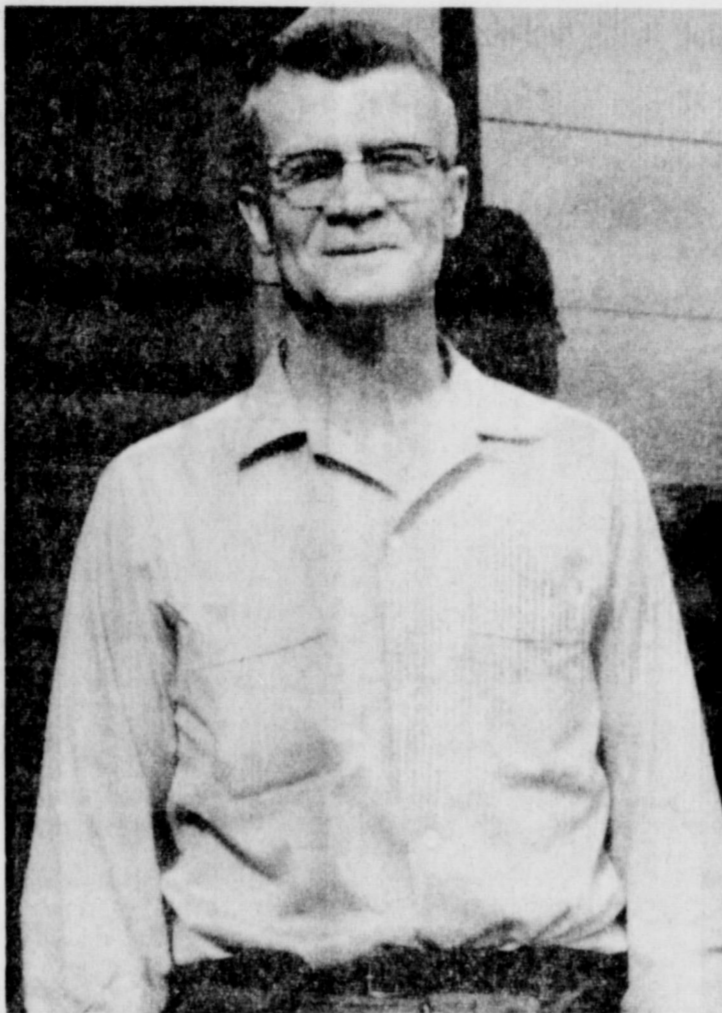

During the course he received instruction in the chemical examination of blood and spinal fluids, and in basic laboratory procedures.

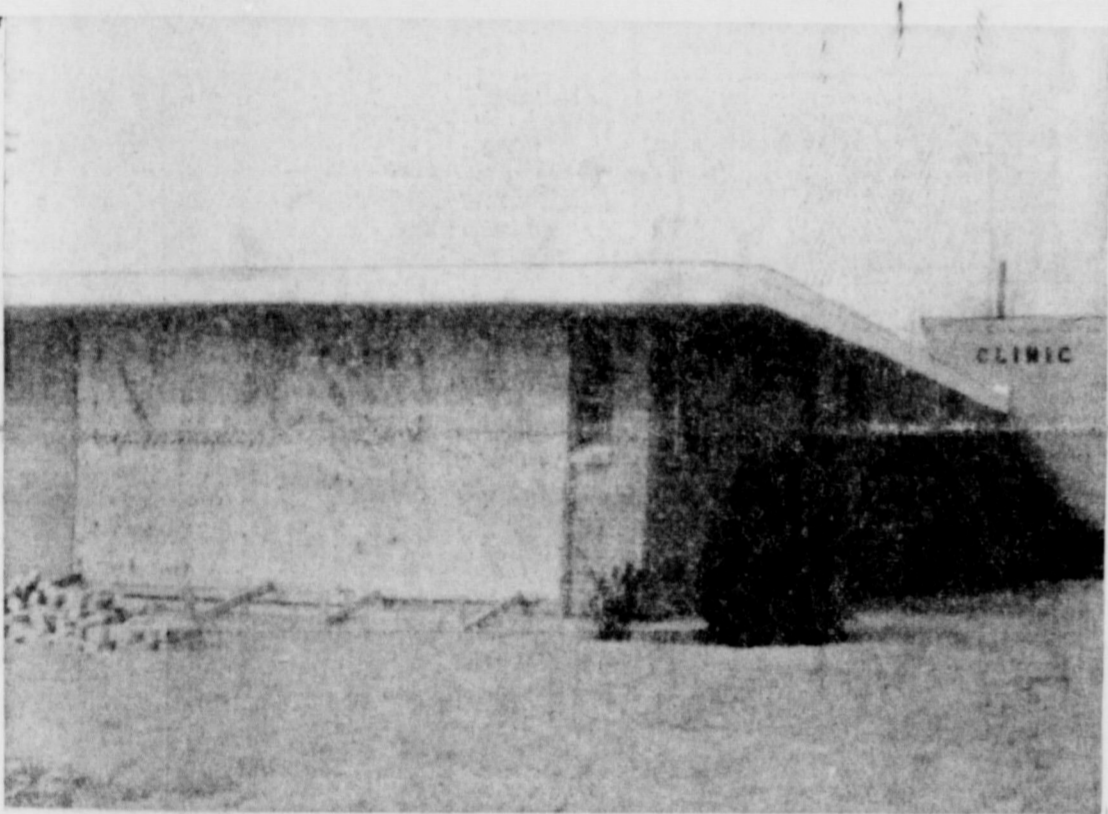
Bloodmobile To Be Here In Feb.

Kenneth Evans, immediate past president, will act as an ex-officio member of the Board.

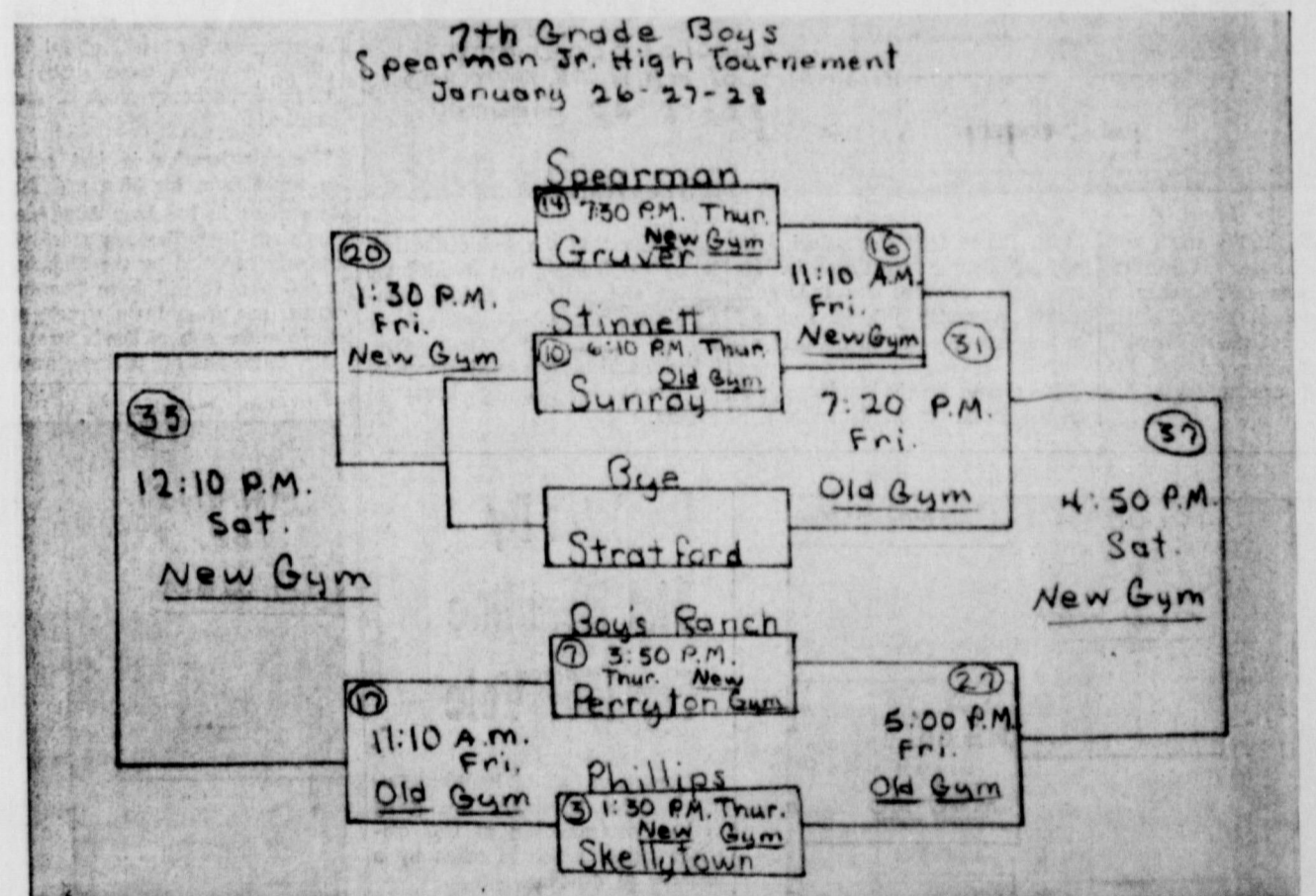
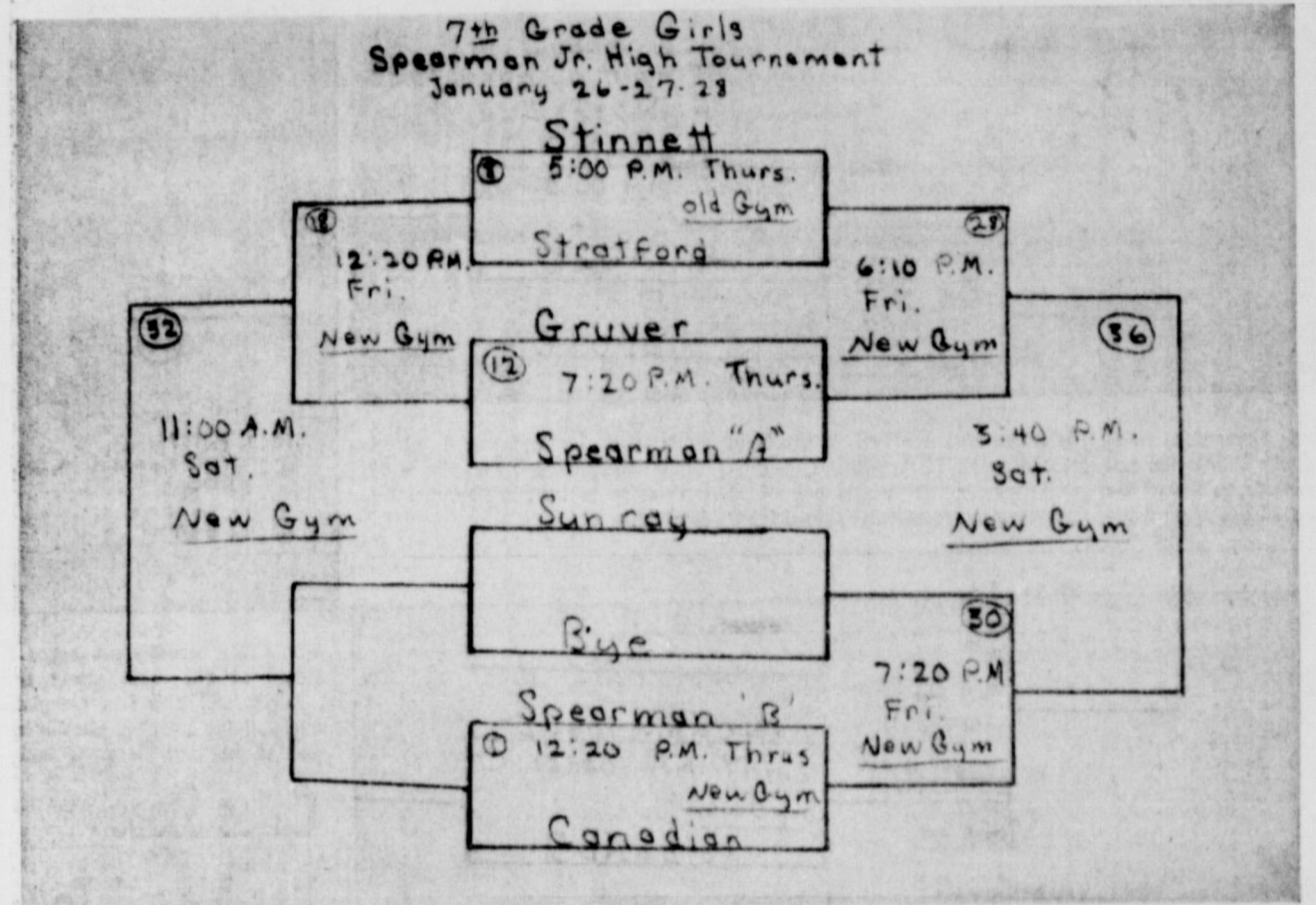

Post Office Receipts Continue Rising During Busy 1966!

Post office business was up some three thousand dollars in 1966 from the previous year, indicating that Spearman population and business is continuing to increase.

Postal receipts rose nearly three thousand dollars for the year, Postmaster Elmon Jacobs said, increasing from the 1965 figure of \$57,331.00 to a 1966 total of \$60,431.00.

Because of the continued increase in business at the Spearman Post Office over the past several years, the Government is soon to classify the Spearman office "First Class changes in the business end of the Post Office." There will be some changes in the business end of the post office when this takes place. Right now the office divides its business into 12 four-week periods rather than on a quarter or monthly basis.

Money order business took a drop for the year, but only slightly, falling \$295.14 from \$181,907.82 in 1965 to \$181,614.68 in 1966. Postmaster Jacobs figures that more people are buying money orders at commercial outlets such as grocery stores.

Over 75,000 pieces of letter size mail for local and out of town delivery were run through the cancelling machine from December 5 through December 23 of 1966. The Christmas season this year was a very busy one.
