Croquet Fans Battle Nightly On Otto Walker's New Court

There is a group of Spearman men who have battled for years to be named "Champion" at the game of Croquet!

For many years E. J. Copeland, 321 S. Barkley, was the only one who had a professional court and the avid croquet fans met there nightly for the game. Many a night these games often became quite lengthy, and sometimes loud, we might add.

It isn't known just WHO, if anybody, put a stop to the croquet games on the Copeland court, but it is a fact that the most avid fan of all built one at his country home. The "most avid" fan is Otto Walker who lives a mile east and one north of Spearman.

Otto built the court recently. It is a 30 X 60 foot fenced court. The floor is dirt and sand mixture which is swept and rolled before each game. He erected six (300 watt) light

poles for night play. Otto says he put in the small wickets, only one quarter inch larger than the Croquet ball. These "wickets are wicked!" he says.

If players do not bring their own special mallet Otto has some available. He has four special favorites, all short handles. The one he uses often has a 14 inch handle, the longest one is 16 inches.

If you don't think Otto is hard to beat at this game, just pay him a visit any time, day or night, and he'll show you. He has a special shot it's true...but most of the men believe it's the way he has of "talking to that ball."

Some of the players are catching on to Otto's tricks though and one of them is Rev. B. T. Shoemaker. Otto says Rev. Shoemaker is just learning the game and already knows how to "talk to the ball!"

Mr. Walker said the gang had a real tough match two nights last week when play began at 8:30 p.m. and lasted until 6:30 in the morning! He swears however, that Rev. Shoemaker left at midnight!

Regular at Otto's croquet court, to name only a few, are Rev. Shoemaker, John Wilde, Dan Faries, Don Tanner, E. J. Copeland, Eddie Gater, Jim Turner and Tomny Reger.

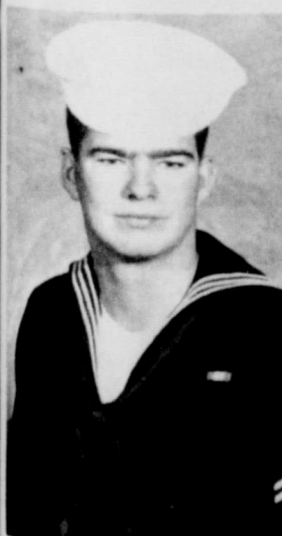
Otto and Tomny are usually partners. In fact they usually win!

Wounded Vietnam Soldier In Brooks General Hospital

Jerry Mitts, son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Mitts, of 905 S. Archer, is in Brooks General Hospital, Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio, where he is undergoing treatment for injuries he received May 26 while serving in Vietnam with the U. S. Army.

Mitts, who will be 26 years old today, July 27, entered the army in October 1966. He was sent to Vietnam in April of 1967. He was wounded while on a "search and destroy" mission when a booby trap exploded. He received shrapnel wounds in the throat, and both legs while serving with Headquarters Company, 4th Infantry Division. Following his injuries he was sent to a Tokyo hospital to recover before being sent back to the States.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Mitts have been in San Antonio with their son since his arrival there on July 15. Floyd returned home Sunday but Lucy remained there and will probably stay until Jerry gets his 30-day furlough home, which will be soon.

Physicians seem to think Jerry will regain the use of his right leg and foot in time when the wound completely heals. They are having a leg brace made and are planning to use therapy treatment on the injured leg which has nerve damage. His other wounds have healed satisfactorily.

Lynx Squad Begin Preparing For 1967 Football Season

Head Coach George Wright announced this week that the 1967 football season is "almost upon us."

In speaking about the hopes for this year's team Coach Wright said "I am very optimistic about our chances this season and feel we could have a better team than last year. I know we will be much better prepared for the early season games as we already know our offense and defense."

"We have some fine boys" the coach continued, "we have the best speed and backfield experience since Spearman became AA. Our line could be just as good as last year if we get our boys out" he concluded.

Boys began weight lifting July 21 and will exercise with weights 4 days a week. Coach Wright urged boys to begin running one mile cross

country 5 days a week and do at least five 100's and five 220's five days a week.

All high school football players will take physicals at the office of Dr. Gregg sometime between August 1 through 12th.

Football shoes will be issued on the afternoon of August 9th at the main gym. Other equipment will be given out at 6:30 a.m. on the 14th.

The squad will have the first workout at the field on August 14. They meet at 8 a.m. and work out from 9-10:30. They will have two workouts a day: one and a half hours in the morning, beginning at 8:30, working on offense, play execution and specialty and kicking game. Shorts, shoulder pads and helmet.

At 5:30 to 7:30 the squad will have full contact workouts on defense and offense using full pads.

The two-a-day workouts will end August 21.

On August 23 the Lynx team will scrimmage with Stratford in Spearman under the lights at 8 p.m.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Mayor and City Council wish to thank those who have worked diligently at keeping weeds mowed and respectfully ask the cooperation of everyone in keeping the weed crop down. This not only makes for a good appearance, but is also a great assistance to our fly and mosquito control program.

We realize that this has been one of those years when showers have been numerous and it takes more effort from all of us to control this weed situation.

For information as to what area that each of us as property owners are responsible for the following is taken from Ordinance No. 265 of the City of Spearman: "It shall be unlawful and is hereby declared a nuisance for any owner or occupant of any lot or parcel of land within the City to allow weeds or tall grass to grow on his premises, or in front or around same to the established curb line next adjacent thereto, and to the center line of any alley-way next adjacent thereto".

Textbooks May Be Protested, List Is Available To Public

In a letter to School Superintendent B. E. Reeves last week, the State Board of Education commissioner enclosed a list of books which publishers intend to submit for adoption in Nov. 1967. The commissioner requested that the list be given publicity and kept available for public inspection and review. The State Textbook committee will meet October 10, 1967 to hear petitions regarding any of the books offered for adoption.

Any citizen desiring to enter a protest against a book or books which are offered for use in Texas Public Schools must declare by September 1, in writing, to the Commissioner of Education. This protest must set forth clearly and specifically by references to page and paragraph the mat-

erial which he is protesting, together with a concise statement as to his reasons for so protesting.

The Textbook committee will make its recommendations from the list on October 11. Textbooks adopted from the list will become available for distribution to Texas school children for the school year beginning Sept. 1, 1968. Local school officials may choose one or more of the textbooks adopted for each subject, which means that final decision as to the specific texts that will be used in each school system will be made by local selection committees and local boards.

The list of books is on file in the office of Dr. Reeves and can be seen by anyone so desiring, at Spearman High School.

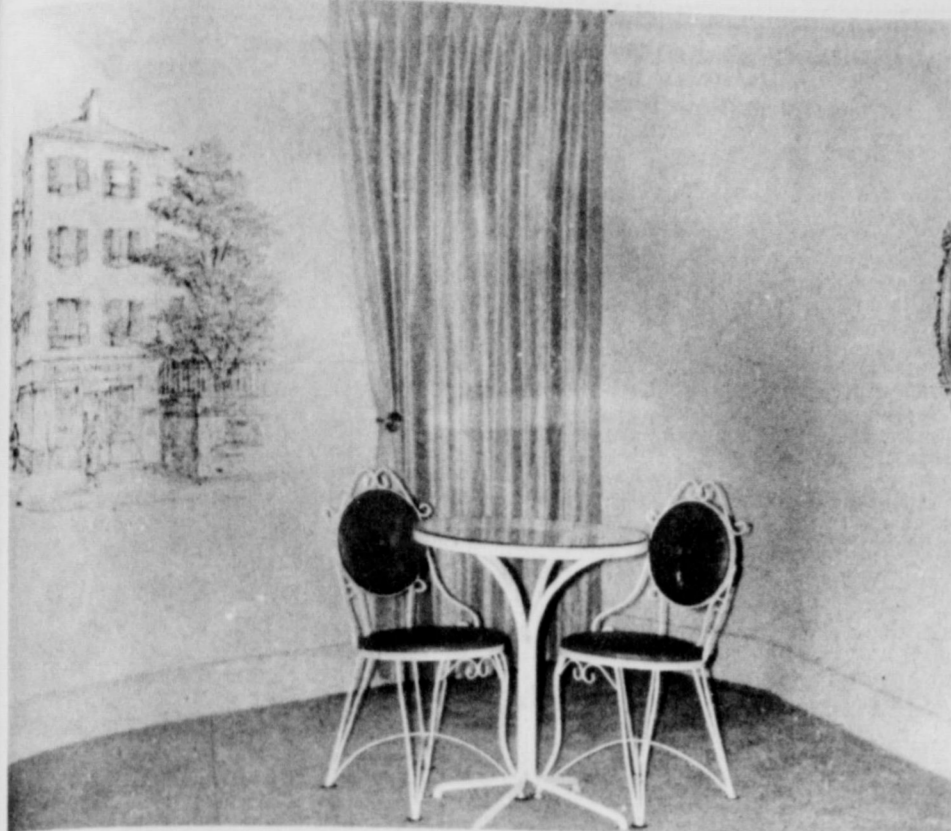

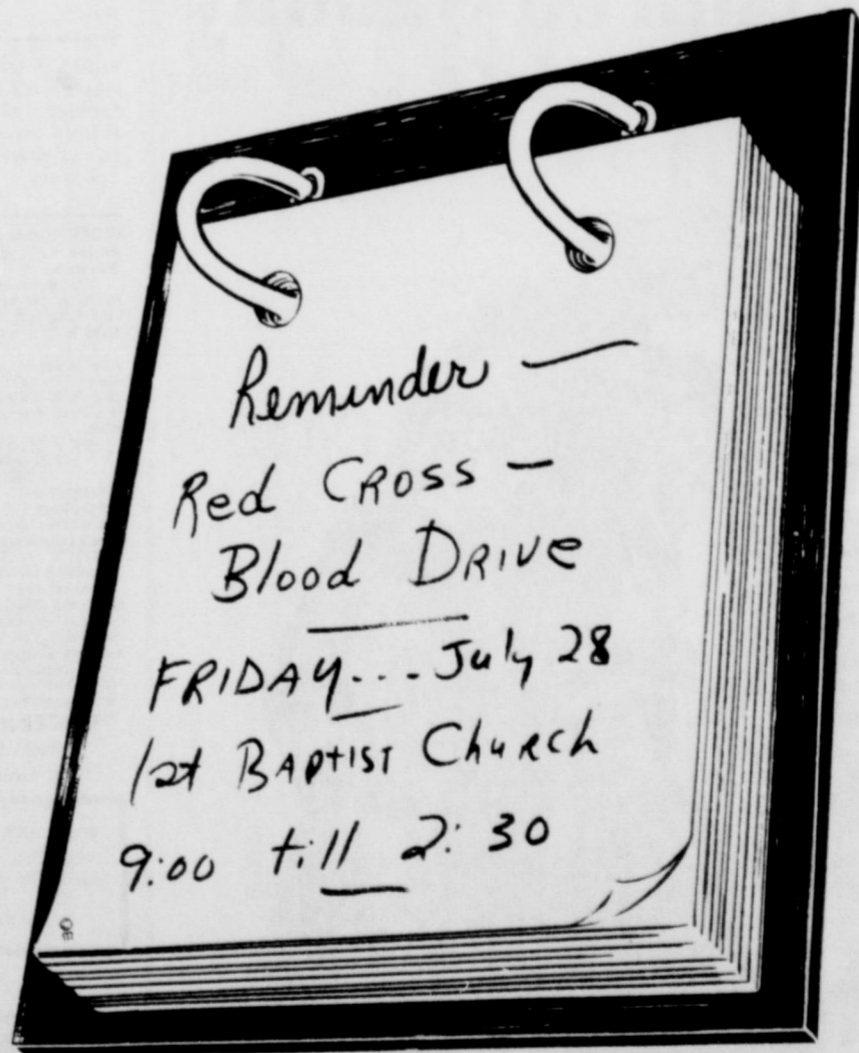

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Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .

Are you tired of serving vegetables the same way? Be creative in your cooking. Try this quick and easy way to make corn more colorful and flavorful. Barbecued Corn-Combine 1 can (12 oz.) whole kernel corn, 2 tablespoons Pit Barbecue Sauce, 1 tablespoon butter, and 1/8 teaspoon salt in a sauce pan. Heat thoroughly, stirring occasionally. Makes about 3 servings.
-Sour cream and barbecue sauce add zest to commonplace vegetables. Blend 1/2 cup sour cream with 1/4 cup barbecue sauce. Stir into two packages frozen vegetables or 1 1/2 pounds fresh vegetables, cooked and drained (about 3 cups). Six servings.

Helpful Hints:
-Trousers will retain shape best if hung from cuff hangers. The weight of the trousers, suspended from cuffs, can stretch out most wrinkles. If shirt collars and cuffs are badly soiled, try rubbing in some plain chalk and allow to stay a few hours. When brushed off, most or all of the imbedded dirt may come with it.
-To prevent knits from sagging or stretching during machine washing, first put each garment into a mesh bag or pillow case.

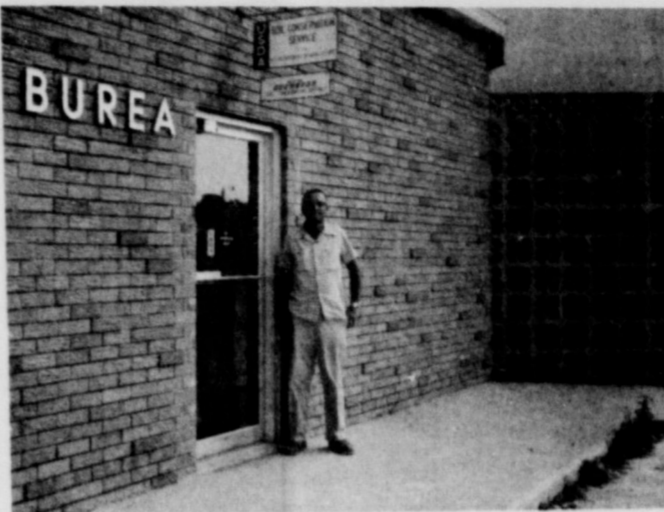
