Grissam's Trial Begins May 17

Johnny Lincoln Grissam, 34, will go on trial in Hansford County, May 17 for the slaying of P. H. (Mickey) Westerfield, February 26. Grissam was employed as a farm laborer, near Gruver.

Westerfield, a prominent Gruver merchant and long-time resident of the area, was gunned down about 9 p.m. at the rear of his dry goods store in Gruver. It is believed that Grissam, while attempting to burglarize the store, was surprised by Westerfield when he returned to the store about 9 p.m. for a security check and to get a pickup truck he had left behind the building. Investigating officers said it appeared that burglaries had been attempted at two firms adjoining the Westerfield store, neither attempt successful. A rear window was broken at the Westerfield store where it is believed the entry was made.

After being shot, Westerfield struggled to the telephone and told the operator "I've been shot." A deputy sheriff called by the operator found the business man dead with the telephone receiver in his hand. Nothing was found to be missing from the store. Ernest Grissam, 27, younger brother of Johnny's, was also arrested as an accomplice in planning the burglary in which Westerfield was killed.

An official State Health Department citation for job proficiency has been awarded to Frank Kirk, superintendent of the Spearman city water department. Health agency engineers praised him as "a credit to his profession."

Signed by the state commissioner of health and authorities of competency is intended as visual evidence of skill in modern utility plant management and an understanding of the work's importance to community health.

Before a plant operator is certified, he must show proof of actual work experience and a record of satisfactory attendance at special schools at which the principles of utility plant management are taught. The schools are held under auspices of the state health agency, Texas A and M University, and the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association.

Many operators attend the schools on their own time and at their own expense to prepare themselves to take a written examination which they must pass before they can be certified.

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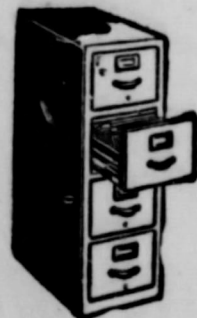

County Agents Report

Today's mighty oak is just yesterday's little nut that held its ground.

WEEDS ARE A PROBLEM
Weeds aren't a crop, but they get plenty of attention from farmers and scientists. One reason is that weeds and brush cost Texas producers \$486,719,000 each year.

Late in January about 900 delegates attended a 3-day meeting in Dallas to discuss weed problems and solutions. Registrants came from 31 states and two foreign countries.

Chemicals still may be the best method of controlling weeds, but scientists discussed many related topics - changes in application equipment, land preparation and planting times, and different control programs throughout the country.

BROWN WHEAT MITE
Norris Daniels, entomologist at Bushland, reported recently on his study about effect of brown wheat mite control on wheat yield.

So far he has found that yields are not increased by controlling the mite - at least when mites were in the numbers he had to control. Dimethoate was the most satisfactory compound tested.

Mite feeding also had no effect on soil moisture depletion.

RESEARCH IMPORTANT
Breakthroughs in research have been made in the past. The promise of the future also looks good.

Scientists say a hybrid wheat could easily increase the yield of wheat by \$20-\$30 million per year. They also say the cost of cotton production, if reduced by 10 to 11 cents a pound, would stabilize domestic world markets.

Other predictions... greater foreign markets for grain sorghum by stabilizing quality of the grain... improved rangeland production... and doubling our nearly \$100 million vegetable production by developing specific market systems.

GRAIN SORGHUM RATES
Plant grain sorghum drilled or two rows per bed, use 8 to 10 pounds seed per acre, and take advantage of chemicals to keep the weeds out. This is the production combination that can yield more grain, more profit, with less work.

Tests at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station at Bushland, Texas, and at the South Plains and Extension Center, Lubbock, have shown narrow-row grain sorghum a yield-booster when properly managed. The fertility level of the soil is a determining factor in getting high yields from narrow-row sorghum. Water must also be available when needed to maintain grain yields. According to agronomist, the fertility and irrigation levels should have a potential of at least 6500 pounds grain per acre or more before narrow-row planting could be expected to out yield regular 40" rows.

At the Bushland Station, experiments were conducted with different row spacings and plant densities over a three-year period. The 12 and 20-inch spacings consistently produced grain yields of 1000 pounds per acre higher and also produced more grain per inch of water used than the 30 or 40-inch row spacings. This is the report from Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station agronomist headquartered at Bushland.

Dr. Porter says rate of seed planted per acre had little influence on grain yields. Pounds of seed planted per acre were 4, 8, and 12 pounds at each row spacing. The higher planting rates produced the higher forage yields but not more grain. According to Dr. Porter about 8 to 10 pounds seed per acre should give sufficient plants for maximum grain yield under most conditions, regardless of row spacing used. If the crop is being produced for grain, seed planting rates higher than 10 pounds per acre would then serve no useful purpose-in fact, these tests showed the fertilizer may not be as efficient for grain production as at lower seed planting rates.

Comparable increases in yields are possible by planting two narrow rows on beds spaced about 10-inches apart. Many Plains farmers are going to this planting method-spacing rows on the bed 12-16 inches apart. But to obtain the most benefit from narrow-row spacing, adequate fertilizer and moisture levels must be maintained.

Narrow-row spacings also have the advantage over wide rows in weed control. Plants in narrow rows will shade out many of the weeds. With the addition of a new herbicide, propazine to the grain sorghum chemicals list, weed control in narrow row sorghum is made even more efficient.

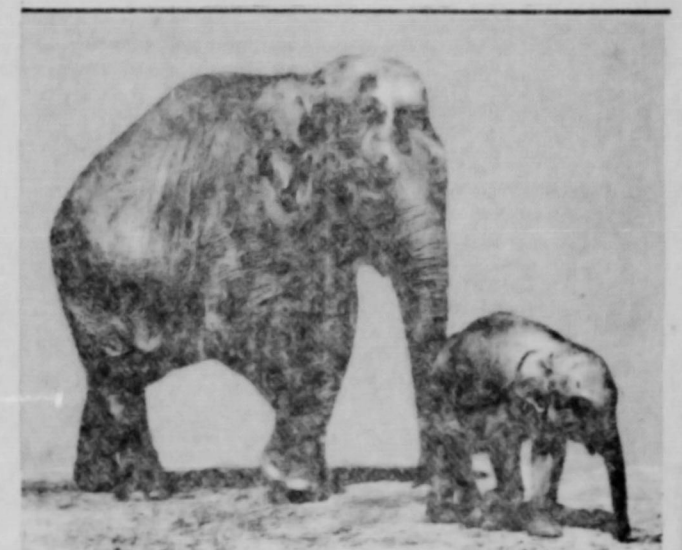

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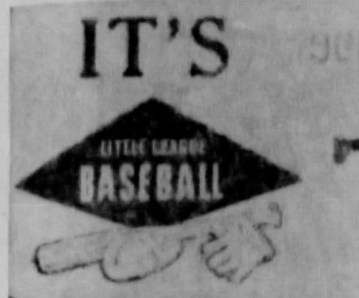
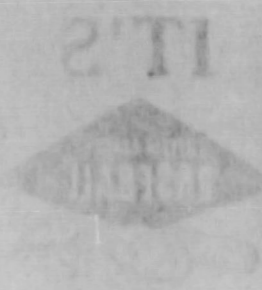

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HOMEMAKING NOTES

Since cars represent a major investment the trade-in value of an old car may be a deciding factor when you can trade in your family to a new one. And the trade-in price depends considerably upon the condition of your car inside as well as out. Thanks to the wide use of plastics to keep its outside shining the car interior clean and as to keep its outside shining. Plastics are suds-washable. There is no more efficient or effective way to remove dirt. This applies to plastic upholstery, floor mats, door panels, coilings, dashboards, steering wheels, and interior accessories. Plastic covers and floor protectors facilitate cleaning cars equipped with fabric upholstery and carpeting.

Experts advise that a family car with heavy use should get a daily brushout and pickup treatment to remove grit and pebbles from the floor and crumbs, crumpled tissues, or minor debris from the seats. A whisk broom and supply of paper bags to hold the clutter can be kept in the garage for this purpose. The car needs a thorough "house cleaning" often to keep it in tip-top condition. For efficiency, the following procedures are recommended:

1. Use a firm whisk broom to brush any gravel or pebbles from the floor.
2. If possible, use vacuum cleaner attachments to remove surface dust and grit from inside the car, starting with the upholstery, and doing floor mats last. Or substitute a stiff whisk broom, working with firm strokes.
3. If the ceiling is plastic-covered, make it the first target for sudsing to prevent soiled suds from dripping on the upholstery. Mix a handful or two of soap or detergent with a

little warm water and swish up thick suds. With a soft cloth or sponge, skim the thick lather off the surface and apply this to the ceiling, starting in one rear corner. Wash section by section, using a circular or back-and-forth motion. Rinse with a sponge or cloth wrung out of clear water, and wipe dry with a clean cloth. Be sure to wash the cover of the ceiling light.

4. Use the same suds-rinse-and-dry method on leather or plastic upholstery, door panels, and arm rests. Most stains will come off with thick suds if treated while fresh. Avoid using volatile cleaning solutions which may cause cracking or hardening. A special plastic dye is recommended for soil or stains that won't wash off. Plastic seat covers can either be sudsed in position, or removed for an occasional thorough washing. If washed outside the car, covers should be rinsed thoroughly and spread in a shady spot to air-dry. Most fabric covers are machine-washable while others

can be sudsed by hand, then replaced slightly damp so they can be smoothed in place with out pressing.

5. Fabric upholstery should be vacuumed thoroughly when seat covers are removed. If the fabric is soiled or grimy, it can be "shampooed" with "dry" suds. Put a generous handful of detergent in a bowl with a little water and use an egg beater to whip up a stiff lather. Dip a cloth, sponge, or soft brush into the lather and shampoo the upholstery surface, one small section at a time, with a brisk rotary motion. Keep the suds fluffy to hold the loosened soil, and scrape it off with a spatula. Wipe the area with a sponge wrung out of clean water, overlapping sections to prevent streaking. Repeat until the entire surface is clean. Leave the car doors and windows open to hasten drying the fabric. To restore the color to dulled fabric, add a tablespoon of ammonia to the suds.

6. Use a sudsy sponge or cloth to wash grit, perspiration, and

sticks—fingerprints—from the steering wheel. Rinse and dry with a soft cloth. Repeat for the dashboard, doorknobs, handles, sunvisors, and rear-view mirror.

7. Remove, wash, and replace the ash tray. Swab the glove compartment with suds.
8. Wash the rear package shelf if it is a hard surface or plastic-covered. Torn fabric should be cemented in place with a good adhesive.

9. Remove rubber floor mats, if possible, for a suds-scrubbing on both sides with a stiff brush; then rinse with a hose or bucket of water. Worn spots can be repaired with color-matched rubber patches, and faded mats can be brightened with a rubber finish.

10. Carpeting should be thoroughly vacuumed, then deep soil and grime can be removed with the same "dry" suds treatment used for fabric upholstery. Worn spots can be repaired by filling them with special "flocking" material made of adhesive and goat hair.

11. Use lukewarm suds to wash the windshield and windows. Rinse using clear water with a pinch of bluing and a few drops of kerosene added to give extra sparkle.
12. Remove all debris from the trunk, and vacuum or brush soil from carpeting. Suds off the hard surface with a sponge or brush.
13. Keep a covered jar of clean sudsy water, and a clean sponge or soft cloth, in the glove compartment to take care of spills promptly.

Who goes to all that trouble on a car? Lots of people do, and you should too, to keep your car interior in good condition. A neat, clean car is more pleasant and fun to use. It is also a source of pride to the family—and more valuable when it comes time to see that man about a trade-in.

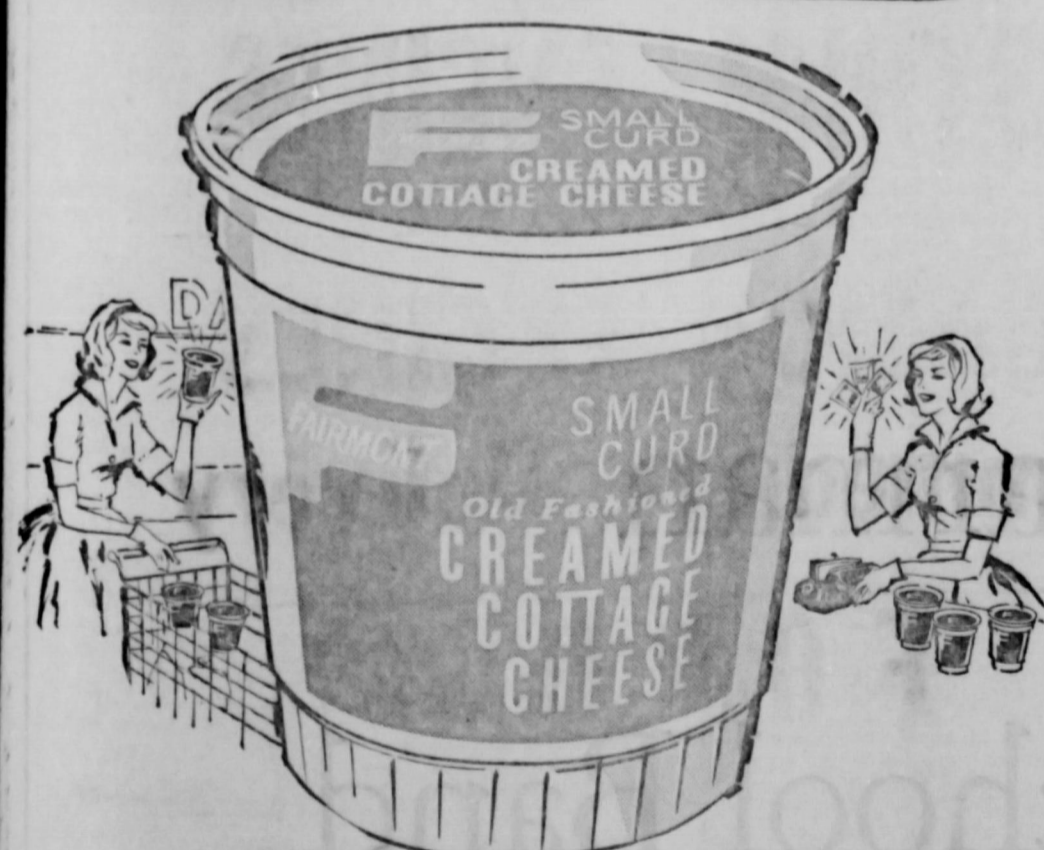
