eliver children to their homes formally. They managed to trael on the paved highways but some children had to spend the night in town.

Among many incidents caused by the rain, Troy Sloan, who ives 9 miles southwest of Speirman was cut off from his wife, Frankie, who was alone at home. Horse Creek Draw runs about 100 yards in front of their home ind was on a rampage. Unable to reach his home by automobile, about 7:45 p.m., Troy forded the river on a tractor, the water covered the wheels. He reached Frankie who was running to him and waving for him to go back Seven inches of rain fell at their farm. Telephone service in that part of the county was out for two days.

Troy said it was the worse he had every seen; he had crossed the draw on horseback before and the water came to his feet. but he had never seen anything like it.

The overflow from Horse Creek flooded the F.B. Schubert home and damaged the carpets and floors.

Although the rain caused considerable damage it will help dry land wheat and the maize farmers, but probably will not add much to the underground water suply.

Offically, Spearman has rece ived 7.99 inches of rain this year with March being the biggest month previous with .85.
