Runner-up was Robbie Ownbey, 16 year old Junior in the Spearman High School. Miss Ownbey was sponsored by Anthony Electric.

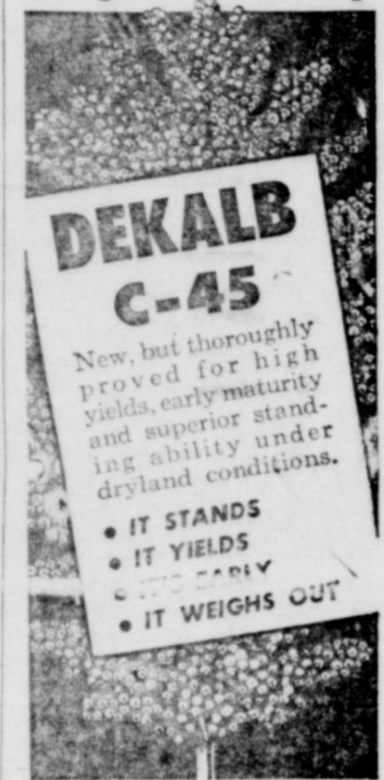

TO Distribute Cards Next Week

Acting Postmaster "Jake" Jacobs reminds rural patrons of the Spearman Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Jacobs explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way the USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are Juanita Ellsworth Route 1; Willicoughby Douglas Route 2; P. J. Dow Route 3.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions, Mr. Jacobs concludes.

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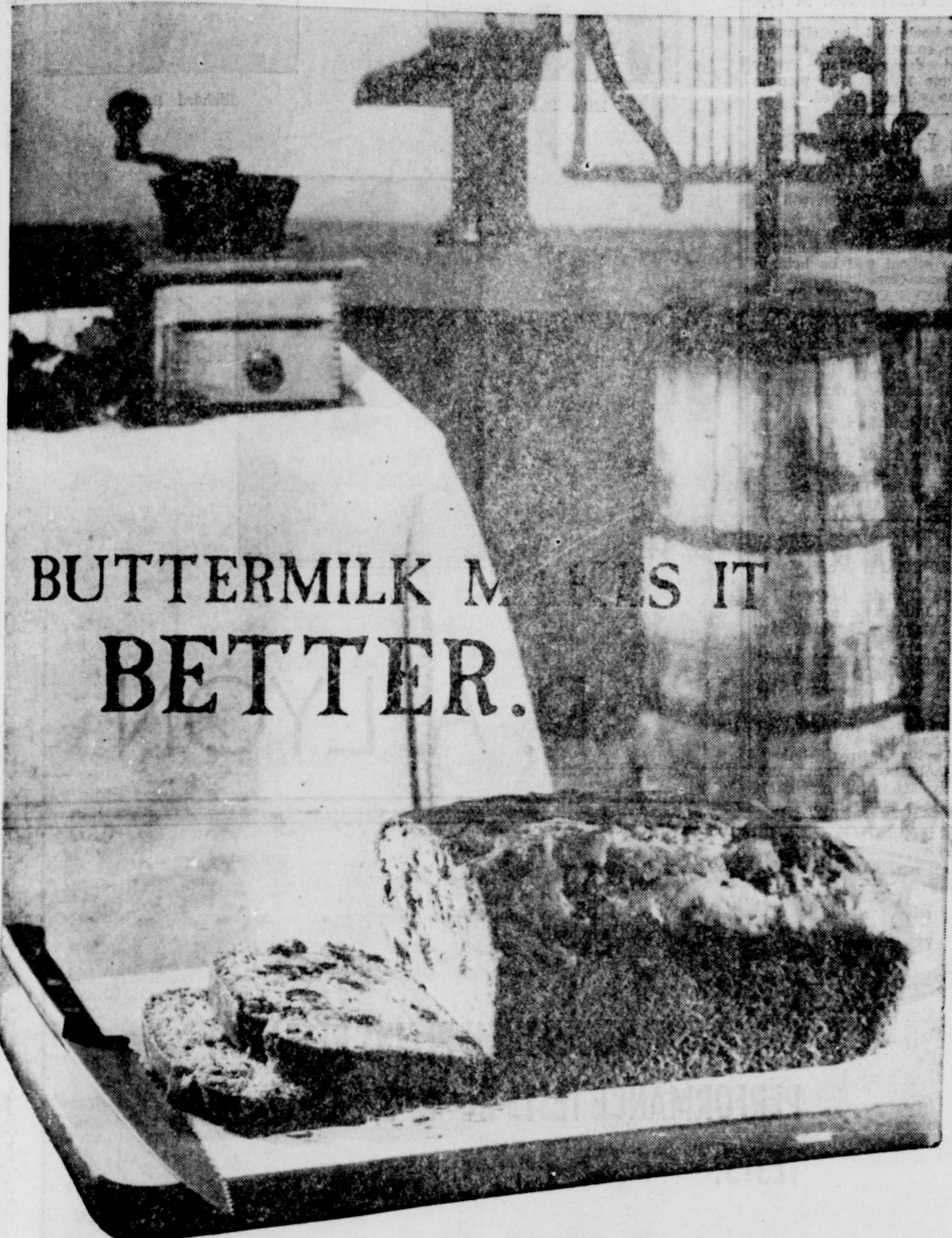

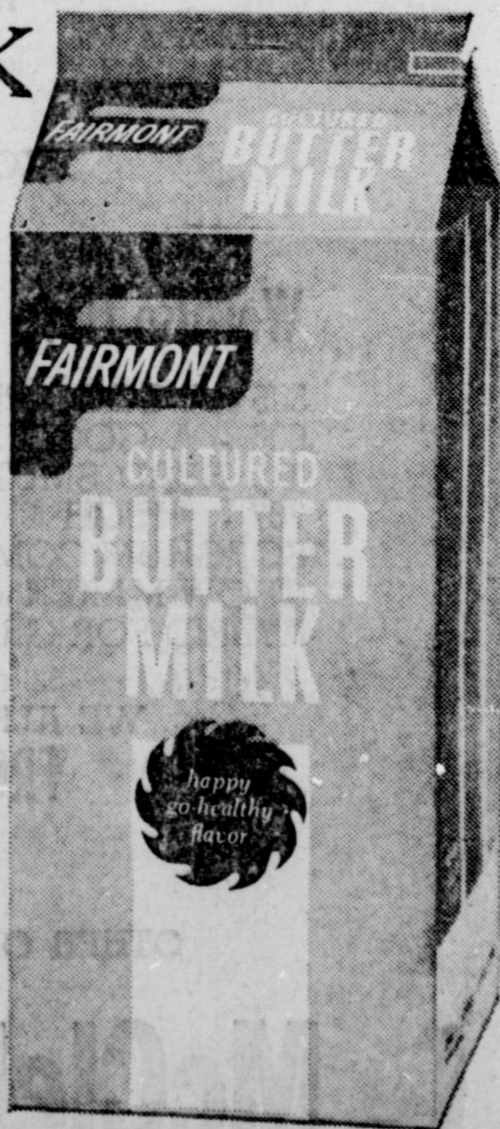

| 2 eggs, beaten | 3/2 teaspoon nutmeg |
| 2 cups brown sugar | 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon |
| 2 cups buttermilk | 1 cup oatmeal |
| 3 cups flour | 1 cup chopped dates |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 3/2 cup crushed nuts |
| 1 teaspoon baking powder | 1/4 cup melted butter |
| 2 teaspoons baking soda | |

Beat eggs and sugar thoroughly. Add buttermilk and beat well. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, soda, and spices. Stir into egg mixture and mix thoroughly. Fold in the oatmeal, dates, and nuts, stirring only enough to combine. Gradually blend in the melted butter. Pour into two oiled waxpaper-lined 9" x 5" loaf pans and bake 40 to 50 minutes in a moderate oven (350°). Cool. Bread slices best if held for 24 hours. Makes two loaves.
