Sixteen students signed up for Jim Allen's American Government Class.

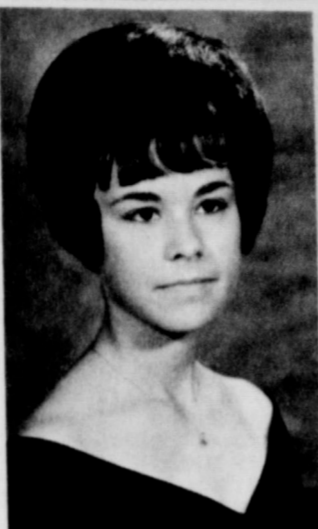
Seventy-four pupils enrolled in the Drivers Education course in order to beat Governor Connally's new driver's law requiring drivers be 16 years of age. The Governor signed the bill Monday May 29. It will go into effect Aug. 29.

Allen Simpson, teacher for the 7 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. classes, and Jerry King, 1:30 p.m. teacher, said that pupils will have 30 hours of class room work which will conclude June 17. Upon completion of class room work, students who are 14 years of age will take a written exam. If they pass this they will be given a special restricted license.

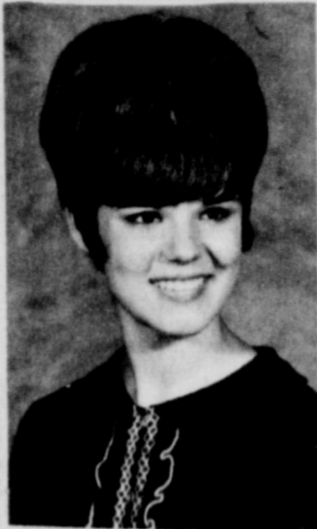
Students then begin 6 hours of driving and 6 hours of observing. After this, they can then take the driving test and if they pass, then restriction will be removed.

Thirteen year olds cannot start driving until they are 14. Then they may take their written exam and do their driving.

According to the Governor's new law, the minimum age for teens without driver education will be 18. The law provides for the issuance of licenses at age 16 to teenagers who have completed approved driver education courses.

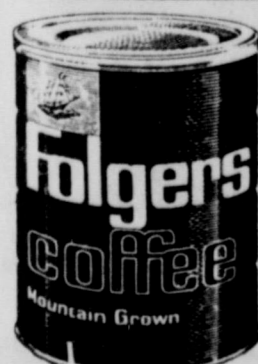

**Washington Report**

From Congressman **BOB PRICE** 18TH DISTRICT, TEXAS



Differences in the Selective Service Act of 1967 as passed by both the House and Senate will be ironed out by a conference committee this week.

The bill passed by the House extends the present Draft Act and related laws for four years and updates and improves the present Selective Service System in a number of ways:

1. A National Manpower Resources Board is established which, in conjunction with the National Security Council, will identify those professional, scientific and critical skill areas that justify a draft deferment.
2. Before any change in the existing method of determining the relative order of induction for registrants within the various age groups may be effected, the President is required to advise congress that such change is in the national interest. The proposed change will become effective after the expiration of a 60-day period unless congress adopts a resolution rejecting the change.
3. A method of maintaining the authorized strengths of the Reserve and the National Guard is provided.
4. Uniform criteria for future undergraduate college student deferments are established. Students receiving such deferments shall be placed in the prime age group liable for induction after they leave school, receive a degree or attain age 24, whichever occurs first.
5. The President is required to establish, whenever practicable, national criteria for the classification of persons subject to induction. Such criteria shall be administered uniformly by all local boards.
6. Those opposed to participation in war in any form by reason of religious training and belief shall be exempt from service in the Armed forces. Conscientious objectors will be required, if selected for induction, to perform noncombatant duty or two years of civilian service if they are conscientiously opposed to both combatant and noncombatant training and service.
7. Individuals are prohibited from serving on local or appeal boards after they have completed 25 years of service or attained age 75. Also, women may be appointed to serve on such boards.

In the past, diverse classification actions by local boards have created certain inequities. The changes in the law embodied in the proposed bill should materially reduce, if not eliminate, this problem. Certainly, the uniform standards for student deferments together with the recommendation that future draft calls concentrate on the younger age group should improve the handling of future registrants. Also, the President is required to establish, wherever practicable, national criteria for the classification of persons subject to induction under the Draft Act.

Although there is an acknowledged need for certain improvements, I believe that the Selective Service System has, for the most part, operated successfully over the last 26 years. The soundness of the system has been proven through its demonstrated ability to meet rapidly fluctuating conditions. During this 26-year period, approximately 14 million men have been inducted into the Armed Services without any adverse effect on the economy of the nation. There has never been a scandal arising out of the administration of this law and there is today public confidence in the basic honesty of the system. The continued use of local boards and the appointment of individuals to such boards on the recommendation of the Governor insures that the control of the system shall remain at the local and state level.

From front to back we melted our metal, made all our slugs and make-up material from hot molten metal. Set our type from old-time cases and got old-time printers ink all over us. (It gets to be bloody). We worked hard and long to meet the proverbial deadline for all country weeklies Thursdays! When we loaded the page forms on the press, pounded down the high type with the wooden mallets and pulled the first proof then we could roll the press! That paper rolling off the press had been manufactured in this shop from start to finish! It gives you a feeling of accomplishment which cannot compare with the new-fangled off-set paper.

Which is what I was getting around to! Last week this shop went off set. It's a cleaner paper. The pictures look like studio prints Cricket makes. And the public likes it. We got more compliments on last week's paper than we've had in many a moon. But to me it's just not "newspaper work." And it really isn't! The man who prints all these off-set papers is an old-time editor himself. He publishes the Hereford Brand... a really good paper... and know what? It's hot metal.

You don't have to be a skilled printer now days to work in an off-set shop. You just have to be able to cut out paper dolls and paste them on a big sheet of ruled paper. Any one could do it. We had an editor of a small town off-set paper visit our shop recently. He didn't even know what type cases were! He had his office in his own home. He owned one typewriter. He was in business!

My trouble is, I married Honest Bill's son. He a conformist! And a good one I might add. He isn't afraid to try anything once. And he usually comes up with a time-saving, labor-saving answer. And this is it. Labor is our

current problem. Uncle Sam has us in a bind. Our linotype operator is now in Ft. Bragg, North Carolina with the Army Reserve. The linotypes are silent. The hot metal vats are cold. The wooden type cases have been shoved back in the corner for the termites to enjoy. The photo plate machine rests on "off" and nobody hollers to the press man "ROLL-EM." This is a new era. Convert, Conform. The public demands it! and labor situations give you no choice.

I have joined the neo-thinkers. I shall try to be a good neophyte, for our plant is now neoteric.

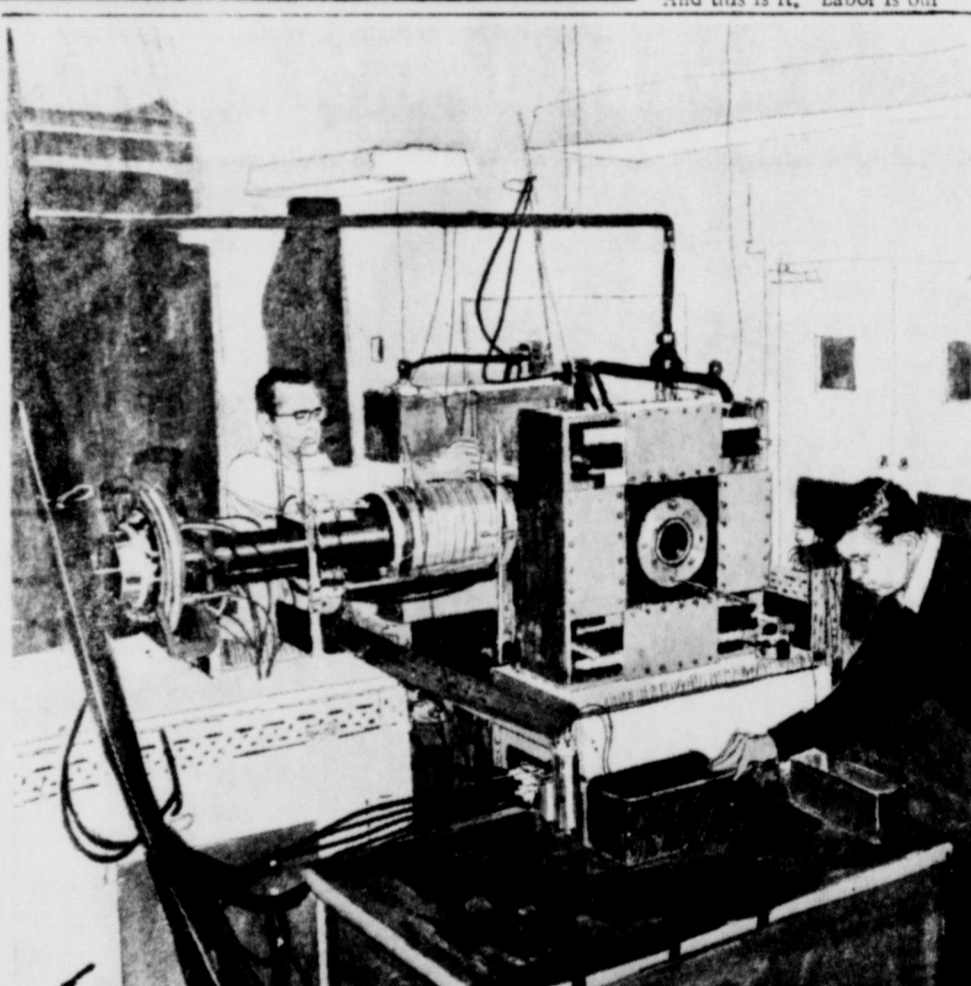

ATOMIC FUSION RESEARCH

seeking the key that may unlock a new source of electric power for the future

Recognizing that the time will come when new fuels will be needed to generate a vastly greater supply of electric power, Community Public Service joined with nine other Texas investor-owned electric utility companies ten years ago in sponsoring an atomic fusion research program.

Although researchers are far from solving difficult basic problems in the fusion process and its application to the production of electric power, the long-range program is progressing, and is currently being conducted in laboratories at the University of Texas.

For the past seven years, the pro-

gram has contributed to the education of several thousand high school science students — many from the area served by Community Public Service Company — by providing nuclear science symposiums. At these meetings, science-minded boys and girls not only are exposed to the knowledge being acquired by this research, but also have the opportunity to meet and talk with some of the world's foremost scientists.

The program's educational functions are an important by-product of the continuing long-range effort to develop direct generation of electric power through the controlled atomic fusion process.

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
