"I am an American youth. As such I realize that I enjoy greater freedom, great privileges and greater advantages than any other youth in the world. If I am to continue to enjoy these things, I must do my best to maintain them. I know, therefore, that I must obey laws and uphold the principles upon which the nation was founded. As I am but one of millions, I must respect the rights of others. As I am not perfect, I must be tolerant of others. As I am young, I must accept good counsel from my elders. Knowing that tomorrow I will be one who will help to guide the destinies of my country, I shall bear in mind that I must be fitted to assume the duties of citizenship, and that I, the same as others before me, must consider that there are others to follow me, who, as they are to enjoy the kind of world that I am enjoying, must have that kind of world waiting for them. Thus, anything I do today to destroy the rights, privileges, and liberties of others is unfair and selfish. These things I do not wish to do. Therefore, I will try to be considerate, honest, and decent, so that others may live as freely as I am living today and in the future.

This Creed for Youth, as adopted by the Chicago Youth Conference expresses the feeling of patriotism of each Girls Nation delegate. We found that Girl's Nation was another step to higher learning. I have been ask to tell you about my experiences as a delegate from Bluebonnett Girls State of Texas to our Girls Nation held at the American University in Washing-

The capitol, the Jefferson Memorial, the Lincoln Memorial the Washington Monument, the Kennedy grave sight, and many others, revealed to us our American heritage. At Girls State, we were the government, at Girls Nation, we observed the government. Our observations began by touring the capi-tol. The feeling of pride was contagious when we all saw, for the first time, our Great Capitol. There I met Bob Price, Sen-ator Tower. I did not get to meet Senator Yarborough because he was out of town, but he did write me a very nice letter and ask me to visit his office, in his absence.

We had a special luncheon in the capitol and met some of the outstanding women of Congress such as Sen. Margaret Chase Smith. We visited the Supreme Court, Dean Rusk of the State Department spoke to us. We made a special trip to Arlington National Cemetary where we saw the Changing of the Guard at the Grave of the Unknown Soldier and while there, presented a Wreath at this gravesite and at the grave of President Kennedy. We toured and got lost in the Pentagon. I don't know how it is possible for them to know where they are going there, much less keep world affairs straight. But it was

most educational and very interesting.

I was appointed to the Cabinet of Girls Nation and served as Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare and was very honored to visit the office of Sec. John Gardner, my counterpart. He was a very fine, concerned man and I enjoyed this immensely. After this visit, we were all priviledged to meet our president, Lyndon B. Johnson, and speak with him in the rose garden behind the White House. This was a great experience for me and especially when I was introduced to him as one of the delegates from Texas. We had a nice visit and I certainly take pride in this.

One of my most pleasant memories shall be when the 18th district from Texas sent me a huge bouquet of flowers. I was so proud and I want to thank you and express my gratitude. It was a great honor for me to be a delegate to Girls Nation and it has given me many priceless experiences that I will never forget.

As Governor of Girls State, I also have priceless memories, and I wish I could share all of these with you. It doesn't seem possible that within ten short days you could learn to love something so much but after an experience is over, and you have time to think, you begin to realize it's real worth. you, of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary, for the you, of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary, for the tireless efforts you have presented in our behalf, we express our gratitude and love. You are responsible for a greater insight to the needs and gifts of our country.
