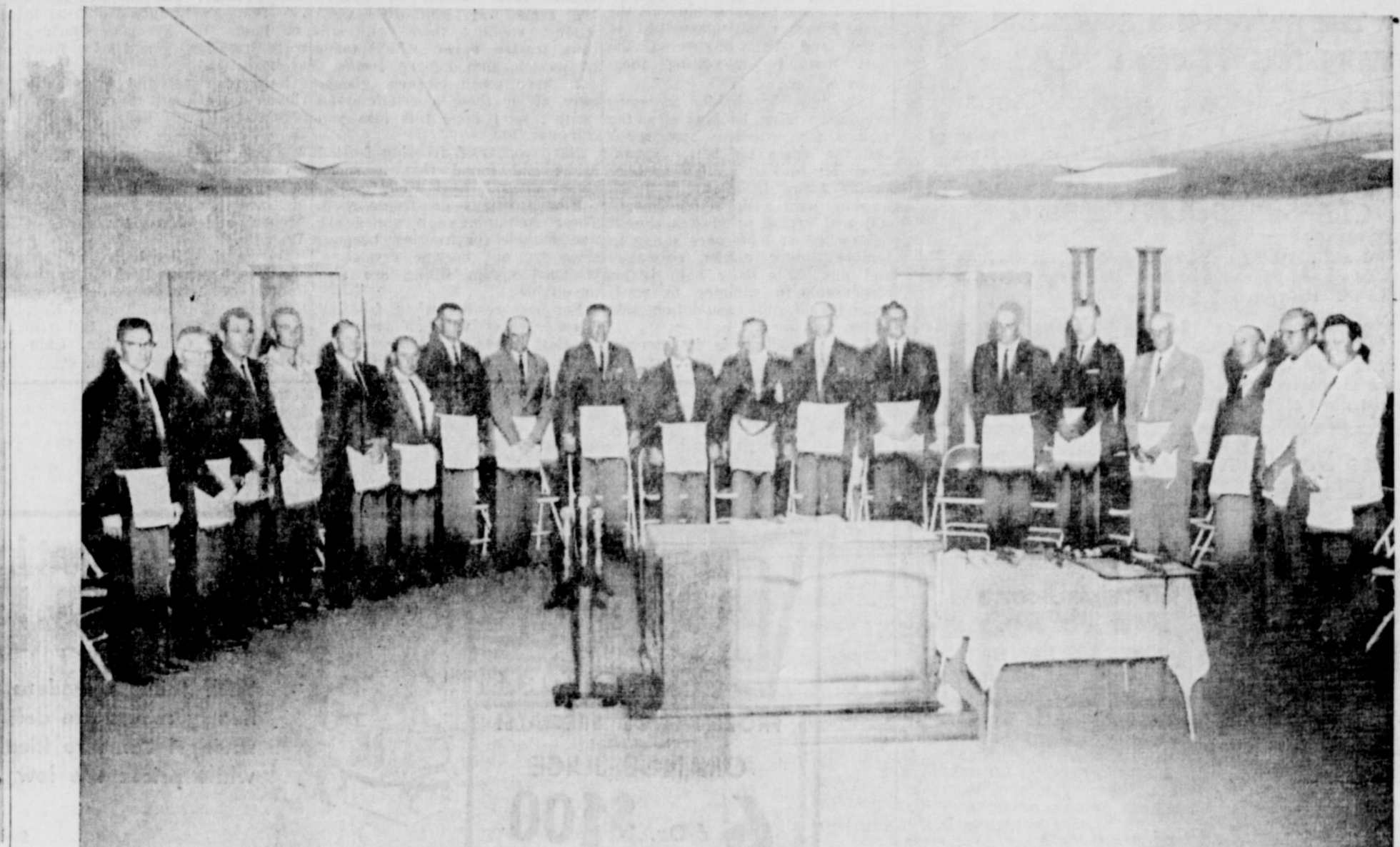

## Berry's Attend Baptist World Conference

The Rev. and Mrs. Berry and Rennie attended the 11th Baptist World Congress in Miami, Florida June 25 thru June 30.

The congress meets every five years in different countries. A little over 17,000 people represented 92 different nations.

Three sessions were held a day, morning, afternoon, and evening. After each morning session, there was a panel of eight to ten leaders representing his country. Panel members discussed the problems of their countries and how they witnessed to the lost. In afternoon sessions, leaders discussed ways for those attending to be of help in their home church. Christians from all over the world brought the messages to the evening sessions.

The evening sessions were held in the Orange Bowl. Billy Graham spoke Saturday and Sunday night with 52,000 people hearing him Sunday night.

On Tuesday night a bomb scare prevented the oratorio choir musical presentation, "What Is Man." Joe Shelton was to be the soprano soloist and Andrew B. White the baritone soloist. The Narrator was William J. Reynolds with the Miami Symphony Orchestra.

It cost \$7,000 to present the musical and when telephone calls continued to come in about a bomb plant, it had to be cancelled. Approximately 13,000 people were asked to leave as quickly and quietly as possible.

During the Congress, the 92 Nations were represented in a parade of their people in native dress and speaking in their native tongue. Flags of all the Nations were also paraded.

On the last day of the congress, everyone stood and held hands and sang "Blest Be The Tie" This was a very impressive sight and sound also, as everyone sang in his own language.

NOTICE OF ROAD BOND ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS ( ) COUNTY OF HANSFORD ( ) TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 2 OF HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID PRECINCT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE of an election to be held on the 7th day of August, 1965, within COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 2 OF HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS, for the purpose of submitting to the resident qualified electors who own taxable property in said Commissioners' Precinct and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition:

"WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of COMMISSIONERS' PRECINCT NUMBER 2, a political subdivision of HANSFORD COUNTY, Texas, shall be issued in the total principal sum of FIFTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$55,000), for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding FOUR AND ONE HALF PER CENTUM (4-1/2%) per annum, and are to be payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, but not to exceed TEN (10) years from the date thereof; and shall ad valorem taxes be levied on all taxable property within said Commissioners' Precinct Number 2, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity."

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the manner of holding said election and canvassing and making returns thereof shall be governed by the General Laws of this State, when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16 of the General Laws passed by the Thirty-ninth Legislature at its First Called Session in 1926; that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

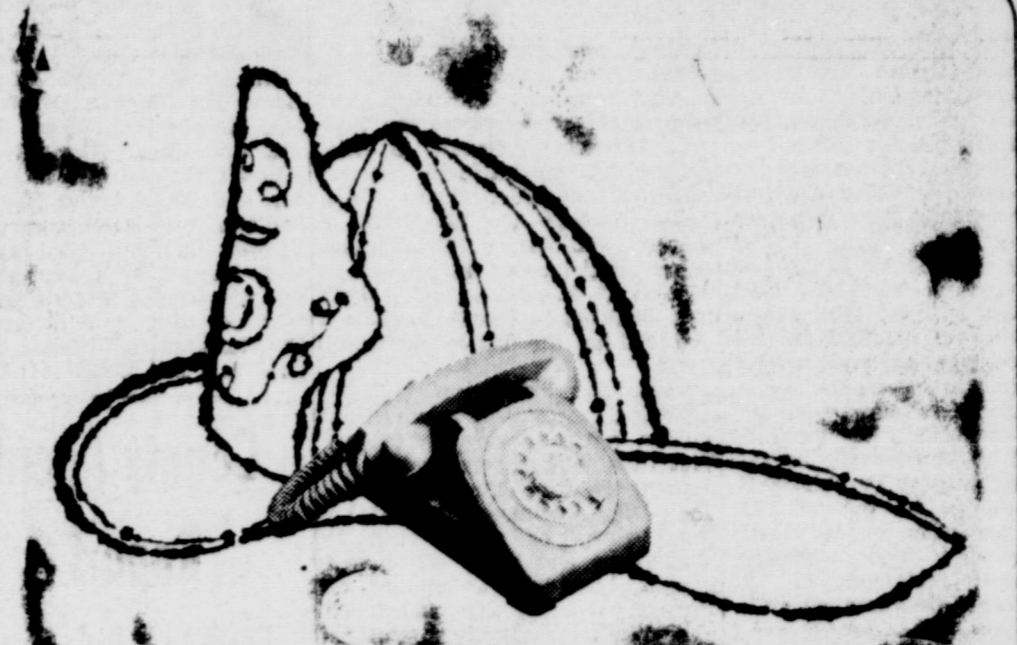

## Former Resident Receives USAF Achievement Certificate

Beck, brother of Mrs. Richard Gaines and a nephew of Owen Pendergraft of Spearman, and a native himself of Spearman, Travis Air Force Base property disposal officer was recently presented a USAF Cost Reduction Program achievement certificate by Col. William A. Delhay, vice commander of the 1501st Air Transport wing. Mr. Beck was credited with effecting a base wide savings of \$136,000 by utilizing redistribution and marketing activities to locate and assign wide variety of equipment and supplies requested for purchase at found to be available as surplus among military organizations. SAFETY EMBLEM

If you move your farm implements on main highways, there's a new reflectorized fluorescent emblem you can buy to warn high-speed motorists to slow down for you. It's good day, dusk or night and in most kinds of weather.

Many accidents are caused simply because the ordinary motorist often does not realize that the object on the road ahead is moving as slowly as it is until it's too late to avoid hitting it. That object could be you. The National Safety Council says that accidents could be reduced substantially if the SMV emblem were used by slow-moving vehicle operators and recognized by motorists nationwide.

The new triangle-shaped emblem, designed by Ohio State University agricultural specialists, can

be easily mounted on most farm equipment. Highway maintenance and construction machines can use it too. It's to be used only on vehicles to travel 25 mph or less. The center of the SMV emblem is fluorescent yellow-orange and the outside border is reflective red material. It's inexpensive, durable, available, and movable and does not interfere with your operation of the equipment. IRON CHLOROSIS

If your ornamental plants are yellow, chances are they are suffering from iron chlorosis. Iron is necessary for the formation of chlorophyll. When iron is unavailable for plant use, chlorophyll fails to develop properly and plants exhibit chlorosis.

To control iron chlorosis, it is necessary to treat the soil so that iron becomes available, or else provide supplement iron as a spray or soil application. To control chlorosis by addition of iron, use iron sulfate (copperas) or iron chelates. Iron sulfate is relatively cheap and a good source of iron to use. Its use should be restricted generally to spray application. If iron sulfate is applied to an alkaline calcareous soil, the iron may become unavailable to plant growth.

For lawns, use 3 oz. of iron sulfate in 5 gallons of water per 1,000 square feet as a spray or 1 lb. per 150 square feet as a soil application. For ornamentals, use 2 1/2 lbs. in a gallon of water for
