Several County residents were in attendance at the democratic meeting in Amarillo Friday and Saturday of last week. County Chairman J. D. Helms assisted the Amarillo County Democratic Executive Committee in its quarterly meeting. Helms also chauffeured Governor and Mrs. Connelly to various functions and activities in Amarillo and the appreciation dinner for Senator Grady Newland Saturday evening in Canyon.

Others present for all or a portion of the festivities were Mr. and Mrs. Gene Cluck, Mr. & Mrs. Carl Archer, Mr. & Mrs. R. D. McClellan, Mr. and Mrs. James P. Linn and C. T. Collier. The 31st Senatorial District was honored with the presence of many State Officials, including Governor and representatives from all over the State. Also present for the noon luncheon on Saturday was Congressman Walter Rogers. This particular meeting of the SDEC became more important when Governor Connelly announced that he would make known his political plans for the future by the middle of September. This announcement came at the noon luncheon on Saturday when he spoke to an overflow crowd at the Holiday Inn West. Governor and Mrs. Connelly arrived Friday evening by way of Childress, because the weather would not permit their plane to land in Amarillo. Many anxious moments were spent by those in attendance prior to Governor Connelly announcing that he would seek reelection. Lt. Governor and Mrs. Preston Smith and Attorney General and Mrs. Waggoner Carr were also present and both announced their future political plans. Lt. Governor Smith announced immediately that he would seek reelection and shortly thereafter and held a press conference and announced that he would be a candidate for the U. S. Senate seeking the seat held by Senator Tower.

Exercise Caution On Meeting School Bus

With the coming of September the movement of thousands of pupils starts to and from Texas public schools. About one out of five of these children ride a school bus. The safety of these pupils is of the utmost importance and each motorist has a responsible part to play.

The motorist traveling Texas highways is reminded that upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which is stopped for receiving or discharging children, he shall stop his vehicle. He may then proceed past the bus at a prudent speed not to exceed 10 miles per hour. Drivers of motor vehicles are urged to exercise due caution each time they approach one of the well-marked buses painted the familiar "school bus yellow." Cooperation of motorists with bus drivers and local school officials may help save the lives of one of the 450,000 pupils that will likely be riding Texas school buses during 1965-66.

Homemaking Notes

The Hansford county bake queen Rebecca Hutchison, has entered baked products angel food cake, and sweet milk biscuits this week in the district 4.H bake show at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo.

The products of each of the 19 contestants in the district bake show contest will be on display all this week in the Women's building at the Tri-State Fair. Winners for this district contest will be announced Saturday, September 25 at the Rural Youth Day program, which begins at 9:30 a. m. The program will be telecast over KGNC on "Cotton

John's Farm and Home Show", September 25. Becky will be introduced among the bake show contestants on the program, so do watch for her.

Mothers, attention please. To this next note — especially those of you who have teen age or near teenage daughters.

A girl's appearance has quite an effect on the grades she brings home from school. These are years, of course, when complexion troubles often occur. Anxiety about facial blemishes can actually destroy self-confidence which in turn affects ability to concentrate on studies.

The best thing a mother can do is to add the subject of beauty care to daughters schedule. It need not be a sophisticated routine, but a simple soap and water program that medical authorities recommend for difficult skin.

Teach daughter to apply dense warm suds to the face like a mask. Let this mask dry then rinse it off and apply a second coating of suds next rinse the skin thoroughly.

Such a simple treatment helps draw oil from the skin and flush out dirt that otherwise would cause blemishes. This treatment

is better than hard scrubbing which can injure youthful skin, some beauty experts say.

Last week I began on the subject of simplifying house cleaning chores. I promised some information about floor waxes, which is quite a large area to cover in such a short space.

Other people do look at your floors, and what they see is an important part of their impression of your home. Regardless of the flooring materials, treated right, they will stay lovely year after year.

Waxed floors look better and stay cleaner longer. Wax keeps grit from grinding into the surface and protects from wear. Understanding what products are available, and where to use them is a long step toward good floor care.

There are two kinds of floor care, products:

(1) Polishing waxes (paste or liquid) that must be buffed to a shine. These products contain naphtha to keep the wax soft for easy application. These waxes clean the floors as they are applied, for naphtha dissolves the old polishing wax on the floor; ground-in dirt is loosened and

picked up by the applicator. With polishing wax, you never have to wash the floor; never have to remove the old wax.

Polishing waxes may be used on every type floor EXCEPT asphalt tile. Asphalt tile can be damaged by the naphtha (or other cleaning agent in polishing wax) as well as by grease, oil, strong cleaners scouring powder, nail polish remover etc.

If you aren't sure whether the floor is asphalt tile, test a small inconspicuous spot with lighter fluid, spot remover or turpentine. If asphalt, the tile will soften or the color will be loosened.

Waxed floors look better and stay cleaner longer. Wax keeps grit from grinding into the surface and protects from wear. Understanding what products are available, and where to use them is a long step toward good floor care.

There are two kinds of floor care, products:

commended for best results. Self-polishing waxes may be used on any type of floor except wood and cork floors which are worn or in poor condition. Let me advise that reading the label on the wax container for instructions is your best bet before you buy any wax for any floor.

One new brand of wax on the market will not come off the floor, except with a strong ammonia cleaner or wax remover to help you cut down on the number of wax jobs you must do. It is well worth trying.

Daily care saves wear and tear-dry mop daily to keep sandy grime from grinding into the floor (see, even though use an oiled mop as it softens wax and dulls the shine). Pick up spills promptly and gently to save the wax shine particularly on kitchen floors where spills may come frequently.

Don't combine partially used cans of self-polishing wax, even of the same brand, as formulas may differ or improvements made from one can to the next.

Don't pour left-over wax back in the container. This contaminates the rest of the contents so that next time results aren't so good.

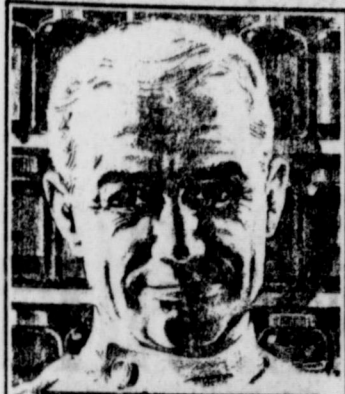

Quality Of Ground Water Discussed

Ground water contains varying amounts of dissolved minerals which determine its suitability for municipal industrial and irrigation uses. In the Northern High Plains the ground water

in the Jurassic and Triassic rocks is suitable for most uses whereas water from the underlying Permian rocks is more saline and is unsuitable for most uses. The Permian rocks are commonly known as the Red Bed.

In recent months water quality checks on a few irrigation wells in Hansford and Ochiltree Counties have indicated some salt water. These wells are generally deeper than other wells in the area.

A sincere effort is being made by the Water District to determine where the salt is coming from. It is a known fact that a salt formation underlies the Ogallala. This is our principal water bearing formation at a relatively shallow depth. However limited information on this salt formation makes it impossible to isolate it area by area at this time.

There are some things which a land owner can do which could help discover salt water before too much money is spent on the well.

(1) It is always important to obtain a good test hole driller-one who can catch accurate samples. This is of up most importance. You are paying for this service and should insist that samples be caught and logged on paper. This is especially true when drilling deep test.

(2) Immediately after the test hole is completed an electric log should be run. An electric log is just as important as any other phase of well drilling, however it will not supply all the answers. There are some things on an electric log which can indicate salt water.

IRRIGATION WELL OWNERS

The Dowell Division of The Dow Chemical Company has recently performed eight experimental well treatments from Stratford, Texas to Perryton, Texas in the North Plains Water District.

The purpose of these treatments was to remove plant growth (such as algae and brown mold), bacteria, iron scale, and clay or silt from the gravel pack, slotted casing and pump column. All of these things are known to be causing a loss of water production.

WANTED BY THE FBI



ALSON THOMAS WAHRLICH

Wahrlich, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for the crime of kidnaping. He allegedly abducted a 6-year-old Arizona girl in Tucson, Arizona, on April 16, 1964, and brutally beat, choked, and sexually molested her before leaving her abandoned in the same city. A Federal warrant was issued at Tucson on April 28, 1964, charging Wahrlich with unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for this offense.

A white American, Wahrlich was born in Rensselaer County, New York, on February 4, 1936. He is 5' 2" tall, weighs 135 to 140 pounds, wears glasses, has blue eyes, brown hair, a medium build and a medium complexion. He has a scar on his left shoulder, a vaccination scar on his left arm, a scar on each side of his abdomen, and a tattoo of a heart and the name "Cindy" on his left arm.

Wahrlich has worked as a truck driver, ranch worker, dishwasher, house trailer repairman, hospital orderly, insurance salesman, and ice cream truck vendor. He is very interested in guns and strongly prefers traveling by personally owned car. Wahrlich reportedly has mental blackouts, has been previously imprisoned for aggravated assault, child molesting, and a crime against nature. He reportedly is armed with a pistol and is said to carry a surgical scalpel in his trouser's pocket. Consider him armed and extremely dangerous.
