

Hansford County, Area Of Opportunity

Hansford County is economically "off" and is in fact ranked as the lowest per-capita income county in the Panhandle area, and among the top ten counties in the State of Texas. These facts are verified by the Texas Employment Commission in a book prepared by the Texas A and M University concerning a report on the Panhandle's resources.

Representatives from Hutchinson, Carson, Gray, Roberts, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties heard discussion of the report on Panhandle resources prepared from a study of economic influence by Texas on Monday at a meeting held in Berger Hotel. This meeting was first in a series of four area meetings at which the Panhandle Economic Program (PEP) will be discussed and discussed. The program is aimed specifically at increasing the income of a 26-county area through intense utilization of natural resources.

Problems which are holding the Panhandle's income back by hundreds of millions of dollars were discussed Monday before more than 100 community leaders from 18 eastern Panhandle counties.

Don Smith, Manager of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce attended the meeting.

Hansford County's average weekly income per family is \$108.40.

Only three counties (Hutchinson, Carson and Moore) show a higher income. Hansford county's average income per household is \$8,102.00, one of the highest in the State! In comparison: Highland Park of Dallas and Pasadena of Houston, which are "areas" and not counties, show the HIGHEST income per family which is 13,000.00. This figure puts Hansford county in the TOP TEN counties in the State with the highest "affiliated buying income per family."

In comparison to this: Randall county shows \$7,956.00, Ochiltree county \$7,099.00 and many places show only 4,000.00 per family.

Hansford county's growth from 1950 to 1960 shows a 47.7 percent increase. The average family age per person is 25.6.

PEP coordinator James Murphrey, an extension service farm management specialist, said the 196 page report is aimed at showing the problems, causes and opportunities that are facing the 26 counties in the program Murphrey said he interviewed 150 leaders in all facets of business to compile data for the report. He said the program is "of for, and by" the people of the Panhandle.

With the above facts before the 26 county area and the entire State of Texas, Hansford County stands out as one of those MAJOR AREAS OF OPPORTUNITIES in the State of Texas.

Lt. Mike Crawford Tells Of Thanksgiving In Vietnam

Lt. Mike Crawford, a helicopter pilot in Viet Nam for the past six months, wrote to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Crawford about Thanksgiving week in that country.

Mike, who is currently based in a very swampy area, said the fact that the army mess hall is built in an old cemetery did not bother the servicemen's appetite on Thanksgiving day. They were served a delicious turkey dinner with all the trimmings. They even had good weather for the holiday. The reason for the location of the mess hall was the high rise which made for good drainage during the rains.

On Friday, the Monsoon rains started again with a violent down-pour. This deluge had some rather unpleasant results on a recreation room that the company had built. This room, about twenty feet square, had walls constructed of sand-bags and bamboo matting. The roof was made of rubber patches, and the floor of more bamboo matting. The furniture was built of rocket and ammunition boxes with rusty nails. The only tools available were two hell-pon hammers.

Mike commented that several four-letter words, spoken with accents from every part of the United States, were also used while the furniture was in the making.

After an eight-hour deluge, Mike's fox-hole, adjacent to the recreation room, filled with water. It broke through the floor of the room and formed a spring that bubbled until the rains lessened.

He said the two bright spots during the week were the sumptuous Thanksgiving dinner and the fact that the tents where his company now sleeps don't leak!

For every 25 hours of combat, Mike is issued an Air Medal, and he states that he is collecting quite a few of these. Mike's duty as a helicopter pilot is to drop troops in combat areas and pick them up.

The 25 year old soldier has been in Vietnam since May 61. His wife and a year old son reside in Canyon where she is a senior at WTSU.

Memorial services were held from the Methodist Church in Monterey Park. Burial was in the Hill of Roses cemetery.

Long Distance Rates Reduced

Reduced long distance rates for most station-to-station calls within Texas will become effective January 1, 1967 for customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Southwestern States Telephone and Four States Telephone Companies, according to E. H. Danner, president of the three companies.

State-wide reductions on three minute calls vary from five to fifteen cents on most station-to-station calls over 56 miles in distance within Texas. Reductions for calls over three minutes are even greater, according to Danner. The reductions apply to calls made during the time when "day rates" are in effect as well as to all intrastate (within Texas) station-to-station calls made during the "night rate" hours after 8 p.m. and all day Sunday.

The new tariffs reflecting the reduced rates will be distributed to all offices handling long distance calls at the earliest possible date, Danner stated.

Report On County's Oil Production

Texas oil production reached the one billion barrel total in 1965 for the first time since 1957, figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association show.

There were 1,000,749,000 barrels of crude oil, valued at more than \$3 billion, produced in 230 of the 254 counties during 1965, statistics show.

Since production records began 70 years ago, the state has produced a total of 28,403,016,481 barrels of crude.

Andrews County continued to be the leading county in oil production, with 76,908,306 barrels, although all sections of the state have several high producing fields.

"The state's excellent oil and gas conservation system must be given credit for the widespread and continuing development of production throughout Texas," said W.A. Landreth, Fort Worth independent operator who is president of Texas Mid-Continent. "Under our state laws, administered ably by the Texas Railroad Commission, the state's petroleum resources development has been encouraged from the driller to the refiner."

Hansford County had a 1965 crude production of 1,894,100 barrels to bring its total to 16,764,100 barrels since its first discovery in 1927. Its 1965 production rate averaged 5,189 barrels a day.

In 1965, Texas had three counties that produced in excess of 40 million barrels. Besides Andrews, Ector County had a total of 61,266,600 barrels and Crane County produced 43,952,300 barrels.

In addition, five other counties produced more than 20 million barrels in 1965 and an additional 24 had production in excess of 10 million barrels. Gregg remains the only county in the state that has produced more than two billion barrels, while three other counties--Rusk, Ector and Andrews -- have produced more than one billion.
