Mrs. Joe Chase of Gruver invites the women who have helped so graciously through the past year giving Beth her patterns, to drop by any afternoon from August 27 through the following week and participate in celebrating Beth's seventeenth birthday. No gifts please.

The above article was sent this newspaper by Mrs. Chase, aunt of 17 year old Beth Chase who received brain damage at birth and has to have "special" treatment and teaching. Beth's mother died at her birth and Mrs. Joe Chase has had her niece since then.

Beth spent several years in a State School, but physicians advised the family to take her home and secure small groups of women to work with her privately. Several groups of ladies from Gruver and Spearman have been going

weekly to the Chase home to help give the youth special exercises and teaching called "patterns." Specialists state that children with this type of brain damage need to be worked with in small groups in order for them to get the full benefit of "learning by doing." In time this will re-route their thinking pattern to various parts of the brain.

Beth will start to school in Gruver this fall term where a class is available for "special" students.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

Each voter shall mark out one of the following ballots, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties using voting machines, the above provision for voting, for and against this Constitutional Amendment, may be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machines for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 2. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after each apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an Amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:

"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service."

Section 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 54th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections; appointments; tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue writs of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capital. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years under the same terms and conditions as those prescribed by law for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Section 2. Said proposed constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Section 3. That favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Law; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, and proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, including the requirement for a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; and provided, however, that the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which entails the removal of water from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within a river basin of priority, except on a temporary, interim basis.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any portion of the direct cost of the additional bonds herein authorized.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any such storage facilities and associated facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs or on any other state lands owned by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment.

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of the \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any such storage facilities and associated facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded in whole or in part.

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

Local Schools

Will Benefit From Program

Spearman schools will be among 101 school districts in the Panhandle to benefit from a program to implement Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 following acceptance of \$375,095 in federal funds approved by Gov. John Connally Friday.

The 10-month program to be financed on the funds is designed information and technical devices for dissemination among the 101 school districts participating in the program in the 36 country area of the Panhandle and South Plains.

The new program will be labeled the Texas Cooperative Dissemination (TCD) Project.

Canyon Independent School District was appointed the fiscal agency for the 101 school districts, to enter into a contract with the Panhandle Educational Services Organization (PESO) to provide the services.

Superintendent of Spearman Independent School District, Dr. B.E. Reeves, stated the Spearman schools would be participating in both Title III and PESO.

Originally the school districts had requested \$404,055 with which to operate the program for 11 months but the U. S. Office of Education asked the program be trimmed. The second request, approved Friday, calls for \$32,000 less and a 10-month program.

According to Dr. Emmitt Smith, director of PESO, the program's purpose is to accelerate and multiply the importance of new information. The information, covering all areas, is to be by national level research groups such as the National Science Foundation's Project English, and Social Studies.

Dr. Smith said the program will differ from any project ever attempted in the country and will allow the secondary and elementary educators to work with research material and technical instruments converting them into language that can then be taught in public schools.

Headquarters of the TCD project will be with PESO at 1601 Cleveland in Amarillo, and a portion of the building for the project's use.

The TCD project is different from the Title L of the 1965 legislative act in that it deals with all teachers, pupils and subjects, instead of only with those children which were economically and educationally deprived, especially in reading capabilities.

According to Dr. Smith the building will contain a laboratory in which the innovations in technical teaching will be demonstrated to participating teachers. An information center will be at the office.

Activating the TCD will be a central staff to include elementary and secondary teachers drawn from the region to serve as consultants, and a specialists staff of West Texas State University professors from various academic areas.

CPS Announces Another Reduction In Electrical Rates For City Users

They passed a new ordinance which will allow the City jurisdiction on platting of territory within one-half mile of the city limits. A Community Public Service official was present to announce further reduction in elect. rates to Spearman users. Some time back CPS reduced their rates to comply with surrounding areas, but this new rate will amount to another 1.28 percent reduction to residential users, effective on the Aug. billing. The City's municipal power rates were reduced .457 percent and its miscellaneous service 40.06 percent. This includes pumping city wells, etc.

The board let the contract to extend utilities to a portion of the Glover Terrace, unit 2 to Foran Construction Co. of Amarillo for \$7,984.92.

Councilmen also approved the purchase of new uniforms for the Police Department.

Sometime back the Highway department recommended some speed changes on Highway 15 within the city limits. However, councilmen decided to leave these speeds as they were.

Mrs. E. D. Mundy resigned from the Library Board to teach school, and the council appointed Mrs. Ray Lackey to replace her. The City appoints 2 members to this board.

Jeff Mason, local CPA, was contracted to do the annual auditing for the City of Spearman. The years business ends September 2.

At the September meeting, councilmen will ask for bids for a new street sweeper and a two-ton flat bed truck.

Bar Association Backs Judge Boyer For Federal Judgeship!

The Northeast Panhandle Bar Association passed a resolution at its regular meeting Tuesday night, August 16, unanimously endorsing District Judge Max W. Boyer of Perryton for the federal judgeship seat that will be vacant on October 1, 1966 as the result of the resignation of Judge Joseph B. Dooley of Amarillo. Judge Dooley submitted his resignation last week to be effective October 1, and after that date the judgeship must be filled by appointment of the President and confirmation by the Senate.

Judge Boyer is presently serving as District Judge of the 84th Judicial District of the State of Texas, which includes Hansford, Ochiltree and Hutchinson Counties. He was appointed to the post in 1957 by Governor Daniel to fill an unexpired term and has since been reelected to two full terms. Prior to going on the bench, Judge Boyer, who is a long time resident of Perryton, was County Attorney of Ochiltree County; representative for four years; and served as City Attorney of Perryton for many years. He was also the first president of the Northeast Panhandle Bar Association, which is composed of all the attorneys in Hansford, Ochiltree and Lipscomb Counties, and he served on the Grievance Committee of the 18th District of the State Bar Association. Judge Boyer was elected by the judges of Texas as a member of the Executive Committee of the Judicial Section of the State Bar in 1964.

The federal judgeship that will be vacant on October 1 is in the Northern District of Texas, which includes most of the Panhandle

and North Texas. Chief Judge of the Northern District is Judge Joe Estes of Dallas. The appointment is a lifetime appointment, as are almost all federal judicial posts. The full text of the resolution passed by the local bar association is as follows:

Boyer, District Judge of the 84th Judicial District of the State of Texas, has compiled a long and impressive record as a practicing attorney, prosecutor, legislator and judge and is held in high esteem by his associates as a man of exceptional ability and integrity, and would be the best qualified individual in the Northern District of Texas to succeed the Honorable Joseph B. Dooley;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED BY THE NORTHEAST PANHANDLE BAR ASSOCIATION, That the Honorable Max W. Boyer is the personal choice of all of the members of the Northeast Panhandle Bar Association to fill the forthcoming vacancy in the Northern District of Texas and the members of said Bar Association hereby go on rec-
