HOMEMAKING NOTES

Having just returned from our County 4-H Camp in Red River, New Mexico, at this writing, I find my desk piled high with lots of things I want to pass along to you. We had a very enjoyable time at Camp, and are already looking forward to next year. July 25-31 is Farm Safety Week. This year's slogan is "Stay Safe and Alive in '65." Many lives are lost or permanently damaged each year through accidents in the home and on the farm. Please be careful so yours won't become one of these.

Safety begins at home, so eliminate household hazards as you find them. Be a good housekeeper at all times. Chemicals are being more widely used in agriculture and about the farm home. Always read the label, use as directed, and store them safely. Prevent falls by taking your time, and by making stairs, ladders and paths clear of obstruction, safe to use. Be courteous on the highway. Live and let live. Know and obey all traffic laws and follow safe driving practices. With your farm machinery, don't depend on luck. Make sure equipment is in safe operating condition. Equip your farm vehicles with the new slow-moving vehicle emblem.

Take safety seriously at all times, especially in recreation, around water, and when handling guns. Since I'm planning to begin my vacation July 22, this next reminder for me, as I hope it will be for you. You can stretch your vacation if you actually start it when you leave home. Going can be as much fun and as relaxing as being at the destination. Provided you plan the trip carefully. Take all necessary equipment for emergencies and don't push it hard to reach your destination.

Here's a handy check list to aid you in getting started. It's prepared by the Women's Department of the National Safety Council. Have your car checked before starting. This should include brakes, lights, tires, steering and wheel alignment, windshield wipers and horn. This is a good time to install seat belts for all passengers, including children. Take along emergency equipment, such as a flashlight and warning flares, reflectors or red flags for use if trouble arises. Start your trip early and don't try to cover too great a distance each day.

Study and understand driving techniques in different localities, such as in the mountains or on superhighways. Always read high way signs and signals carefully, since they are not uniform in all states. Take the sun in easy doses. Wear sun glasses, and don't nap in the sun. Stay out of the water for at least an hour after eating. Swim in sight of others. Be sure the water is deep enough and free of obstructions before swimming. Don't scoff at poison ivy. Doctors say a lot of 10 persons are susceptible.

LAST NOTE: For a terrifying demonstration of what a nuclear explosion would do to the food supply, let you teen-agers invite a few friends over for dinner.

Mindy Murrell won 1st place in the aged Registered Quarter Horse Mare Class and placed 7th in the Western Pleasure Class. There were over 100 entries & she placed 22nd in the overall competition. The top 16 go to the State 4-H Horse show. Pat Sloan was in the top 24 in the Western Pleasure Class, with 95 entered.

County Agents Report

FARM SAFETY WEEK The President of the United States has proclaimed the week of July 25-31, 1965, as National Farm Safety Week. Governor John Connally has designated this week as Farm Safety Week in Texas. The theme of the observance this year is "Safe & Alive in 1965." Farm and rural accidents continue to take a heavy toll in lives lost and injuries suffered. The latest yearly breakdown of farm residential accidents shows a total of 4,400 deaths and 780,000 injuries. Statistics about accidents may be startling, but they do not convey the pain, grief, loneliness, and hardship accidents bring. No purpose is served by accidents. No one benefits by having an accident. But everyone gains when people work together on strong purposeful accident prevention programs. During Farm Safety Week many people and agencies, both public and private, will be working together on a statewide accident prevention educational program. This rural safety campaign is co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and U. S. Department of Agriculture. Special emphasis this year is being given to preventing accidents involving slow moving vehicles, chemicals, and electricity and in recreation.

The slow moving vehicle emblem identifies vehicles designed to travel 25 mph or less. You can recognize it within 500 feet day or night. Low speeds are dangerous! They cause more, worse, and more costly accidents than average speeds. In one-third of all highway accidents studied recently, one driver went slower than the other. Very slow speeds had the greatest effect on the number of accidents. You are least likely to have an accident if you drive at the average speed of vehicles on the highway you're traveling. During the day, a driver traveling at a speed of 20 miles per hour on main roadways is about 100 times more likely to become involved in an accident than a driver traveling at a speed of 65 miles an hour. Nearly half of all accidents were either rear-end collisions or same-direction side swipes. About 40 percent of day and 40 percent of night accidents were of this type.

SOIL BACTERIA ERADICATION PROGRAM

California has first confirmed screwworm infestation this season. With nearly half the year yet to go, Texas has already recorded more screwworm infestation than any other state. The total (223) was surpassed last year and although the number of cases has been decreasing the level of infestation still much higher than a year ago and the dangerous fall season is still ahead. New Mexico, with 40 cases reported, long ago went ahead of its total of 14 infestations a year ago. Arizona had 158 cases in 1964, and has recorded 120 cases thus far this year.

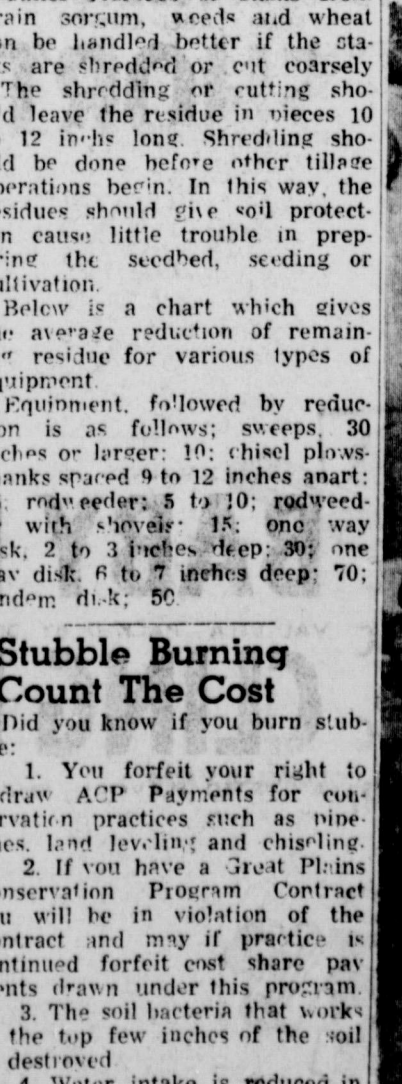
If the producer will just pause and reflect, then he should give thought to his ranch management operations today so that we will not have to go back to what it used to be. There is still a need for the producer to be watchful every day as he rides the pasture for wounds made by natural causes to avoid possible screwworm cases. If any suspected cases are found there is still the need for submitting specimens for positive identification. It is only through good management practices and submission of suspected screwworm specimens that the eradication program can be successful.

4-H Electric Camp

DON'T BURN YOUR STUBBLE Burning your wheat stubble is not good conservation practice as it destroys the structure of your soil. This is the long term damage. If you burn stubble; water intake is reduced, wind erosion hazard is increased, and soil bacteria is destroyed. The handling of small grain residue begins with the harvest. If a field is to be stubbled, the combine should be equipped with a straw spreader. When the straw is spread, grain fields can be stubbled mulched without difficulty. Taller residues or stalks from grain sorghum, weeds and wheat can be handled better if the stalks are shredded or cut coarsely. The shredding or cutting should leave the residue in pieces 10 to 12 inches long. Shredding should be done before other tillage operations begin. In this way, the residues should give soil protection cause little trouble in preparing the seedbed, seeding or cultivation. Below is a chart which gives the average reduction of remaining residue for various types of equipment. Equipment, followed by reduction is as follows: sweeps, 30 inches or larger: 10; chisel plows-shanks spaced 9 to 12 inches apart: 25; rodweeder: 5 to 10; rodweeder with shovels: 15; one way disk, 2 to 3 inches deep: 30; one way disk, 6 to 7 inches deep: 70; tandem disk: 50.

Stubble Burning Count The Cost

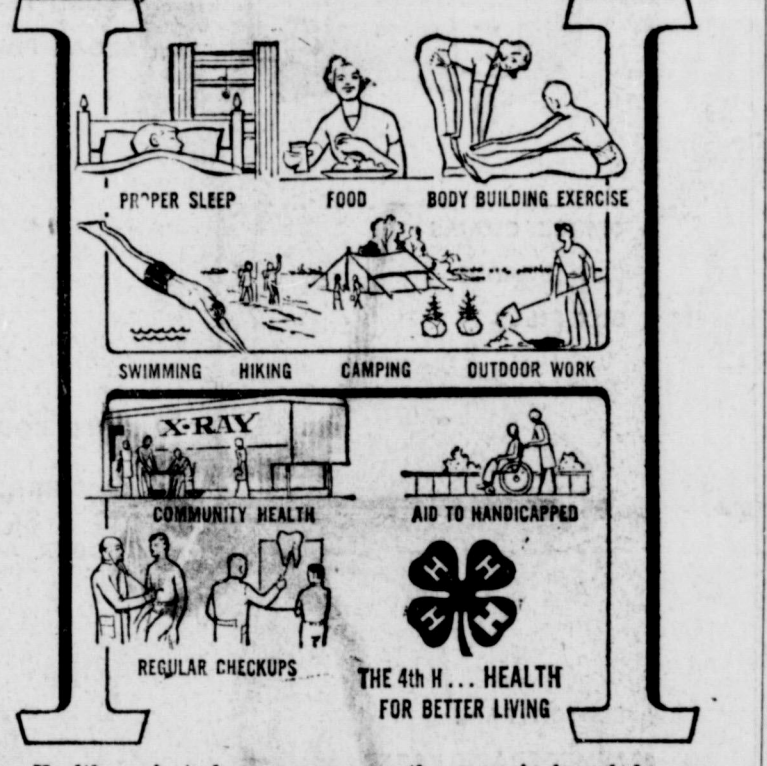
Did you know if you burn stubble: 1. You forfeit your right to draw ACP Payments for conservation practices such as no-till, land leveling, and chiseling. 2. If you have a Great Plains Conservation Program Contract you will be in violation of the Contract and may if practice is continued forfeit cost share payments drawn under this program. 3. And keeping fit is one important segment of the national 4-H Health program which today enrolls some 677,000 boys and girls. It is easy to keep in good shape during summer months through sports, games, hikes, camping and outdoor work. But, cautions the 4-H Health bulletin, there is more to maintaining good health than strenuous exercise. This recent publication points out the need for three nutritional meals a day, plenty of sleep, periodic physical checkups and a sensible balance of work and play. It also urges 4-H Club members to look for ways to improve family and community health. Individual members and clubs can win awards for doing an outstanding job. Winners are selected by the Extension Service. Award donor and sponsor of the 4-H Health program for the last 10 years is Eli Lilly and Company. The boy or girl judged best in the state will be a delegate to the National 4-H Club Congress at Chicago next fall, and will compete for one of six \$300 scholarships. In the county, the best four club projects will be recognized with a certificate and medals will be presented to as many as four top individuals.

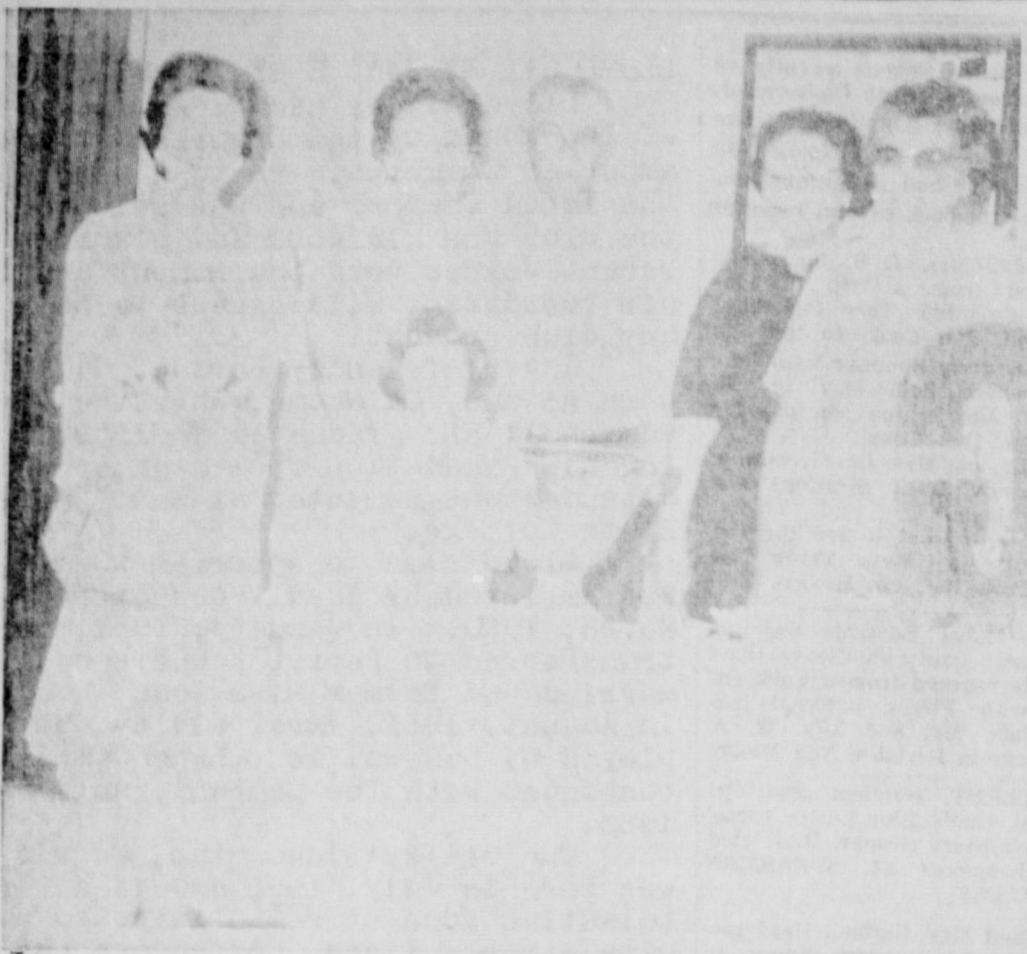
