Colonel Cox Retires; 23 yrs.

Retirement ceremony for Lt. Charles L. Cox (left) Thursday at Dyess AFB, included presentation of an Air Force Commendation Medal. The award was presented by Colonel John L. Ryan (right), vice commander, 96th Strategic Aerospace Wing. A citation with the award read: "Lt. Col. Charles L. Cox distinguished himself by meritorious service as Commander, 42nd Munitions Maintenance Squadron, from August 1, 1964 to July 10, 1965. The statement cited his outstanding professional skill, vast technical knowledge and excellent supervisory ability. Lt. Col. Cox is residing in Spearman, Texas, 706 Gibner Drive.

Colonel Charles L. Cox retired after twenty three years in the United States Air Force and his family are living at 706 Gibner Drive where they purchased their home.

Coming to Spearman with the Conservation Service in the 1950s, Cox met and married Virginia Maize, a native of Spearman. They have two children, Charles, Jr., 21, who married and he and his wife moved to A&M.

Cox entered the service in 1942 and served in Puerto Rico during World War 2. He was discharged and lived in Spearman for three years, and being in the reserve, he was recalled during the Berlin Airlift. He decided to make the service his career.

During the years in service, he traveled and lived all over the world. His family has lived in Africa, among other places. He was stationed in England at different times.

The Colonel a graduate of Miles High School, received his degree from Schreiner Institute, Kerrville, Texas. He attended Texas Tech.

A native of San Angelo where his father is still living, Cox has had Spearman home for many years. The family was happy to be back to Spearman and the business as a licensed state surveyor and engineer.

Lunchroom Ready For Service This Monday

The Junior High and High School lunchrooms will be ready for serving the first day of school August 30, 1965.

The same menu will be served with each lunch designed to meet the requirements of the National School Lunch Program. In meeting these requirements each lunch shall consist of one-half pint whole milk, two ounces protein rich food, three-fourths cup fruit or vegetable, one slice enriched bread, two teaspoon butter and other foods needed for energy and to satisfy the appetite. This Type A lunch will generally meet one-third to one-half of the daily dietary allowances recommended by the National Research Council.

Since studies show that vitamin A and C are frequently short in children's diet, special attention will be given to include a vitamin C food in each lunch and A food in lunches twice during the week.

Cost of these lunches for Elementary and Junior High students will be 30c, as their nutritional needs will be minimum to average portions, also seconds will be available at no extra cost for these students.

Lunches for High School students and all faculty and others who wish to eat at the lunchrooms will be 40c, since larger servings are needed to meet the nutritional needs of teenagers (particularly boys) and adults.

For the convenience of students and parents lunch tickets are available in 5 lunches, 10 lunches, 20 lunches per tickets with no reduction made on the number of lunches purchased. No refunds will be made on lost tickets as tickets are to be considered the same as cash.

Ice Cream novelties are available at the High School lunchroom with additional cost of 5c, also extra cartons of milk (chocolate or white) are available at either lunch room at extra cost of 2c per carton.

A choice of meat, fish or cheese, will be offered on Friday at each lunchroom for those people whose religious convictions do not permit the eating of meats.

Parents are welcome to eat lunch with their children, but because of the large number of students served at the Elementary and Junior High lunchroom, it would be appreciated if you would call the manager and make arrangements before your scheduled visit.

A special election will be held throughout the State of Texas, September 7, 1965 for the purpose of adopting or rejecting the following constitutional amendment submitted by the 59th Legislature of Texas at its regular session in 1965:

The constitutional amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring the apportionment of the senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

The 411 program was represented by a very lovely girl from Northern Indiana.

Two most interesting displays were 190 pictures of Indiana Homemakers of Art work. 70 dolls were shown representing various countries for the A. C. W. W.

There were half-hour programs, staged each day of the convention, to see hear and learn. Early mornings consisted of Morning Spirituals, Marion Bar Ever's puppets and Marionettes. Even square dance lessons were given and hula lessons by Mrs. Mary Lee of Hula, Hawaii.

HOMEMAKING NOTES

To let you in on some of the new things across my desk, I've composed quite a potpourri of items for you this week.

For those of you who have lots of tomatoes and don't want to can them, you now can successfully freeze tomatoes. It's still true that fresh ripe tomatoes do not freeze well. But they may be frozen, either stewed or as juice.

Here's how:

FOR JUICE - wash, sort and trim vine-ripened tomatoes Cut in quarters or eights, and simmer 5 to 10 minutes. Press through a sieve. Season with a teaspoon salt to each quart of juice. Pour into freezing containers with wide top opening, allowing 1 inch space at top of each quart. Seal and freeze.

Stewed Tomatoes - Remove stem ends, peel, and quarter ripe tomatoes. Cover and cook until tender (10 to 20 minutes). Place pan containing tomatoes in cold water to cool. Pack into wide-topped freezing containers, leaving 1-inch head space per quart; 3/4 inch per pint. Seal and freeze.

If you plan to freeze a cake, be sure you use pure vanilla. The USDA says synthetic vanilla may give an off-flavor to frozen cakes.

There's a difference between chocolate milk and chocolate-flavored drink.

There is also a difference between Roquefort and bleu cheese, which is simply a matter of milk. Roquefort is made from the milk of ewes (female sheep) only in South France. Bleu cheese is made by the same methods but from the milk of cows - anywhere.

Speaking of cheese, a low-fat cheese that looks and taste like a very mild cheddar has been developed. Compared with cheddar's 31 percent butterfat, the new low fat cheese contains only 5 to 7 percent.

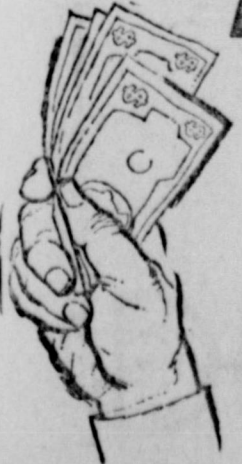

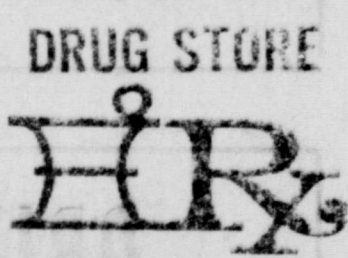

deeply regret to report that the United States does not now have a program to cull Communist propaganda from mail coming to this country from abroad. I had such a program, set up under a 1962 Act of Congress I advocated and supported but the law was struck down in the Supreme Court decision in Lamont vs. The Postmaster General. On the day the Supreme Court announced its decision in the Lamont case, all activity under the law was terminated. In two years in which the law was in effect gives us the precedence of the extent to which Communists seek to distort thinking of U. S. citizens through mailed propaganda. On January 7, 1963, special Foreign Postage Units manned by Postal Customs personnel were established in 11 key ports of entry as the Act took effect. From May until May 24, 1965, when the Supreme Court struck down the law with its Lamont decision, approximately 105 million pieces of foreign mailed matter were referred to these units. Approximately 43 million pieces of such matter were directed to "exempt" classes for the law had specifically exempted certain categories of recipients and its provisions did not apply to sealed letters. Of 43 million pieces of mail quickly sent along to those whom they were addressed, the remaining 62 million pieces of mail were examined and being forwarded. Of this approximately 4 percent determined to be constituted foreign communist political propaganda. In other words, in period of slightly more than two years in which the screening law was in effect, about 2.5 million pieces of Communist "junk mail" were by our Postal and Customs units.

County Agent's Report

Education is what a man gets when he sits in his living room with a group of teenagers. **SMALL FLIES FOUND** Some small flies were brought to my office last week that looked like the sorghum midge. I looked at this small insect with my magnifying glass and compared it with the sorghum midge specimen I had and decide it was not the sorghum midge. I sent it to Lubbock for identification. The small flies did belong to the midge family but it was not the sorghum midge. If you find any insect that you need to find out what it is, bring it in. If I cannot identify it, I will send it off for identification. **LITHIUM SALT OF 2,4-D** The release of Lithate, a lithium salt of 2,4-D has raised questions concerning the use of this non-volatile form of 2,4-D. The material is non-volatile as advertised. It is 2,4-D and subject to state and federal regulations concerning the use of hormone herbicides. The volatility of 2,4-D amines is also very limited. Most instances of crop injury from them is the result of drift from the sprayer rather than volatility. Sprays of the lithate will also drift, therefore, users are urged to observe the same precautions concerning spraying in windy weather, sprayer pressure and nozzle tip size that have become standard practice for 2,4-D. **WEEDS ON INCREASE** This statement is frequently heard from farmers "This weed didn't use to bother us but it seems to have come in in recent years". This statement is absolutely true in many cases. In a recent survey of the 10 most common weeds on the experiment station now and in 1948, the Montana Experiment Station found that the list had changed completely. Not a single weed appears on both lists. **AGENT'S VACATION** I will be out of my office from August 23 till September 7 on vacation.
