Helpful Hints From Me To Thee By Vivian Warminski

It is none too soon to start making plans for Christmas. Here are a few ideas that might be of interest to you.

Instead of putting a wreath in the window, put the window in a wreath this Christmas. First measure the window's area, then pencil a circle with the same diameter on newspaper. Wire large branches of pine together to conform to the pattern, hiding the wire under the needles at each turn. Suspend this wreath from the ceiling molding so it surrounds the frame. To give a wintry effect, beat a cup of dry soap or detergent with warm water to create "suds-snow."

Newest addition to the artificial Christmas tree is the Scotch pine, with green vinyl needles coating a metal frame. This type of tree has pre-shaped branches for remarkable realism, and many versions come apart for washing in soap or detergent suds before storage.

Use Water and Suds to Keep Christmas Green

A noted garden editor, C. G. Milne, offers these suggestions to keep a cut Christmas tree fresh. "Recut the trunk with a saw, place trunk end in a bucket of hot water and leave the tree there until ready for indoor use. Water will cool down but don't add more hot water--but do add water when necessary."

Boughs of evergreens will look better if dust and soot are removed by swirling the branches in soap or detergent suds, followed by rinsing. To make needles glossy, add one-third cup of cooking oil per gallon to the final rinse.

Fruitcake is a holiday tradition. Good shoppers plan ahead and think about the supplies they need. There appears to be fewer dried fruits, especially raisins this year. But prunes are plentiful this season.

What is next on the market? An Illinois food company now is marketing a frozen pancake batter which won't separate. Just thaw in the refrigerator and pour.

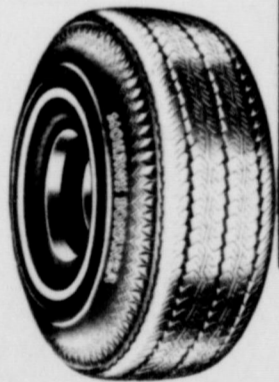
