Donor Requirements Listed As Bloodmobile Visit Nears

A list of requirements for prospective blood donors was given to week by the Red Cross office, in advance of the bloodmobile visit in Spearman on Wed., Feb. 22.

These requirements are as follows: 1) Age 21 to 60 years. A donor is disqualified on his sixtieth birthday.

All unmarried minors must have the written consent of one parent plus the signature of a witness. Married minors do not need consent.

2) Weight: donors must weigh at least 110 pounds.

3) Nourishment: fatty foods (such as dairy products, mayonnaise, oil dressing, peanuts butter, ham, bacon, chocolate or nuts) should not be eaten on day of donation.

4) Frequency: two months must elapse between donations. One year must elapse after rabies shot; two weeks after a smallpox vaccination and one month after a dose of cortisone. If the donor has been exposed to a contagious disease, he should not give blood for three weeks.

The American Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Spearman Wednesday February 22 and in Gruber Thursday February 23.

Hansford county's quota is 300 pints of blood.

Mrs. Jack McWhirter is County Blood Program chairman while Mrs. V. N. King is Red Cross Executive Secretary for the county.

Everyone is urged to keep this date in mind and plan to donate a pint of blood. Blood donated will go to Hansford Hospital and to soldiers fighting in Vietnam.

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HOMEMAKING NOTES

By Linda Garnett

Although most of us don't have to buy bedding, such as sheets, pillowcases and blankets very often, we need to be aware of the changes taking place so we can make intelligent decisions when it becomes necessary.

When you buy sheets, do you compare qualities and know that you are buying what you want? What's there to know about buying sheets? A sheet is a sheet, isn't it?

My answer is that there is a lot to know about buying sheets and pillowcases. And, no - a sheet isn't just a sheet. Perhaps the remainder of my article this week will put more light on the subject of sheets for you.

There are two basic types of sheets and pillow cases - percale and muslin. Percale is light weight, woven of finer combed yarns feels soft, smooth and crisp and has a closer weave (higher thread count).

Percale find three different types of combed percale; finest quality combed percale; and blends of synthetic and cotton fibers.

Muslin is heavier weight, woven with thicker corded (not combed) yarns. It feels less fine to the touch and has a looser weave (lower thread count). There are medium weight and heavy weight muslins.

Examine a sheets' weave carefully before you buy. Even within these classifications, there is a tremendous difference in quality of sheets. What you find depends on the manufacturer and the care used in making the sheets.

I have mentioned thread count, but what exactly is it? Thread count is the number of threads woven in one square inch of sheet. For example, a 128 thread count muslin is woven with 64 threads in an inch width, and 64 threads in an inch length, totaling 128 thread count.

Muslins can be found with 128 or 160 thread counts. Percale thread counts are always higher, being 200 to 260.

These counts are counts before the sheets are bleached in manufacture. After bleaching, sheets shrink slightly, making finished thread count a little higher.

The original count, however, is the thread count printed on the package label. It has been proven in tests that percale sheets, even though they feel more fragile, are stronger and longer lasting than muslin fabrics. The secret here is the resiliency and flexibility of the finer, lighter combed yarn of percale. The thicker, short-stapled coarser yarn in muslin may feel sturdy and strong, but the longer stapled more flexible yarns of percale "give" easily with bending and flexing in actual use.

What about sheet size? This should be printed on the package label, there are some interesting facts, however, about sheet sizes to help you determine what you need.

Fitted sheets are made for certain standard mattress sizes, and are always pre-shrunk. Fabric shrinkage should be less than 1 percent, and this should be stated on the package.

Flat sheets are not pre-shrunk, and the length labeled on sheets is the length before hemming. The finished sheet is about 5 to 7 inches shorter than the label indicates, and may shrink an additional 5 to 8 inches when laundered.

Because of the loss in length due to hemming and shrinkage, sheets 18 inches long are the most satisfactory, both for beauty and comfort. Shrinkage in sheet width is not nearly so much as it is in length, so width doesn't cause as much concern.

Pillow cases are also labeled with size before hemming and seaming. For old-fashioned down or feather pillows, which are a fluffy 22 by 26 or 30 inches, the correct case size is 45x38 1/2. For the newer down polyester or foam rubber pillows choose cases in size of 42x36. The finished size of the 42x36 after seaming and hemming is 20 1/2 x 32 1/2 inches.

So many different sizes, types, styles, colors and patterns in sheets and pillowcases are available today, it is important to give some advance consideration to your requirements. Most important is to know your mattress size. The depth of the mattress may vary almost as much as its top size, so measure yours. As a rule standard innerspring mattresses are about 7" deep. Foam rubber mattresses are from 4 1/2 to 6 inches deep.

Of course, most people like the convenience of bottom fitted sheets, which may have both ends and all four corners stretch. Or, you might like the newest of all the percale fitted sheets. Your color scheme is important, too, and sheets and pillowcases can mix and match as attractively as skirts, sweaters and blouses.

Happy shopping the next time you look for sheets and pillow cases. Next week, some care hints for blankets, and shopping hints for blankets.

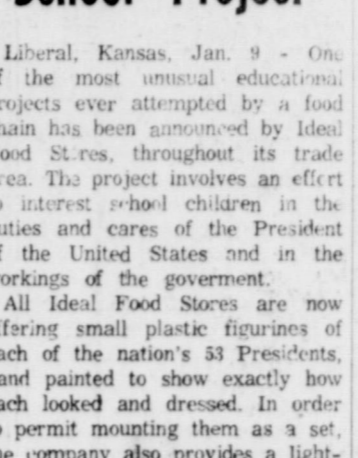

Washington Report

The office has been very busy since my last report. I introduced two pieces of legislation on January 26 and have been preparing other bills for introduction in the near future.

My House Joint Resolution 224 proposes an amendment to our Constitution which would put the American people on record in favor of allowing prayer in schools and other public buildings. Contrary to the belief of many people the Supreme Court decision of several years ago did not outlaw prayer in schools. The justices stated that school officials could not give the students a prepared prayer to recite.

As I stated in my last newsletter, however I will fight for passage of this amendment to make sure that some future court does not prohibit all prayer in public buildings.

The other resolution was introduced in connection with my assignment to the House Agriculture Committee on January 25. House Concurrent Resolution 165, "expresses the sense of Congress that in the public interest the administration should (1) cease and desist in its efforts to enforce selective economic discrimination against American farmers and ranchers by deliberately depressing farm prices; and (2) use the various legislative authorities at its disposal to improve and enhance farm prices."

In regard to my appointment to the Agriculture Committee, I have requested assignment to three subcommittees. The subcommittee on Livestock and Grains which handles legislation involving which handles production and wheat, maize, and soybeans, was my first choice.

My other choices included Cotton, which is a major crop in the 18th District. There are more than 600,000 bales annually produced in our area. My another choice is Conservation & Credit which involves small watershed programs as well as dealing with Farmers Home Administration and Federal Land Bank problems.

I will be announcing the members of my advisory committees on agriculture in the near future. I expect to have about 60 Panhandle farmers ranchers, and business on several committees.

I have received numerous letters in regard to the war in Viet Nam and the United Nations economic sanctions against Rhodesia.

I am still in favor of blockading the Port of Haiphong and bombing air fields and industrial plants in North Viet Nam in order to bring this conflict to a speedy and successful conclusion.

Also, I am opposed to the United States' honoring any economic sanctions against Rhodesia as long as our so-called allies continue to trade with North Viet Nam.
