sion and it adopted a new registration act. The major change in the law was that registration with the County Tax Collector should be without charge.

Under the law passed in February voters will register annually, as they have previously done, during the period of October 1 through January 31. A temporary registration was allowed in March 1966, but this was a one-time provision only.

You do not have to pay a poll tax now, but you must register. The time to do this is now. To be eligible to vote in 1967 elections, you must go by the County Tax Office and register. Deadline date is January 31.

Everyone from the age of 21 years through 60 must register in order to vote. If you are over 60, you are exempt.

Although no State or National elections of importance are on the agenda now, there will be constitutional amendments, local bond elections school board city aldermen etc. coming up in 1967, so it is of utmost importance that you register before January 31.

Must Register For 1967 Vote

The poll tax requirement for voting was held invalid in February of this year by a three judge federal court. It based its ruling on the due process clause of the Federal Constitution. The court said this requirement was equivalent to a charge or penalty imposed on the exercise of a fundamental right, & it indicated that any charge for registration would be illegal. The United States Supreme Court affirmed the decision.

Immediately following the three judge decision the State Legislature was called into special ses-

**Higher Loan Rate--Price Support
For The 1967 Feed Grain Program**

Elizey D. Vanderburg, Mgr. of the local ASC office, stated this week that the 1967 voluntary feed grain program would be basically the same as in previous years, the changes being a higher loan rate, higher total price support and elimination of voluntary diversion for payment except on small farms which may earn diversion payments higher than in 1966.

Mr. Vanderburg said cotton producers would vote December 5 through December 9 to determine whether a research and promotion order should be issued for upland cotton and also to determine whether there will be cotton marketing quotas for the 1967 crop.

This referendum will be held by mail balloting, with all eligible voters receiving their ballots and pertinent information before Dec. 5.

Now is the time for cotton farmers to make application for transfer of a 1967 cotton allotment within or out of the county by sale, lease or owner. Final date is Dec. 31.

The Hansford county ACP allocation for the 1967 program is \$76,719.00. A thousand dollar payment limitation per person per farm for the 1967 program year was approved by the County Committee.

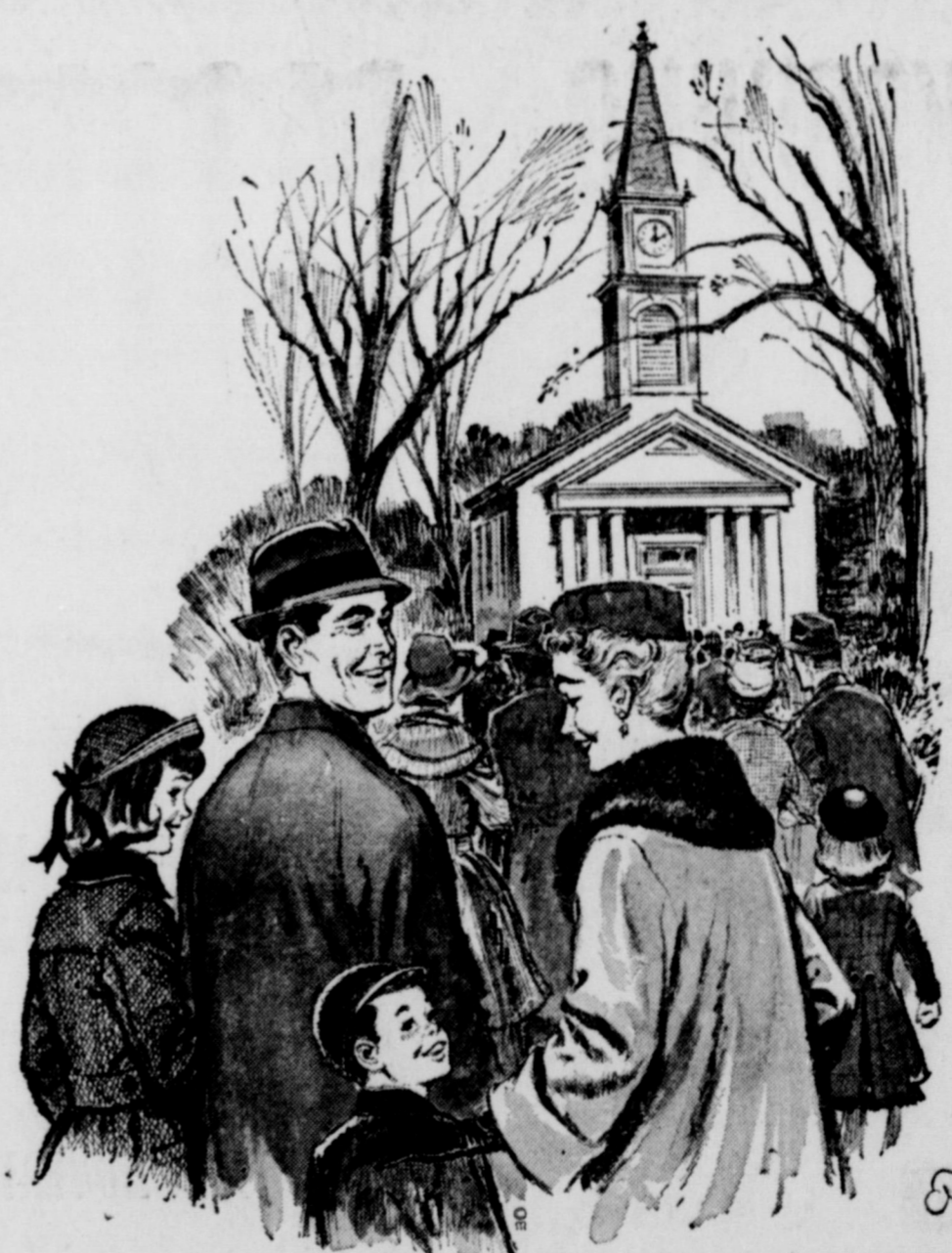

Spearman Merchants Planning Big Christmas Program, Begins Dec. 3

Brad Beedy, Chairman of Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, announced today that these present at the meeting unanimously agreed on a Fair Share assessment of \$15.00 for each merchant to cover the entire Christmas Program. Note From Postmaster

Postmaster Jacobs today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725 - The Dulski Military Mail Act - which was signed by President Johnson on November 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Jacobs explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail). This will eliminate the task of reweighing the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

HOME-MAKING NOTES

The time is growing short for contestants to enter the 1966 "Make It With Wool," contest. I still have several entry blanks in my office for persons wishing to enter. November 14 is the deadline for sending in your entry form.

As in the years past, there are four divisions in the contest - 1) Sub-deb for 10 to 15 years old; 2) Junior, for 14-16 years; 3) Senior 17-21 years; and 4) adults, for persons 22 and over.

Sub-debs may make a jumper or skirt from a 100 percent wool fabric. Other divisions may enter any of the following garment categories: two-piece suit; coat; dress (school, jacket, party or formal).

Still looking for money-savers in the food department? Try some of these suggestions for making substitutions in recipes rather than purchase an item called for:

To make sweet milk sour, add 1 tablespoon vinegar to 1 cup sweet milk. 1 cup milk equals 1/2 cup canned milk plus 1/2 cup water. 1 cup milk equals 4 tablespoons powdered milk plus 1 cup water. Vinegar, orange juice or grapefruit may be used in place of lemon juice in salad dressings.

2 1/2 Tablespoons cocoa plus 1/2 tablespoon shortening are almost equal in flavor and composition to 1 oz. of chocolate.

In place of frosting on cake spread with jelly and then sprinkle with nuts or coconut. To use left-over whites or yolks of eggs: 2 whites may be used for 1 egg. 4 whites may be used for 2 eggs. If a white is substituted for a yolk in cakes, add 1 teaspoon shortening. 1 cup bread crumbs equal 3/4 cup cracker crumbs.

For lovely flowers next spring, right now is the time to plant flowers bulbs. Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist, sent along these bulb-planting hints - In general, bulbs need a well-drained soil. Peatmoss can be added to supply organic matter if the soil is extra heavy or sandy. Bulbs do not tolerate heavy concentrations of fertilizer near them. For this reason fresh manure should not be used in the bulb garden. Bonemeal is one of the most commonly recommended fertilizers for bulbs.

More People Would Have Cancer Check-up If Urged By Physician

Ninety percent of Americans would have annual checkups for cancer, if urged to do so by their physicians, according to a new study by the American Cancer Society.

At present, less than half of the public said they have had checkups that could detect cancer, Dr.

Leonard W. Larson, retiring National President of the ACS, reported to the Society's Annual Meeting in New York.

The Meeting was attended by the newly-elected President of the Texas Division, ACS John P. Thomas, M.D., of Austin. Other representatives to the National

Board from Texas are: Mrs. Walter Lalley, DeWalt; Mr. Clayton Williams, Sweetwater; B. L. Aronoff, M. D., Dallas; Mr. Grant Judge, McQueeney; Mrs. Charles Bailey, Austin; A. B. Goldston, M.D., Amarillo; Mr. John A. Mobley, Corpus Christi; Murray M. Copeland, M.D. and R. Lee Clark, M.D. of Houston; and G. V. Brindley, Sr., M.D., Temple.

The study of public attitudes toward cancer was conducted for the ACS by Lieberman Research, Inc., of New York City. It showed that 57 percent of those questioned had never had a physical examination including tests for cancer; 26 and 17 percent have had an examination at one time or another. "Among both groups of goers and

'non-goers,' nine out of ten said they would have a checkup if their doctors told them to do so," Dr. Larson said. Presently about one-third of all cancer patients are being saved, Dr. Larson pointed out. He credited early detection and diagnosis as the key to saving lives from cancer. He said, "We know too that 'cures,' the synonym for five-year survivals, are due principally to one thing, the urgency of treatment--the promptness with which a cancer patient responds to our pleas for early detection, to early diagnosis, to early attention to the

cancer that can be cured but kills if neglected." The American Cancer Society points out that at least half of those who get cancer could be saved with present techniques of treatment. Dr. Larson estimated that since the founding of the ACS in 1913, "at least two and a half million Americans stricken with cancer have been saved." He added, "And of this number, nearly one and a half million are alive today!" The ACS president said, "It seems clear that the physician is indeed the key to making the checkup program a success."

One of the attitudes that must be changed, he said, is the belief by those who do not have checkups that "doctors are for treating symptoms, not for conducting checkups." He said an effective way of changing this attitude is to "demonstrate to the patient that the family physician welcomes his complaint, however trivial, and endorses the annual checkup as the best defense against cancer."

"In the most forceful terms at my command," he said, "I call upon every physician in the land to reinforce this stand -- to demonstrate at every opportunity that checkups are necessary and important. At the same time no physician, anywhere, must ever turn aside one who comes to him with a complaint about a persistent cough or what seems to him a persistent indigestion or any other warning signal of cancer."

"Let us set about to tear down the curtain of doubt that keeps the patient and the physician apart," he declared. "If the public believes that the physician is too busy or not enough concerned to recommend regular checkups or to pay attention to his complaint about a symptom of illness, we must take steps to correct this misconception where it exists, and to alter the doctor's attitude if indeed he is at fault."

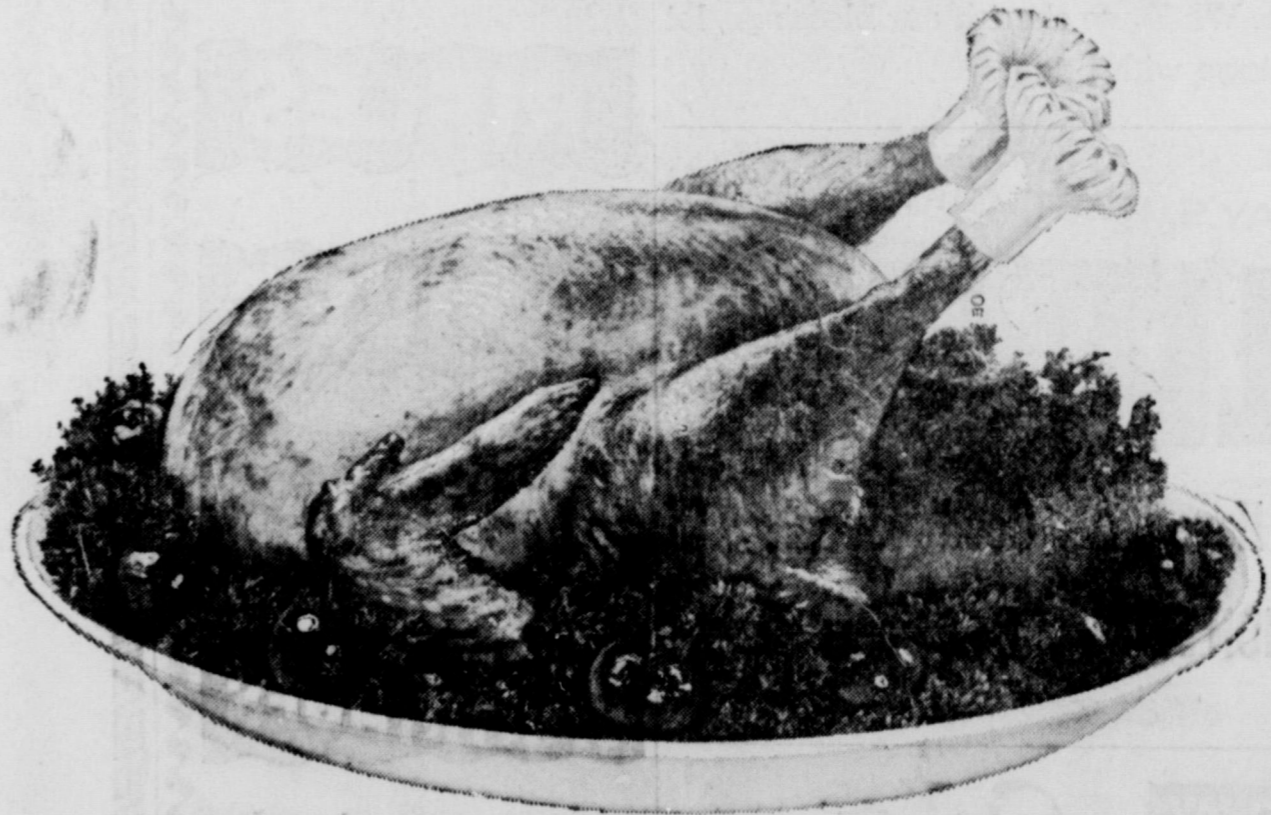

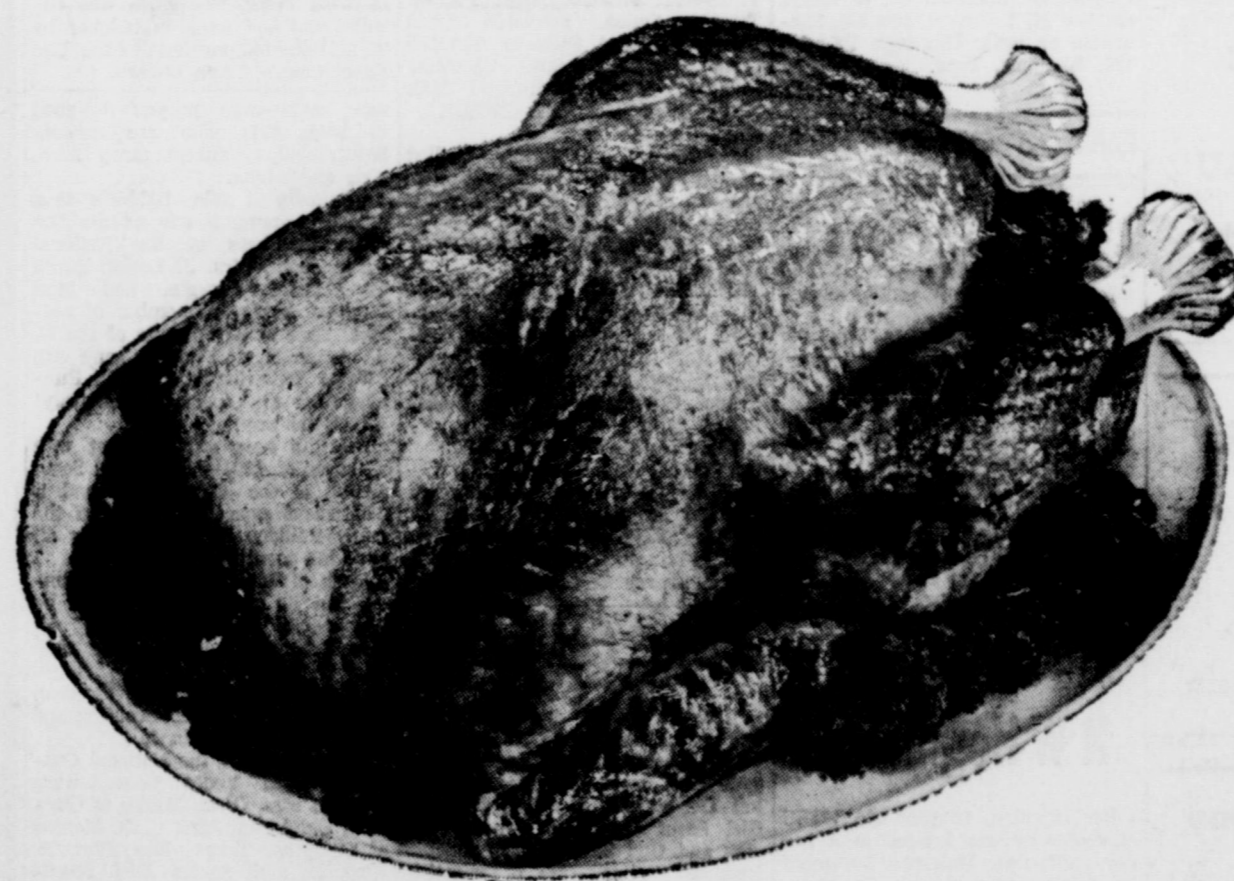

Farm Bureau
Members Total
Over 100,000

Final 1966 membership tabulation
showed the Texas Farm Bureau
increased its membership by 5,722
over last year, according to Wayne
Little, organization director. Oct. 31
is the end of the TFB's membership
year.

Total 1966 membership in the TFB
is 100,926—first time ever for the
33-year-old farm organization to
pass the 100,000 mark in members.
The Texas Farm Bureau, now
fifteen times larger than the next
biggest farm organization in the
state, has shown an increase in
members each year for the past
14 years.

"Considering the continuing de-
cline in number of farmers and
ranchers, our gain this year is evi-
dence that most farmers and
ranchers in Texas endorse the
Farm Bureau's activities in legis-
lation, marketing and personal
economic services," Little said.

There are 203 organized counties
in the Texas Farm Bureau. The
organization is supported by volun-
tary dues-paying members. Dues
vary by county, but average about
\$10-\$12 per year.

The 100,000th member signed up
in the TFB this year was a 47-
year-old dairyman, Oswald Norman
of Willis Point, Texas. He was en-
rolled the last week in October by
T. L. Roberts, president of the Van
Zandt County Farm Bureau.

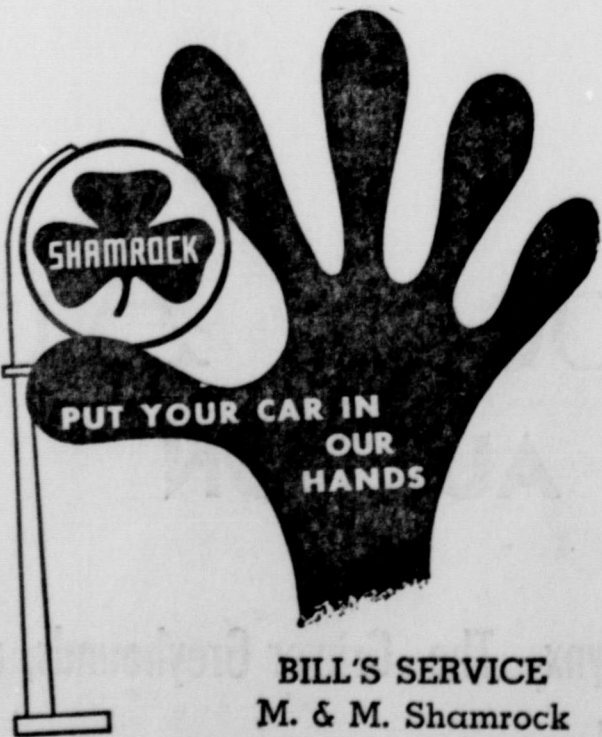

Linda's Home-making Notes

Grandmother had quite a pantry, which she kept well stocked. It was a rare occasion when she did not have several weeks' supply of food on hand.

How many of us bother to maintain a sizable reserve of food supplies today? Not too many, I'm afraid.

Each person should keep enough food on hand for at least 14 days. This recommendation is not based solely upon possibilities of war emergencies or natural disasters which could occur at any time.

Another excellent reason for keeping a well-stocked pantry is an economic one. Although the original investment could run into several dollars, such a food stockpile could be quite a budget stretcher.

Everyone right now is becoming quite concerned about the high food prices, so here are a few wise pointers to help you keep down your expenditures for food.

1. Make a shopping list and use it as a guide. Money can be easily wasted on impulse purchases.

2. Buy where prices are generally low or moderate.

3. Learn to judge quality of fruits, vegetables, eggs and meats. Learning how to select and buy intelligently may mean a real saving in money.

4. Use fruits, vegetables and eggs when they are in season locally, as they are cheaper at this time.

5. Save by purchasing larger amounts of food when you can use them or store them properly. Take advantage of special sales, but don't buy something your family can't or won't eat.

6. Read newspaper ads for good buys and specials.

If you want to spend less money you will need to give more time to planning and usually more time and energy to buying and preparing food. When you buy more carefully, you must require knowledge and make careful comparisons - this requires time and energy.

By planning your shopping carefully, considerable savings will result over a period of time in your food budget, savings in time spent on trips, savings in money spent for "extras" (impulse purchases).

Next week, I will go into more detail on Better Use of Your Food Dollar, to help you save money on your food purchases.

Now, on to quite a different subject, but a timely one -

The fall and winter season is the time to check and decide whether replacement plants are needed in the home landscaping.

Maybe a rose bush has died or failed to live up to expectations, or there is a gap in the shrub border where a plant is needed. Or where a new plant is needed. Or do you have adequate shade in your outdoor living area? Make a list of your landscape needs and be ready to take advantage of the selections offered to early buyers by nursery and garden centers.

The natural inclination is to put off garden work until late spring when everything is greenening up and the spring flowers are in bloom. Then suddenly comes the urge to plant trees and shrubs and a rush to the nursery or garden center for plants only to find picked-over stock remaining.

Balled and burlapped plants and those grown in containers can be transplanted any time of the year. Many of the deciduous plants, those that lose their leaves each fall, can be more easily handled or transplanted in a bare root condition. For best results, however, bare root plants should be set out in the late fall and winter from mid-November through February in most areas of Texas. Planting during this period gives ample time for good root development before spring growth begins.

With proper care, bare root plants can be set out as late as March and April. Their success, however, is dependent upon condition of the nursery stock used and the care they receive for six months after planting.

For ease of maintenance and to reduce the amount of disease and insect damage, select landscape plants which are native or adapted to the area.

Gift Parcels To Be Airlifted To Military Post Offices Overseas

Postmaster "Jake" Jacobs reminded Spearman residents that there are not very many mailing days before Christmas. "While it may seem a long time to most people, it is frighteningly short to those of us in the Postal Service," he said. "Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has predicted that well over eight billion pieces of mail must be delivered between now and Christmas Eve, a new record."

"We are asking everyone to start thinking about their Christmas shopping and mailing now. If all the holiday mail were to hit the postal system at one time, it is obvious that we'd have difficulty delivering every piece on time." Mailing early and spreading the mail flow out along the entire Pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time of the year.

Last year the public cooperation was "tremendous" according to Mr. Jacobs. Virtually every piece of holiday mail was delivered before Christmas Day. This year with increased volume we are hoping to see that fine cooperative spirit again.

Postmaster Jacobs offered these mailing tips:

Use ZIP Codes on all mail. "If

there are some ZIP Codes that you still need for your mailing list, come to the Post Office or give us a call. ZIP Codes are more important than ever this year.

Prepare your gift list right away. The earlier you do your shopping the better chance you have to get exactly what you want while the stores are still full of merchandise. That way, you can mail earlier too.

Be sure to have enough boxes, tape, string and wrapping paper on hand. Wrap packages well. Include sufficient padding. Remember, that your parcel may be shipped in a mail sack with a set of encyclopedias riding on top.

Include a card or piece of paper inside the package with your name and address and that of the person you are sending the parcel to in case the wrapping should be loose and come off. That way, you can be assured your gift will not wind up in the dead parcel office. Also, insert a list of the package's contents.

Address your gifts and greetings clearly so that postal workers will have no difficulty in reading the destination. Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved. Cards that are undeliverable will be returned when you include a return address on the envelope and use first class postage.
