



Freedom Shares can be purchased only in combination with Series E Savings Bonds on a regular purchase plan through banks or pay

roll savings. Nationally, during the first seven months of 1967, eash ales of Series E and H Savings Bonds totaled \$3,027 million, which is an increase of 4 per cent over sales a year ago and an ll-year peak for seven months.





## Panel Speaks On Plans For Proposed Library

Luther Moore, Regional Comm-ander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Major Moore also said that more 100 miles per hour violators are being apprehended than ever before. In an effort to halt this upsurge in speed, additional ra-dar will be used extensively in

this area and throughout Texas, "Experience and surveys have shown that about 85 per cent of Texas operators drive at or below an appropriate safe speed. By removing the 15 per cent who drive over the posted limit

and safe speeds for existing conditions, it will be much safer for the abiding 85 per cent and their passengers," Moore said, "The majority will be supporting any legal means of purging these irres-ponsible drivers from the road. > **Draft Board** Questions

Editor's note: Below are uestions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Direc tor, 702 Colorado Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q--We have only one son. We've heard if a family has only one son he won't be draf ted, but he'll be put in Class IV-A. Is that right?

A--That depends. The law provides that he must be the sole surviving son of a family of which the father or one or more sons or daughters were killed in action or died in line of duty while serving in the Armed Forces of the U.S., or subsequently died as a result of injuries received or disease incurred during this service. Q -- Must a man return to his

own local board for his Armed Forces physical examination, or for his induction?

A -- No. He may transfer for either physical examination or induction by requesting this action at the draft board nearest him.

Q--Recently my wife and 1 were divorced. She has custody of our two children and has them with her. Can I still get a Class III-A defer-ment?

A -- Not as a father. To qualify for III-A, you must main-tain a bona fide family relationship with the children in your home. It may be possi-ble for you to be deferred in III-A because of extreme hard-

Q--Last year I attended college part time, but will attend full time, beginning in Septem ber. Will I qualify for studen deferment?

A -- Ordinarily, a student who attended part time last year would not qualify for Class II s this year because he was not then full time. Your board's consideration of circumstances might, however, result in deferment in II-S. Q--My sick friend won't be



Class I-S for high school study until (1) he is graduated, (2) reaches age 20, or (3) drops out of school, whichev er occ. urs first.


