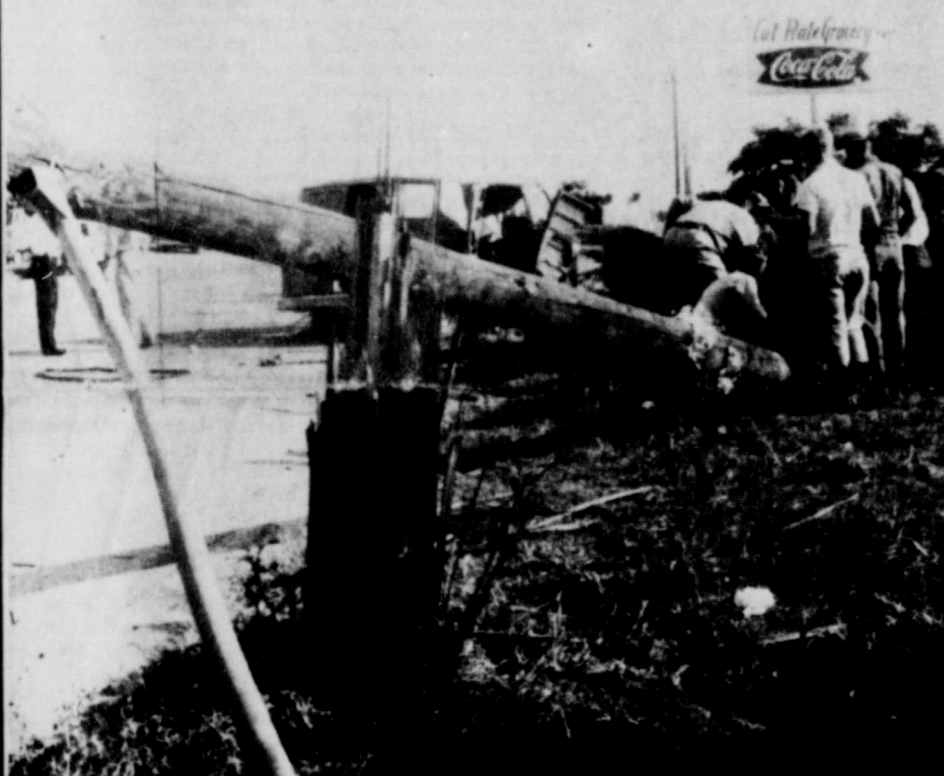

## Change In Voting Law States Persons Over 60 Must Register

Tax Assessor and Collector J. B. Cooke announced this week that tax payers will soon be receiving statements through the mail with a very important "Voters Registration Application" enclosed. On June 12, 1967, the Governor of Texas signed into effect a new voting law relating to voter registration. THE MAIN CHANGE in the law concerns persons 60 years old and over. Heretofore, these persons have not had to pay Poll Tax nor register to be eligible to vote. THE NEW LAW STATES THAT ALL VOTERS MUST REGISTER, regardless of age! If you meet all voting requirements: (Live in State 1 year and in county 6 months, are 21 years old and over) you are eligible to vote PROVIDED you have signed a voters registration slip. In short, EVERYONE will have to register in order to vote in elections held during the year 1968. Registration period is from October 1, 1967 to January 31, 1968. You must register before the Jan. 31 deadline in order to vote in 1968 elections. The registration form is being enclosed, with your County Tax Statements. Fill out the form and mail it back to the Sheriff and Tax Assessor. If you do not receive enough voter registration forms in your statement (if several voters live within your household) you may obtain these at the Tax Office. If you are a resident of the county and will not receive a tax statement, you are urged to go by the Tax office and sign a voters application anytime before Jan. 31. NO ONE will be allowed to vote during 1968 elections with out a registration certificate. Tax statements this year are new. They have been prepared by automation on IBM machines. Statements are easily read and show a 3% discount if paid in October, 2% in November, 1% in December. Not taxes must be paid after December. ## Over \$6 Million Dollar Tax Roll Ready To Mail

The City tax roll has been prepared and is ready for mailing by October 1. Tax payers will receive the usual 3% discount by paying in October, 2% in November and 1% if paid in December. This year's (1967) assessed tax roll totals \$6,972,838.04 of this \$6,576,266.00 is Real Estate property and \$1,396,572.00 is Personal property. Real estate property tax is up \$175,260.00 from last year. This is a good, solid growth for Spearman, for this is construction growth: new homes and businesses. Personal property tax is down from last year by \$102,814.00. The majority of this drop is due to the fact that last year Michigan-Wisconsin Pipe Line Company was stationed in Spearman and paid over ninety-eight thousand dollars tax on stock and inventory. Total amount of last year's tax roll was \$6,999,384.00.

## Accidents On Rural Roads

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Ben A. Noel, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no deaths, four injuries, and an estimated property damage of \$2,500.00. The rural accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1967 shows a total of 11 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 13 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$13,335.00.

Carriers deliver and collect mail on foot or by vehicles under varying weather conditions. In most offices they must be able to drive a vehicle under all kinds of road conditions. They may be required to carry on their shoulders loads up to 80 pounds. Additional information may be obtained at the local post office.

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 112 Colorado Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

- Q--Can I still enlist in the National Guard or other Reserves and escape the draft?
A--Yes, if you can find a vacancy and enlist before receiving an order for induction.
Q--How's that?
A--You'd have to take four months or more of active-duty training, remain in the Reserves for six years, making weekly drills and summer camp and take the chance of being called to active duty.
Q--How about the Navy?
A--Some Reserve programs, including the Navy, require two years of active duty.
Q--May I enlist in the Guard or Reserves after I get my induction orders?
A--No.
Q--I'm a college student and have a chance to join the National Guard. What will that do to my student deferment?
A--You'll be deferred for your Guard service in Class I-D instead of Class II-S as a student.
Q--I'm getting in ROTC. How will I be classified?
A--In class I-D as a student taking military training.

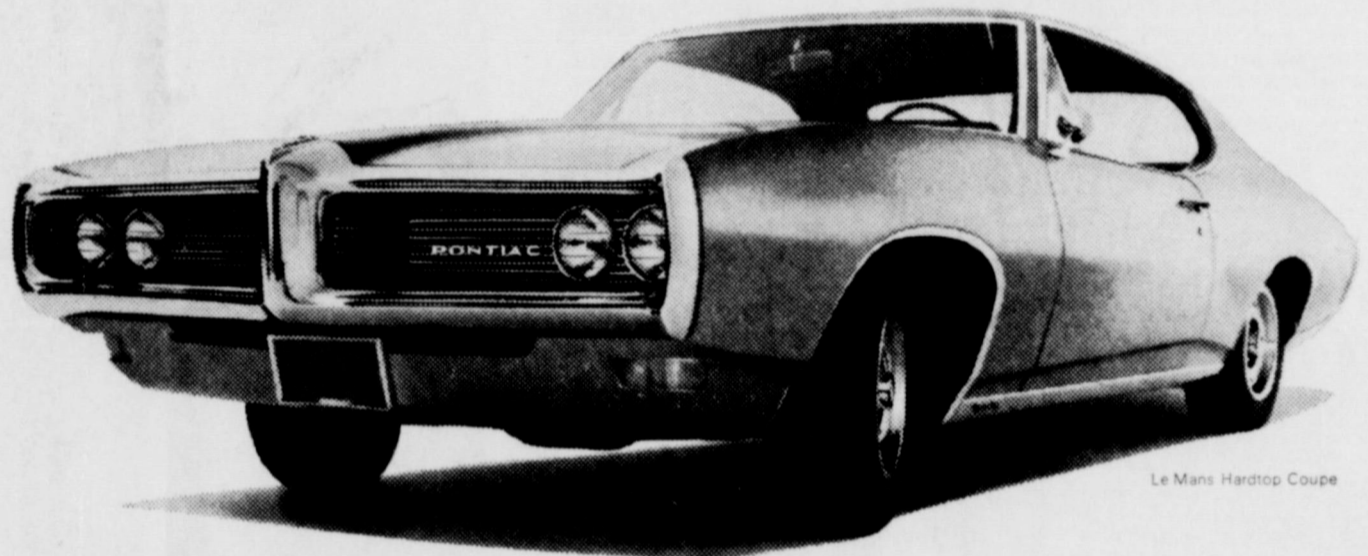

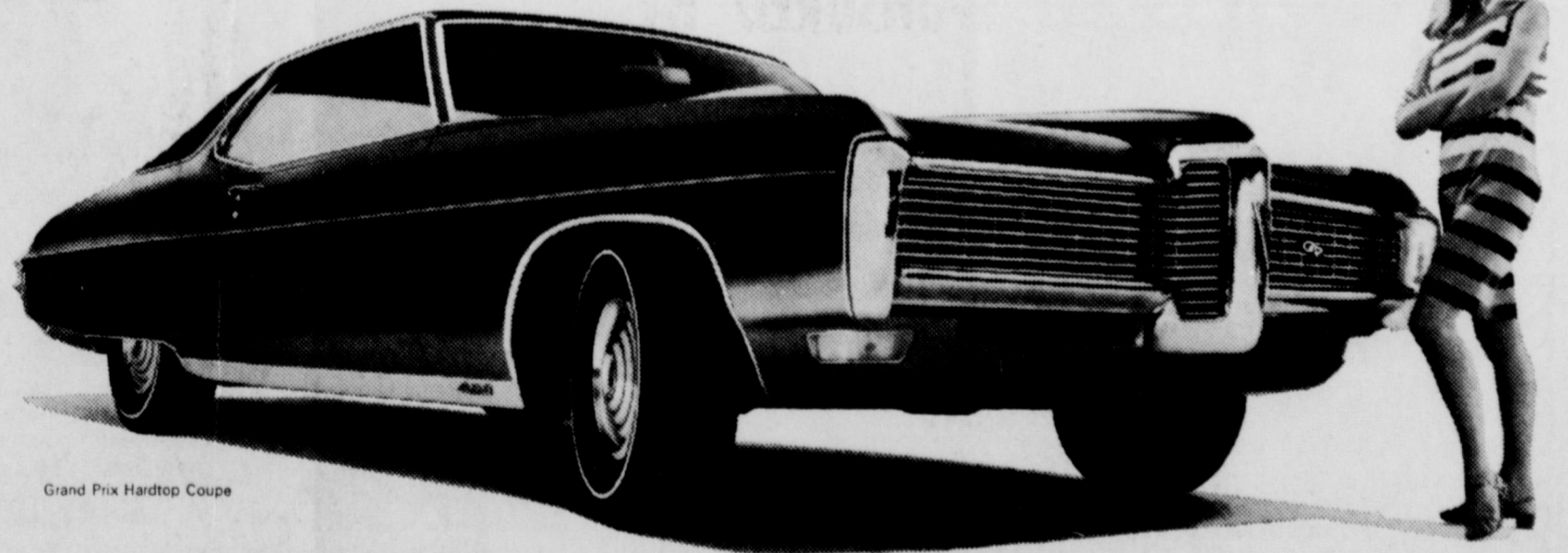

### Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .

An old stand-by, cotton denim, is beginning to show its age -- and with outstanding results.

Cotton denim is now wearing a new "weather-beaten" look that is a big hit in sports wear. Call it brushed, call it suede denim. It's all the same old reliable fabric, says the home agent, only now it sports a slightly napped surface and irregular streakings of color for a soft, faded appearance.

The idea for scrubbed denim probably drew its inspiration from the teen-age fad of giving stiff new jeans an overnight soaking in ammonia water to make them look "broken-in." Now the aged look is put in at the mill.

Scrubbed denim isn't confined just to teen-agers. Its fashion impact is throughout all of leisure wear, in styles for children as well as grownups.

Scrubbed denims turn up in way-out western pants and skirts, hip-riding shorts, ranch-hand jackets and ponderosa shirts. Even ball bottoms and sailor styled pea coats are popping up in this newest denim.

Faded blue is the favorite color, style since the streaky and washed-out characteristics show up best in this traditional shade.

HOW FRESH IS FRESH? Every homemaker strives to serve fresh eggs to her family; but when is an egg fresh? Although there is no definite answer, the greatest enemy of egg quality is heat. Eggs left in the heat of the kitchen or car, deteriorate in freshness. Researchers have demonstrated that in only a few days the quality of neglected eggs goes down more than eggs protected for 30 days in refrigeration.

GIVE YOUR FURNITURE A FACIAL - Does your furniture need a facial? If so, use the following mixture for a like new-again look. Mix 1 quart hot water, 3 tbsps. boiled linseed oil and 1 tbsps. turpentine. Keep the mixture warm to wash away that dull, dirty look. Rinse with clear water and buff with a soft, dry cloth.

GLUT WHAT? - Even if you can't pronounce Glutaraldehyde, remember that it's a government developed process to make leather last longer, wear better, wash easily in warm soap or detergent suds and dry without stiffening or cracking. Glutaraldehyde is being used for golf gloves, shoe uppers, coats and other leather fashions. Leather has always been elegant and a sure washability now makes it also economical.



AN ANGLE ON MOOCHING

In most parts of the country a mooching fisherman is a guy who helps himself to his partner's boat, bait and beer. In the northwest, everybody mooches -- but only on the fish.

Mooching is merely a way to sink a bait down to the bottom and keep it there, say the fishing experts at Mercury outboards. As a sophisticated technique, mooching is about as subtle as whopping a mule in the head with a club to get its attention, but it works.

As the waters get warmer, the wisdom of bottom fishing becomes more apparent, and it holds true in both streams and lakes where sinking lures chalk up the best records. Sometimes, however, the best bait in a fish's opinion won't drop to the fish's level -- and that's where mooching comes in.

Mooching incorporates a three-way swivel at the end of the line. One leader is secured to a weight, the other to the bait.

The sinker most commonly used in running water is of the pencil or thick lead-wire type -- which can be easily freed from obstacles. It is tied with light leader material, the length determined by the depth to be fished.

Bait is attached to a longer leader and allowed to drift away from its "anchor" yet being held at the right depth. Boat fishermen can adopt this technique with a form of "motor mooching," note the Mercury lads. It becomes

merely a matter of drifting either a bait or an artificial plug with the wind, or trolling slowly so the weight bumps bottom.

Some folks call this rig the fish-finder, but "mooching" is easier to recall. Remember, don't mooch on your buddy, mooch on the fish. It pays better dividends!

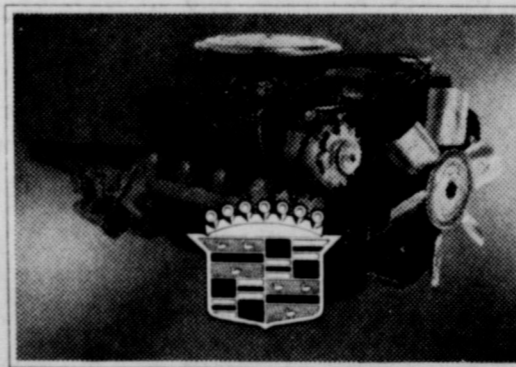

### Hotel Built In 1909 Is Historic Landmark

The historic Spearman Hotel 502 S. Davis St., in Spearman has been named a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, significant to the history of this community and state and worthy of preservation. This announcement was made this week by Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey committee.

The old Hotel will be awarded the Texas Historical Building Medallion with interpretive plate giving a capsule history of the structure which will be affixed to the front of the building. The date for the dedication of the marker will be announced by Tom Jones of Gruver, chairman of the Hansford County Historical committee.

The inscription on the marker reads: "SPEARMAN HOTEL built 1909 by Bert O. Gator, J. H. Wright and S. B. Hale, Hansford County Pioneers, Gator had built first dugout in the Panhandle in 1873; Hale was first Druggist in Old Hansford; Wright promoted Town of Han-

sford, now abandoned, Victorian Architecture. This was first Hotel erected in Hansford. In 1920 building was moved to Spearman, after Railroad came into County."

This Aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect, is handsome and requires practically no maintenance. More than 3300 official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since 1964.

The present owner, Mrs. Sid Beck, Sr. has operated the Hotel for 25 years. Mr. and Mrs. Beck purchased the building from J. W. Cox then of Wellington, Texas. They bought the building for the amount of taxes which were then unpaid around \$1500. Mrs. Beck uses only two stories of the 3-story structure. She keeps 12 rooms rented and has beds available on the third floor if needed.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers" in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, and to acquaint the people of Hansford County with their own unique historical past.

Directors in Amarillo for 3 years. He is a member of Lions International, a 22-year man; Scottish Rite Mason; and has served the Public Relations Committee of Baptist General Convention of Texas for 5 years. In 1963 he went abroad and preached in Japan and Taiwan.

The Song Leader for this revival week will be Joe Williams, Minister of Music at the First Baptist Church in Chickasha, Okla. He is a member of the Nationally known "Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma." The public is cordially invited to attend the Revival.

### Mumps--- Swollen Jaws? Be Careful

Mumps is a virus infection of the parotid gland, one of the salivary glands, immediately below the ear lobe and behind the angle

of the jaw, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

The best sign of mumps is a tender, smooth, firm swelling that



covers the corner of the jawbone where it turns upward toward the ear, the magazine reports.

Mumps in a child is usually only mildly incapacitating and moderately uncomfortable. Many cases in children are so mild as to go unnoticed by parents. A mild medication for fever and the discomfort of mild headache and muscle aches may be used as needed.

Normally the child recovers in five to seven days.

In the teen-ager or adult mumps is more serious. The virus is more likely to involve other

areas such as the pancreas, and to result in nausea, abdominal pains and severe food or fluid intolerances.

The tendency for mumps with its attendant pain to settle in the ovary or testicle is well known. The chance of sterility is highly and emotionally overrated, however. Physicians usually prescribe complete bed rest for adults with mumps. Greater physical activity brings greater chance of complications.

Mumps is not excessively contagious and almost direct contact with the afflicted—such as drinking from the same cup or being sneezed at—is required to contract the disease.

One can get mumps twice, but it is a rare occurrence. Most cases of "mumps the second time" were the result of previous misdiagnosis of swollen neck glands from an infected throat. Odds are about one in 400 of having bona fide mumps as a repeat illness.

Mumps cannot be prevented at present, but recent research promises a vaccine soon.

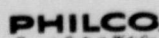

### Washington Report

I was a recent White House guest of President Johnson, along with other new Republican Members of Congress.

During a briefing session on the progress of the war in Vietnam and the state of the country generally, the President had some kind words for the Republican support of his conduct of the war. And he believes we are winning in our efforts to guarantee the people of South Vietnam the right of freedom and self-determination of their own form of government. That the President said, is our sole objective and the reason why we have no military designs on North Vietnam nor plans of invasion.

The President's main concern is the hope he believes the dissenters of his own party have given North Vietnamese leaders that the American people will tire of the war and insist on pulling out before we have accomplished our goal.

That goal is not only to save the people of South Vietnam from a Communist takeover through open aggression, but to convince the leaders of World Communism that the United

States will stand by its commitments against such aggression in other countries, particularly Latin America.

Although I cannot entirely agree with the President and especially with his Secretary of Defense in the conduct of the war, I can certainly sympathize with him for the burdens



of his office and don't envy him the tremendous responsibilities of what is probably the most demanding job in the world. The very existence or continuation of freedom in the world may hinge on decisions the President makes.

General Wallace M. Greene, Commandant of the Marine Corps, has been very outspoken recently in expressing his dissatisfaction with the limited bombing of North Vietnam.

"I ask that my Marines and all the other men fighting this war for us, not be denied their principal means of striking the enemy sanctuary," General Greene told American Legionnaires at their annual conven-

tion in Boston.

"Is the war in Vietnam any less important than our domestic problems? Greene asked, 'I say it is not. I say it is our most pressing problem. And it has got to be won.'"

Greene warned that if the United States did not stop "this Communist theory of world revolution... then our domestic problems and our pocketbooks are going to become mighty unimportant in the future."

Greene said, and I agree with him entirely, that the United States should give the war effort top priority, resist domestic pressure to halt bombing the North, stay in Vietnam "Until the aggression from North Viet-

nam ceases", and, "reject the cry that the war is stalemated."
