Aldermen also approved the 1966 tax roll in the amount of \$6,000,000. Manager Dorce Foshee announced that the tax roll is now ready for mailing.

Coach Praises Smith - Holton

Spearman's greatly improved Lynx squad held the AAA Canyon team to a 6-0 Score Friday night in Canyon. The highly favored Canyon Eagles were hit harder Friday night by the Lynx than they have been in any game they've played so far this year.

The Lynx travel to Phillips this SATURDAY night for an 8 P. M. clash with the Blackhaws and the first conference game of the season.

Listed below are comments on the Canyon game and some statistics of what we might expect in the game Friday night against Phillips given by head coach George Wright.

CANYON

"Our Total Team effort was very good. Our offense improved some over last week but not as much as we had hoped. We moved the ball on a very fine AAA ball club; however, we are still short of the "knockout" punch which must be developed in our offense. Our offensive line was slightly better but the films show that our backs are favoring each hole too wide and tend to run too wide on the "inside plays." Offensively we will continue to stress our line "Firing out" - "Staying low" and Driving. In the last two games our line was position stepping for blocks and losing their power. They have corrected much of this fault and it will continue to improve as we continue to stress our blocking techniques.

"Our defense continues to shine and I am extremely pleased with this phase of our game. Mike Hendrick played an excellent game at Defensive end - his best game by far. Joe Vandenburg came through for us at the other defensive end spot. Our corner backs did a top job. Hal Shufeldt and Bobby Smith played their best game. Hal turned in one of the top tackles of the night and Bobby Smith has improved greatly on his pass defense. He broke up several and the film shows that he definitely came up with the football on

the disputed interception near our own goal line. Nose-guard Jerry Holton did an outstanding job and is developing into one of the finest in this area.

Canyon hurt our line backers some but considering the weight advantage and the excellent power attack of Canyon it could have been a lot worse had our backers paused to rest - they didn't - they stayed in there & slugged it out. Wesley Jenkins made a typical sophomore error in being OVER EAGER and coming up to help tackle, thereby allowing an end deep behind him - otherwise he and Gary Cates both did a good job. Gary intercepted a 4th down pass that he should have only batted away but these are mistakes of EAGERNESS and are good signs of determination and desire - a most welcome sign I might add.

"Our kicking game continued to improve. It was FAR FAR superior to the opening game with Sunray and better than the Gruver game. The Quick-Kick with Jerry Holton booting turned out to be very valuable and instrumental in getting us out of the hole. Randy Moore turned in a fine kicking game. Karl Kunselman has improved a lot on his deep snaps. Karl is also one of the 1st men down covering on punts and kickoffs. Phillip Renner did an excellent job covering punts. This had been a weak point of Phillips' up to this game."

PHILLIPS

"Phillips is 2-1 winning their opener against AAA Canyon 18-6. They dropped the 2nd game to AAA Dumas 8-0 and really clubbed AAA Hiferford 20-8 after having lost several fumbles and having one TD called back. Phillips is an explosive ball club who plays like they want to keep their favored position of being ranked in the top 5 of class AA in the state. They have fine team speed and favor the fullback trap up the middle. If you watch No. 44 you will see a fullback with both power and sprinters speed. He is definitely an all state candidate. We must stop the trap up the middle and contain their speed in order to win."

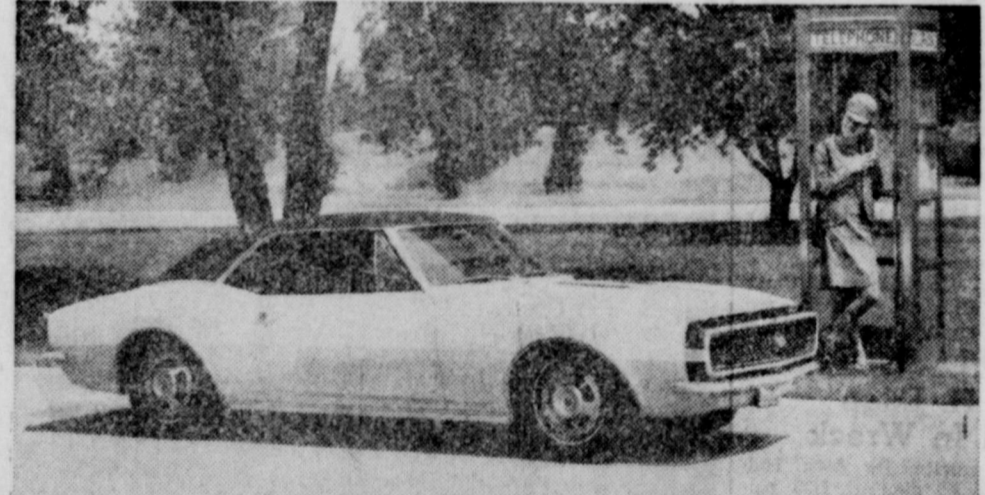

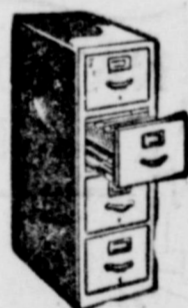

County Agent's Report

September 26, 1966 NATIONAL 4-H CLUB WEEK

The fourth generation of 4-H boys and girls and some 24 million adults who once were 4H Club members celebrate National 4-H Club Week, September 24 through October 1st.

The main objectives of National 4-H Club Week is to acquaint more parents and youngsters with 4-H so they will join the program. Parents can become local club or project leaders, and their children active members.

Total enrollment in 4-H this year exceeds two and one-quarter million. The youngsters from 9 to 19 years of age reside in every county in every state. They are about equally divided between farm and non-farm residents, reports the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises and conducts all 4-H work, including training of 525,066 adult and junior volunteer leaders.

This youth program also extends to Puerto Rico which boasts nearly 35,000 members.

Texas enrollment is approximately 84,000. There are 15 4-H members enrolled in the 8 clubs in Hansford County.

There are 96,000 clubs throughout the nation in which the members hold office, plan activities and work on a variety of projects. As interests of youth have changed 4-H has changed and expanded.

Private support of 4-H has kept pace. Business firms, foundations and other friends help to finance state 4-H Foundations, national and regional award programs, scholarships, training and teaching aids.

Nationally, 57 donors this year pledged well over \$1 million, according to the National 4-H Service Committee of Chicago. These funds are used for long established 4-H programs and some brand new ones.

Scholarships alone will amount to \$146,500, and an estimated 1,690 deserving boys and girls will enjoy national recognition for superior achievement and receive trips to the National 4-H Club Congress held in Chicago the week after Thanksgiving.

TRACTOR ENGINE CARE

A tractor engine takes in about 8,000 gallons of air for every gallon of fuel it uses. A large tractor burning 4-1/8 gallons of fuel an hour takes in about 250,000 gallons of air in a 10-hour day. That's a lot of air and it includes a lot of dirt which can ruin an engine in half a day's work.

Proper air cleaner care insures longer engine life. An efficient air cleaner removes the dirt and dust particles for the air and does not restrict the carburetor intake.

Generally, the air cleaner cup should be removed and the old oil discarded every 10 hours of engine operation. Scrape the dirt from the bottom of the cup, wash the cup in kerosene and refill to the oil mark with clean oil.

It's important to follow instructions in the operator's manual for your particular tractor.

SC Tour Of Hansford County Farms To Be Conducted September 29th

A Conservation Tour will be held on September 29th starting at 1:30 p. m. The tour will be organized at Nancy's Cafe in Gruver.

The following agenda will be followed on the tour: 1. Don Hart Tailwater Recovery System. A pond has been built and a system of diversion terraces and waterways have been installed to protect land from floodwater as well as collect tailwater. A pipeline has been installed to carry water back up the irrigation fur to be used again.

2. W. L. Harris - cattle grazing Midland Bermuda grass using a 3 pasture rotation system. Cattle the other two are being rested & watered.

3. J. C. Harris - A grassed water way has been established to a good stand of western wheatgrass. Grass was planted in a clean listed seedbed last September and watered up.

4. D. L. Mathews - Sudan has been planted for a dead litter cover into which native grasses will be seeded. Sideoats grama & blue grama will be seeded next spring.

5. James Stedje - Farmstead Windbreak - A windbreak around the farmstead not only helps to keep the wind and dust away from the house, but adds natural beauty to the farm.

6. Reuben Hindergardt - Diversion Terrace & Parallel Terraces have been constructed the same distance apart to avoid point rows. This makes the terraces more desirable to farm.

7. Johnnie Venneman - Range Seeding and Livestock Water Facility - Sideoats grama and blue grama have been established to an excellent stand. Also a livestock well and storage facility have been installed to improve distribution of grazing.

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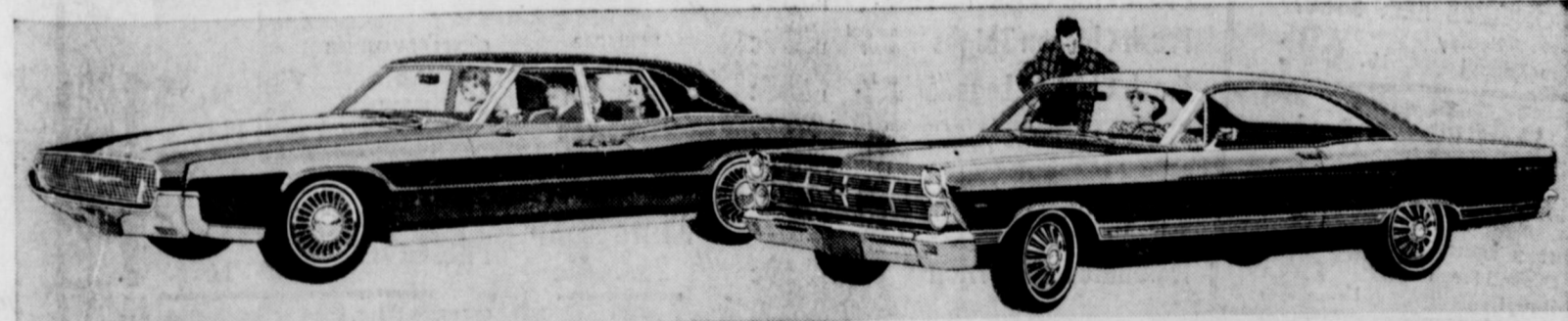
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Dignitaries from three states, including governors and congressmen, will join an anticipated crowd of 5000 persons in groundbreaking ceremonies October 1 of Optima Dam near Hardesty Oklahoma. The groundbreaking is slated at 10 a.m. for the \$23 million project, near the dam site about four miles northwest of Hardesty. Observation balloons will mark the path of the three-mile-long earthen barrier and spectators will be able to see six miles up and down the river valley. High school bands from Perryton, Guyton and Liberal will provide music at the ceremony. Dr. Robert Sexton band director from

Panhandle A&M College, will conduct. Optima is being built primarily as a municipal water flood control and reclamation project but it will have recreational benefits for many nearby cities including Spearman, Perryton and Liberal. The reservoir's daily municipal water output is estimated at 10 million gallons. The dam will be built at the confluence of the North Canadian River and Coldwater Creek about four miles northeast of Hardesty. Optima Dam will be about as long as Denison Dam across Lake Texoma and it will inundate 5,340 surface acres and in-pound 229,500

acre feet of water. The Corps of Engineers has estimated that 500,000 persons annually will visit Optima Army engineers are now building access roads, a landing strip an administration building and drilling water wells for construction crews. The dam will be about 35 miles from Spearman.

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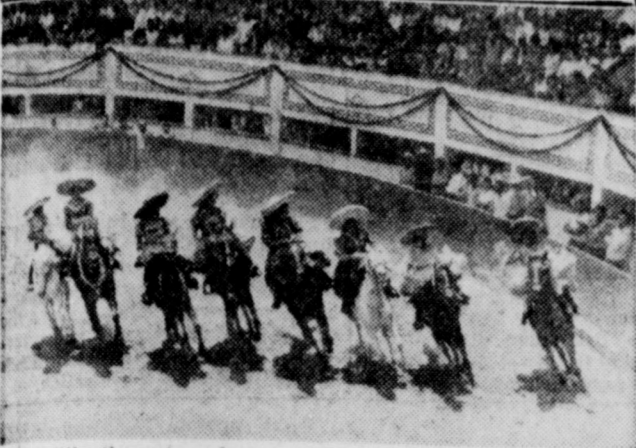

HOMEMAKING NOTES

Parents--Do you listen to your child?
Much of a child's learning comes about because someone is listening. Many adults think that if they are talking & a child is listening, learning is taking place. However, the opposite is often true.

A child's learning depends largely on how he perceives and feels about a situation. When parents are aware of these feelings they can be helpful. This can come about by listening carefully to the child.

When there is reason to learn,

and what a child learns. How when and what a child learns, however depends to a great extent on his surroundings, which include people as well as things. Parents must know a child very well to know the best time for him to learn--and this, too, comes only from listening to the child.

Why a child talks or asks questions is not always clear or easy to recognize. Sometimes they are simply wanting information and sometimes they are seeking attention. These are both valid reasons--each as important as the other--but parents must realize that each requires its own special kind of response.

When the child asks questions to gain attention the response is important on an emotional level. The child is seeking to feel like a more valued person. Questions that seem unimportant to adults may serve to reveal deep areas of concern to the child. Children generally are much more sensitive to parents than parents are to children. When parents don't listen, children don't listen, either.

Such closing of communication seriously reduces the amount of learning taking place. "Learning to listen well takes time and effort, but when you listen to your child, you'll learn a lot about him, and he will learn a lot about growing up."

Of special significance is the plans they have made for helping teach the Spanish homemakers in our county. The first programs are fundamental classes in basic sewing

and cooking. The Spanish women have shown a great deal of enthusiasm about learning all they can to make their homes and families more comfortable and better adjusted.

Another area of program emphasis for this county is housing and home furnishings. Several different programs have been planned including a drapery-making workshop, a home furnishings tour, a county-wide meeting on home decorating and others.

Keep your eyes and ears open for more information concerning these programs in the coming months.

HOW TO REMOVE GREASE FROM PATIOS
It's hard to remove greasy stains from concrete or cement patios. But here's some concrete advice on how to remove those smudges left from summer cookouts & barbecues.

Try an absorbent substance, such as Fuller's earth or lime. It will act as a blotter and may remove the grease stains without further treatment. Just sprinkle it on, leave it alone for a while, then sweep it up.

If that doesn't remove the evidence then hose down the patio with clean water. This process will saturate the concrete and serve as a kind of seal to prevent dirty water from soaking in. Then scrub briskly with a stiff broom dipped in thick detergent suds. Hose again to rinse.

Should the grease spots still persist sprinkle dishwater detergent on the wet concrete. Let it stand a few minutes--then rinse with a kettle of boiling water.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENT TASKS OF TEENS

Today's teenagers have three major developmental tasks to accomplish, according to a Missouri family relations expert who spoke at Texas A & M University recently.

"These are developing a sense of identity, establishing independence from adults and understanding the socially accepted roles of adolescence," says Arthur McArthur, Extension division family relations specialist at the University of Missouri.

McArthur explained that the roles were seen in terms of the teenager's peer groups and members of the opposite sex. The family relations expert was one of several major speakers who addressed the Texas A&M University Family Life Education Workshop this past spring.

Young people today have many choices of identity roles, he told home demonstration agents participating in the training. "There

is no a scribed role for youth today, as there was in more primitive societies. In those societies, however, scribed roles served to give youth a sense of security. There's considerably more decision-making today for teens."

The family relations expert said that if parents and educators are going to prepare young people for leadership roles, then they must help them to grow up and be knowledgeable about all types of people.

McArthur suggested that parents give young people guidance in recognizing bonds between all groups, despite the differences which must necessarily exist between these groups.

He defined the "spoiled child" as a child of "chicken-hearted parents." "But, who isn't afraid of many issues of the day?"

McArthur urged parents and teachers to re-examine each expectation they have for a child to determine if these aspirations are basic and valid and child-centered.

GREB'S MOCK GROG
Peel of 1 orange, in strips, 4 cinnamon sticks, each about 3 inches long, 1 1/2 teaspoons whole cloves, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup chocolate syrup, 1/2 teaspoon anise flavoring 2 quart; strong hot coffee.

Combine all ingredients in a large coffee or deep chafing dish. Steep over very low heat for 15 minutes (do not boil). Serve in demitasses or small mugs with a twist of lemon peel and a spoonful of whipped cream. Makes about 12 half cup servings.

New Row Spacing of Grain Sorghum Shown Today On Etter Field Tour

Etter -- Research findings that have practical value to Panhandle agriculturalists will dominate the program during the field day at the North Plains Research Field set for 1:15 to 5 p.m. Thursday, September 22. The Texas A&M research installation is located one mile east and a half mile north of Etter.

Topics slated for discussion include herbicide selection, results of wheat and small grains variety trials, vegetable production and optimum versus maximum yields of grain sorghum and wheat.

Dr. John Shipley, coordinator of studies at the North Plains Research Field, will also present a brief review of projects currently underway at the site.

Soybean tests and row spacing trials with irrigated grain sorghum are two of the major items to be shown during the tour that will follow the research reports, Shipley said.

Speakers on the program are all Texas agricultural experiment station staff members who have been directly involved in the trials at the research field, he said.

Discussing herbicides will be Dr. Allen Wiese, who offices at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, Bushland. The well-known weed control researcher plans to speak on "looking to the future in selecting herbicides today."

He will stress herbicide selection based on the cropping sequence or rotations planned for the future.

Dr. Ken Porter, also of the Bushland research center, will discuss the most promising varieties of wheat and small grains observed in 1966 tests.

The scientists are testing six commercial varieties of soybeans this year including Hinn Hill, Patterson, Clark 63 Lee and Wayne. Shipley says the Wayne variety which was the high yielding variety in the nation last season looks very promising in the local tests.

A new system of row-spacing in grain sorghum will also be shown during the field tour. Shipley says the grain sorghum is planted three inches from the water furrow in each test to give 26 inch rows. The area between these rows is then varied at 14, 34 and 54 inch intervals.

Fifteen stops will be made during the field tour. Shipley said. Besides grain sorghum and soybean work, visitors will see castorbean and vegetable trials, the field's new tailwater pit and numerous other projects on such things as herbicides and fertilization.
