Donor Requirements Listed As Bloodmobile Visit Nears

A list of requirements for prospective blood donors was given to week by the area Cross office, in advance of the bloodmobile visit in Spearman on Wed., Feb. 22.

These requirements are as follows:

- 1) Age 21 to 69 years. A donor is disqualified on his sixtieth birthday.
- 2) All unmarried minors must have the written consent of one parent plus the signature of a witness. Married minors do not need consent.
- 3) Weight: donors must weigh at least 110 pounds.
- 4) Nourishment: fatty foods (such as dairy products, mayonnaise, oil dressing, peanuts butter, ham, bacon, chocolate or nuts) should not be eaten on day of donation.
- 5) Frequency: two months must elapse between donations. One year must elapse after rabies shot; two weeks after a smallpox vaccination and one month after a dose of cortisone. If the donor has been exposed to a contagious disease, he should not give blood for three weeks.

The American Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Spearman Wednesday February 22 and in Gruver Thursday February 23.

License Plates Now For Sale

The new 1967 automobile license plates are now on sale at the Tax Assessor's office in the Hansford county court house. These plates must be on vehicles by April 1.

In 1966, 6,637 plates were issued. From these receipts the county received \$110,497.83, the State \$61,632.75, the county general fund \$4,423.20 for a grand total of \$175,553.78.

J. B. Cooke, Tax collector, urges everyone to bring their title and last year's license receipts when they come to buy new plates.

Warm Weather Breaks Record

January ended with no trace of moisture, but broke all temperature records as this area luxuriated in the warmth of 70-degree readings.

The highest reading came on January 22 with a 79.

The mercury gauge jumped from 44 degrees on the 18th to 71 on the 20th, 75 on the 21st, 79 on the 22 and 73 on the 23rd.

Since January 20, the temperature gauge has hovered from the low 50s to high 70s and on the 30th again read a comfortable 71.

Traditionally January is real winter time in this area, but blue birds have decided it's spring time, and some of the trees are budding.

HOMEMAKING NOTES
By Linda Garnett

As I have now become a Mrs., and joined the ranks of "working wives", I'll find that timesavers in any area of homemaking are a necessity - especially in the kitchen.

Pies may be historical fare, but with the convenience of canned fruit pie fillings, they take on a modern look homemakers love. There are canned pie fillings, to suit every taste, each one boasting a wealth of fine flavor.

While they're designed to make a delicious pie, they are also wonderful for adding that fresh fruit flavor to other dishes as well.

Helpful hints:

-Canned fruit pie fillings keep best if stored in a cool area before use. Once opened, keep covered and refrigerated if the contents are not used at once.

-Use the "finger test" to determine whether or not pastry is rolled too thick or too thin for pie crusts. Press pastry gently with finger. If a slight dent is made, pastry is thin enough; if finger leaves a deeper mark, continue rolling.

-A light hand in the making and light hand in lifting pastry from the board to pie plate is necessary for a good pie crust. Lift gently, without stretching pastry, or stretching increases shrinkage.

-Pastry is easier to work with, and flakier too, if it is chilled before baking. Here are some pie filling pleasures to try on your family:

STRAWBERRIES AND CREAM PIE

1 three ounce package strawberry flavored gelatin
¾ cup hot water
1 No. 2 Can Strawberry Pie Filling

1 pint vanilla ice cream, cut into 6 chunks
Red food coloring (optional)
1 10 inch Graham cracker crust, dissolve gelatin in hot water, add Strawberry Pie Filling and vanilla ice cream; Stir until ice cream melts. Add food coloring, fill until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from spoon, top with berries.

OOTENAPPLE CASSEROLE

3 sweet potatoes, cooked and peeled
5 or 6 thin slices lemon
1 No. 2 can or 1 1 pound 4 oz. can Apple Pie Filling
3 slices bacon

Cut potatoes into 1 inch slices and arrange in 1½ quart baking dish. Arrange lemon slices over potatoes; spoon apple filling over all. Arrange bacon on top. Bake in 350 degree oven 45 minutes.

Canned sweet potatoes may be used; increase lemon slices to 10 or 12.

PEACH GLOW ANGEL CAKE

1 package angel food cake mix
1 package (4 oz.) vanilla pudding mix
2 cups milk
1 No. 2 can Peach Pie Filling
1 cup whipping cream, whipped

Prepare cake according to package directions; bake in 10 in. tube pan. Cool and remove from pan. Slice entire top from cake about 1 inch down; set aside. Hollow out center of cake leaving substantial 1 inch base and sides. Prepare pudding mix according to directions on pkg., using 2 cups milk. Cool. Mix half of pudding with peach filling; spoon into cavity of cake. Replace top of cake; chill. Fold remaining pudding into whipped cream and frost cake. Chill.

BONNY BERRY BREAD

½ cup butter
1 egg
¾ cup sugar
1/3 cup milk
2 cups sifted all purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
1 No. 2 can Blueberry Pie Filling (2½ cups)

Cream butter and sugar; beat in egg. Blend in milk. Sift together dry ingredients; add to creamed mixture. Spread half the batter in a greased 8x8x2 inch pan; cover with ¾ can pie filling. Spread remaining batter over pie filling; mix ½ cup sugar, ½ cup flour; and ½ tsp. cinnamon, cut in 2 Tablespoons butter. Sprinkle crumb mixture over bread. Bake 375 for 30 to 40 minutes.

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Washington Report

From Congressman
BOB PRICE 18TH DISTRICT, TEXAS



Number 2
I am proud to begin my second report from Washington by announcing that I will introduce a proposed school prayer amendment on January 26. This is in the form of a joint resolution which states:

"Nothing contained in this Constitution shall abridge the right of persons lawfully assembled, in any public building which is supported in whole or in part through the expenditure of public funds, to participate in non-denominational prayer..."

In order to become part of our Constitution this resolution must be approved by two-thirds of the members of each house of Congress and then must be ratified by three-fourths of our state legislatures.

I do not believe the nine men of the Supreme Court should be allowed to tell 190 million people, including the children, where and when they can utter their prayers. I greatly appreciate all the mail I have received in regard to this proposal and hope we can reverse the decision of the last Congress when the resolution failed to gain the necessary votes to be submitted to the states.

At the time of this writing I have learned that the Executive Committee of the Committee on Committees has approved my request for assignment to the House Agriculture Committee. I am confident the full committee will approve this recommendation, and I will be in a position to help the farmers and ranchers of the Panhandle with their problems as well as trying to help the agricultural industry across the nation.

The chairman of the National Republican Congressional Committee was kind enough to appoint me to the 10-member executive committee of that group recently. The goal of the Congressional Committee is to maintain the Constitutional balance of power between the Congress and the President by keeping a strong two-party system.

Although we have not yet begun our deliberations on legislation introduced in this session of Congress, I am happy to report that the volume of mail already received here in our

Washington office indicates the residents of the 18th District are very interested in their government. I am always happy to hear from you.

I would also like to thank all of you who have sent your best wishes to Marty, the children, and me. We have almost completed the job of moving into our home here, and the children will start to their new school on January 30. I am sure they will become accustomed to their new surroundings sooner than Marty and I will.

Until next week my best regards to all of you in the Panhandle and, remember my staff and I are here to serve you. Do not hesitate to write if we can be of assistance.

HONOR STUDENTS TO BE RECOGNIZED

3. First place winners in competition in academic contests at the local level of the Interscholastic League earn 10 points. First place winners at the District level earn 20 points; at regional, 30 points; and at state, 40 points. The final level won shall determine the total points.
4. Serving as editor of either publication for a school year earns 2 points, provided that he has fulfilled this responsibility satisfactorily.

A student does not qualify for this honor if he has not completed at least four half units each semester, exclusive of P. E., Choir and Band. A student is disqualified also if he has been involved in any known act of delinquency during the preceding twelve months.

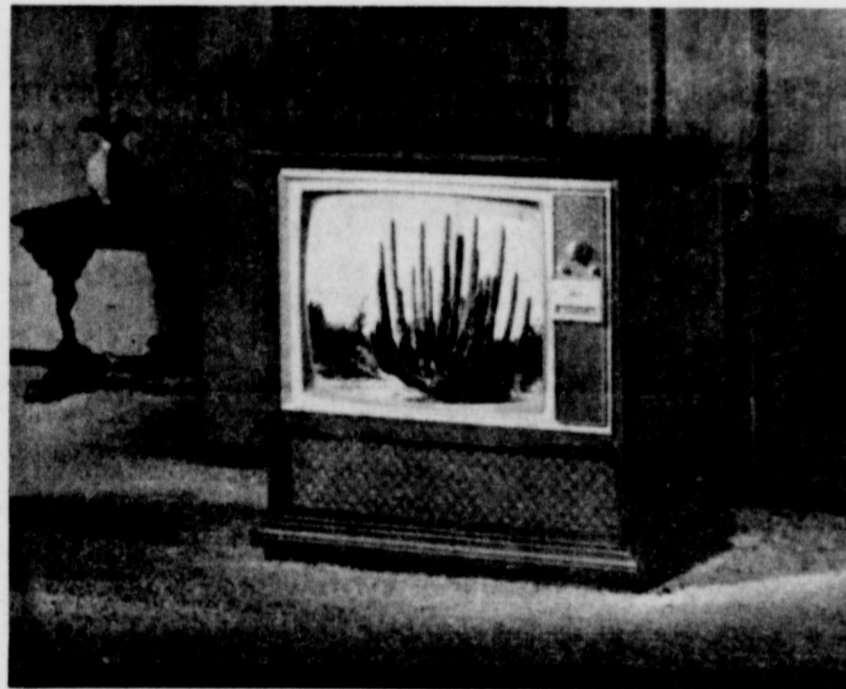

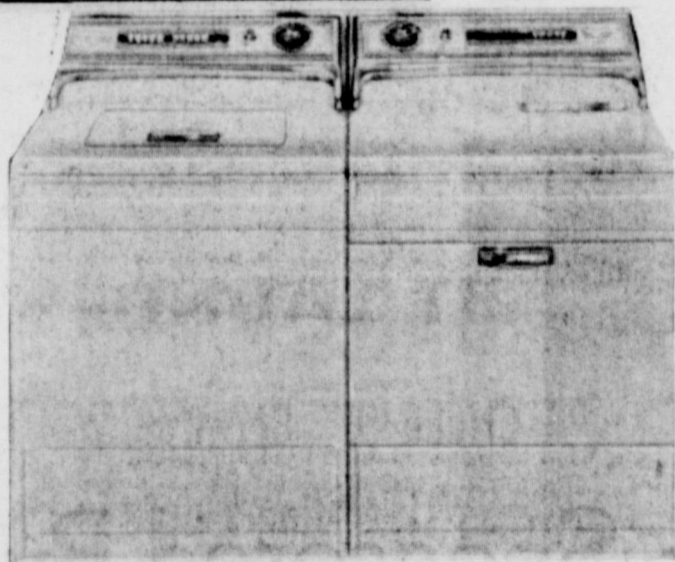

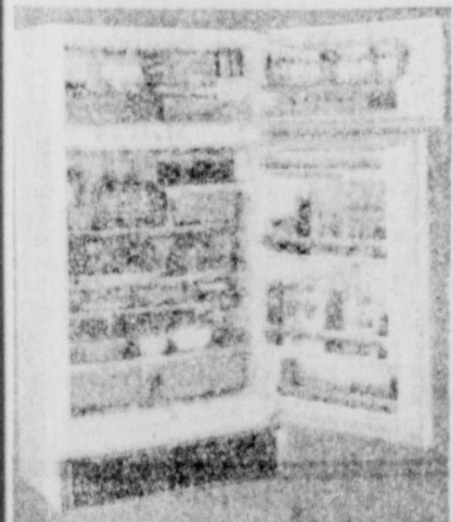
