### The Challenge Of Growth

With dominion over the earth and the fullness thereof man bears a great responsibility to his maker, to himself and to all the living world around him—a responsibility for maintaining developing the natural endowments which he inhabits the earth.

Each year we give recognition to an important part of this responsibility in observance of Soil Stewardship Week.

We do so this year from May 22 through 30 with the theme "The Challenge of Growth." We acknowledge man's dependence on the soil and his duty to care for it. We have come to know that a land of conservation is a land of plenty.

Our conservation responsibility is a product of the growth that characterizes the United States, and growth presents a challenge that becomes more demanding with time.

Midway the decade of the sixties, as we venture into the total and awesome universe, we are fast becoming aware of an extension of man's responsibility. There dawns upon us the realization that, bit by bit, man is slipping his veil of ignorance and misunderstanding, sweeping aside the aged shrouds of timidity and fear, the approach new horizons of human achievement.

In the laboratory, on the soil, beneath the sea and into space our forays into the unknown in search of the "whys" and "hows" bring us always closer to truths we have only vaguely suspected. Our imagination leaps to engage more profound mysteries.

It is imperative, in the face of this remarkable boldness, that we pause with each unfolding to understand our role and the meaning.

We are stewards of what we survey. Whatever we may chance to discover about our world, or worlds beyond, we are privileged by a Higher Authority than ourselves. The rewards of this privilege are accompanied to meet our responsibility, to honor our trust, to discharge our obligation as stewards, than on earth with its soil and water resources, the stuff on which after all, our lives depend.

We have learned from bitter experience the price of disregard for these obligations. Where we misused and abused the floods and dust and utter desolation.

We in America have survived these mistakes. We are earnestly endeavoring to husband and develop our soil and water resources to heal the scars of our land. In this effort there are yet too many who believe the problems of soil and water to be problems only for the land owner and operator. They must be impressed with the meaning of stewardship. They must come to know that although our resources to meet present and future needs are adequate, they will remain adequate only as we of country and city together use and develop them wisely. The speed with which stewardship becomes a fact of life in our cities can well be marked as a facet of the challenge of growth.

The best use of land and water to meet human demands on a continuing basis becomes more

urgent. As each day passes, this fact looms larger in importance in both urban and rural areas.

This is the nature of the challenge of growth that confronts us. To cultivate more widely, among all our people, the conservation is the essence of stewardship is the God-given privilege of humanity.

The general survey shows a shortage of crop production in the county due to hot winds, drought and hail.

**HOMEMAKING NOTES**

A whole group of new sizes of aerosol products are coming on the scene to save time and space when packing for a trip, or even for jobs at home.

A few of the things you can find in handy small sizes are hair spray, cologne or perfume, deodorants, shaving cream and insect repellent. Of course small sizes of mouth wash, make-up foundation and bath oils can be found, too, outside the aerosol field.

If you are a real organizer (or just want to save blood pressure!) try keeping a special "miniature grooming kit" already packed, ready to travel whenever you are. This is especially handy if any member of the family travels a lot—it will save time and temper in last minute packing.

Are your family members outdoor cookery enthusiasts? If so, you may like to try some new ideas for "cooking in the coals" this summer.

Since charcoal broiling is a dry heat method of cooking, tender cuts of meats should be used. Veal is not well suited to dry methods of cooking. Lamb cuts, (not mutton,) are excellent for outdoor cooking, as are cured and smoked pork products, and tender beef cuts. Weiners, ground beef and variety cuts are also good to use.

Steaks or chops should be cut at least one inch thick for grilling. Thinner cuts tend to dry out too much during cooking.

To cook meat: the grill should be thoroughly cleaned before use to prevent the meat from sticking. The grill may be greased lightly if there is a tendency for the meat to stick. (of course immediate cleaning of the grill after cooking is important.)

Meat will be more tender if cooked slowly. Basting with fat or a sauce will tend to keep meat more moist and juicy. It is best to have a grill that can be raised and lowered so that the distance of the meat from the coals can be regulated.

Don't season meat before grilling, as salt tends to draw moisture from lean tissue. To avoid loss of juice, turn meat with tongs. Piercing with a fork will let out the moisture. Seasoning may be added immediately after meat before grilling, as salt tends to draw moisture from lean tissue. To avoid loss of juice, turn meat with tongs. For hickory flavor, hickory chips that have been soaked in water or green pieces of hickory can be added to the hot coals about five minutes before the meat is done.

Next week, I'll give some ideas for vegetables you can use in charcoal grilling.

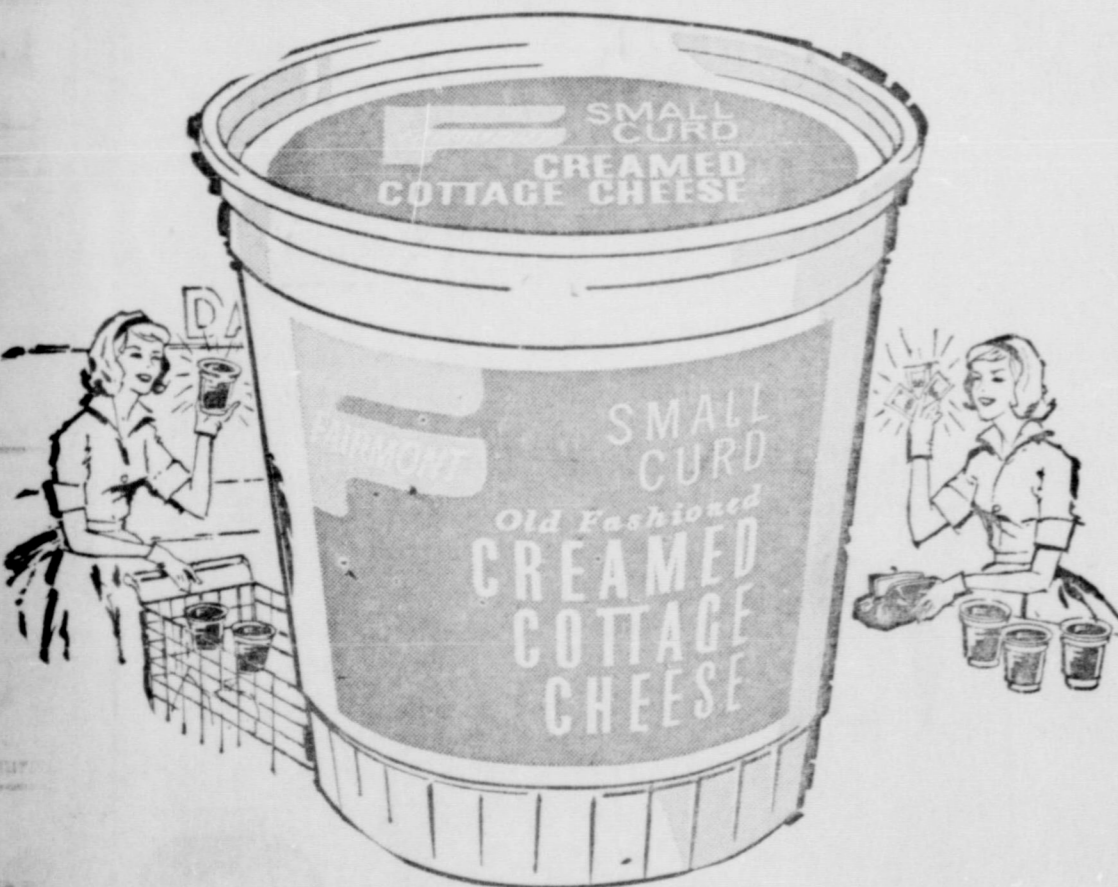

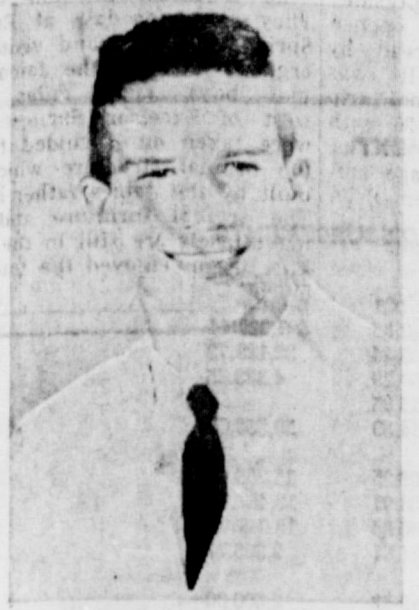

They bring to even the most isolated Military units weekly recreation programs full of American flavor.

Only 50 young women, all college graduates, are chosen each year for this unique Red Cross service assignment.

Tribute Through The Red Cross

Today, Memorial Day, the nation pauses to honor those who served and died in its service a solemn annual tribute by millions of Americans.

During the past year, these same Americans, many without realizing it, have been paying another kind of tribute in the form of material aid, counsel, and financial assistance.

During these days of limited peace, the Red Cross job continues to grow, throughout the world wherever servicemen are stationed. Red Cross field directors are also assigned. Of these 1,200 field directors, about one-fourth serve overseas in such locations as Viet Nam, the Dominican Republic, Korea, Turkey, and Ethiopia.

For instance, last year the Red Cross helped an average of 80,000 servicemen each month at military installations and hospitals around the world, and served more than 118,000 servicemen and veterans and their families each month through chapter service to Military Families. A total of \$11,632,000 was given in financial assistance to servicemen and their dependents and \$401,000 to veterans and dependants.

In addition to the many services provided servicemen, including financial aid and counseling, the Red Cross assisted thousands of veterans in preparing and presenting claims to the Veterans Administration for government benefits.

At overseas locations selected

leave; notification of illness or death in a family; and in a more happy vein, birth announcements. In all, the Red Cross last year spent almost 40% of its nearly 100 million dollar budget for welfare services to the armed forces, veterans, and their families and for special services and recreation in military and Veterans Administration hospitals. It plans to spend approximately the same amount during 1965 as a "living memorial" to our servicemen past and present.

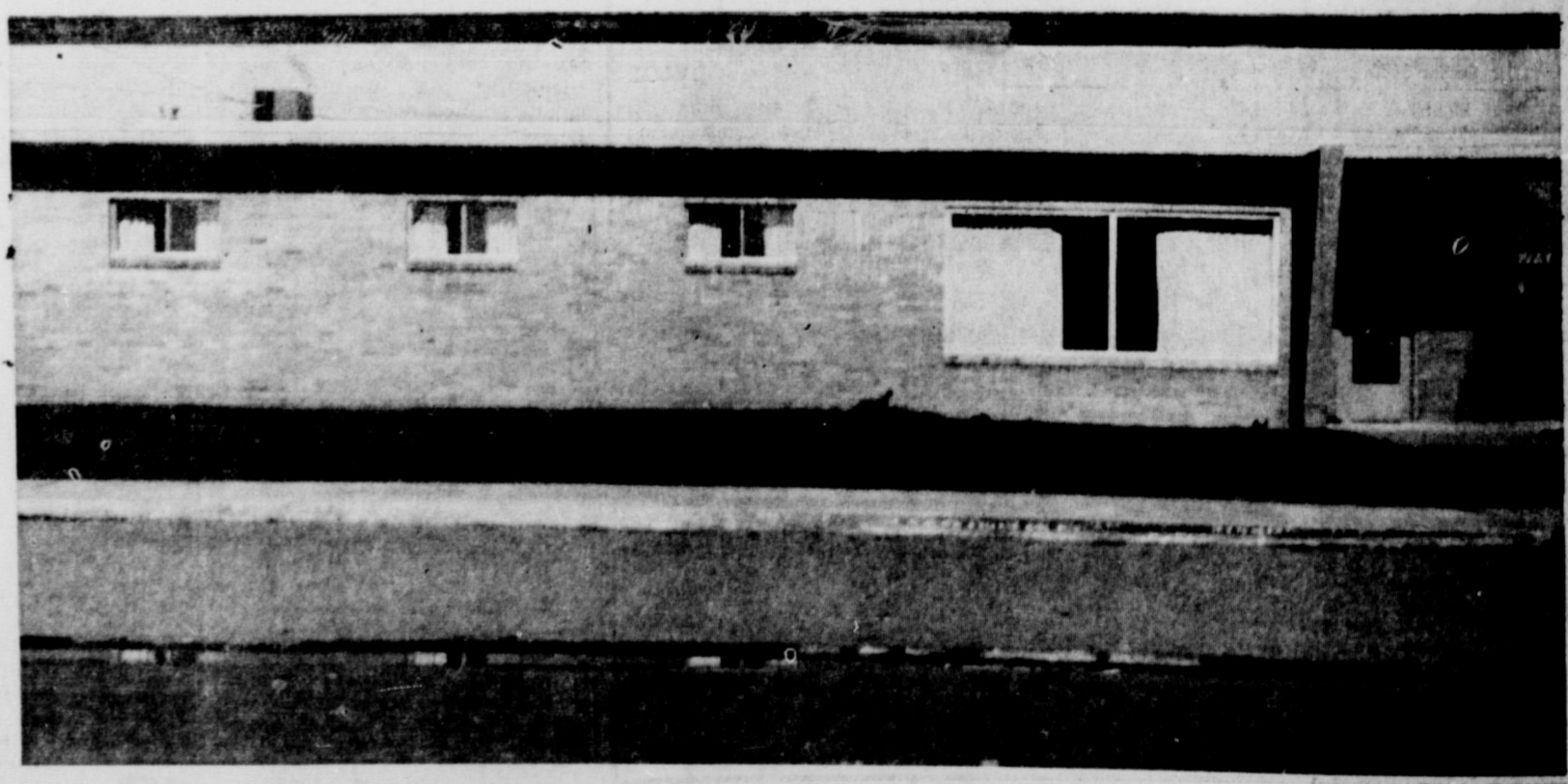
