Life Of Mrs Effie Jarvis Reviewed On 92nd Birthday

(Last week the REPORTER carried the picture, and story, of Mrs. Effie Jarvis, who celebrated her 92nd birthday on January 8 in the Pioneer Manor nursing home in Spearman.)

This week the story of the life of Mrs. Jarvis is being submitted by Mrs. Susie Dacus of Amarillo, who had the pleasure of caring for Mrs. Jarvis for two years in her private home in Amarillo.)

Effie Luginbuhl Jarvis was born January 8, 1874, in Denton County, Texas near the present site of small town of Sanger.

Her father was a native of Switzerland, and came to the United States with his parents at the age of six months.

At the age of twenty-one he left his home in Ohio to go west on his own. He filled on land that is now part of the townsite of Omaha, Nebraska.

In 1880 he came to Texas, and filed on land in Denton County. The land was new and fertile, and timber and water were plentiful.

He immediately set about to build a homestead. Logs were hewn for the house, and nails were made of wood. All the frame work was hewn and finished by hand.

Before the house was completed, the war between the States drew him into the Southern Confederacy. After the war ended he returned to his Texas home and decided to down the unfinished house since it had long stood exposed to the elements.

After ten years they built the house that still stands on their home site. She was very proud of her new prairie home, and it's a love of her life today.

Mr. Jarvis hauled the lumber from a sawmill on the Canadian River. While crossing the river with a load once, the team floundered around and one of the mules wanted to fall down in the traces. Mr. Jarvis got down from the wagon seat to help the mule.

He reached below the water for handful of sand and put into the long ear of the mule. The mule, touchy about his ears, kept pulling. The river was up, the weather cool, and that day Mr. Jarvis was wearing his claw hammer wedding coat! Billy called from his perch, on the wagon seat "Look, papa, your coat tails are floating on the water!"

A runaway team gave her a bit of scare when the boys were small. They had started in the late afternoon to Grandpa Jarvis' home about eight miles away. The team was frisky and grew unmanageable. She made the boys get out and go to a fence & wait for her.

She raced the team over the prairie in circles. The wagon bed tumbled on one side of the bounds. It was a bit one sided & uncomfortable. The team tired of running and she went back to ward home. She overtook the little boys who were keeping near the fence (their guide when darkness should fall), and heard Woodville say to his brothers, "If that old team had hurt our Mama, we would have to do some thing about it!"

Mr. Jarvis, she said, was the bravest of anyone when it came to pain or injury. Once, she says, a horse dragged him on his stomach over rough terrain. A wound deep enough to expose the thin tissue covering the abdominal cavity was suffered and needed to be sutured. This he did for himself with a needle & wrapping twine. The scar was for life, she says, but the wound healed as cleanly as if a surgeon had attended him.

Her old time recipes and medicine treatments are fascinating, and her son, Woodville, relates, "Mama has baked enough loaves of bread to fill a house!" She likes to tell how they made lard, lye soap, and managed their home in the old days.

She has a great love for the outdoors. She loves to see the great blue sky by day and the canopy of stars by night. Every one should sleep under the stars at some time, she says. "I love the outdoors and the life of outdoors, the birds, horses, cattle, even our poultry. It was all fun; even the snake!" Once she found a small snake so cold it seemed about to die. She took it

into her bedroom and laid it in a sunny spot on her head to revive and warm. She then put it out in a safe and sunny place where it could continue life.

A sister-in-law, she said was so angry with a 'chicken' snake for getting into her setting hen's nest and swallowing several eggs, that she got a switch and switched the snake until she got back her eggs. When placed under the hen again, the eggs hatched just like they would have normally.

Much could be said about Mrs. Jarvis for truly she is a versatile and outstanding person. She has kept her wit and humor alive by bright conversation and interest in things and people about her. Her life has been colorful and happy. At ninety-two, she is still alert with a bright and shining spirit that makes me request like the poet long ago:

"Let me grow lovely growing old So many fine things to do; Lace and ivory and gold And silks, need not be new."

In her bedside table, is a shoe box packed tightly, as if on file, with letters and post cards dating back to 1903 — cards that either got from their grandfather, mother at Denton — cards they received from school pals at the various holidays and seasons. Today they are an avenue of memories for her, and a source of enjoyment to anyone to browse among, and for Antique Collectors "A collector's item!"

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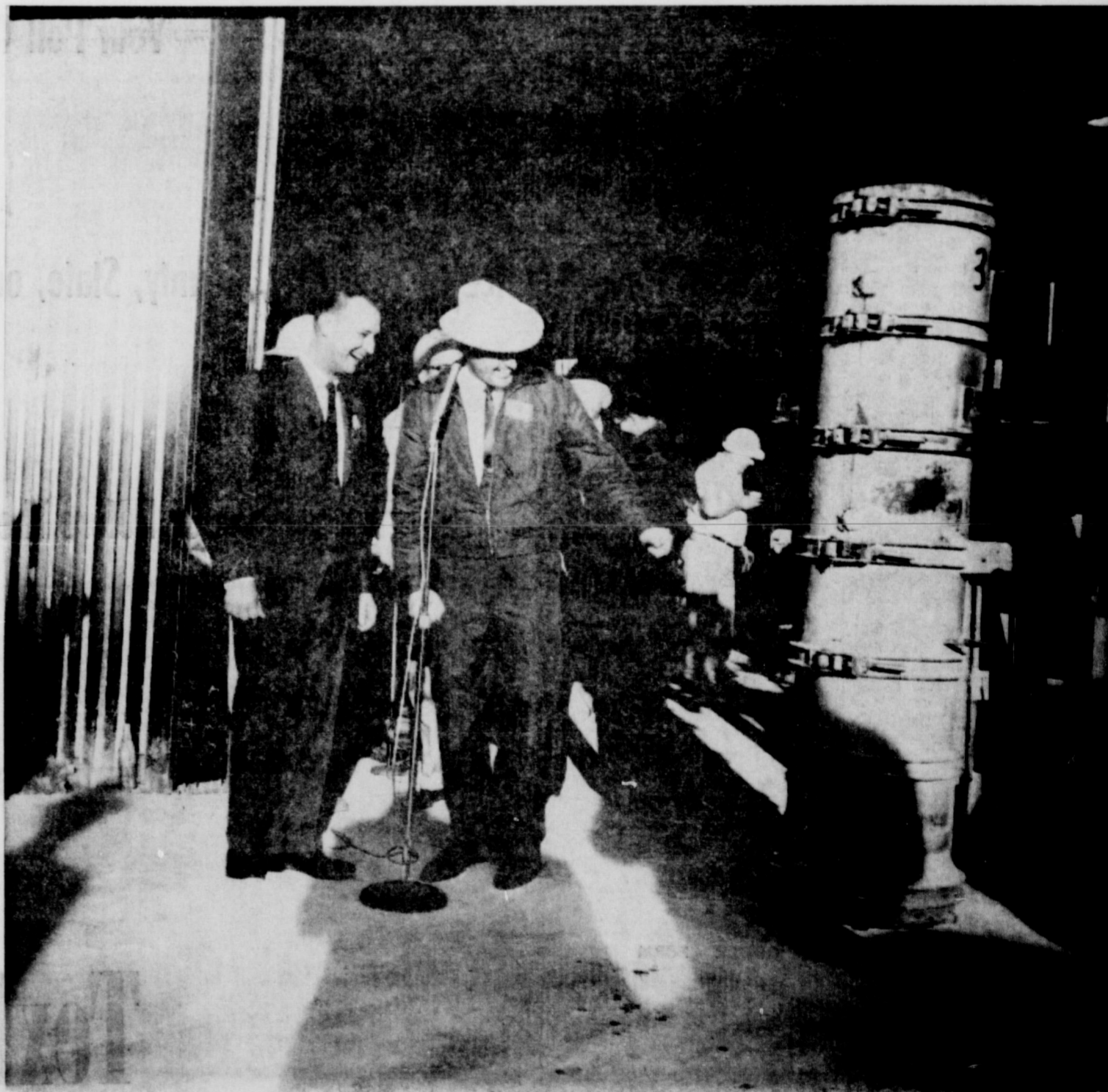

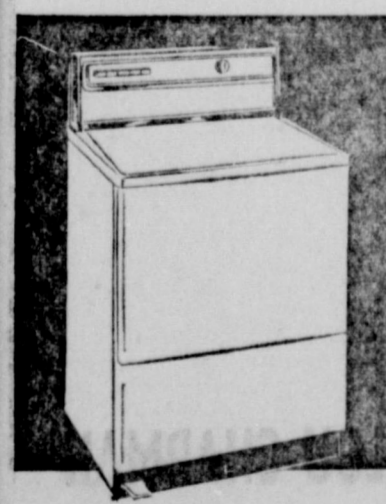

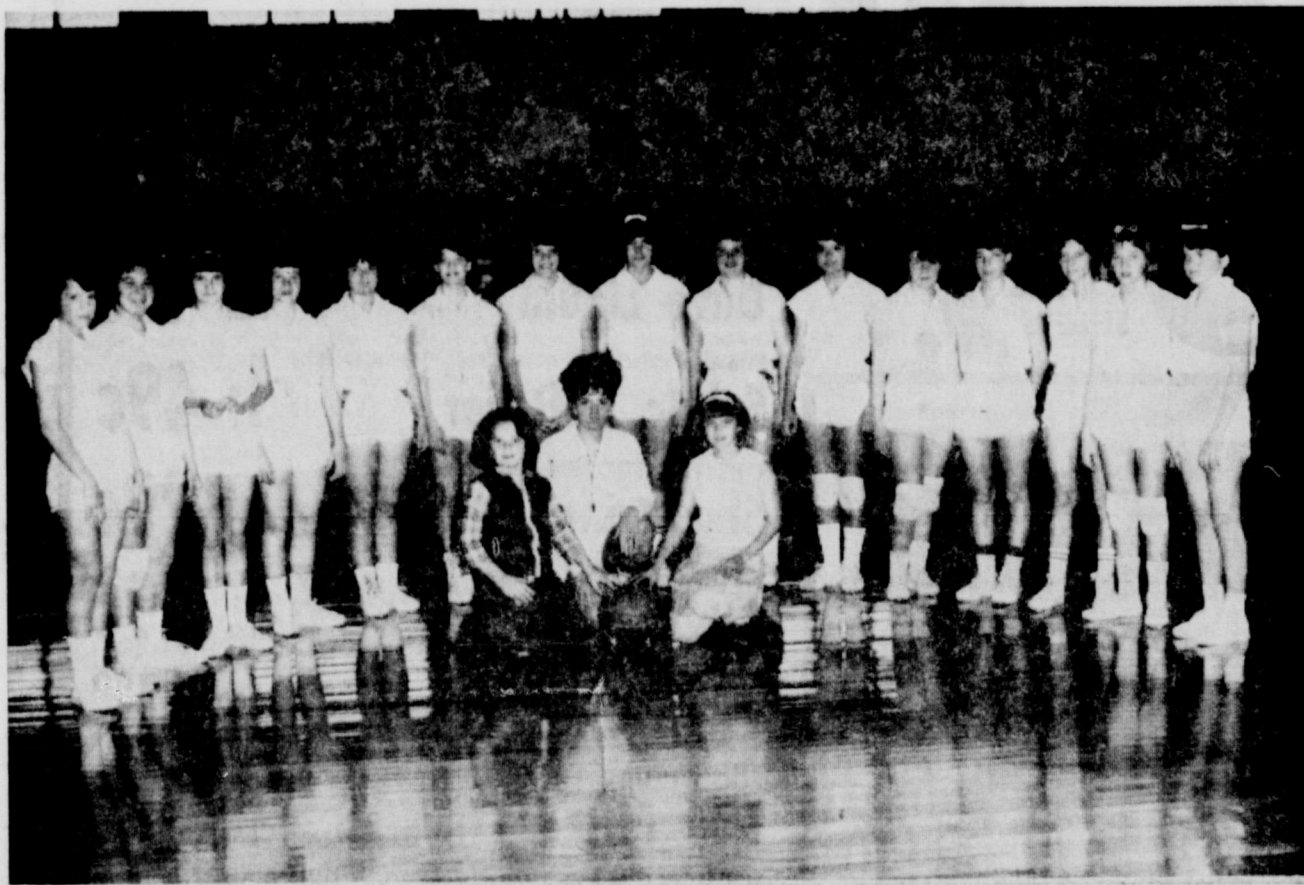
