DeKalb Field Day Set For September 7th

A demonstration of DeKalb corn and grain sorghum production by actual tests will be given area farmers in a DeKalb field day at Dumas on Thursday, Sept. 7---corn-plate with free barbecue and refreshments.

The field day will be at a DeKalb demonstration field two miles west of Dumas and will have continuous runs starting at 9 a. m.

Refreshments will be served all day, a free barbecue at noon.

Two DeKalb crop specialists, Bob Christensen and Clarence Perna, will talk about increasing yields on both grain sorghum and corn, and Dr. Bruce Alexander will discuss his new DeKalb Total Performance program and his extensive research program on new varieties.

Twenty-three XL hybrid corns and 22 sorghum hybrids will be shown in the Dumas test plots, and related to growing conditions in the plains area. A number of Flying Farmers will arrive by air for the field day.

An invitation to all grain producers and other interested persons in the area is extended by Darrell Reynolds, manager of the Dumas DeKalb plant and see production area.

Aug. 24, US FORCES, PHAN THIEU, VIETNAM--Recently reporting for duty with the Military Assistance Command, Vietnam, was Army, Second Lieutenant Robert E. Whitson.

Lieutenant Whitson is the husband of Mrs. Linda Castleberry Whitson of Box 654, Farwell, Texas. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack H. Whitson reside at Spearman, Texas.

The 25 year old officer is assigned to Advisory Team 37 and will serve as Detachment Commander of the team with American advisors to elements of the 23rd Infantry Division, Army of the Republic of Vietnam, with headquarters in Ban Me Thuot.

Two Men Held For Burglary Of Morse Gro.

Hansford County Sheriff's department has in custody this week two men charged with the burglary of Long's Grocery in Morse Sunday night.

Donocio Trevino, 27, and Jesse Carrasco, 19, have been charged with the offense.

The men allegedly entered the grocery store by breaking a front door window, taking meat, cigarettes and about five dollars in small change.

Trevino is a farm laborer employed by John Trindle of rural Spearman. Carrasco is from Morse.

School Enrollment Totals 1112

Enrollment figures from Principal's offices Tuesday shows Spearman Public Schools enrollment figure to be up from last year by 27 pupils.

James Pendergraft, Junior High Principal, said he had enrolled 92 Fifth graders, 94 sixth graders, 104 seventh graders and 80 eighth graders, with a total of 370.

These figures compare with Sept. 1966 enrollment of 82 fifth graders, 106 sixth, 74 seventh and 97 eighth total of 359. It is interesting to note, however, that Junior High graduated 89 fifth graders, 104 sixth, 80 seventh and 98 eighth graders. At the end of school the middle grades had gained some 12 students.

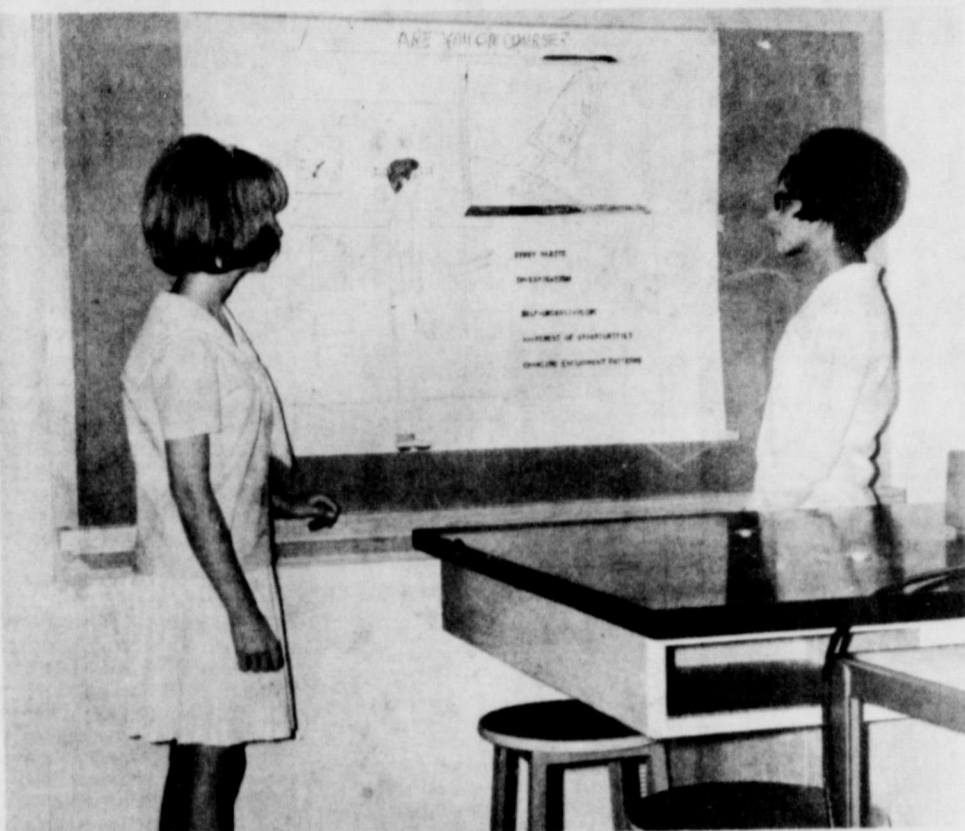
The first four elementary grades show a total of 377 students enrolled! Elementary Principal Allen Alford said he had five first grades with 102 pupils, four second grades with 83 pupils, four third grades with 87 pupils and five fourth grades with 105 pupils.

These figures compare with last September enrollment; first, 99; second, 87; third, 104 and fourth, 82, with a total of 372.

High School Principal Kenneth McKay shows 103 Freshmen, 101 Sophomores, 77 Juniors and 84 Seniors, for a total of 365.

Last year High School had a total of 354 September enrollment with 103 Freshmen, 87 Sophomores, 84 Juniors and 80 Seniors.

Enrollment was 1109 in 1965, 1085 in 1966. 1112 is the total so far this year.

New Project In Spearman School Trains Student For "Right Job"

By 1980, there will be 174 million people over age 14 in the United States. Of this number, 58 percent will participate in the labor market. That means we will have 102 million potential workers... 36 million more than today.

Choice of the right job, awareness of one's capabilities and needs... this may be the key to our nation's future.

This, then, has become a major role of our school systems. How do we prepare these young men and women to find their proper place? The answer lies within the classroom.

This year the Spearman school system is introducing a new project called "find your orbit" which relates school subjects to careers.

The object of this new project is to assist the student in developing an awareness of his own aptitudes, skills, interests so that he can make a wise vocational decision. It will acquaint students with major career fields including economic structure, organization, specializations, relationship to other careers, the type of work involved and the education and training requirements.

This important project was worked up this past summer by L. L. Laws, Lee Laws, Mrs. June Porter, and George Robinson, who were assisted by many other teachers. They compiled a 130 page book covering each unit of work and career opportunities within this field of work.

The first month of this school term, September, students will be exploring career opportunities in Science. In October it will be Math, Nov. Social studies which includes History, Government, etc. Dec. -Language Arts (English and Journalism) Jan. -Fine Arts, Feb. -Vocational (Ag, Home Ec, Business, etc.) March-Foreign Language. April-Health and P. E. In May the year's program of work will conclude with special displays and panel discussions.

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Judge Grants New Trial, Sentences Grissam To Life

Acting in accordance with the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, Judge Max W. Boyer granted the motion of John Lincoln Grissam for a new trial in 84th District Court. The hearing was held in Spearman on August 23rd.

Grissam had previously been convicted of murder with malice in the homicide of P. H. Westerfield on Feb. 5, 1965, and the jury had assessed the death penalty in a trial in Sept. of 1965.

The motion for new trial was not contested by the State, Judge Boyer, in granting the motion for a new trial, stated that decisions of the Federal Courts, including the Supreme Court of the United States, since the time of Grissam's first trial, required the setting aside of the verdict and judgment. "I am required to follow the law as pronounced by the Federal Judiciary and if I fail to grant the defendant a new trial, the Court of Criminal Appeals or some Federal Court will do so," the Judge commented.

Immediately after the motion for new trial was granted, District Attorney Robert Galloway filed a written statement reciting that the State would not seek the death penalty. Grissam and his attorney Charles Hamilton of Borger, filed an application to waive trial by jury. Grissam then entered a plea of guilty.

Testimony was heard by Judge Boyer, one of the witnesses being Sheriff J. B. Cooke. The defendant, Grissam, went on the witness stand and gave sworn testimony detailing his acts in connection with the homicide of P. H. Westerfield, who was a prominent citizen of Gruver.

At the conclusion of the trial, Judge Boyer assessed punishment for Grissam at confinement in the penitentiary for life. Grissam waived the ten days allowed by law for filing of motion for new trial and motion in arrest of judgment and was sentenced to the pen for life and remanded to jail until such time as Sheriff Cooke shall deliver him to the state penitentiary at Huntsville to commence his life sentence.

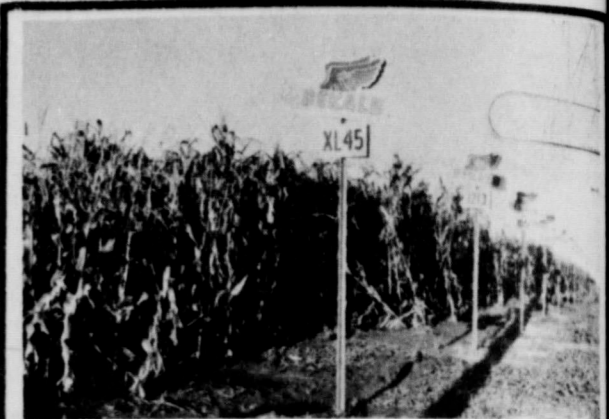

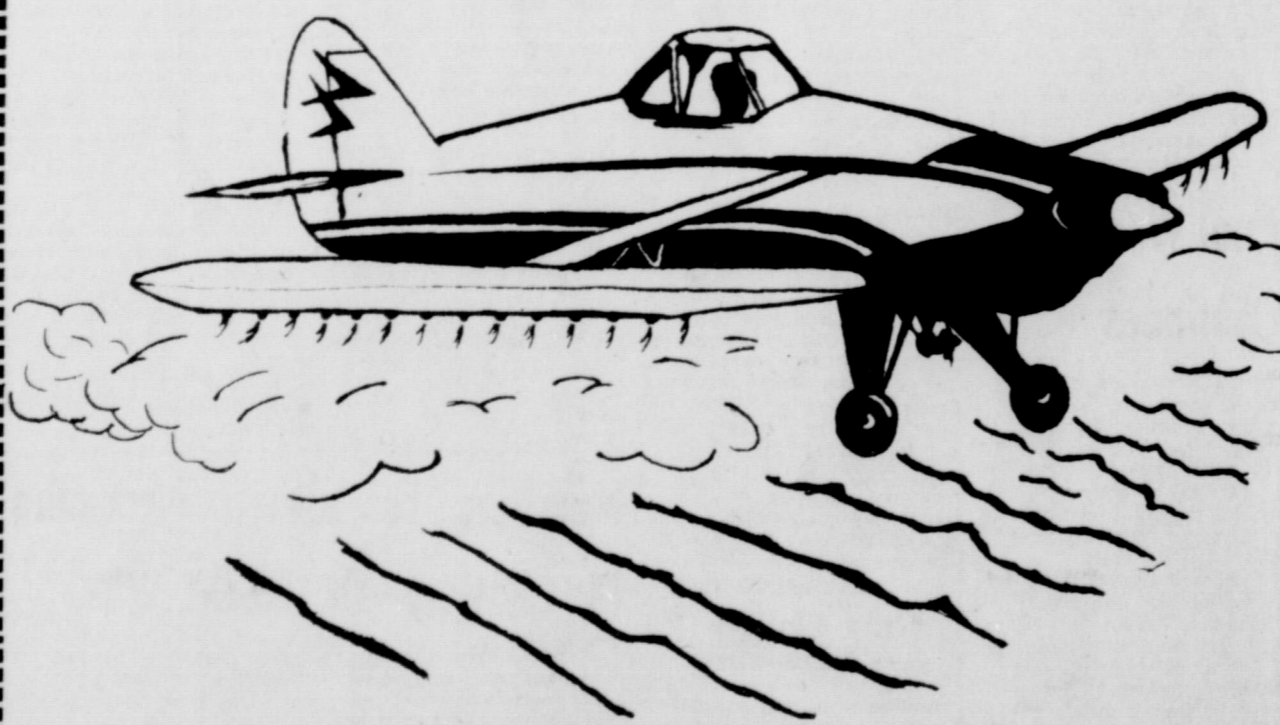

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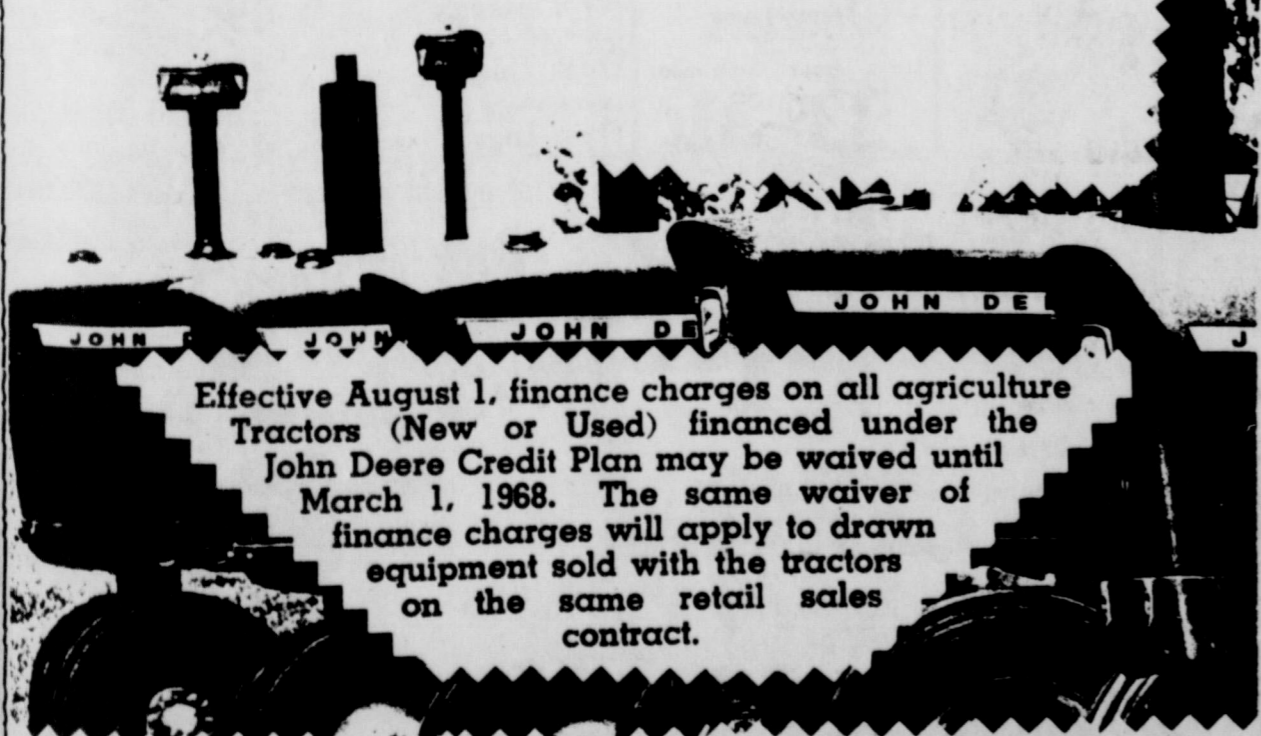

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist hereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

partition, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .
By Vivian Warminski
Hansford Co. Home Demonstration Agent

When green vines, sprawling on the earth, yield basketfuls of crisp cucumbers... when dill heads turn green-gold on their feathery stalks, country cooks know it's pickling time. Homemakers know that hours to make pickles are hard to come by. But sure that the effort, crowded into a busy schedule, will pay off next winter, they tackle it. Nothing gives meals a color and flavor lift more economically and delightfully than pickles. Satisfactory pickle products can be obtained only when good-quality ingredients are used and proper procedures are followed. Correct proportions of fruit or vegetable, sugar, salt, vinegar, and spices are essential. Alum and lime are not needed to make pickles crisp and firm if good-quality ingredients and up-to-date procedures are used.

Use tested recipes. Read the complete recipe before starting preparation and make sure necessary ingredients are on hand. Measure all ingredients carefully.

Pickles divide into two important families--those made by the quick process and the brine-cure. Most women now use the quick-process to save time and work. In this method you cook the vegetable or fruit in vinegar to preserve it. In the brine-cure you hold vegetable in brine about 4 weeks. Then you soak them in water to remove surplus

salt, and vinegar sugar, and spices to make pickles. Only fresh, firm, not too ripe products should be used for pickling. Cucumbers should be small or medium-sized and freshly gathered. Use a good grade of vinegar, one with 4% to 6% acidity. Pickling salt should be used for pickles, never iodized salt. Try this Kosher dill pickle recipe.

30 to 36 cucumbers (3 to 4 inches long)
3 cups vinegar
3 cups water
6 tablespoons salt
Fresh or dried dill
Garlic

Wash the cucumbers. Make a brine of the vinegar, water, and salt. Bring to boil. Place a generous layer of dill, 1/2 to 1 clove of garlic in bottom of each jar. Pack the cucumbers into the jars. When the jars are half filled with cucumbers add another layer of dill and complete the packing of jars. Fill the jars to within 1/2 inch of the top with the boiling brine. Put cap on jars screwing the band firmly tight. Process 3 minutes in boiling water bath.

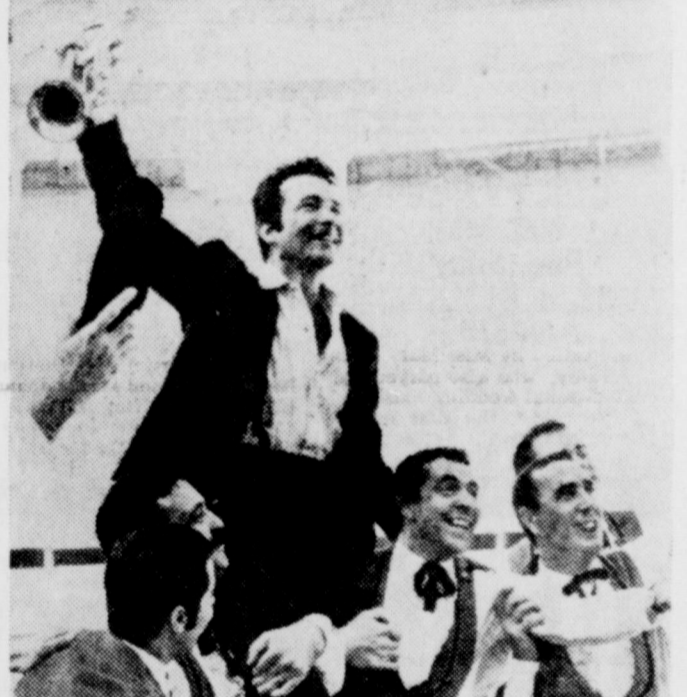

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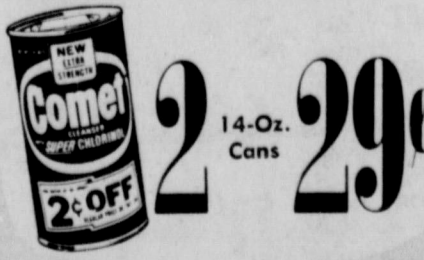

Draft Board Questions Are Being Asked

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q--Does Selective Service establish the physical, mental and moral standards for entry into the Armed Forces?

A--No. These are prescribed by the Secretary of Defense.

Q--Who conducts the examinations to a man's acceptability?

A--Army personnel acting as the agent of the Department of Defense.

Q--Who says I am liable for service in the Armed Forces?

A--The Congress of the United States.

Q--Who says I'm available for induction into the Armed Forces?

A--Your draft board.

Q--Who says I'm acceptable for induction and service?

A--The Department of Defense.

Q--I thought the Department of Defense ran Selective Service. Isn't it a part of the Defense Department?

A--No. It's an independent agency of the President. The Director of Selective Service is responsible directly to the President and not to the Secretary of Defense.

Q--Can military men serve on draft boards?

A--No. Not even a member of the military Reserves.
