## Mike Skinner Returns From Honolulu Visit

Mike Skinner, 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Skinner, has recently returned from his stay in the Hawaiian Islands.

Mike left June 15 to attend six weeks Summer school at the University of Hawaii. He left from Amarillo and flew to Los Angeles where he met John Miles a friend whom he attended Oklahoma University with. They flew from Los Angeles to Honolulu in three hours. Mike lived off campus while there. First he lived two blocks off of Waikiki, then moved to a piece of the school and the beach.

While attending school he took Sociology of the Hawaiian Islands. In his extra time he laid on the beach, surfed, read, attended several stage shows, theatres, and heard many new popular singers. He also saw many things of interest while there. He toured all of the islands by airplane, and

stopped to tour 3 of these on foot. He toured the Dole pineapple factory, one of the C & H Sugar plantations, and saw sugar being made, also Pearl Harbor and many other historical places.

Mike said the weather was much like ours. The temperature was around 90 degrees everyday, and 70 degrees at night. It would sprinkle a little rain everyday on the island, but only rained real hard 2 days out of the six weeks there.

The dress of most tourists was shorts, aloha shirts, muu-muus, & bare feet, but the natives wore clothes similar to ours. Mike said you could get any type of food you wanted. His favorite places to eat were a German place, and a Jewish delicatessen restaurant. He said you could get Mexican food, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, and Hawaiian food. "The good American hamburger would cost you \$1.00," he said.

Campus life is some different over there than here. Most of the students are natives and do not live on campus, so therefore there are no fraternities and sororities. There are several parties & dances though. The professors wear shorts, and dress like the tourist. The overall attitude of the college is friendly. Mike was a little disappointed in the construction of the college buildings. He said the building would be classified as a low grade of construction over here.

The main method of transportation was by bus or walking. He said to rent a car or motor cycle cost too much.

While there Mike saw Miss Pat Howard, a former Spearman high school English teacher. Miss Howard is working as a Social Director of the Baptist Church in Pearl Harbor.

Mike said he had a real nice time while gone, although he had some trouble "joining" homes. He had to spend two days and two nights in the Honolulu air terminal, sleeping on the weighing scales, and one day in the Los Angeles terminal, waiting for a plane for home.

Mike will return to Oklahoma University this fall where he will be a sophomore.

## School Students To Register At Various Times

School officials have announced the following schedule for registration of all Spearman school students.

AUG. 25, from 9 to 12 a.m. ALL FIRST GRADE students and parents will come to the Elementary school. Parents MUST have available, medical report, Birth certificate and \$2.75 for student supplies. You must have these items before your child will be registered.

From 1-3 p.m. Aug. 25, ALL GRADE school students who have moved into the district lately, and who were not listed on the school census. Registration will be at the Elementary building.

GRADES 2 through 8 will register August 26 from 9-12 o'clock. Grades 2, 3 and 4 will go to Elementary building, and must have WITH THEM AT THIS TIME the \$2.75 for work books, supplies, etc. Grades 5-8 will go to the Grade School auditorium for registration. Allen Alford, Elementary Principal expects to register around 400 students in grades 1-4.

James Pendergraft, Grade School Principal, will register over 400 students in grades 5-8. This is an increase which is anticipated over last year's enrollment.

HIGH SCHOOL students will register Thursday May 25. Kenneth McKay, High school Principal urges all new students who have moved into the district, and are not on the census, to come to the High school any time from now to the 26 and make out their schedules.

Aug. 25, from 8 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. NEW STUDENTS will register. From 10 a.m. to 11 all Seniors will report to the auditorium for briefing and registration.

From 11:15 to 12:15 Juniors will register. All high school students will report to the auditorium.

From 1-2 p.m. Sophomores, and Juniors will register. Mr. McKay says they expect 80 Freshmen, 83 Sophomores, 81 Juniors and 73 Seniors to register on Aug. 25. This includes students who have filled out schedules, and does not include new students.

All high school students will be assigned lockers and issued books as they are registered.

AUG. 26 (Friday) will be used to work out any problems of schedules, etc., which students might encounter at registration.

## Wheat Quota Boosted 15 percent For Hansford County Area

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman increased the 1967 national wheat acreage allotment 15 percent or 8.9 million acres, Monday to a total of 68.2 million acres.

With the 7.7 million acre increase of May 7, the allotment for 1967 is now 15.6 million acres greater than for 1966 crop year.

Experts are afraid that the largest famine in modern history is in the making, with many countries who depend on Uncle Sam for food, literally starving if we do not sell them wheat. Also corn

and grain sorghums are at an all-time low.

The local ASC office has now begun their official work of advising farmers of the increased allotment for wheat, but all allotments will be 30 per cent over last year on wheat.

Spotted rains in the Hansford county area over the week-end have battered wheat-planting prospects, and many farmers will undoubtedly begin planting wheat in the near future; although many fields need another rain to insure a good kill of volunteer wheat, as well as getting a good stand on newly planted wheat.

The new 30 per cent in the wheat quota for this county, will boost the county's income just about 30 per cent on the winter wheat crop, plus 30 per cent increase in wheat pasture for cattle.

With any kind of good breaks in the weather, Hansford County faces the brightest income from a winter crop, in the history of the county!

## Dee Miller Is Demos Choice As Candidate For Congressman

Democratic county chairmen of the 18th Congressional District chose Dee Miller, as nominee for Congress in the Nov. 8 election.

Miller, of Amarillo, is the district attorney of the 47th District. He was chosen on the fourth roll call Monday as chairman from the 30 county district met to choose a man to replace Walter Rogers who last week announced his decision to retire.

Miller will be opposed on the ballot by Bob Price, Republican. He received 17 votes from the 30 county chairmen. Bob Price has been campaigning for three months, but Miller said he felt "we are going to send a Democratic congressman to Congress in November."

James P. Linn, of Spearman, had announced as a candidate for the post last week. The popular Attorney was the nominee for Hansford county.

District Judge Max Beyer of Perryton was nominated by Lipscomb County.

J. W. (Buck) Buchanan, a former Spearman man, was nominated by Moore County.

Will D. Davis Jr. of Austin, chairman of the State Democratic Executive committee, called the committee into session and heard various counties nominate their candidates. All withdrew after

the third round of balloting and the choice became unanimous for Miller.

## Spraying Of Crops To Be Voluntary

A voluntary program by farmers to use insect sprays for mildew crops will not damage broad-leaf plants was discussed Monday by the Hansford County Commissioners.

Heavy damage to are cotton soybean and castor bean crops by sprays that float or drift has been reported.

A voluntary program to use a type of spray that will not drift would prevent enforcement of a herbicide law, a spokesman for the commissioners said.

The law requires that a farmer who sprays must get a permit and pay 10 cents an acre for the area that is sprayed.

The letters already have been mailed to county farmers recommending a type spray that doesn't drift.

## Population Signs To Be Erected Soon

Two men from the Texas Highway department met with the City councilmen, Monday evening to give their final report on the traffic situation at the intersections of highway 15, Kenneth street, and the Gruver highway. Several months ago the City of Spearman ask for an investigation on the intersection to see if it would warrant a traffic light.

The report from Smith and Moss Monday evening showed that the amount of traffic did not warrant a signal light.

New population signs will go up soon at the entrance to the city limits of Spearman. New signs have not been erected since 1960. The board estimates the number of residents to be around 4800 now.

Like Texas Tech's latest representative to the Chicago College All-Star game, Donny Anderson, the school's first selection, in 1945, Walt Schlinkman, also was headed toward a pro career with the Green Bay Packers.

Parallels involving Anderson & Schlinkman have been many. Both came to Texas Tech from Texas Panhandle towns. Anderson's home of Stinnett is only 31 miles from Dumas, Schlinkman's home.

Together they own virtually every Tech rushing record. When Anderson set a one-season mark of 966 yards, in 1964 he broke a mark established by Schlinkman 20 years earlier.

Both were No. 1 draft choices of the same pro club, Green Bay, with a year's eligibility remaining, current employer.
