## One Accident In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of March, according to Sergeant W. J. McLean, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. The crash resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$460.00. The rural accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1967 shows a total of two accidents resulting in no persons killed, two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$685.00. The final entry in the 1966 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record high of 3,406 persons killed, 208,310 persons injured, and an estimated property loss of \$557,414,000 was sustained. This compares to the 1965 record of 3,028 persons killed, 186,062 injured and an estimated property damage of \$498,070,000. Since the death count of 2,254 in 1966, Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the death rate increases during the last four years of this decade as it has during the first years, the death count will stand at 4,745 in 1970." What is the solution? 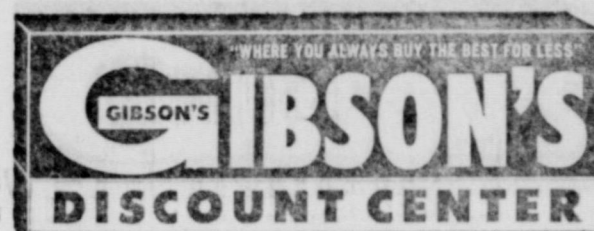

**Shoemaker To Train For Missionary**

Robert Shoemaker, a school teacher in Culpeper, Va., is among 61 young people invited by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board to train this summer for journeyman service overseas. He hopes to work in a dermatology or missionary children who attend school in Tokyo Japan.

"This will be one more exciting link in the wonderful chain of Christian experiences that binds me to God," says the 23-year-old teacher, who is the son of a Baptist minister.

Southern Baptist journeymen are single college graduates under 27 years of age who spend two years overseas sharing their Christian faith while performing certain skills under the supervision of career missionaries. The young people employed on April 2, during a three-day meeting of the Foreign Mission Board, will, if they complete requirements, become the third generation of journeymen. The first group, sent out in 1965, will return home this summer.

Mr. Shoemaker grew up in Winters, a west Texas farming community, and graduated from Winters High School in 1962. His parents, Rev. and Mrs. B. T. Shoemaker, recently moved to Spearman, Texas, where his father is pastor of First Baptist Church.

He received the bachelor of arts degree from Baylor University Waco, Texas, last year, directed youth work for Memorial Baptist Church, Arlington Va. during the summer, and began teaching mathematics in Culpeper County High School last fall. He also works with young people in Culpeper Baptist Church. (He lives at 704 Commerce, Culpeper).

"My future is in God's hands," says Mr. Shoemaker. "He may want me to continue teaching, or certainly that is a Christian calling. He may want me to be a preacher, a church music director, a religious education worker or a missionary. But no matter what or where it may be, I want to follow him and give him the best I have to offer."

He and the prospective journeymen will enter training at Virginia Interment College, Bristol, on June 17. Their curriculum will include Christian doctrine, Bible, missions, evangelism, area studies and world affairs, language study, training for special skills, health and personal development, and physical education.

These trainees bring the Southern Baptist overseas mission staff to nearly 2,300.
