Change In Voting Law States Persons Over 60 Must Register

Tax Assessor and Collector J. Cooke announced this week that tax payers will soon be receiving statements through the mail with a very important "Voters Registration Applica tion" enclosed. On June 12, 1967, the Gover-nor of Texas signed into effect

a new voting law relating to voter registration. THE MAIN CHANGE in the law concerns persons 60 years old and over. Heretofore, these persons have not had to pay Poll Tax nor register to be eligible to vote. THE NEW LAW STATES that ALL VOTERS MUST REGISTER, regardless of age! If you meet all voting requirements: (Live in State I year and in county 6 mon ths, are 21 years old and over) you are eligible to vote PROVIDED you have signed a voters registration slip. In short, EVERYONE will have to register in order to vote in elections held during the year 19-

Registration period is from October 1, 1967 to January 31, 1968. You must register before the Jan. 31 deadline in order to vote in 1968 elections. The registration form is being enclosed, for your convenience, with your County Tax Statements. Fill out the form and mail it back to the Sheriff and Tax Assessor. If you do not receive enough voter re-gistration forms in your statement (if several voters live within your household) you ma obtain these at the Tax Office. If you are a resident of the county and will not receive a tax statement, you are urged to go by the Tax office and sign a voters application anytime before Jan. 31. NO ONE will be allowed to vote during 1968 elections with out a registration certificate. Tax statements this year are new. They have been prep -ared by automation on IBM Cooke. machines. Statements are easily read and show a 3% discount if paid in October, 2% in November, 1% in December. Net taxes must be paid after December.

The future of the school was threatened by the possibility of establishing a proposed baccalaureate program of Texas Women's University in Amari-110. T.W. U. officials had asked for a phase-out of the diploma schools in Amarillo so that adequate clinical facili ties would be available to them The Medical Staff at Northwest Texas Hospital had previously gone on record in strong support of the Northwest Texas School as being vital in supplying nurses for hospitals in this area.

Northwest is enrolling the largest class in the history of the school this September. Already a full class has been admitted for the spring enrollnent in January and more than 175 applications on file of students who are enrolling for their one year of college prerequisite work.





from the teen-age fad of giving stiff new jeans an overnight oaking in ammonia water to make them look "brohen-in." Now the aged look is put in at the mill. Scrubbed denim isn't confined just to teen-agers. Its fashion

impact is throughout all of leislure wear, in styles for children as well as grownups.

Scrubbed denims turn up in way-out western pants and skirts, hip-riding shorts, ranch-hand jackets and ponderosa shirts. Even ball bottoms and sailor styled pea coats are popping up in this newest denim.

AN ANGLE ON MOOCHING

In most parts of the country a mooching fisherman is a guy who helps himself to his part ner's boat, bait and beer. In the northwest, everybody mooches — but only on the fish. Mooching is merely a way to sink a bait down to the bot-tom and keep it there, say the fishing experts at Mercury out-boards. As a sophisticated technique, mooching is about as subtle as whopping a mule in the head with a club to get its attention, but it works.

As the waters get warmer, the wisdom of bottom fishing becomes more apparent, and it holds true in both streams and lakes where sinking lures chalk up the best records. Some-times, however, the best bait in a fish's opinion won't drop to the fish's level — and that's where mooching comes in. Mooching incorporates three-way swivel at the end of the line. One leader is secured to a weight, the other to the bait.

The sinker most commonly which can be easily freed from obstacles. It is tied with light leader material, the length determined by the depth to be fished.

Bait is attached to a longer leader and allowed to drift away from its "anchor" yet being held at the right depth. Boat fishermen can adopt this technique with a form of "motor mooching," note the Mercury lads. It becomes Thursday, September 21, 1967

merely a matter of drifting either a bait or an artificial plug with the wind, or trolling slowly so the weight bumps hottom.

Some folks call this rig the fish-finder, but "mooching" is easier to recall. Remember, don't mooch on your buddy, mooch on the fish. It pays bet ter dividends!

Hotel Built In 1909 Is Historic Landmark

The historic Spearman Hotel 502 S. Davis St., in Spearman has been named a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, signi-ficant to the history of this com-munity and state and worthy of preservation. This announ. cement was made this week by Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State

Historical Survey committee. The old Hotel will be awarded the Texas Historical Building Medallion with interpretive plate giving a capsule history of the structure which will be affixed to the front of the building. The date for the de-dication of the marker will be announced by Tom Jones of Gruver, chairman of the Hansford County Historical committee.

The inscription on the marker reads: "SPEARMAN HOTEL built 1909 by Bert O. Cator, J.H. Wright and S. B. Hale, Hansford County Pioneers, Caor had built first dugout in the Panhandle in 1873; Hale was first Druggist in Old Hansford; Wright promoted Town of Han-

into County." This Aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect, is handsome and requires practically no maintenance. More than 3300 official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since 1964.

The present owner, Mrs. Sid Beck, Sr. has operated the Ho-tel for 25 years. Mr. and Mrs. Beck purchased the building from J. W. Cox then of Well-ington, Texas. They bought the building for the amount of taxes which were then unpaid around \$1500. Mrs. Beck uses only two stories of the 3-story structure. She keeps 12 rooms rented and has beds available on the third floor if needed. This marker and it's location

will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers" in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, and to acquaint the people of Hansford County with their own unique historical

One can get mumps twice, but it is a rare occurrence. Most cases of "mumps the second time" were the result of previous misdiagnosis of swollen neck glands from an infected throat. Odds are about one in 400 of having bona fide mumps as a repeat illness.


