Members of the Hansford County Historical Survey Committee have just elected the 14th historical marker in Hansford County. (see story elsewhere.)

In Memorial day, the 5th and final Civil War Veteran's marker was erected at the grave of Mr. B. P. Ward in Hansford Cemetery. Other Civil War Vets buried there are: Henry Gibner, W. T. Bowling, C. C. Hancock and P. A. Burran.

The committee is working on the following projects: To erect a marker at the site of the old Zulu Stockade, the first building put up north of the Canadian river in Texas. J. H. Cator built it in 1873, and served as the Post Office and Stage Coach stop. As soon as information arrives from Washington, they can place a marker at the site of the Palo Duro battle in 1874. This was the station for Federal Soldiers who protected travelers from Indians along the Dodge City-Tasosca trail.

Already approved by the State is the Medalion to be placed on the first Hotel in Hansford County. This building was moved from Old Spearman and is a present the Spearman Hotel owned by Mrs. Sid Beck. The Medalion will be placed on the front of the Hotel.

City To Try Covered Cans

The Mayor and City Aldermen met Monday evening to hear departmental reports for May as follows:

Police Report: 108 traffic tickets were issued. Police investigated nine motor vehicle accidents, handled 5 drunks and one DWI.

Animal Control picked up 41 animals in May, destroyed 20, 12 were paid out, 6 held over and someone left the gate open and 3 got away! Corporate Court had a total of 111 cases filed. Total fines assessed \$739,000, worked out \$80,50, jail time \$10., floated \$100., suspended \$49,50 and \$38., of it was paid by writing themes on safety. Total collected \$461. City officials have received many inquiries about trash burning. They remind citizens once again that trash burning is permitted after 5 P. M. and on week ends only. Many complaints about trash burning has brought about a plan whereby the city will try to work out a way to go to "covered trash cans." They plan to purchase some of these and place them over the city on a trial basis. If the covered cans work out the city will then convert to the closed receptacle.

6th Historical Marker Placed

The sixth Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Hansford County was set in place at 9 A. M. June 2.

This was the marker for Hansford Cemetery and was placed at the cemetery entrance at Old Hansford.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 20 X 20 inches and was sponsored by Hansford County Historical Survey Committee. Tom Jones of Gruver is chairman.

The inscription on the marker reads: "Hansford Cemetery. First burial ground set aside in this county. Early grave (1890) was that of Mrs. Alfie P. Magee, wife of the first Sheriff. Also buried here: the Cator Brothers, founders of Zulo Stockade; and the Wright Brothers, early ranchers. Only official cemetery in County until 1928, is still in use. Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, 1967."

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers, in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of Hansford County with their own unique historical past.

The first five markers to be placed by this committee were: Bob Cator marker; Dodge-City, Tasosca Trail marker, History of Hansford County marker, both placed at old Hansford; Bob Martin marker (first Sheriff killed in line of duty) placed on Court house; and the Old Farwell (first town in county) marker.

Mitts said he was on a "Search and destroy mission" and was helping to remove a road block set up by the Viet Cong. A large tree was blocking the road and as the soldiers were moving it a booby trap exploded. Evidently Mitts took the full impact. No others were wounded. He received shrapnel injuries in the throat and both legs. One leg was broken. When he wrote the letter he was in a field hospital in Bien Hoa, Republic of Vietnam, and was to be transferred soon. He did not know where he would be sent.

Jerry said Lana Turner was making a tour of the hospitals there and visited with him. She had her photographer to snap their picture which he sent home to his wife, Susan, who lives in Guymon.

Mitts has been in the Army since October, 1966. He was sent to Vietnam last April.

He is with the Headquarters Company of the 4th Infantry Division.

This is the second Hansford County soldier to be wounded in action in Vietnam. The first one was Cpl. Raymond Tindell, USMC, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Tindell of Spearman.

THE PRESIDENT AS A LEADER

It takes a good leader to govern a country in time of peace. It takes a better leader to govern a country in wartime. But it takes a truly great leader, a leader of leaders, to govern a nation when that nation's citizens are fighting among themselves.

Such a man was Abraham Lincoln. He had the greatest task any president ever faced, holding the nation together during the Civil War, perhaps the most perilous war in our history.

What is required of any leader? I think some important qualities are determination, listening to all advice, and keeping the group strong and unified.

How did Lincoln show determination? Lincoln had little formal education, but he educated himself by reading. From such lowly beginnings, he reached the highest office in our land. Any man with such much determination will perform every job as best he can.

How did Lincoln show he would accept all advice? Lincoln's famous beard was the result of advice taken from a little girl.

Most important, Lincoln held the nation together. This was his goal all along. When he defeated the Confederates, instead of being cruel, he set an example for the nation. He expressed trust and forgiveness that lasted even after his death. If Lincoln had been cruel to the Confederates, the nation would have followed his example and another, more serious rebellion, would probably have resulted.

Yet Lincoln did even more. He freed the slaves, removing fear for us the mockery in the title, "A Free Nation."

It is interesting to note that after Lincoln's death, even his enemies praised his rare virtues. It was remarked on that unhappy night that he now belonged to the ages.

Perhaps the ages belong to him.

**New Traffic Law Signed May 30
Calls For Changes In Licenses**

Great strides were taken to protect motorists on Texas highways May 30 when Governor John Connally signed his traffic safety program into law.
The first of the series of bills, the Traffic Safety Act of 1967, provides for authority of the Governor to establish a statewide traffic safety program which provides for research and developmental projects and direct cooperation of state agencies. The Act also provides for a Traffic Safety Fund into which all funds received for the purpose of implementing the Act will be placed. Establishment of this Act will enable Texas to receive federal aid under the Federal Highway Safety Act of 1966 which requires all state governments to establish government-administered highway safety programs or lose 10 percent of the federal money.
Texas drivers' licenses will soon take on a new look by the addition of a picture of the licensee on laminated cards. Drivers' licenses for persons under 21 years of age will be provisional and a different color than those issued to adults. The color of the license and the picture will help liquor store operators determine whether or not a customer is a minor.
Drivers' licenses applied for on or after January 1, 1968, will be renewable every four years on the birth date of the applicant at the rate of \$6 rather than the present \$3 fee. A fee of \$1 will be charged for duplicate licenses.
The Department of Public Safety may in its discretion require an examination for the renewal of a license. Mandatory license suspension for the first moving traffic violation has been increased from six to 12 months and subject to orders of state courts, up to 18 months for subsequent violations. Drivers whose licenses have been suspended or revoked or are subject to suspension or revocation will have to attend rehabilitation schools which will be established and developed by the Department of Public Safety.
In order for an applicant to get a drivers' license he must be 18 years old unless he has completed a driver education course approved by the Department and is 16 years of age. Those who take driver education however, will as in the past, be granted a 10 percent discount on their bodily injury-property damage-medical payments and collision insurance by all insurance companies in the state who follow the prescribed rates set by the St. Board of Insurance.
The only exceptions under which a license may be issued at the age of 16 are hardship cases and where the driver has completed the classroom portion of a driver education course and drives only with a licensed adult driver in the front seat with him. Previously the minimum age for obtaining a drivers' license was 14.
Effect Jan. 1 1968 all motorcycle operators and passengers will be required to wear protective headgear which meets the minimum safety standards set by the Dept. of Public Safety. Any person violating the law is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction may be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50.
Another bill requires the St. Dept. of Health to recommend, study and investigate policies relating to the medical aspects of driver licensing, traffic safety, and accident investigation.

The fee for inspection of motor vehicles will be raised to \$1.75 rather than \$1.50. Now on the mandatory inspection checklists are front seatbelts where seatbelt anchorages are part of the manufacturers original equipment, wheels, rims, and steering.
The Commercial Driver Training School and Instructor Licensing Act requires state police to regulate them and license driver training schools and their operators.

Rose water, 1 oz. powdered Orris root, 1/4 oz. each of: Rose Geranium oil, Bitter almond oil, Lavender oil, oil of spike, oil of jasmine. Rub inside of a large jar with Glycerine. Pack in layers in air-tight jar for 3 weeks before opening.

and she cuts roses with stems 12 inches long from the bush. In a recent survey, rose lovers voted the Peace Rose America's favorite.
