8 People Taking Shots For Rabies

Amarillo and Hansford County authorities conducted a week end search for all persons who might have come into contact with a litter of rabid baby skunks.

A friend of little Billy Pettit, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Pettit of Spearman, found the litter of baby skunks on his farm soon after their mother had been killed. He gave the babies to Billy. Clarence took three of the skunks to Amarillo with him last week and gave them away.

After one of the skunks died in Amarillo, its owner took it to the Amarillo A.C. where the test for rabies turned out "Positive". The director of Amarillo Animal Control, Merrill Buckles, then put out the alarm and the search for everyone who had contacted the skunks began.

All of the skunks had been located by Saturday, and 8 people are now under a doctor's care for the Pasteur treatment of rabies. The Pettit boy's dog had killed his two skunks, and they had already disposed of the animals. (The dog had had his rabies shots.) The Pettit family was notified by the Amarillo people about the rabid skunks, so their son Billy is now taking the preventive treatment.

Billy Pettit says these shots are not so painful as most people suppose. The shot is given just under the skin either on the abdomen or thigh, for 14 consecutive days.

One Amarillo man who had come in contact with the skunks left on vacation and was located on the golf course in Fort Worth.

The skunks were in Thompson Park on May 19 and handled by several persons, including a kindergarten group from Berger. All parents of these children were notified.

Buckles advised anyone who might have come into contact with the animals to see a doctor immediately. "If they wait for symptoms to appear, it will be too late because rabies is always 100 per cent fatal when symptoms have begun."

The animals were probably born in a den with a rabid mother. Although they had no teeth and could not bite, they might have playfully sucked on a sore thumb or licked a cut hand, and rabies can be spread like that.

This is the second "rabies" scare for Spearman and vicinity.

A few weeks ago the John Sell family lost two horses from the disease. At the time the Sell family was searching their farm, just north of town, they found a dead skunk in the field, so it might possibly be that this animal, which is always so prevalent, is going to be the "spreader" of the disease.

The public is urged to take extreme precaution with pets, and if dead animals are found, notify your Veterinarian at once.

The following polling places will be open throughout the county from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Residents in Precincts 1, 2, 9 and 10 will vote at the courthouse in Spearman. Precinct residents in 3 and 4 will vote at the Ag building in Gruver. Voters in Precincts 7 and 8 will vote at the Old Lutheran church.

No one voted absentee ballots, according to County Clerk Mrs. Keesee Richardson. This was as predicted. In fact the state is looking for a very tight vote for Saturday.

For want of the votes of Texans don't care enough to go to the polls June 4, a very small minority of citizens could elect some of its most important office holders. Texas is predicting one of the smallest turn-outs in its history with possibly as few as five percent of Texas citizens going to the polls.

Elections at all levels of government have been won or lost on the basis of a handful of votes.

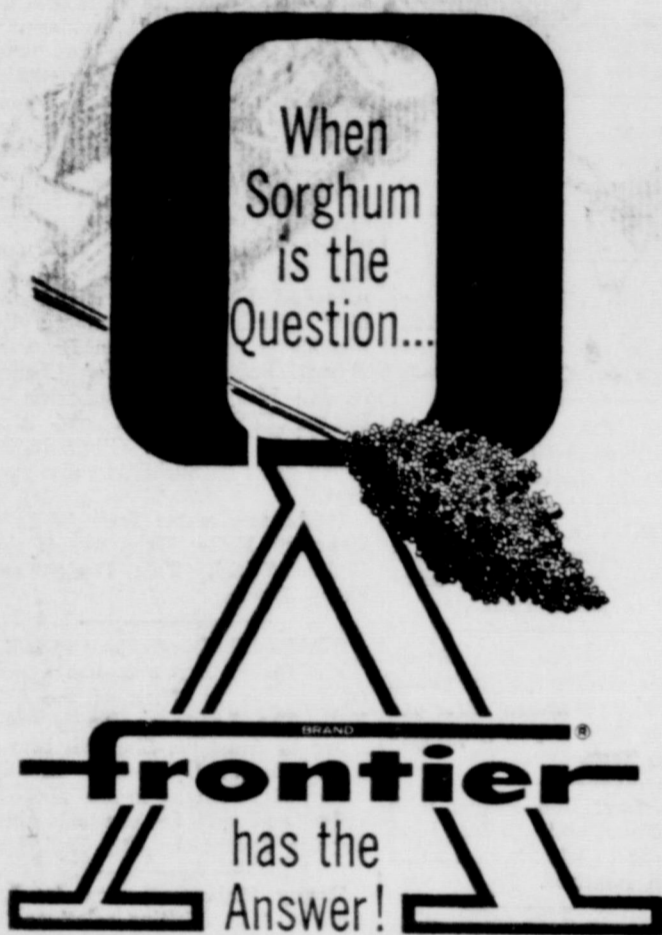

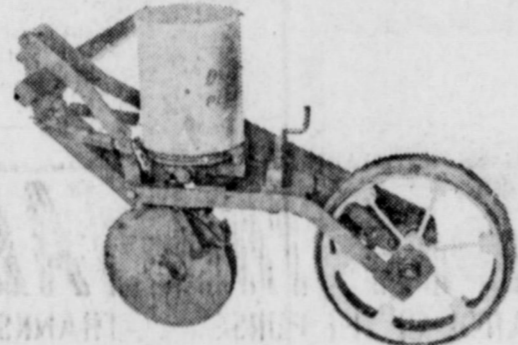

HOMEMAKING NOTES

HOMEMAKING NOTES — We hear a lot about food packaging, (and sometimes even say a lot ourselves.) Many shoppers criticize from time to time. They find packages that won't open, are chipped or damaged, or whose shape won't fit on the storage shelf.

For every dollar spent for food, eight to ten cents goes for its packaging.

There are several benefits derived from good packages. One is the convenience a good package gives to its user. For example, most milk cartons are equipped with handy pouring spouts. Certain packages act as serving dishes, to be eaten out of, or as a cooking container for the food. Some packages are even reusable.

Another benefit is that of safety. Modern packaging has improved so much that we can now store meats, fruits, vegetables, and many other foods for months without refrigeration or special care — and then eat them with perfect confidence.

Still another benefit is that of education. Most packages are equipped with labels that give important information such as ingredients, style, serving suggestions, number of servings and quantity of product.

On the negative side of food packaging, it can be deceiving. Certain colors may look larger, and the construction of certain packages make them look larger, too.

Some packages, especially those containing dry foods such as crackers or cereals may not always be full. Generally, however, this is because the food has "settled" in handling. The wise shopper should look for net contents on the packages.

Price increases sometimes are misleading by use of a smaller package for the same price. The

color or shape of the package may make a new package look as large as the original.

You, the consumer, can stop package deception. Anytime you find misrepresentation, or any attempt to deceive, discuss it with the store manager. If enough people call this to his attention, the manufacturer will hear about it.

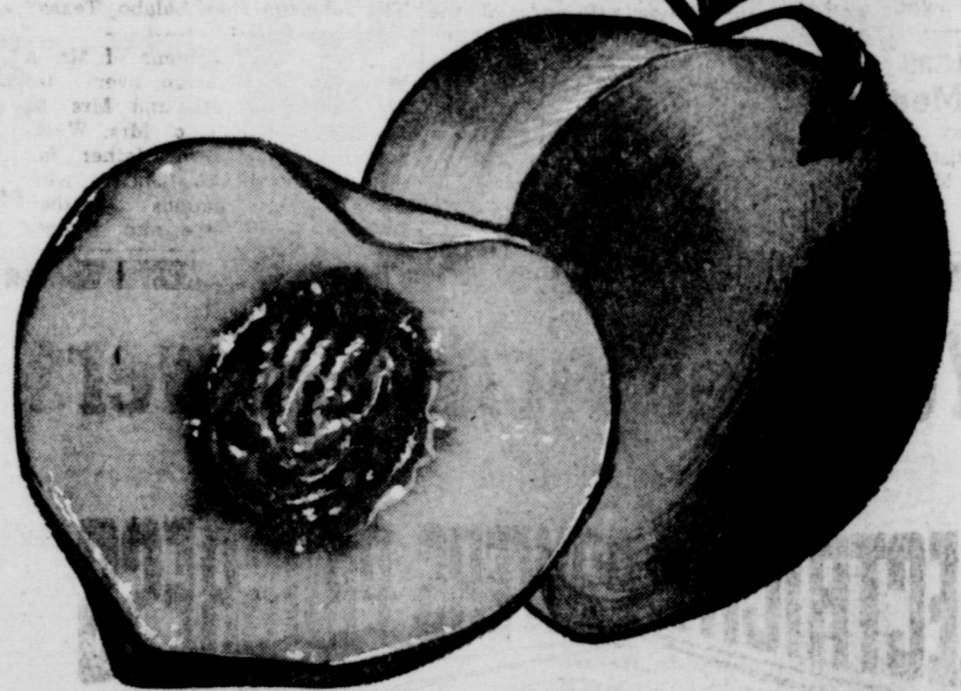

Mrs. Bessie Henderson of Morse has been active in HD Club work since 1936. Her other hobbies include reading, knitting and raising house plants.

A lady who donates one afternoon of her time each week to serve as librarian for the Community library has been named HD Club Woman of the Month, for the Morse HD Club.

Mrs. Bessie Henderson, a club woman since 1936 has acted as librarian since the library was organized three years ago. Through the community improvement program such a library was organized. It is located in the community building and has around 500 books for loan. The Morse 4-H clubs sponsored the community improvement program and an adult committee composed of Mrs. M. W. McCloy, Vera James and Jack Johnson, Jr., along with several 4-H members, worked to secure this library.

Mrs. Henderson states she is glad to give her time to such a worthy cause. She is most gratified to see the children reading so many books. She holds library hours each Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Henderson, born in Tilden, Ill., came to the Texas Panhandle in February of 1906. She and her family traveled to Guymon by train and then came to the Lieb community by covered wagon where they, like so many pioneer families, lived in a half dugout for some time.

She was an early day school teacher and taught from 1913-1918 in small country schools. At one time her pupils were from only one family and school was held in a room of the family home.

In 1918 she married Alva Henderson and they lived on a farm west of Morse. In 1927 they built their home on the section where her son, Earl, now resides.

In 1930 Mrs. Henderson joined her first H D club at Pringle in Hutchinson county. She states this was a learning experience for farm women and she learned many things of value.

"At that time," says Mrs. Henderson, "learning to can beef with a pressure cooker was most valuable both nutritionally and economically. This made it possible to have meat the year round as we had no refrigerators or ice on the farms. For refrigeration we used what was called a "cooler" It was a metal frame over which a damp cloth was placed. This certainly did not keep meat in edible condition for very long.

"In 1936 we got a wind charger

which provided electricity for lights and radio. To this day I'm careful about leaving lights turned on unnecessarily. We were so glad to get away from using those kerosene lamps and we learned to conserve our wind-charger electricity.

"The washing machine, powered by a gasoline motor put out in the mid 20's was one of the nicest things to happen for the farm woman."

In the early 50's Mrs. Henderson joined the Morse HD Club and she states she has learned many new tricks about sewing and cooking which helped her to rear her family of two boys and one girl. Mr. Henderson passed away in 1945.

Mrs. Henderson has served in nearly every office of her local club and has been a member of the HD County Council several times. She states "I think HD work is more valuable for the young homemaker while she is rearing her family, but older members enjoy the association with the young and also still learn new things."

In addition to her club work she has been and still is active in church and PTA work. Her hobbies include raising house plants, working in her yard, knitting and piecing and quilting quilts. In the past ten years she has pieced and quilted 30 quilts. She has eleven grandchildren and states she has two quilts for each of them.

"Grandma Bessie," as she is called by both her grandchildren and many youngsters in the community, is a lady who has remained young in spirit through her years.

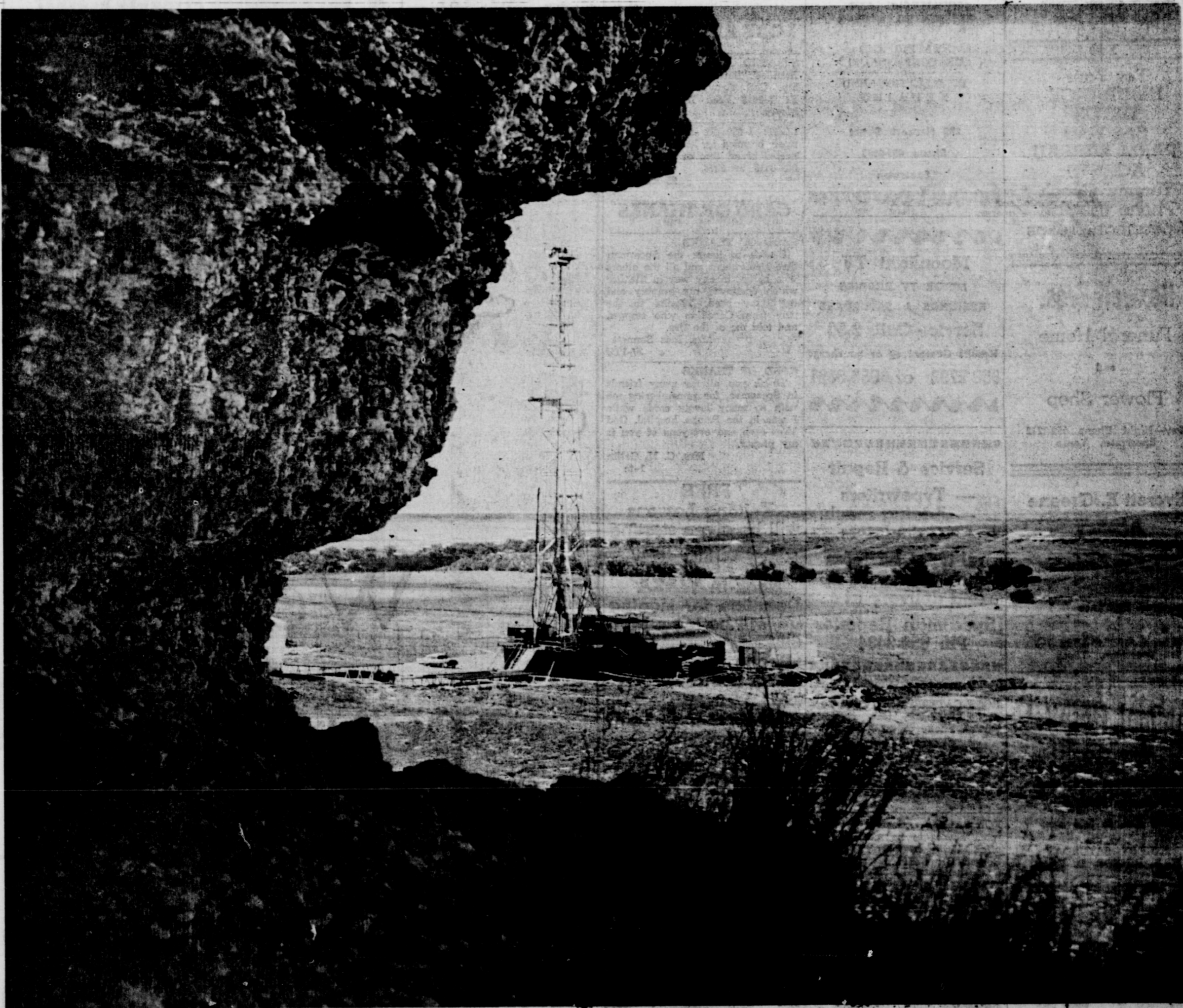

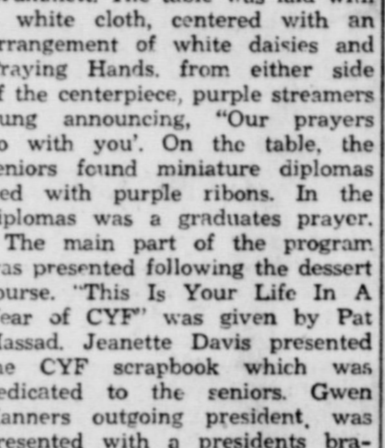
Progressive Supper Honors CYF Seniors

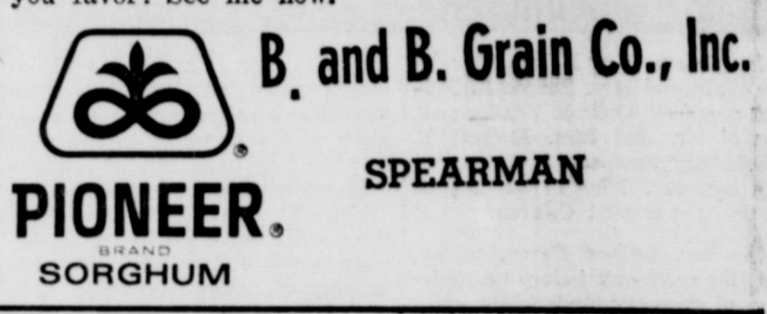
