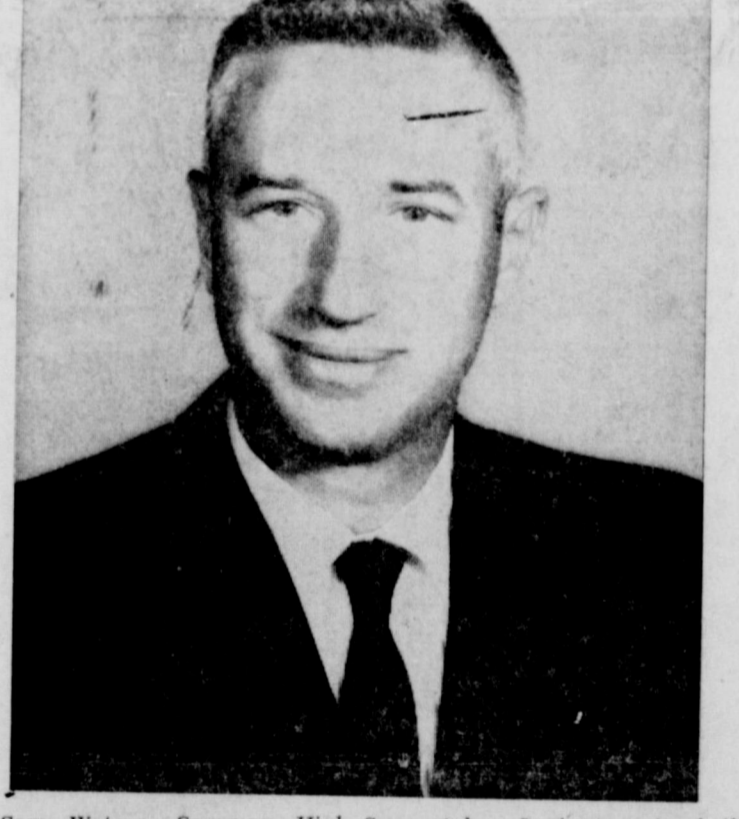
## 35 New Residents Past Two Weeks

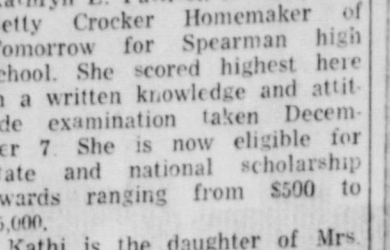
**Kathi Pattison Named By General Mills As "Homemaker of Tomorrow"**

 Test papers of all school winners in the state are being judged competitively. From them, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of annual Betty Crocker Search. In addition, her school will be awarded a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The second-ranking girl will receive a \$500 educational grant.
