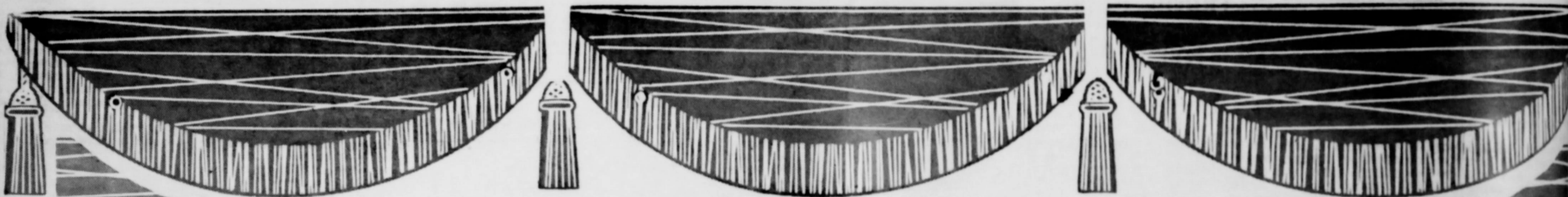

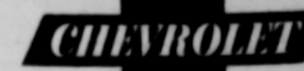

Upturn In Insured Farm Loans Noted

Local banks and other private lenders are increasing their stake in the Farmers Home Administration's program of long-term loans to qualified farmers to buy or improve family-type farms or establish good soil and water conservation practices, Bob Holloway, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor, pointed out this week.

His agency is authorized to insure farm real estate loans that are made from funds advanced by banks, insurance companies, or other institutions having money to invest. Since the recent change in the money market, activity by investors has greatly increased.

During the past 6 months, the national monthly volume of new insured loan business has risen from approximately \$1,250,000 to \$5,000,000 a month.

For either a direct or insured loan the farmer pays 4 1/2 percent interest. If the loan is insured, the lender or investor gets a clear 3 1/2 percent and the Government guarantees payment of both principal and interest.

The full guarantee and the money market change have put many local banks in position to contribute to a stronger local agriculture by helping farmers otherwise unable to buy or improve their farms, Mr. Holloway said.

After a 5-year period the private may sell the insured note to the Government for the amount of principal and interest due, may arrange for a later sale, or may hold until the note is fully repaid. In case of default, the Government stands ready to take the note over with no loss to the investor. The Farmers Home Administration takes care of all collection and servicing details.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK This recipe is contributed by Mrs. Ernest Butler, and she says it is one of her favorites and so easy to make. Thank you, Mrs. Butler.

Peanut Butter Cookies
1 cup shortening
1 cup peanut butter

News in Hansford

Soil Conservation District

Although the Texas State Soil Conservation District law has only been in effect since 1939, 173 Soil Conservation Districts have been organized taking in 97% of the State. There are more than 187,000 landowners or operators who have detailed conservation plans for their land and are otherwise cooperating with their local Soil Conservation District. These district cooperators operate more than 96,000,000 acres of land. All this has been accomplished on a strictly voluntary basis without any form of compulsion. Some ask how and why?

Soil conservation work in Texas is carried out in a similar manner to the way we educate our young people. Texas law authorizes local people by petition and election to organize independent districts which are subdivisions of the State. Each Soil Conservation District is governed by a five man board of supervisors elected by local interests in the development of district's plan of work. The district supervisors by agreement with the Secretary of Agriculture obtain the technical services of

make the district program effective. The Board coordinates the work of the districts to effect a unified state program. The State Board and its employee assist local supervisors with any problem they may have.

A great factor in the success of a Soil Conservation District is the support it gets from local organizations and firms such as Chambers of Commerce, Service Clubs, Women's organizations and churches. During Soil Stewardship week alone there were 2,225 sermons given by ministers of local churches. Over 1/4 of a million people heard these sermons. Sermons were also carried on 21 TV stations, and 161 radio stations. Soil Stewardship week is fast becoming a tradition.

A Soil Conservation District is not an agency but is a local subdivision of State Government. What it does and how, rests except as they are limited by Texas Law.

How well the district supervisors are able to mobilize the efforts of state and federal agencies as well as individuals and local organizations and bring their resources and abilities to bear on the locally planned Soil Conservation District program determines the effectiveness of the District.

The Texas State Soil Conservation Board composed of five landowners performs the State level administrative functions to

development.

To submit records for District and State competition, girls must be 14 years old by January 1 of that year. Hansford County submitted four records this year and their girls were all winners. Congratulations, Girls!

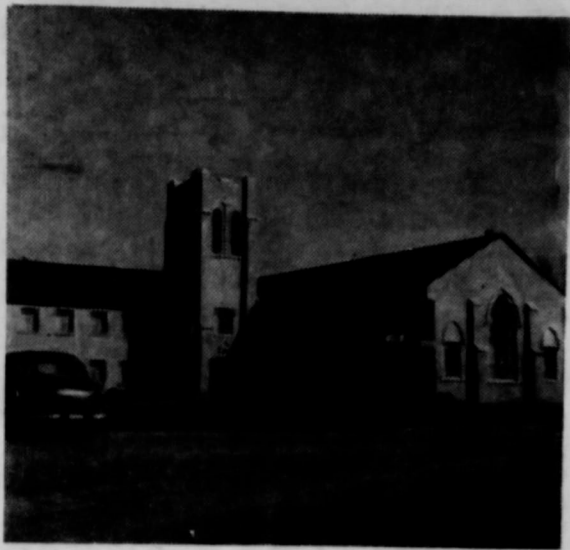

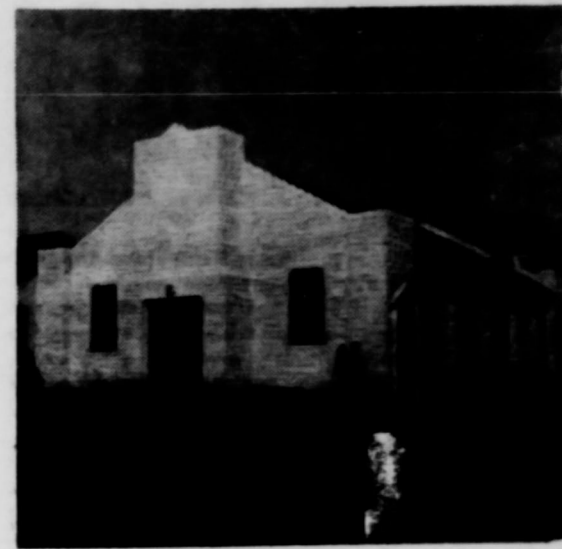
Revival AT Apostolic Church

The Apostolic Faith Church is the newest church in Spearman, and is located in the new addition, in the South part of Spearman. This was formerly the Spearman Country Church.

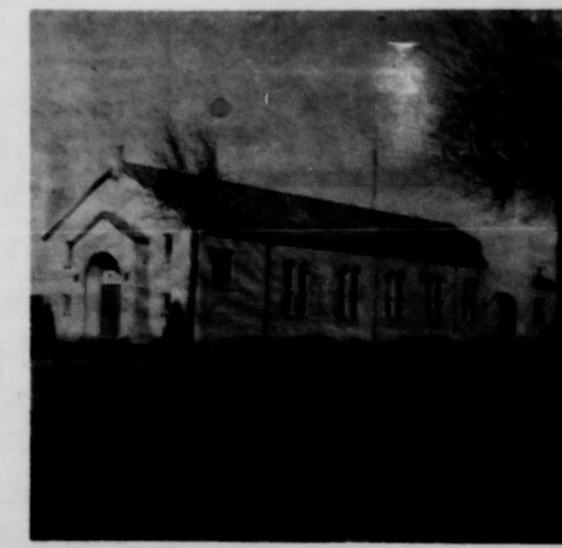

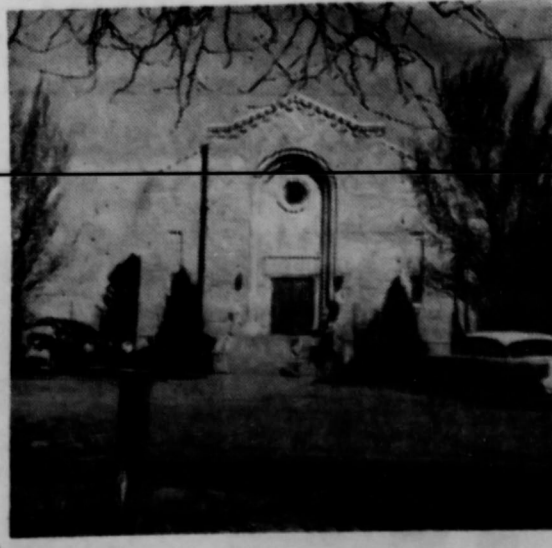

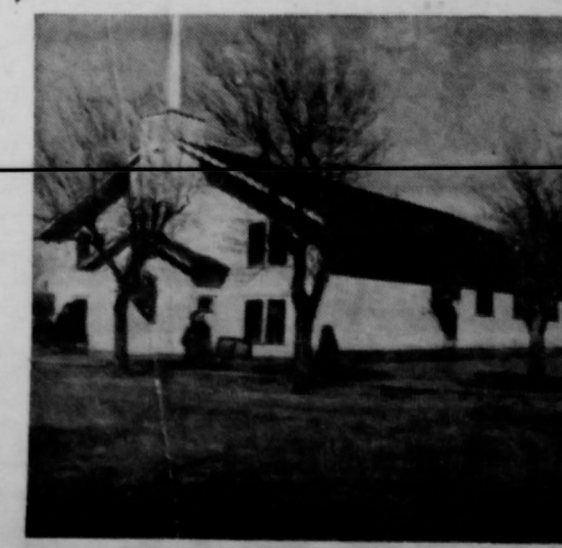
