

W. E. Caldwell Store At Old Hansford, 1904



This picture shows the first windmill in Hansford, the city's stood on the SW corner of the courthouse lot. The car pictured was the first Hansford man to own a car. Stores pictured include THE W. E. CALDWELL DRY GOODS STORE. It was sold to Hill House Drug and moved to Spearman in 1919.

Truly, the W. E. Caldwell family had definite roll in the historic development of Hansford County.

They exemplified almost every phase of life in the area. They till the land, grazed cattle on the range, pioneered in merchandising, organized lodges and churches, served in social and civic duties and served the county as officials of local government.

Their lives, like other pioneers were stepping stones to our modern life enjoyed today.

Farmers in the Hansford County had sharpened their knives on the maize harvest that was in full swing. Ducks and geese were being taken their way south and had been to rest from their flights on the prairie lakes.

School was in session at Hansford. A lonely little girl was glad to see its pupil that warm autumn day as she skipped joyously along with a "lady bird" tightly in hand. Perhaps the reason for her joy was the privilege of going to school with children of her own age, and that she was on her way to the store to buy something for herself.

Every little while the small girl stopped to re-examine the silver piece in hand. On its face was a tiny in flowing robe with a diadem of stars above her head. She was almost, she thought, with such beautiful money as she had found along the dusty road— "Mel Wright's Bank," and across a gravelly street to E. C. Hays' Grocery Store on the corner.

She stepped onto the board side walk that echoed loudly the sound of her tiny footsteps. The nearer to her destination, the faster she trod. A nice lady dressed neatly in a light waist and skirt protected by a black satin apron, stood behind the counter smiling at the girl. A cold catch that she opened and closed. The catch, as an added protection or security, was pinned to the left side of her shirt waist with a gold fleur de Lis pin.

It was a sight to behold for a child fresh from the "wide open spaces." Distracted, almost by the vision of goodies before her, she was brought back to tow, by the soft southern drawl of Mrs. W. E. Caldwell. "Take your time, honey, and look things over then tell me what you want to buy."

A beautiful display of colorful hair ribbons held the girl's fancy. First, she had to have a bright red ribbon for her sun bleached pig-tails! Then a lovely green gingham material with red and blue plaid by a dress. Finally, she came to the stockings. Black and heavy lined, they held a fascinating label "A bear held a stocking between its jaws." A caption above read "Bear Brand." Those who know bears, know that it is a label from one of the finest knitting mills in America.

The store intrigued one with its mill of new leather and freshly tilled cottons, satins, laces, cologne and cosmetics. All of which were unobtainable to the little girl aizing yearningly, as the stars in the sky over head.

Mr. Caldwell lost his father when he was nine years old. Dis-

heartened because his mother sold the beloved registered horse ranch at Harrisburg, Penn. to move to the city, young Billy ran away from home -- to Ohio! Horace Greely made the famous quote "Go west, young man, go west," and Billy did just that.

He landed in Shelby County, Texas at the age of twenty-one. March 29, 1881 he married his Texas sweetheart, Henrietta Mc-Lamore. Mr. Caldwell was a brick mason and helped to make the bricks, and to construct the Shelby County Court House. Three children were born in the county -- Vernie Simeon, and Berta, the baby girl who died in infancy.

Scurry County

After nine years at Center, Texas, the family moved to Scurry County to a quarter section of land. There, their final child, daughter Keesee, was born. In Scurry, Mr. Caldwell supplemented his farming by acting as wagon master to several cattlemen over a period of eight years. The cattle droves took him across the Panhandle many times. The vast expanse of virgin land appealed to him, & on one of the drives he bought a quarter section "down the creek" from Hansford.

"To the Panhandle."

Soon afterward, the family moved to Hansford County, and stopped at "Uncle Huff" Wright's place until their dugout home was completed and ready for occupancy.

Mr. Caldwell and his sons broke the land along the Palo Duro Creek Bottom, with a "walking sod buster." They planted cane and milo by hand. At harvest time they headed it by hand, and threshed it by the hooves of horses trampling it underfoot. It was winnowed by hand. The seed was reserved for next planting, and the fodder used for winter feeding of live stock. This method of farming was laborious and tedious compared to the stream lined methods of today, but blazed the way for a better way of life.

The Caldwell children attended the primitive school on the creek, and classes at the court house in Hansford when they sold the farm and moved to town in 1904.

The Store

Mr. Caldwell built the "W. E. Caldwell Dry Goods Store" on the west side of the courthouse square. Their merchant neighbors were: E. C. Hays, groceryman, Geo. Faus, meat market, Sid Clark, barber shop, Womble's Drug store (later Hale Drug). The U. S. Post Office was in the rear of this building and operated by Harve Baily. The P. Monkey Maize General Store was on the northwest corner of the square.

Mrs. Gus Ward acted as purchasing agent for the new store. She went to Kansas City, Mo to buy merchandise that was shipped to Guymon, Okla by rail, and thence by freight wagon to Hansford.

A telephone system, the first in the county, was located in the rear of the store. It had ten lines, and a private line to Guymon, and was tendered by Mrs. Caldwell. The most memorable news to come over the wire, was the report that Hansford County's beloved Sher-

1966 Grain May Not Be Accepted Under Program

Because of a technical situation between the commercial grain warehouse industry and the government's Commodity Credit Corporation, grain producers of Texas are being advised by directors of the Texas Grain and Feed Association that some Texas grain warehousemen, through no fault of their own, may be unable to accept 1966 grain under CCC support program.

The Kansas City office of CCC-USDA has for some months warned grain warehousemen that it will suspend from its approved list any warehouse which fails within 90 days to comply with orders to load out CCC grain. In the meantime a nation-wide shortage of boxcars has become critical of CCC service orders and has made it virtually impossible for some warehousemen to comply fully with the loading orders. Thus it is technically possible that some warehouses may be suspended from the government's approved list at harvest time, in spite of any efforts the warehouseman may make in the meantime to comply. Seven Texas grain warehouses are now under this technical suspension.

Directors of the Texas Grain and Feed Association point out that suspension under the above conditions would not necessarily imply any physical, financial or ethical weakness on the part of the warehouseman, and should not be considered by his customers as any form of discredit.

The Texas Association's Board of Directors considered a proposal that they consider court action in the case of any Texas warehouse which at harvest time, is suspended from normal competition by this action of CCC-USDA, and where good faith of the warehouse has been established. The action was held up pending other representations to be made by the trade group to government officials, in the hope that a reconciliation could be effected well ahead of harvest time.

Mrs. Caldwell sold the store and retired when her husband died. She bought the Mel Wright place, and lived there until the birth of Spearman. She bought lots in the new townsite, and built a nice home with private windmill for water.

In Spearman, she devoted her last days to her friends and neighbors, Church, and the Lodge of which she and Mr. Caldwell were charter members. Always a true western neighbor, the kind woman lived among the people to love and to serve.

Family Tree

During the time the family lived at Hansford, Vernie Caldwell married Ruth Tompkins. They were the parents of three sons and three daughters. Simeon also married a girl from a pioneer family, Gladys Richardson. They were parents of a daughter, Keesee Caldwell married Herber Nesbitt. He died two months before their daughter was born. After his death, Keesee lived with her mother until her marriage to Alvino "Veena" Richardson. Mr. Richardson served two terms as Hansford County Sheriff, with Bill Bradford serving as Deputy. Keesee has probably served the County of Hansford more years than any other individual. She has served in the official capacity of Treasurer, County Clerk and District Clerk. Local Attorneys Handle Bank Suit

A civil suit was filed in 69th District Court in Dalhart last week by Gary George of Perryton who seeks to recover \$99,330 from the Citizens State Bank & from W. R. Koehler who recently resigned as vice president of the Dalhart Bank.

George states in his petition that he began doing business with the Dalhart Bank in March 1965 and that his banking business was transacted with Koehler. The suit contends that in February, Koehler informed George of a transaction involving real estate in Lubbock County and offered George a half interest in the transaction.

George says he agreed to enter the business deal and gave Koehler his personal check for \$30,000 payable to the Bank. Koehler was to place the money in escrow in the bank pending completion of the transaction.

Koehler again approached George and said he needed his assistance in another real estate transaction and that \$69,330 was needed in order to complete the transaction.

George alleges that the defendant has refused to return the \$99,330 to him. Attorneys for George are James P. Linn and J. D. Helms of Spearman.

Koehler resigned from his presidency March 15. His father is President of the Bank.

Pvt. Sutherland To Okinawa Isle

Marine Private Mickey R. Sutherland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Sutherland of Spearman, has completed a 12-day training and processing cycle with Staging Battalion at the Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

This refresher training stresses the principles of small unit tactics, with particular emphasis on the fundamentals of scouting and patrolling, and land navigation. This prepares the individual Marine with an opportunity to improve his skill as a combat infantryman; how to be self-sufficient, and teaches day and night tactical maneuvers.

Marines completing this training are assigned to combat units overseas.

Pvt. Sutherland left last Tuesday for overseas duty on Okinawa.

Gulf Oil Scores Again In County

Gulf has another indicated wildcat success in Hansford county at their No. 1, D. L. McClellan 3 1/2 miles north of Gruver.

After a fracture treatment, Upper Morrow perforations from 6984-7008 feet flowed 107 barrels of oil plus 900,000 cubic feet of gas daily, plus 106 barrels water through a one-inch choke.

A later flow test yielded 63 barrels of oil plus 1,170,000 cubic feet gas daily, plus 34 barrels water in 9 hours. Top of the Morrow was called at 6865 feet with Upper sand at 6974.

Gulf No. 1 John Venneman, section 6 block 46 Bailey survey 8 miles SE Hitchland; has proposed depth 7000 feet.

Another First Report well last week is the Moran, No. 1 Hart, 660 feet from S and W lines, section 7 block 5T T&N survey, 3 miles north of Morse. Proposed depth 5800 feet.

Another Well of interest just east of Spearman is the Shamrock No. 2 Isa O. Rifenberg, 1980 feet from S, 660 ft from E lines, section 58 block 13 T&NO Survey, 14 miles S W of Perryton; initial production, flow 239 barrels oil daily, no water; gravity 43; gas-oil ratio 221-lp perforations 7018-48 feet; total depth 9038.

Death Takes Area Pioneer

Mrs. Sena Walstad King, one of this area's oldest residents, died Wednesday afternoon in the Perryton Hospital where she had been five days. She was 94.

Mrs. King was born Jan. 17, 1872, in Iowa, the same year her mother and four older brothers and sisters came to America from Norway to join Mr. Watsford who came to this country in 1839.

The family left Iowa in 1879 and headed for Kansas. Mrs. King often recalled that her father had only 98 cents in his pocket when they arrived at what is now Medicine Bend, and all along the way the family had lived greatly off wildlife.

Mrs. King moved with her family to the Panhandle in 1886 and settled on Wolf Creek in Ochiltree county. The young girl not only helped around the house but also assisted her father in farm and ranch work.

Many frontier tales have been told by and about Mrs. King, one of the most prominent being her capture of a bear while a resident of Iowa. The incident took place while she was herding cattle for her father. Roping the bear, Mrs. King took the animal to the home as a pet. However, the bear later became so large she in time gave it to a traveling show.

Sena Walstad met Archie King in 1880 and the couple married in 1890. The couple set up house-keeping on Johns Creek on the north side of the Canadian River in Hutchinson county until 1896 when they moved to Perryton and ranched. They built a small house of native cottonwood logs, but later replaced it with a 2 story frame home with modern conveniences.

Mr. King died in 1945. Mrs. King was a Lutheran. She is survived by her daughters: Mrs. Ben Archer of Sunray, Mrs. Knox Pipkin of Spearman and Mrs. Grace Bunting of Farnsworth; a sister Mrs. Dave Lard of Truth of Consequences and 15 grandchildren.

Funeral services were held April 8 in Perryton, Texas.

Library Official Declares Texas is "Book Poor"

Texas has the largest library book gap in the nation, claims the president of the American Library Assn.
Robert Vosper, who is also in charge of doubling the size of the 1.5-million-volume library at the University of California at Los Angeles, said Texas is "book poor" by any measure.
He told more than 2000 delegates to the Governor's Conference on Libraries here Wednesday that comparing Texas libraries with libraries in other states is as meaningful as answering the question:
"Is Texas prepared to deal imaginatively with the things of the mind and the spirit, as well as the practicalities of life?"
Once the commitment to better libraries is made, said Vosper, people must decide what kinds and levels of library service they want and determine the state government's fair share in meeting the need.
Gov. John Connally said the Texas library problem can be summed up as widespread substandard library services; too many small, poorly paid, inadequately trained staffs; improvised book collections; library buildings that

damage community pride, confused patterns of service in metropolitan areas and unevenly distributed expenditure for service.

Connally challenged the mayors, city managers, county judges and commissioners, school superintendents, library board members and interested citizens to commit themselves to positive action.

Few librarians attended. Houston had 110 delegates and observers came from California, New York, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Illinois and Washington, D.C.

Texas participants will return home to help stage 150 regional conferences. Most of the meetings will coincide with the April 17-23 observance of National Library Week.

Mrs. Weldon Lynch, past president of the American Library Trustee Assn., said Texas spends \$5100 to expose a child to 12 years of public schooling, based on a projection of current costs.
"Now, suppose the child lives in the community for 50 years after high school," said Mrs. Lynch "at present levels of library expenditure, how much will you spend in Texas to provide this person with materials to utilize the reading and studying skills you have paid \$5100 to achieve?" she asked.

"According to your present per capita expenditure for library service, you will pay \$42 over the next 50 years. Not \$42 for one year, but for 50 years—a little less than it costs to send a child through the first five weeks of the first grade."

Mrs. Lynch called it a "short sighted investment."
A study has shown, she said, that an adult seeking achievement in any work must learn, unlearn and relearn three times during his working lifetime.

"Business demands education in its employees—and the biggest and most flexible sources today of continuing adult education is the public library," she said.

Professors are served in the same manner, she added.

GRAIN SORGHUM NEWS

Sam Atterbury of Atterbury Elevators, Inc. of Amarillo will leave April 4 for approximately 90 day assignment in India to assist with grain handling and distribution problems. The announcement was made today by Elbert Harp, President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association which arranged for Atterbury's assignment through the U. S. Feed Grains Council in cooperation with the Foreign Agricultural Service of USDA.

Recently, President Johnson announced that one million tons of grain sorghum and 2 million tons of wheat would be made available to India under Title 1 Public Law 490 (purchase for local currency) over a 90 day period in order to head off a potential food famine in that country. According to Harp, since the announcement involved such a large shipment of grain over such a short period of time Grain Sorghum Producers Association immediately held conferences with USDA officials raising questions as to whether (1) that quantity of grain could be exported from this country in such a short period of time without affecting normal cash purchases by other countries and (2) if that quantity of grain could be received and redistributed within India during the specified period and (3) if producers can look to additional similar commitments in the future requiring stepped-up production. Harp said that in order for the Association and USDA to have this information available, it was proposed that a team of grain industry experts travel to India to give technical assistance to assure adequate distribution and utilization of the grain.

It is in this connection that Atterbury has been selected as a grain sorghum trade authority as a member of a three man team going to India for these purposes. Other members of the team are T. J. Toohy of the Export Division of Carga Terminal Assoc., St. Paul, Minnesota and Mr. Forest Martin, Manager of Farmers Co-Op Association, in J. A. S. A., Minnesota.

HOMEMAKING NOTES

By Linda Webb

The sweetest month of the year could be April. That's because honey is plentiful this month, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
A choice sweetener for your baked goods, honey absorbs and retains moisture. Cakes and cookies made with honey have fine keeping quality.
Some tips on using honey —
To measure honey, measure shortening first then measure honey in the same measuring cup. It slides out with ease.
To replace other sweetening with honey in cake or cookie recipes that call for other sweetening, the general rule is to reduce the amount of liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of honey used.
To liquify honey that has granulated or solidified place the container in a bowl of warm water (not warmer than the hand can bear) until all crystals are melted and honey is liquid.
To store honey, keep liquid honey in a dry place. Freezing does not injure the color or flavor, but may hasten granulation. Don't put honey in the refrigerator. Avoid damp places for storing honey as it has the property of absorbing and retaining moisture. Crystallized honey is just as good as liquid honey.

our citizens."

Explaining the size of the cancer
problem in Texas, Governor Con-
nally stated that cancer not only
eventually strikes one in every
four persons, but each year kills
more school-age children than
does any other disease.

"The great hope for a future
that will see the cure, or even
the prevention, of cancer, lies with-
in the realms of bio-medical re-
search," the Governor said.

The American Cancer Society
spends 33% of its funds raised on
research; \$761,257 went to Texas
medical schools and hospitals in
1965 alone.

Giving firm backing to each of
the 70,000 volunteers of the Society
the Governor concluded, "The
American Cancer Society, pledged
to continue a vigorous and select-
ive research program within the
borders of our state and across
the nation, deserves our complete
support."

The Governor commended Dr.
A. B. Goldston, of Amarillo, who
is President of the Texas ACS.

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
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
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
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
