Perhaps 3000 people in the Spearman area know how the folks at Leadville felt when the Mighty Casey came to bat and lost the game.

Just as Casey was capable of knocking a home run, we believe the gallant Spearman Lynxettes were capable of downing the brilliant Friona team in the regional game last Saturday at 11:20 a.m.

That's as far as our comparison can go. We know the Lynxettes were not over confident like Casey. But we do know the Lynxettes were taunt and playing their hearts out. Coach Weese praised the Friona team, but admitted they could do no wrong and that the Lynxettes played way below par.

The contest started off pretty even, since the score was tied 8-8 at the end of the first quarter. In the second quarter the wear and tear of the contest changed the score to a 18 to 28 score favoring Friona, giving the Friona Squaws a 10 point margin.

There was little change in the play during the last half of the game. One can see how the Friona team won when we report that the mighty Phillis Patterson only made 2 field goals during the entire game and racked up only 12 free throws out of 18 tries.

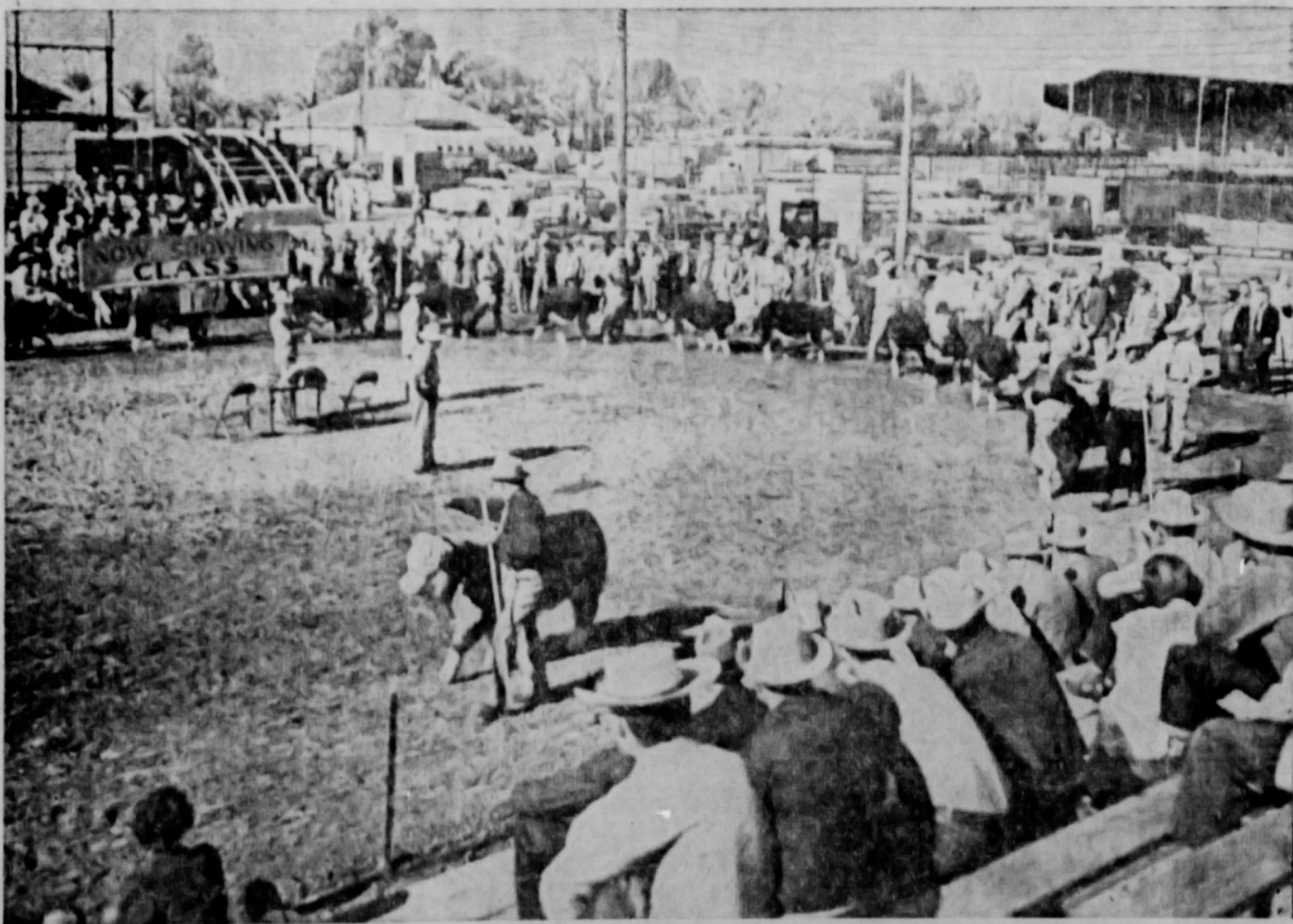

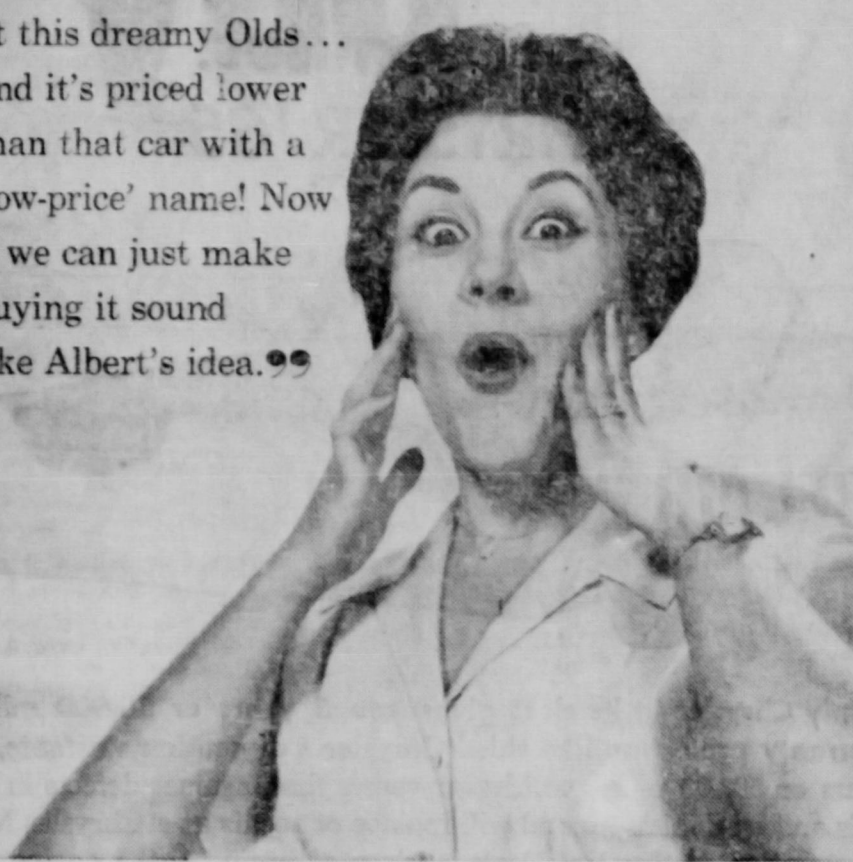

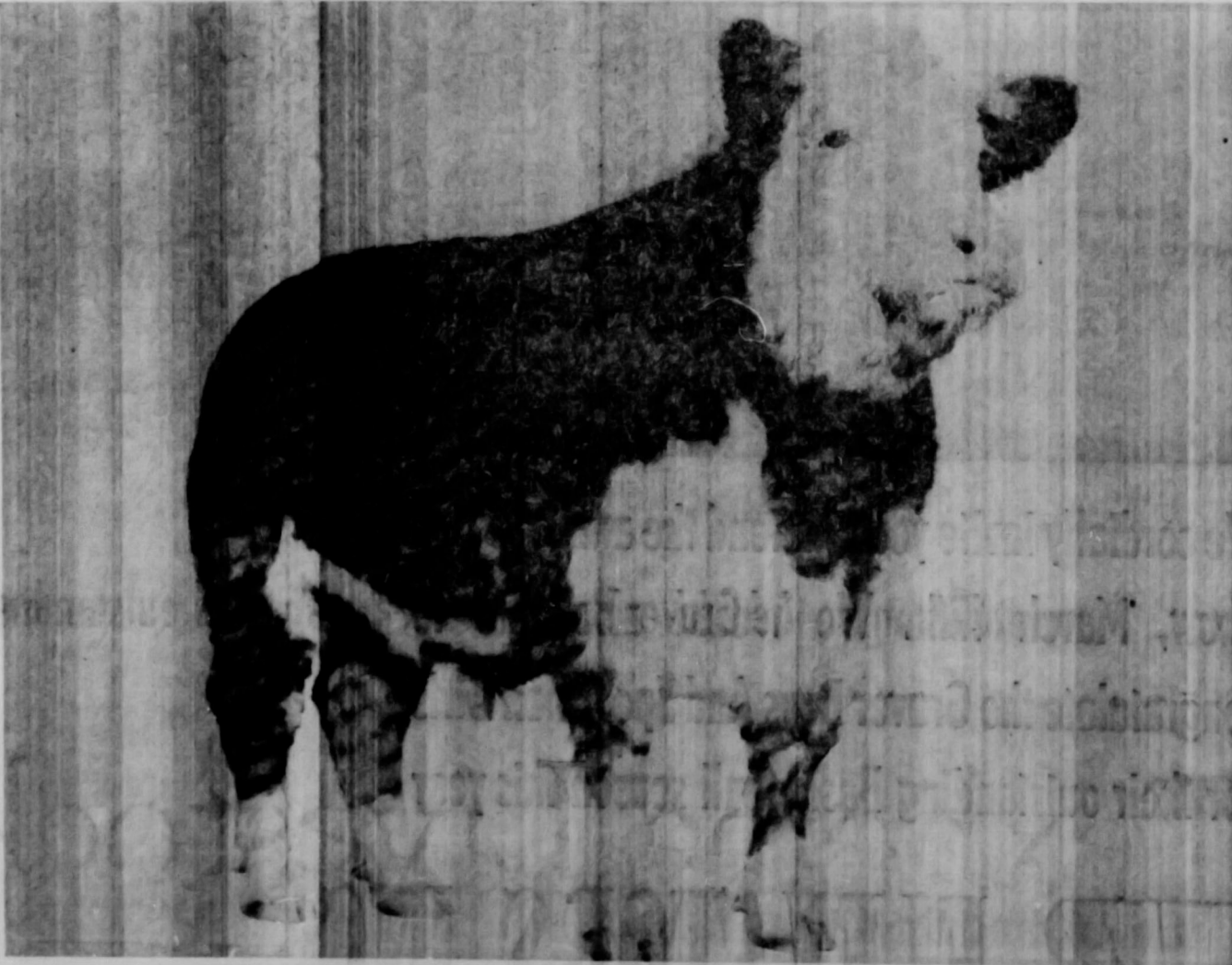

Larry Archer In Fleet Operation

April 15 Deadline For Car Inspection

There will be no extension of the Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection deadline of April 15, 1965, announced Captain Alan Johnson of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, for this area.

"Only two million of the five and a quarter million registered vehicles in Texas have been inspected. This leaves over three million vehicles to be inspected in about five weeks," said Johnson. Many thousands of vehicle owners can expect to wait in long lines in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April 15 deadline.

It is almost apparent now that many vehicle owners have waited too long for the inspection stations to safety inspect their vehicles by April 15. "Any driver operating a vehicle registered in Texas that is required to be inspected, on public roads after April 15 without a valid 1965 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law," stated the Captain.

The DPS supervisor said, "The purpose of the motor vehicle inspection program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident, and by removing the link, prevent the accident."
