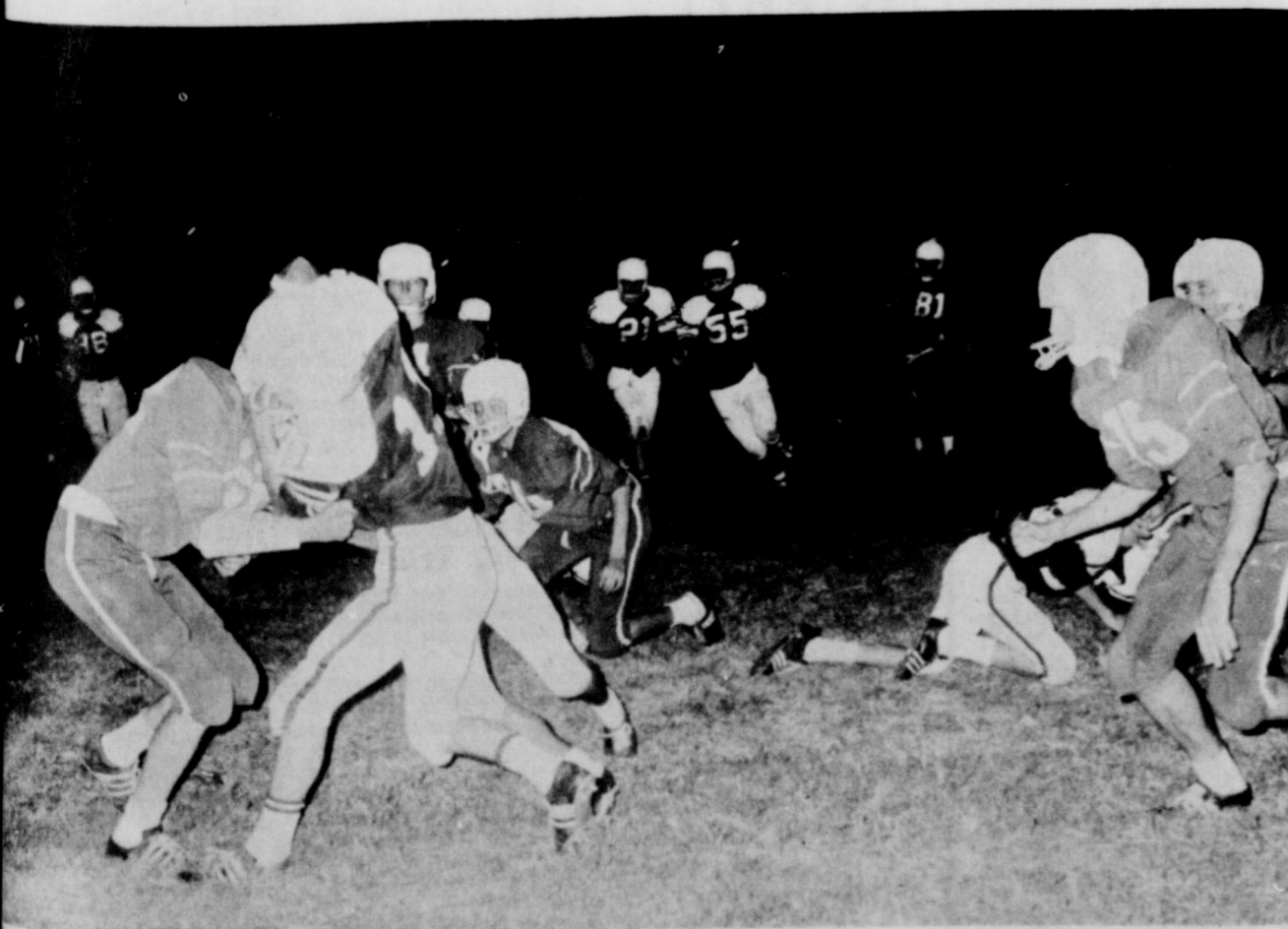

Revival Starts

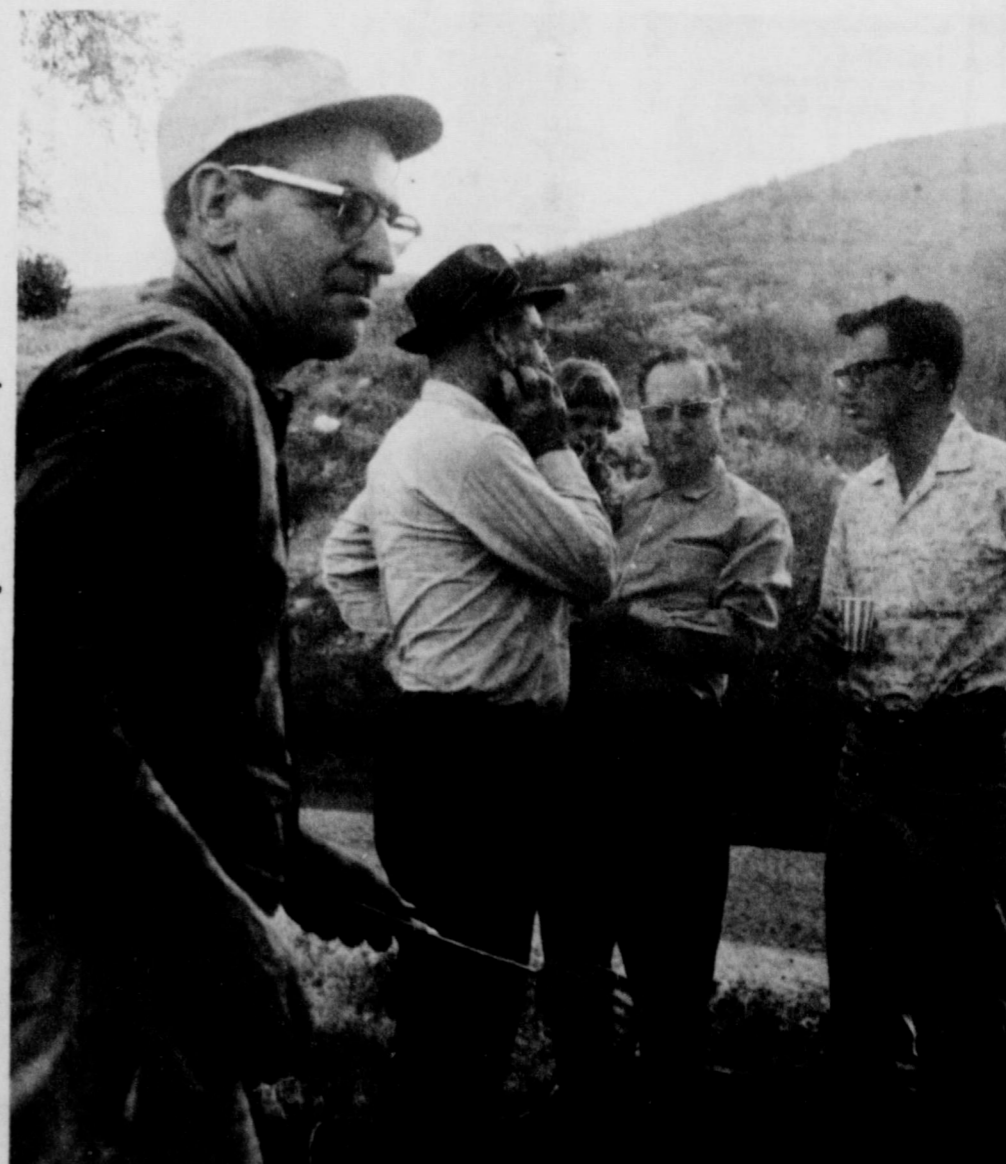


PLAY CAST NAMED by C. Fullbright

City Budget Hearing Set

City Manager Darce Foshee went over the proposed budget for the coming year with Aldermen in Monday night's regular meeting at City Hall. Councilmen approved a portion of the budget and agreed that because of the cost of living increase they would allow an across-the-board salary raise for all full time City employees. The increase, \$25.00 per month each would amount to \$527,00 monthly total increase.

Aldermen said tentative budget figures would run like this: \$250,000. Utilities (last year's was \$250,125.); \$149,330.00 General Fund (was \$134,405, last year); \$3,660.00 Park Fund (was \$3,600.00 last year.) These figures are still under study.

A public hearing for the City Budget has been scheduled for 8 P. M., Sept. 25 at which time it will become final. The public is invited to this open meeting.

During the month of August 47 cases were filed in City Corporate Court. Total fines assessed \$460.50. Of this \$11,50 will be paid later; \$49,50 paid by writing traffic tickets; \$33, was suspended. Actually collected: \$366,50.

City Police issued 59 traffic tickets in August, investigated 7 Motor vehicle accidents with an estimated damage report of \$1,275. Two drunks were arrested, 2 for illegal entry and one for DWI.

Animal Control picked up 31 animals, destroyed 27. One was held over from July. Three were paid out of the pound and 2 held over.

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .
By Vivian Warminski
Hansford Co. Home Demonstration Agent

Clothes designers call 1967 the year "anything goes" in women fashions. The mood runs from mod to mad and back to conservative, and even the designers can't agree on hem lengths for fall. Some show short skirts; some show long. But one thing everyone agrees on, says Vivian C. Warminski, county home demonstration agent, is the "total look" in attire. Each detail of the outfit is planned to produce a becoming total picture.

Keep the total look in mind when you plan your fall wardrobe. And, most important is careful selection of accessories. Accessories prove costly if good for only one or two wearings. Good leather bags, gloves and shoes are a mark of a well-dressed person and are considered investments which outlast and look good longer than the cheaper ones.

Choose accessories simple in line and neat in workmanship. A few pieces of costume jewelry of real semi-precious stones cost no more than a lot of imitation items and are in better taste. Subdued accessories with bright-colored garments, simply designed hats, shoes and bags with prints and plaids; a touch of color to relieve the monotone with all black ensembles are recommended by designers.

The smart shopper buys accessories suited for the places she goes. But the best rule of thumb is the old cliché - when in doubt, leave it out.

BUYING BACK TO SCHOOL GARMENTS:
September brings a rash of duties, as every mother knows. And it's time to begin thinking in terms of school clothing for the children again. Here are some suggestions that may lighten the work load.

Back-to-school shoppers find more and more items for clothing for both boys and girls made of fabrics which have the permanent or durable press finish. Garments of this finish lighten the work load of the busy homemaker. They are satisfactory if laundered and dried properly, with an automatic washer and dryer.

Recommended washing procedure follows: Use a warm wash for clothes with average soil. Extremely dirty clothes may need a hot wash. To reduce wrinkling use a cool-down rinse with a gentle spin. Follow with a cold rinse and gently spin. Remove clothes from dryer as soon as it stops to prevent wrinkling. Read hang tags and labels before buying to learn the recommended care method.

The home demonstration agent suggests taking the youngster along on the shopping trip to be sure the garments fit. Do not buy an item with the idea of letting down the hem or easing out seams. All stitching lines and creases are set permanently and cannot be removed by pressing. Seams and hems can be taken up, however.

HOUSEHOLD HINT:
Watch for the new fabric which contains a small amount of stainless steel combined with nylon or acrylic. Garments and household items made from this fabric are stain free without the undesirable clinging properties found in synthetic garments. The new fiber is so fine that 10 or 12 bundled together scarcely equal the diameter of human hair. These stainless steel fibers blend with familiar fibers in proportions as low as 1 to 100.

Use Of Radar To Be Increased

More Texas motorists in this area are exceeding the posted legal speed limits and safe speeds for existing conditions than ever before, stated Major Luther Moore, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Major Moore also said that more 100 miles per hour violators are being apprehended than ever before.

In an effort to halt this upsurge in speed, additional radar will be used extensively in this area and throughout Texas. Experience and surveys have shown that about 85 per cent of Texas operators drive at or below an appropriate safe speed. By removing the 15 per cent who drive over the posted limit and safe speeds for existing conditions, it will be much safer for the abiding 85 per cent and their passengers, Moore said.

"The majority will be supporting any legal means of purging these irresponsible drivers from the road," These "traffic speeders" will be against any control that will increase the probability of their being arrested for violating the law. They don't mind speed laws so long as they can spot a patrol car a half a mile away. "To this group, enforcement to protect life and property is not 'sporting' unless they are warned when an officer is near," Major Moore added.

Now suppose a prowler were in the yard of one of these "traffic speeders" and about to make off with a 98¢ garden hose some dark night. Would the "traffic speeder" want the police to answer his call with a red light flashing and a siren screaming and scare the prowler away, or would he expect the police to use tactics that would insure detection, apprehension and punishment of the thief? Would this "traffic speeder" be interested in giving the thief a "sporting chance" such as the "traffic speeder" expects when he endangers thousands of dollars worth of property, and even life, while driving on the highway at high speeds. No, the "traffic speeder" would be interested in stopping the act of stealing his garden hose by any legal means, even to jailing the thief.

According to Major Moore this is exactly what the majority of drivers want. They want the practice of high speed stopped by any legal means even to jailing the drivers or removing them from the highways.

Q--I was 24 years old in July. If I become an undergraduate student this fall, will I qualify for the II-S student deferment?
A--No, because you're 24. You will qualify for classification in class I-S for an academic year if you're ordered for induction while you're a full-time, satisfactory student.

Q--We have only one son. We've heard if a family has only one son he won't be drafted, but he'll be put in Class IV-A. Is that right?
A--That depends. The law provides that he must be the sole surviving son of a family of which the father or one or more sons or daughters were killed in action or died in line of duty while serving in the Armed Forces of the U.S., or subsequently died as a result of injuries received or disease incurred during this service.

Q--Must a man return to his own local board for his Armed Forces physical examination, or for his induction?
A--No. He may transfer for either physical examination or induction by requesting this action at the draft board nearest him.

Q--Recently my wife and I were divorced. She has custody of our two children and has them with her. Can I still get a Class III-A deferment?
A--Not as a father. To qualify for III-A, you must maintain a bona fide family relationship with the children in your home. It may be possible for you to be deferred in III-A because of extreme hard-

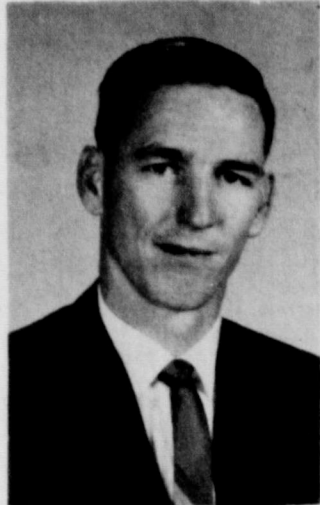

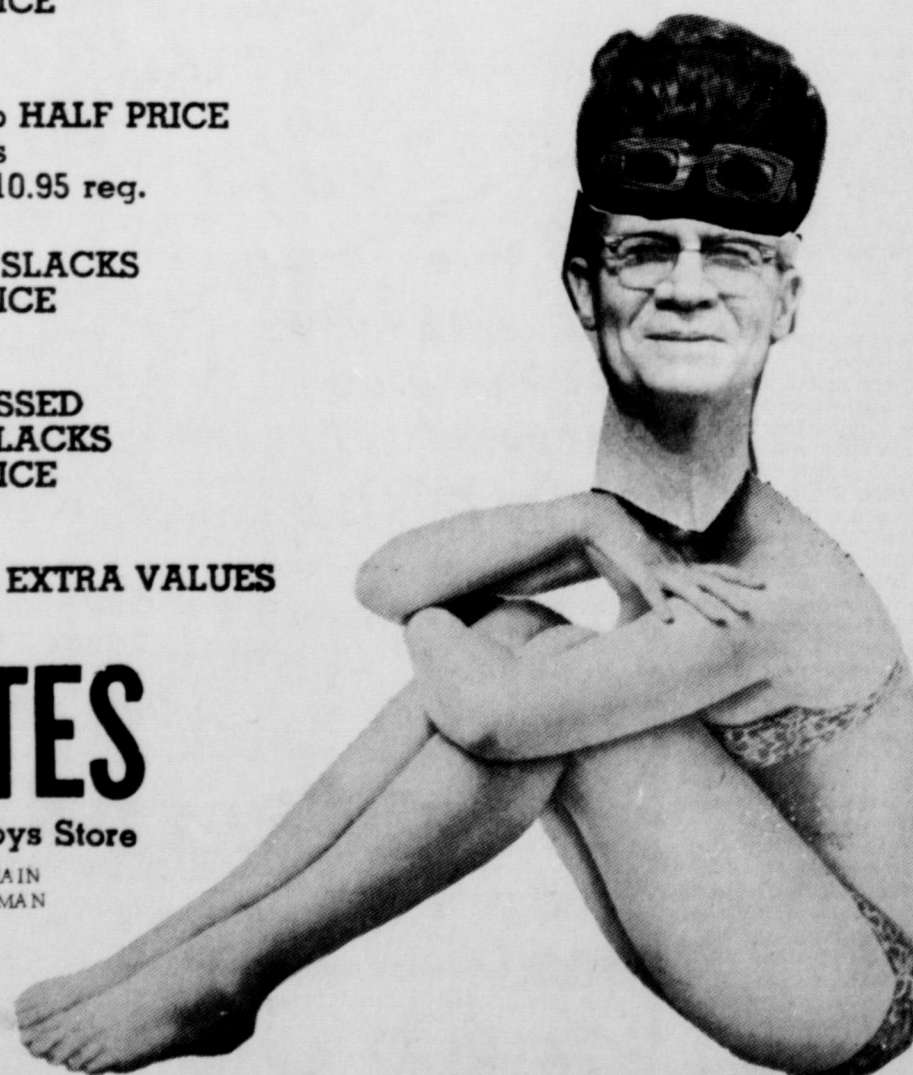
