SPEARMAN SCHOOLS OPEN 1937-1938 TERM SEPT. 6TH.

Registration of students of the Spearman Independent school will begin at the school building Monday Sept. 6, according to information from Supt. W. R. Finley. Registration will begin at 8:00 a. m. At 10:30 a. m. the student body will assemble in the auditorium for a short program. At the close of the program students who have not registered will return to school rooms to complete registration. All high school students will report to the study hall for announcements. At 1:00 p. m. all high school students will report to classes as will be announced. Teachers will make class assignments and distribute covers for school books.

Parents are urged to check over the students schedule that they may know what courses the child is taking.

The following schedule of high school courses is published for the benefit of students and parents:

Courses that will be offered in the Spearman School for the year of 1937-38.

Courses marked with a star are required.

Freshman Courses:
*English 1, *Math 1, Home Ec. General Science, Band, Occupation (1st semester), Commercial Geography (last semester), Speech, *Physical Ed., and Choral Singing.

Sophomore Courses:
*English 2, *Algebra 2, World History, Home Ec. 1 or 2, Speech, Typing, Biology, Commercial Geography, Band, *Physical Ed., Choral Singing.

Junior Courses:
*English 3, *History 3, *Plain Geometry, World History, Spanish 2, Home Ec. 1, 2, or 3, Band, Texas History, Typing, Chemistry Biology, *Physical Ed., Choral Singing and Shorthand.

Senior Courses:
*English 4, *Civics (1st semester), Texas History (2nd sem.), Typing, Speech, Home Ec. 1, 2, or 3, Chemistry, Spanish 2, Biology, Physical Ed., Choral Singing, and Shorthand.

Finley could not reach Mr. Poole to notify him of the board action, until Tuesday, when Mr. Poole phoned in his resignation, and asked that his contract with the school be cancelled in order that he might accept a position with the Carlsbad, New Mexico school. Principal Higgins of the grade school is training the football boys on their annual mountain trip, awaiting the selection of a coach and assistant.

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Soil Conservation Used By Spearman Wheat Producers

Soil and moisture conservation practices are the only insurance of successful farming in the wind erosion area, in the opinion of F. B. Buzzard of Spearman, who is recognized as one of the outstanding wheat growers in the Texas Panhandle.

Mr. Buzzard and his son, Geo. F. Buzzard, are farming 4,500 acres in Ochiltree and Hansford Counties, and have been cultivating on the contour for the last three years. The wheat yield from their farms this year totaled 27,000 bushels.

"I estimate that our yield this year was increased 15,000 bushels as a direct result of terracing and contour tillage," Mr. Buzzard says.

During his eight years in Hansford County, Mr. Buzzard has given much study to the best methods of wheat farming. During some of the recent drouth years his harvest has not been up to expectations, but is success has been so outstanding that his methods are being observed closely by other farmers of the area.

Mr. Buzzard, who is cooperating with the Soil Conservation Service camp at Perryton, says: "I have been using soil and moisture conservation practices for the last three years and am thoroughly convinced of their value. If we are ever going to put farming in this area on a safe and sound basis, it will be through contour tillage and terracing."

Three machines now are being used on the Buzzard properties to do all the terracing possible before wheat is planted this fall.

Lion Club Meetings To Resume; First Meet September Seventh

Information from president L. B. Campbell of the Spearman Lion club is to the effect that the club meetings will resume Tuesday September 7. Campbell has been signing up many new members during the past few weeks and announces a membership of 23 at the present time with prospects of 30 members for the fall opening.

Members of the club will consider surrendering their Lion charter and organize a community club on the plan of a Chamber of Commerce with two to four luncheon meetings per month.

Grasshopper Poison Available Tuesday And Thursday Only

Due to the falling off of the demand for grasshopper poison, County Agent Joe Hatton announces the local station open for deliveries on and after August 30, on Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week only.

If the demand for poison increases the schedule will be changed so that the demand can be supplied, even if the station must be opened full time again.

Three Hansford County Students Graduate From W. T. S. T. C.

Hansford County has three representatives in the summer graduating class at the West Texas State Teachers College. They are: Mrs. H. S. Durham of Morse, and Miss Mattie Lou Easley and James Elma Gunn of Spearman.

There are 174 graduates in the class, which is the largest class in the history of the school.

13 members of the class come from states other than Texas; Arkansas, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona, and California being their home states.

Dr. J. M. Lewis, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Lubbock, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon, and Hon Ed Gossett, prominent lawyer of Wichita Falls, will be the commencement speaker.

The fall semester will open September 15.

HANSFORD TO SHARE IN \$40,000,000 DUST BOWL EXPENDITURES

Hansford county will share in the forty million dollar dust bowl expenditure, distribution of funds being under the supervision of the WPA agencies.

The major portion of this vast sum of money to be distributed in five states dust bowl area will be spent in the construction of lakes and dams, according to the story carried in the Amarillo Daily News dated today (Thursday).

Hansford county's water and soil conservation committee, headed by County Judge A. F. Barkley, will be accompanied by representatives from various organizations of the county to the five state meeting to be held at Amarillo September 8th. Hansford county people are anxious to enter the coming program which due to the excellent work of President John McCarty and various committees, will enable so called destitute counties an equal share in the distribution of funds.

Provisions of legislation provide for funds to purchase land for lakes and dams, and funds of WPA agencies will provide for construction work. Only such a program as outlined above would benefit Hansford county since there are no available county funds for purchase of land.

DOVE SEASON OPENS SEPTEMBER FIRST

Hunters of this section are anxiously awaiting the opening of the dove season September 1st. The information coming to this office is to the effect that there are a good many doves this season.

F. W. Brandt, gives us the information that hunters should secure hunting license before the season opening. This is required even if one hunts in his own county. The license will be good for the duck season, and most everyone purchases permits for hunting ducks.

Wilson is vitally interested in this subject and declares that he would like to see students of public schools use studies along this line in their school work.

Five of six amendment Texas constitution voted a special election Monday ed a majority in Hansford. The amendment to abolish salary system of comp for county officials was by one vote in latest count.

Aid for needy blind: F. against 19.

Texas added five new amendments to its state constitution rejected one, according to Texas Election Bureau.

The proposal to abolish salary system and return fee system of compensation large classification of local officials was decisively rejected on the face of return sufficiently complete to indicate drift of public sentiment.

Richard Crookes

At seventeen, he was loading ice on ice wagons for twenty cents an hour, he had to get on the job at three o'clock in the morning.

When he came to New York to study, he lived in one room with four other boys. The room was small, but they managed to jam a bed and three army cots into it.

He used to go hungry all day to hear Caruso sing. He would deny himself all food for a day except a pint bottle of milk and then go to the opera and pay a dollar ten for standing room in the topmost gallery.

"I was awed by Caruso," he told me. "I felt then and I still feel that he was the most wonderful singer who ever lived. I used to go to the library and read articles and biographies about him."

Richard Crookes got his first job in churches, singing for weddings and funerals. He told me that, although he didn't wish anybody any hard luck, he was always glad in those days when a funeral came along.

Walter Wamrosch heard him sing and was so impressed that


he volunteered to get a ten thousand dollar loan for Crookes so he could study abroad but Crookes refused the loan. He wanted to earn everything for himself. He wanted to be independent. Finally he was offered a job singing in "The Student Prince" at a salary of \$1,000 a week. What? A thousand a week? for him? He could hardly believe his ears. He needed the money. He was married at the time, had a family to support one of his children had had a long siege of serious illness and he himself wanted to study abroad; but he turned down a thousand a week because he wanted to devote his life to a higher type of music to concert work and the opera.

And speaking of opera, he is probably the only singer who ever lived who turned down offers year after year to sing at the Metropolitan Opera in New York—before he had become famous.

You would like Richard Crookes everybody likes him. Even his wife likes him. She said to me Dick has never said a mean thing or done a mean thing in all his life. And she ought to know for they were childhood sweethearts and they have been married for 12 years.

When Richard Crookes first came to New York, he wanted to play hand ball. Finally he found an out door hand ball court where he could play free in return for

laste when a leaf or two is added to a jar of pickles.

Chutney Sauce
Twelve sour green apples, 12 small green tomatoes, 3 green peppers, 2 medium sized Spanish onions, 1 pound seedless rasins, 6 tablespoons salt, 1-4 pound green ginger root or 2 tablespoons ground ginger, 3 tablespoons mustard seed, 1 cup chopped mint leaves, 2 1-2 cups day, brown sugar, 1 1-2 quarts vinegar.

Wash tomatoes, remove stem end and chop coarsely. Sprinkle with two tablespoons salt and let stand over night. Drain. Pare, core and chop apples. Peel and chop onions. Remove seeds and white fiber from peppers and chop flesh. Mince ginger. Put apples, tomatoes, onions, peppers, ginger and rasins in preserving kettle. Add sugar and remaining salt to vinegar and bring to the boiling point. Boil five minutes and pour over mixture in preserving kettle. Add mustard seeds and mint and cook slowly until vegetables are tender and mixture is thick. It will take about one hour. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Sweet Gherkins
The secret of crisp pickles lies in obtaining a correct bacterial action in one direction and at the same time preventing the unpleasant bacterial action which causes spoilage and softening. Common salt, the plain barrel variety, has been to be the most efficient agent for this purpose.

One peck gherkins, 1 1-3 pound barrel salt, 3 teaspoons powdered alum, 4 quarts cider vinegar, 4 ounces mixed pickling spices, 2 1-2 cups granulated sugar.

Wash pickles and put in a deep crock. Sprinkle with salt, cover with water, weight to keep pickles in brine and let stand four to six weeks. Drain from brine and rinse in clear water. Return to clean crock, add alum and enough warm water to cover gherkins. All the old-fashioned savory garden herbs give an unexpected

drain and rinse in clear water. Wipe. Put vinegar, sugar and spices in preserving kettle and bring to the boiling point. Boil eight minutes and pour over cucumbers in crock. Let stand five days. Drain off vinegar, add 2 cups sugar and bring to the boiling point. Pour boiling hot over pickles. Let stand five days longer. Every five days pour off vinegar, add 2 cups of sugar and pour over pickles until they are as sweet as you want them. Then put in sterilized jars, cover with hot vinegar and seal.

Bread and Butter Pickles
Four quarts cucumber slices, 12 onions, 1 cup salt, 4 cups vinegar, 3 cups sugar, 2 tablespoons mustard seed, 2 tablespoons celery seed, 1 ablespoon tumeric, 2 or 3 hot red peppers.


Peel onions and slice. Mix with cucumber slices, sprinkle with salt and let stand three hours. Rinse with cold water. Chop hot peppers and put ingredients in preserving kettle. Bring to the boiling point and boil fifteen minutes. Put into sterilized jars and seal.

An unusual and very good cake is made by putting 1-2 cup jelly in a bowl in a pan of hot water. Add a dash of salt and 1 unbeatn white of egg. Beat with a rotary beater until the mixture is stiff enough to stand up in peaks. Spread on cakes and serve at once.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

DO'S AND DON'TS



Give your camera half a chance and you'll get good snapshots.

It's really quite surprising the number of amateurs who go merrily along snapping pictures without giving any thought as to why their snapshots appear somewhat smudged or cloudy.

Your snapshots can be classed into the above categories for the simple can be attributed to your neglect and not to faulty construction of the camera.

A dirty lens, for example, will give smudgy prints. A lens is the eye of your camera. Can you see clearly if your glasses are smudged with finger prints?

Cleaning a lens is a very simple operation. All you need is a soft, unscrubbed linen handkerchief and a match or pencil, if the lens is quite small. The rear surface of the lens can easily be reached by moving the back of the camera.

The camera has a double lens (one behind and one in front of the shutter diaphragm), the front combination may be removed by turning to the left, which will allow you to work through the shutter opening.

When using a focusing type camera be sure to set the lens at the correct distance mark, for if you don't the chances are that your picture will be out of focus and blurred.

Here's another one. Unless you have an extremely fast lens and shutter don't try to take broadside snaps of fast-moving subjects. Moving objects can, however, be caught, even with an ordinary camera, if taken from an angle of about 45 degrees and not too close up.

Amateur snapshotting is really anything but difficult and it is quite safe to say that the majority of picture failures are the result of carelessness or lack of thought on the part of the snapshotter.






nificance of the consuming fire. They missed the true intent of the moment. They had thought out-

The Drunkards of Ephraim.
Isa. 28:1.
"Woe to the crown of pride of the drunkards of Ephraim, and to the fading flower of his glorious beauty, which is on the head of the valley of them that are overcome with wine!" v. 1. Ephraim is only another name for Samaria, or the northern kingdom, comprising the area occupied by ten of the twelve tribes of Israel, of which Ephraim was the leading tribe. Samaria had been a thing of such beauty, elegance, and his life so luxurious, that it is compared to a flower: but its beauty is fading because its people had become slaves to drink, as the margin reads, "smitten down with wine," or, as Dr. J. A. Alexander interprets: "Smitten, beaten, knocked down with wine as with a hammer and laid prostrate on the ground, where they lie fixed to it, not able to get up."

Temperance for others' Sake.
"It is good not to eat flesh, nor drink wine, nor to do anything whereby thy brother stumbleth." Rom. 14:21. "The editor himself knows of no more terrible sight in restaurants, dining-cars, hotels etc., of our land, than to see

fathers and mothers, not only ordering intoxicating beverages for themselves, but having glasses of beer placed before their children who sit with them at the table. He recalls the case of a mother who recently came to him in great grief, telling him how horrified she was when her son came home one night with a heavy breath of liquor, and how she lay awake all night grieving, fearful for her son's future, while, at the same time, the editor knew that she and her husband were liberally sipping in intoxicating drinks to friends who came into the house."

A National Law Breaking
"Lest they drink and forget the law." Prov. 31:5. "The Internal Revenue Department has been issuing licenses to wholesalers in dry states. In one state alone (Alabama) 17 wholesale beer dealers have been licensed. This same department has also stated that there are 980 retail whiskey dealers and 328 retail beer dealers in Alabama. This is in spite of Section 2 of the 21st Amendment, which says "The transportation or importation into any state territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of laws thereof, is prohibited." They also have erred through wine. The drunkards of 1945 are beginning their parade. Hundreds of thousands of young girls and boys are taking their places in the procession. During the last "Three long years," there has been a 183 per cent increase in youth made uninsurable by drink."

Introduction.
The liquor problem is invariably an ally of Satan. God's people must keep ever vigilant against its growth. Legislation alone is not sufficient. Jehovah regulate world issues. Jehovah regulate to teach them the significance of clean living and sobriety. The priests and prophets are, first, to be an example of cleanliness and high character. "And the Lord said unto Aaron, saying, Do not drink wine or strong drink, thou, nor thy sons, when ye go into the tabernacle of the congrega-

tion, lest ye die: it shall be a statute forever throughout your generations." Sobriety is essential among a nation's leaders, if social welfare is to receive first consideration and the laws of the land be respected.

A Proper Reverence For The Tabernacle

Proper understanding of the purpose and function of the tabernacle had to precede an effective priesthood. Any meeting-house is a holy sanctuary. Desecration devaluated the sacredness of sacrifice. No amount of altar offering can atone for habitual social sinning. Jehovah, through Moses, is seeking out a priestly line, to be cleansed, consecrated and made fit to preside over the spiritual ceremonies. The spiritual level cannot rise above the level of its leadership. In the instance

of Moses and the burning bush, the flame prefaced the voice of Jehovah (Ex. 3:2-5). Perhaps on this occasion the atmosphere of the worship service was being prepared so that Aaron, the minister, might receive the divine message to be transmitted to the congregation.

A Warning Example.

"And Nadab and Abihu, the sons of Aaron, took either of them his censor, and put fire therein, and put incense thereon, and offered strange fire before the Lord which he commanded them not. 


