Rural Traffic Accidents Total 13 For Current Year

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of September, according to Sergeant A. Neel, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no one killed, one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,310.00. The statistics for the month of September during the first three months of 1967 shows a total of 13 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 14 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$17,685.00. Traffic wise, the month of October signals the beginning of the most deadly season of the year. From past experience the last three months of the year almost double the number of deaths occurring during the first three months of the year. The Sergeant listed some factors why these three months are more deadly. (1) October marks the beginning of shorter days and longer nights, these increased hours of darkness will hide dangers otherwise visible during the day - night hours. (2) An increase in traffic due to vehicles conveying school children, football fans, harvest vehicles and others, and the holidays. (3) Element weather conditions, these factors in varying degrees coupled with high speed accidents that would not occur in the daytime.

 Surface Transportation - - October 16 to November 15.
 Space available (SAM) - - October 21 to Dec. 1.
 Air Mail - - Dec. 1 to Dec. 11.

The term "Armed Forces overseas" includes personnel of the Armed Forces, members of their families, and U.S. civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO or FPO, New York, San Francisco, or Seattle. All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper which materially strengthens the package. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning materials should be used to prevent rattling or loosening of articles within the package. Boxes tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. A list showing a list of the contents, and the name and address of the sender and addressee, should be enclosed in the parcel.

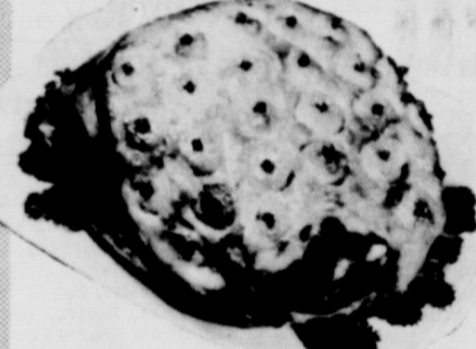

I never knowed his eyesite waz bad until last week when he miss took a American Eggele for a bald headed rooster and ended up by dive bummin this here eggele from off a fence post.

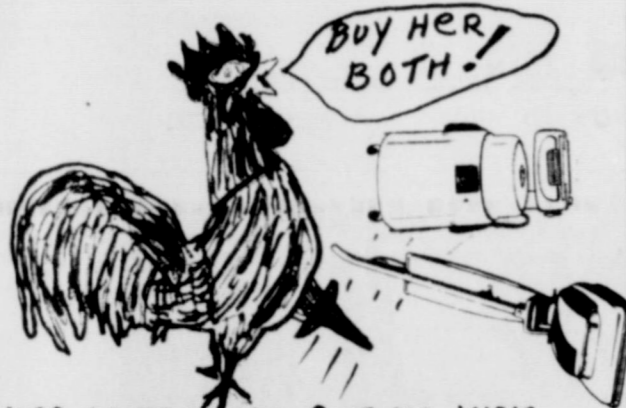
This hear eggele, which wuz peobable lost, wuz sittin on this cottonwood stump a sleepin when old Red who wuz sittin on the closet pole seen him.

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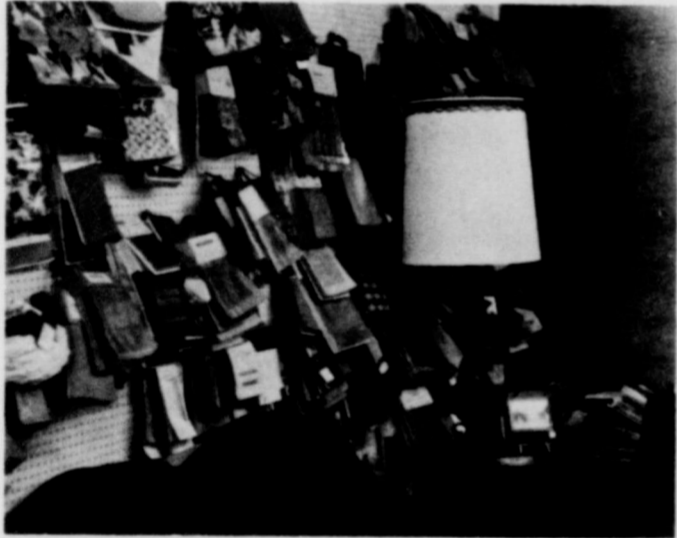

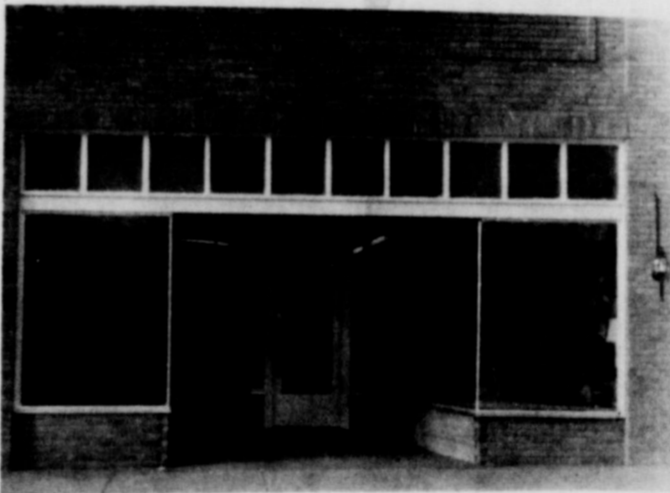

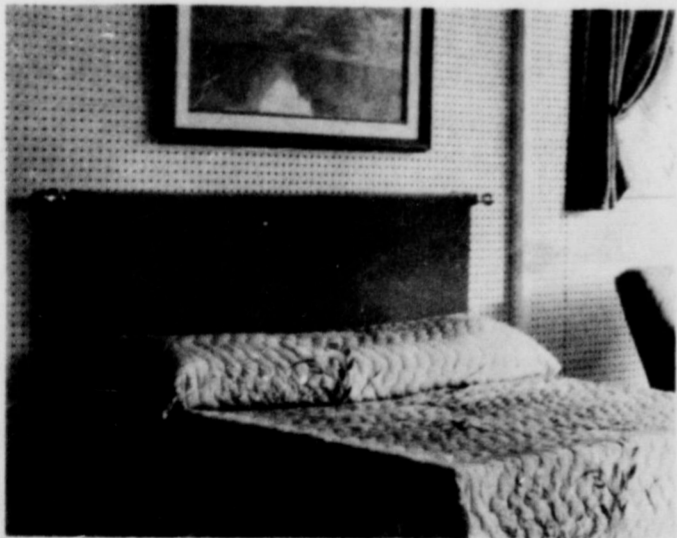
