Dr. Garnett To Do Research Work At University Of Ga.



Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Garnett and Lynn and Mrs. B. J. Garnett traveled to Bryan, Tex., last week where the Garnetts saw their son graduate from Texas A and M College of Veterinary Medicine on August 4.

Eighty-Three graduates, 5 of these were women, received the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree. This is the largest class ever to graduate from the college. Garnett was listed on the "distinguished students" list.

Howard Wesley Garnett Jr. graduated from Hardin Simmons University in 1964 with a degree in Bio-Chemistry. He and his wife left this week for Athens, Georgia where he has been employed by the University of Georgia Veterinary College as a research associate. Earl Rudder, President of Texas A&M conferred the degree. A. A. Price, College Dean, gave the main address. Dr. Price said much of the work of the veterinarian of the future will be on the scientific side rather than clinical. They will pry into diseased areas with microscopes for closer association with preventive medicine, marine animal medicine, space medicine, laboratory animal medicine and medical research.

"Veterinarians will have a much bigger role in efforts to feed the expanding population, particularly in public health through location and control of diseases and their elimination. Biological medical research, in contrast to old concepts of veterinary medical practice is just opening up to the veterinarian, and he is destined to become more closely associated with the medical doctor and specialized Ph. Ds," he concluded.

Following Dr. Price's address the administered the following oath to the graduating class: Being admitted to the profession of veterinary medicine, I solemnly dedicate myself and the knowledge I possess to the conservation of our livestock resources and to the relief of suffering animals. I will practice my profession conscientiously with dignity. The health of my patients, the best interest of their owners, and the welfare of my fellow man, will be my primary considerations.

"I will at all time, be humane and temper pain with anesthesia where indicated. I will not use my knowledge contrary to the laws of humanity nor in contravention to the ethical code of my profession. I will uphold and strive to advance the honor and noble traditions of the veterinary profession. These pledges I make freely in the eyes of God and upon my honor."

BIKE RIDERS PROHIBITED AFTER DARK

ORDINANCE PROHIBITING BICYCLES ON PUBLIC STREETS IN SPEARMAN DURING CERTAIN HOURS:

Bicycles shall not be driven, ridden or permitted upon streets between the hours of thirty minutes after sundown and thirty minutes before sunrise. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction in the Corporation Court of the City of Spearman, be fined not less than \$10 and no more than \$100.

The fact that there is an immediate danger to the safety and welfare of the citizens of Spearman, and especially the younger citizens creates an emergency and imperative public necessity. The above ordinance shall be strictly enforced (beginning this week) by City Police officials. Police Chief Leland Wood stated Monday that there had been several "very close calls" the past few days when children riding bicycles after dark were nearly struck by automobiles on the streets in Spearman.

To protect their lives and to prevent a terrible accident from happening, all bicycle riders are thus notified that the "after dark" ordinance is in effect from now on.

Members of the City Council met Monday night to hear departmental reports for the month of July.

Corporation Court tried 64 cases and assessed a total of \$741, 50 in fines. Of this total, traffic tickets paid \$132, 00; \$200, floored; \$33, remains unpaid; \$16, 50 was suspended and \$30, 50 was worked out. Total collected; \$329, 50.

The new image is on FOCUS. Some of you are probably thinking, just what is FOCUS?
 Extension home economics has its greatest opportunities today to make a vital contribution to our society. Shifts in national concerns reveal broad recognition of need for human development.
 Rapid social and economic changes, the changes in the changing roles and status of women, and the economics in the Cooperative Extension Service today.
 Focus is directed to the following five areas of national concern: Family Stability, consumer competence, family health, family housing, and

Community and resource development.
 The following are some of the major program emphasis that have been identified as necessary to deal with the problems in the five areas of concern: development of children and youth adjustments in marital and parental roles, preparation for retirement years, changing roles of women, money management, consumer performance in the market, nutrition and health, home selection, building, buying and remodeling, community factors in housing decisions, furnishing a home and many more on developing community economic social, cultural and human resources.
 Home economics programs will be designed for specific clientele such as young marrieds, families with young children, working women, youth and youth leadership and business personnel.
 This is just a small eye opener into the program, we hope you

will be seeing results of some of these programs in the county.
SPECIAL HINTS:
 What a child wants for breakfast and what mother wants him to eat often are nutritionally equal. A breakfast of a hot dog, bun, milk shake and an orange is the same nutritionally as a breakfast of orange juice, egg, cereal and milk.
 To remove a meat juice stain from a white or colorfast tablecloth, first sponge the stain with cool water, or soak the cloth with cool water, for 30 minutes. Then rub detergent into the spot and launder the cloth in hot suds.

COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT
by Robert Adamson

The time is once again approaching to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall.

Since most soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients, the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test, says Robert Adamson, Hansford County agricultural agent. By sampling early, the report will be received in time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element likely to be in shortest supply, points out Adamson. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides

for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, such factors as the amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop.

Data at the South Plains Research and Extension Center clearly indicates that where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen applications is of little importance. However, adds the agent, when wheat is to be grazed, all or part of the nitrogen should be applied preplant to stimulate early growth. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can contain 20 per cent protein or 3 per cent nitrogen on a dry basis.

Insufficient phosphorus can also limit wheat production, the agent points out. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have also been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by soil testing.

Since phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots. Therefore, pre-plant application is recommended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosphorus when they are young.

Adamson urges all wheat growers to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Complete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the County Extension office.

Draft Board Questions Are Being Asked

(Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your question.)

Q--What must I do to qualify for II-S classification as an undergraduate college student?

A--You must file a written request with your draft board after June 30, 1967. At the end of each school year you must furnish the board with convincing evidence that you are continuing to pursue satisfactorily a full time course of instruction.

Q--How is the phrase "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction" defined?

A--An undergraduate student taking a four-year course must earn 25% of the credits toward his bachelor's degree at the end of his first academic year, 50% at the end of his second, and 75% at the end of his third. If five years of study are prescribed by the school for a bachelor's degree in some field, a student must earn 20% of the total credits toward the degree each year.

Q--What is meant by a "student's academic year"?

A--In determining a student's eligibility for classification in Class II-S (college student), his academic year shall include the 12-month period following the beginning of his course of study.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows: "Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, the municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows: "Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. "From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."
