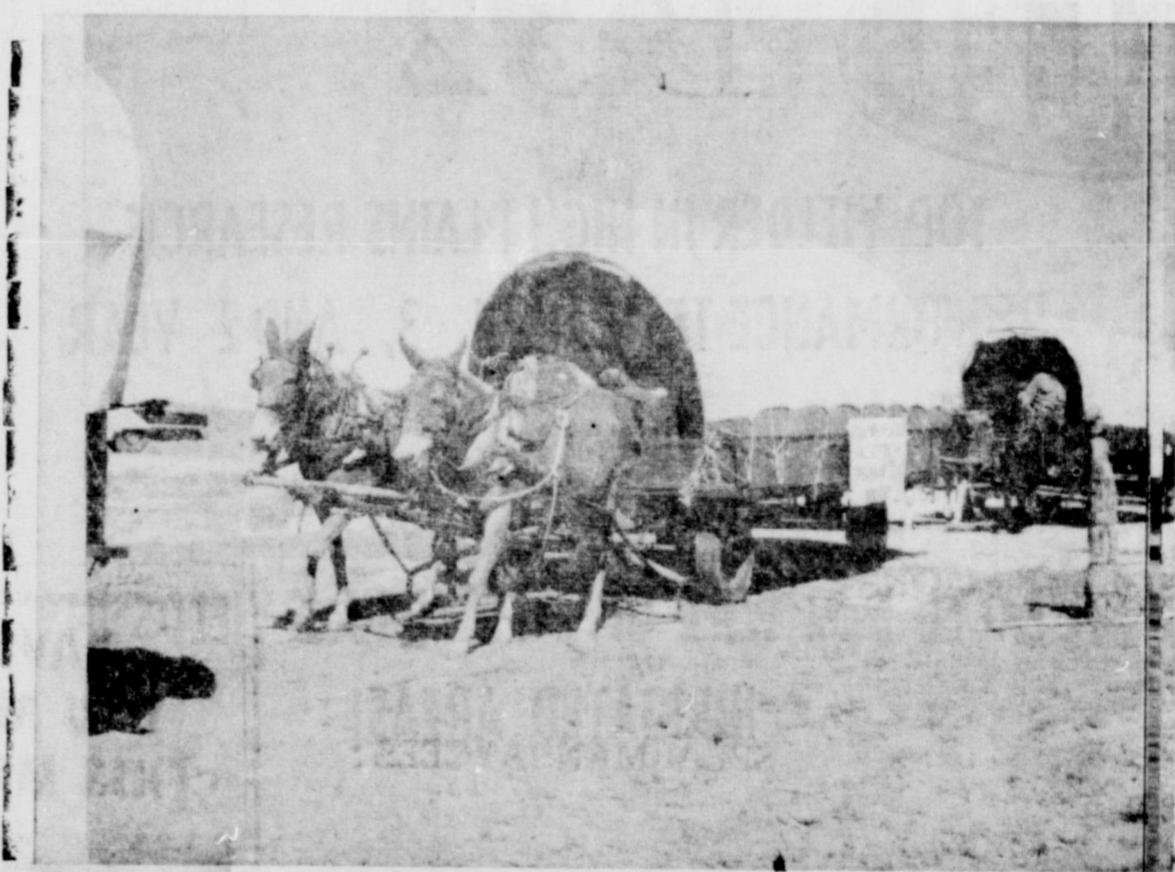
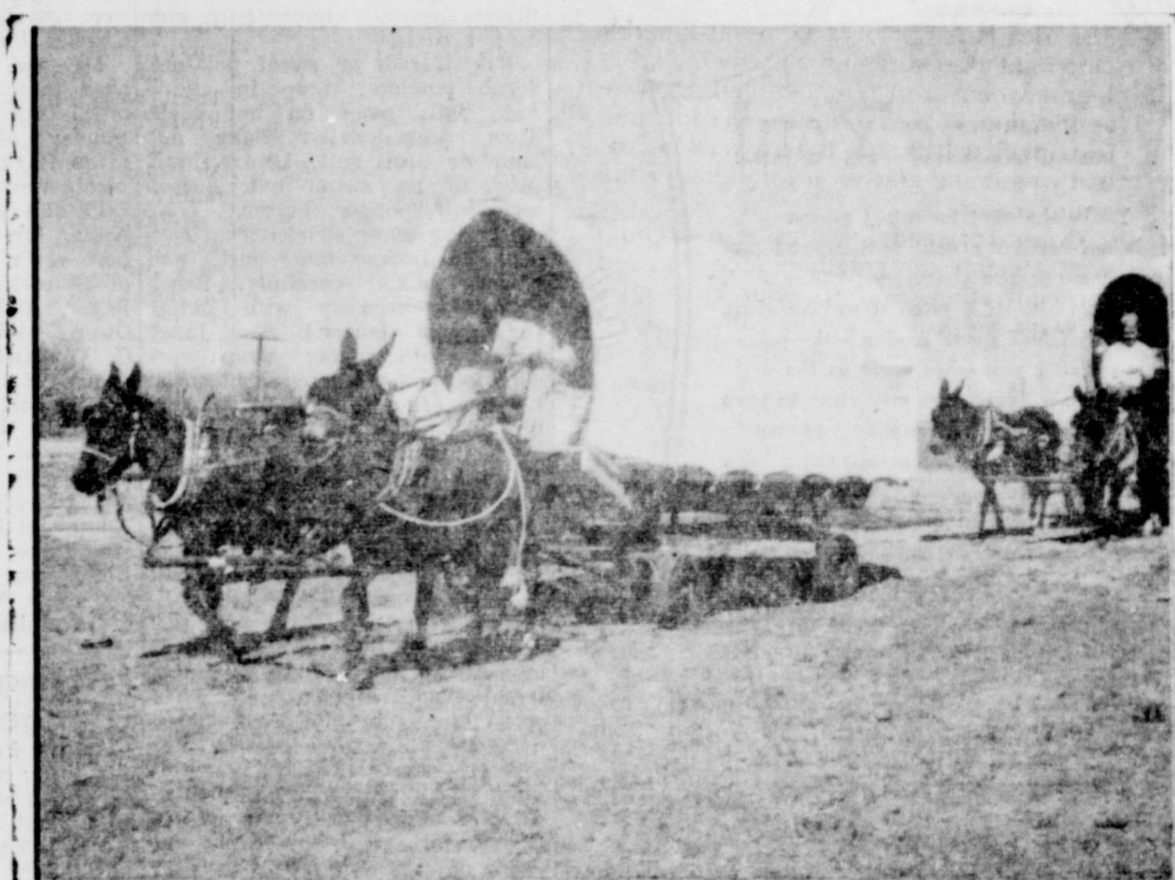

# HOMEMAKING NOTES

by Linda Webb, Home Depr. Agent

Hansford County can be mighty proud of 16 4-H delegates who attended State 4-H Roundup in College Station, June 1-3.

Winning a blue ribbon in the State Favorite Foods Show, was Rebecca Hutchison of Spearman. Her entry was a carrot cake in the Bread and Cereal division.

Contestants in this contest were awarded blue, red, or white ribbons. The blue ribbon winners are eligible to turn in their record books in the fall to be judged in the Foods-Nutrition Awards program.

Here is Rebecca's blue ribbon Carrot Cake recipe:  
 2 cups granulated sugar 1 1/3 cup cooking oil 3 eggs 3 cups flour, 2 teaspoons soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon 2 cups grated carrots, 1 small can crushed pineapple, drained 2 Tablespoons pineapple juice

Mix sugar, oil and eggs. Add one egg at a time, beating after each one. Add the sifted dry ingredients. Mix well. Add carrots, pineapple, and juice.

Pour into two 9 inch greased and floured pans. Bake at 45-50 minutes at 350 degrees.

Cool and ice with cream cheese icing: ICING: 1 (oz.) package cream cheese 1/4 lb. butter or margarine 1 lb. powdered sugar 1 cup chopped pecans. Cream together soften cream cheese and butter. Mix in sifted powdered sugar and nuts.

Patricia Henderson and Susan Graves of Morse was the first place winning team in the safety contest. Their demonstration on "Adequate Circuit Protection for the Home" is one I wish everyone could see.

Several of the 4-H girls are giving programs at the Home Demonstration Clubs around the county this month. This is an effort to help the H. D. club members learn more about the 4-H Club program.

Sewing is of particular interest to the 4-H members right now since chool is out. We have a good many girls enrolled in clothing, but we are short of adult cloth-

ing leaders this summer. Anyone interested in working as a clothing leader with these girls is welcome to call the office as soon as possible.

LAST NOTE: Another definition of the breaking point is when Mother's patience is exhausted but her children aren't.

Looking for different vegetable cooking ideas for the charcoal grill doesn't have to be a task. Almost every vegetable except the leafy greens and certain others, can be successfully cooked this way to accompany the delectable grilled meat.

Some vegetables are left whole while others are cut into large pieces. Potatoes and squash may be cooked in their skins. Try these ideas: Place a slice of cabbage and a couple of slices of onion on a 12 inch square of aluminum foil. Season with butter salt, and pepper. Close the foil with a drug store type wrap, closing the ends well so juice can't leak out. Place the foil-wrapped vegetables in the hot coals to cook for 5-6 minutes on each side. Delicious! (This is an individual portions.) This same principle can work for most any vegetable. Peel and shoe string one sweet potato. Place on aluminum foil; add two tablespoons water, about 1/2 cup brown sugar. Fold and wrap. Bake approximately seven minutes each side in hot coals.

Baked Irish or sweet potatoes. Scrub potatoes. Wrap in aluminum foil; place on hot coals. Turn occasionally. Bake one hour or until soft. Unwrap and prick to let steam out. Season with salt, pepper, butter.

Remove outer shucks from ears of corn. Loosen inner shucks and remove silks carefully. Brush kernels generously with butter (or garlic butter.) Tie inner shucks into place; wrap ears with foil and place over hot coals, turning often, for 10 to 25 minutes, depending on the tenderness of the corn.

Last week, I didn't mention that young tender chickens and turkeys are suited to outdoor cooking. They may be cooked whole, halved or quartered. Small or medium sized whole fish, fillets and fish steaks grill well, too.

For those women and girls interested in the 1965 "Make-It-With-Wool" contest, I now have entry blanks in my office. There will be four divisions in our country and district competition, which are: 1. Sub-Deb 10 to 13 years of age. 2. Junior - 14 to 18 years of age. 3. Senior 18 to 21 years of age. 4. Adult - over 21 years of age.

Begin thinking now about this contest, and enter our county competition. You may just be a winner.

Tune in to Channel 3 TV in Spearman each morning at 10:30 a.m. for the County Extension Agents program. I am on the 15 minute program every other week with news and notes for the homemaker. Those who are on the Spearman TV cable are asked to join me then.

Acting Postmaster Suggests Exhibit

Acting Postmaster "Jake" Jacobs today suggested residents of Spearman visit the special post office and exhibit if they attend the New York World's Fair.

Highlight of the display is the nation's most famous postal error

the 1918 twenty-four-cent airmail stamp with the up-side down map plane, the acting postmaster said.

In addition to original die proofs of the "mistake" and other philatelic rarities connected with the airmail invert, the post office features an exhibit on the development of the John F. Kennedy Stamp, and a special branch of the Post Office Department's Philatelic Sales Agency, offering a complete stock of all commemorative issues now available.

Visitors to the modern postal installation will receive a free commemorative cachet envelope picturing the post office.

The most up-to-date postal equipment in use, and several experimental models, are installed in the World's Fair Post Office. One mechanism mechanically places letters in their long end spots the stamp and, if necessary, flips the envelopes so that they are in the proper position and then cancels them. Another device over 70 feet long, contains 12 stations from which postal clerks direct letters into nearly 300 bins as they separate the mail for speedy delivery.

The World's Fair Post Office processes approximately 250,000 pieces of mail each day. Visitors are able to see all operations from a ramp which circles the work area. A tape recorded commentary explains the action.

Twenty-one mail boxes from every area of the world line the entrance walk.

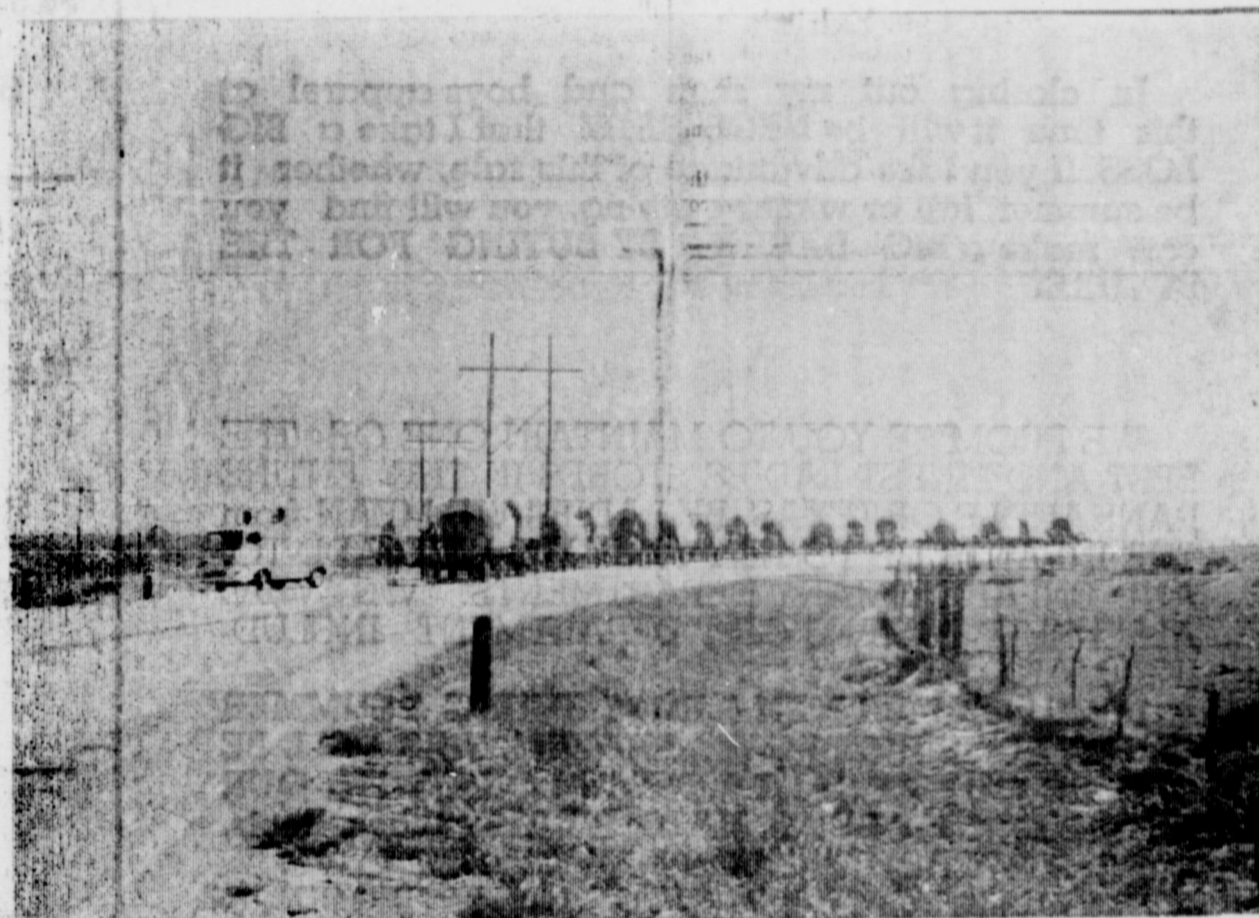
