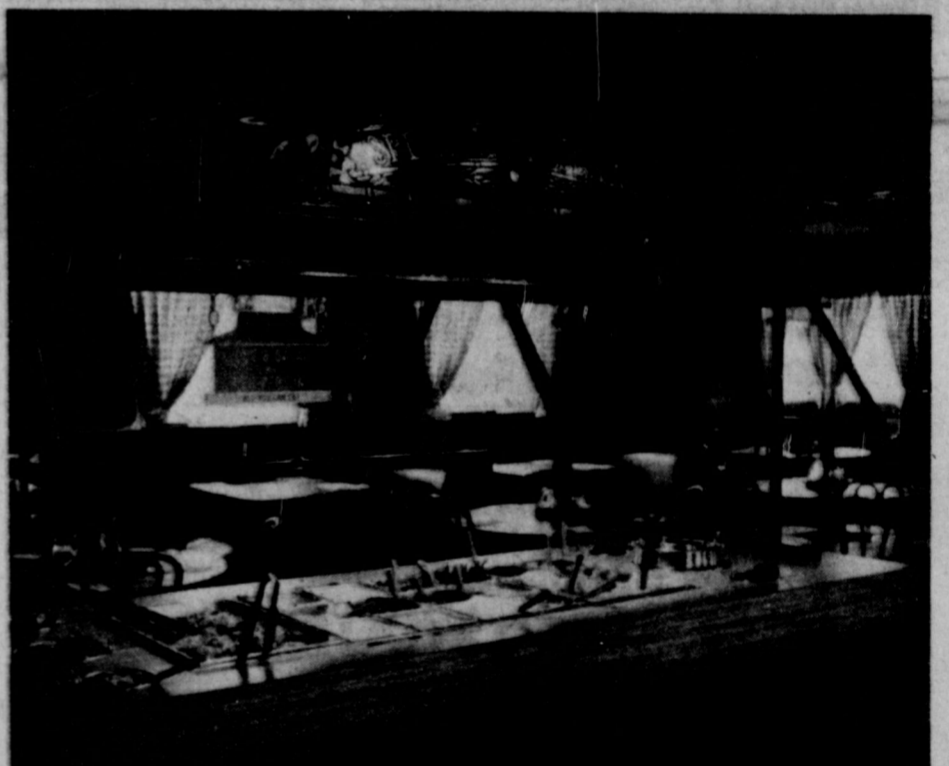

Pizza Hut Open For Business

There is a new aroma of cooking in the air. There is a tantalizing whiff of it every time someone comes out of the door of the new Pizza Hut with a satisfied smile -- or you go in with a ravenous hunger for something different. That door to Spearman's newest eating place officially opened at 5:30 Sunday afternoon with ribbon-cutting ceremonies with the very first serving following at six. "You people have brought to Spearman the king of pizzas we have been driving miles to get," observed Spearman Mayor or Ralph Blodgett at the opening ceremonies, Sunday. In addition to the mayor, Chamber of Commerce Ambassadors J. L. Brock, Jim McLain and Len Simpson were present for the occasion. President Brock brought the welcoming address following an invocation by Kim Brock. A trio of executives of the franchise chain headquartered at Liberal, Kans., were present. Yvonne Brown will be the manager of the new facility. She is a native of Flint, Mich., and has operated Pizza Huts at

Denver, Colo., for the parent company before joining the Liberal franchise group. The Spearman "store" as it is called in the trade, is the thirtieth Pizza Hut opened in the group at Liberal. A spokesman for the chain said Spearman is a medium-sized town in the group. "It is not the smallest city by any means but it is not the largest either," he said in answer to the question. "Because Spearman is the city it is, we believe this store will be as successful as any we have currently in operation." The local menu offers the choice of a wide variety of pizza combinations including the new pan pizza. Also now is the spaghetti supreme offering a topping that includes pepperoni, cheese and green peppers among other ingredients in the tantalizing blend. Naturally, the Pizza Hut people believe their ingredients and the care in which they are used produce the tastiest food of this type served anywhere. The building is a variation on the Pizza Hut theme. Of course, the red tile roof is there.

So are the tapered panels that separate the windows but they are a soft beige color where many of the company's buildings have white or light-colored -- or even stone panels in the exterior construction. The entrance is on the south side of the building where there is a spacious hard-surfaced parking area. Inside, the typical tables and booths are comfortable. Tiffany-style lamp shades bear the Pizza Hut legend. An oblong lamp with the same Tiffany theme lights the centrally located salad bar. This lamp shade bears the legend, "Spearman, Tex." The salad bar is something new in styling, too. The bar itself resembles a butcher's block with square stainless steel dishes counter-sunk. The new Pizza Hut is located south on the Burger highway located on the west side of the road. Serving hours are 11 a.m. - 12 p.m., Monday through Saturday. On Sunday, serving will be from 12 noon until 10 p.m.

Mayor Blodgett said that the city is making real progress in filling the potholes around town and doing a better job this year than previously.

Alleys have been muddy and some so bad it was dangerous to walk in them. The worst ones have been worked on and crews are trying to work caliche into all of them.

The airport is waiting for Millikin workers to the caliche work. New runways should be ready by October 1. The city

owns the hangars and rents them out.

If you have been at swimming pool park or the YMCA you will have seen that good progress is being made on the new fire station.

The city may have to go a little bit into debt for the first time due to a warm winter and a wet Spring and consequently less income coming in.

Peggy's Pointers

So you missed "spring" cleaning this year -- after all, rainy days aren't the best incentive.

Then do some "summer" housecleaning -- and this year, make it "conservation cleaning" with energy savings in mind.

CLEAN 'BIG ENERGY' USERS

Pay lots of attention to your heaviest energy users -- such as furnaces, air conditioners and major appliances. That includes the clothes washer and dryer and the refrigerator and freezer.

Energy saving cleaning also means maintenance -- like drivebelt tightening or lubrication -- to help your appliances work more efficiently and last longer.

START WITH FURNACE

Start with the furnace. Since the average household furnace uses about half the total family energy consumption in a year, give it top priority.

You won't use the furnace until next fall, but now's the time to get it in shape.

Make sure the filter is clean -- and promise yourself you'll clean the filter or change it every two months when you're using the furnace. This can save much money.

Some filters just need a tapping and a good vacuuming for cleaning -- or you can wash them with a hose or under a faucet. Most are disposable now.

Also, lubricate electric motors, fans and pumps according to the manufacturer's directions. Use oil sparingly once or twice a year.

Check all the drive belts for proper tension. If belts are properly adjusted, you should be able to press them together on-half to one inch. Replace cracked or frayed belts.

CLEAN AIR CONDITIONER

Clean the air conditioner next. Inspect the filter. Clean it or replace it every month during the cooling season.

Make sure the condenser is clean. If not, the unit will have to run longer to do the job.

Regular lubrication is important, here, too, if required by the manufacturer.

Have a professional repairman check the air conditioner every other year.

OTHER ENERGY SAVERS

Here are some other energy-saving things you can do:

Keep the condenser coils on your refrigerator and freezer clean -- to help them work their best during the hot summer months when demands on them are heaviest.

Think about repainting the walls with lighter colors to reflect more light and reduce lighting costs.

Keep all lighting equipment clean. Dust and soil reduce lighting efficiency.

Check lampshades for discoloration. White reflects more light, if the insides of your shades have darkened, clean the shades, relime them or replace them.

Draperies, kept closed, will go a long way toward keeping hot summer sun from heating your home -- and they will reduce air-conditioning costs. In winter, they can help keep out cold air, and that reduces heating costs. Make sure your draperies are clean and in good condition for the greatest efficiency.

"Summer" cleaning means heavy laundry chores, too -- bedspreads, curtains, blankets and other bedding. Be sure to use full washer loads to save

energy. For heavily soiled items, use hot water. For the rest, use warm or cool water to save energy, if possible.

Line drying is fashionable again, so cut even more energy costs by drying clothes outdoors in good weather.

During balmy days of late spring and early summer, save energy by opening windows more and using air conditioning less -- but make sure your screens are clean to allow optimum air circulation.

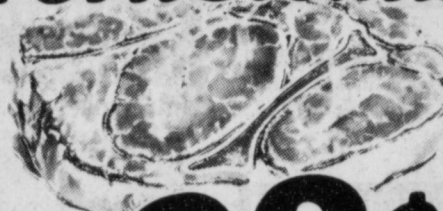

greatest benefit for herself, her school and her community.

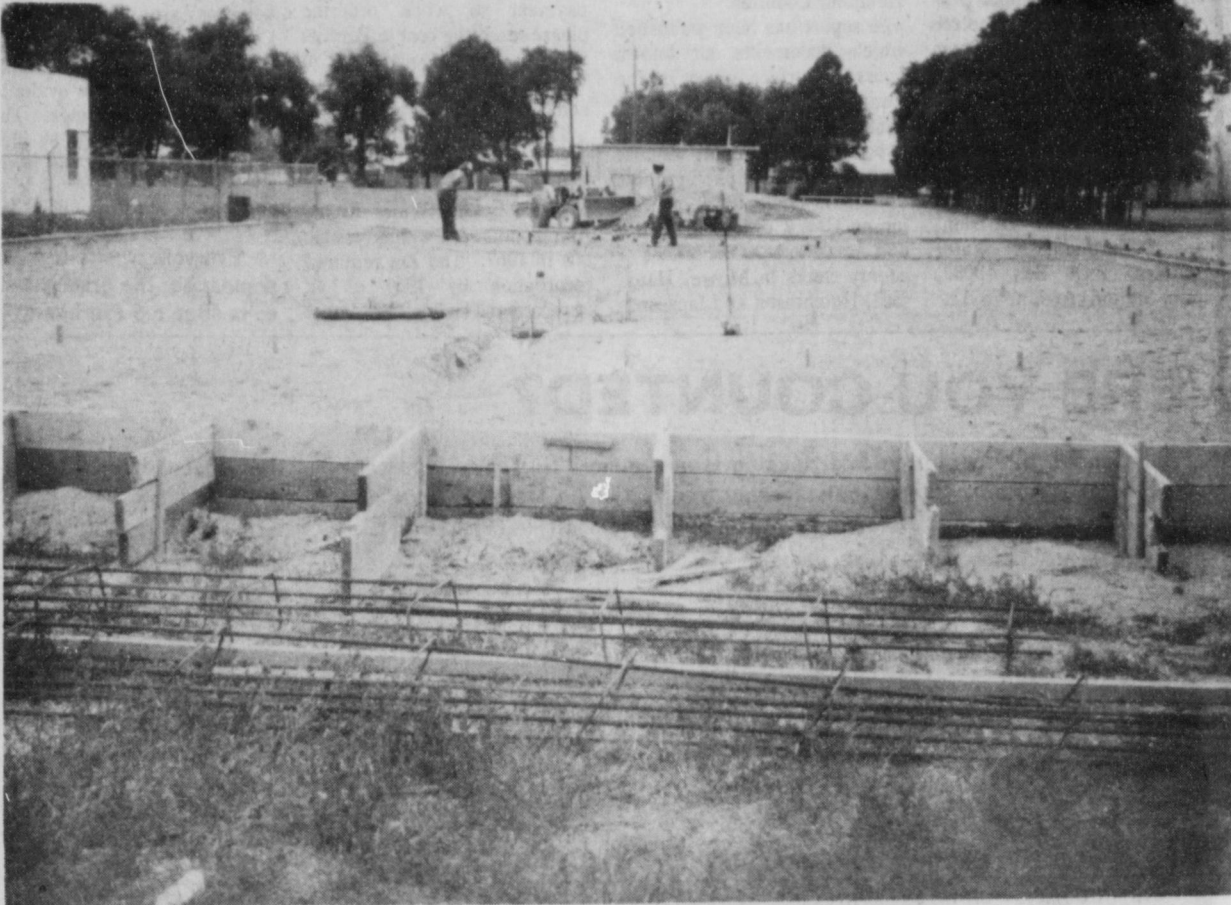
The girls run for office and have their own state and city officials. They have their own Senate, House of Representatives, and City Councils.

Water Rights Hearing Scheduled

Adjudication of claims of water rights in the Canadian River Basin located within the State, will begin with hearings scheduled by the Texas Water Commission for Sept. 8 in Borger. The hearings will be held at City Hall, 113 E. 6th St., beginning at 9:30 a.m., and will continue until all claimants in the basin have had an opportunity appear and present evidence in support of their claims.

A water right is the right under state law to impound, divert, or use State water which is water that occurs on the surface when confined to a streambed.

Dockets listing claimants and the time and place for each evidentiary hearing will be sent to each claimant of record.

Claimants who do not appear and present evidence in support of their claims will, in all probability, lose any water right to which they may otherwise be entitled.

All persons claiming a water right of any kind in the Canadian River Basin to divert and use state water for other than domestic or livestock purposes are required to complete and file a sworn claim of water rights with the Department on or before Aug. 8. Persons who have not received forms for the filing of these claims and wish to do so may obtain forms and information by writing to the following: Permits Division, Texas Department of Water Resources, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, 78711.

The Canadian River Basin consists of the Canadian River and its tributaries located within the State of Texas and includes all or portions of Dallam, Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Sherman, Moore, Potter, Randall, Hansford, Hutchinson, Carson, Ochiltree, Roberts, Gray, Lipscomb and Hemphill Counties.

A report has been published which documents all known users of surface water in the Canadian River Basin for purposes other than domestic and livestock. The report and its appendix of aerial photographic mosaics is available for inspection at TDWR offices in Austin and Amarillo or at the offices of county clerks in Moore, Hansford, Hutchinson and Lipscomb

Counties. Copies of this investigation report and of the appendix may be purchased for a cost of \$10.00 for the complete report without appendix and \$50.00 for the complete appendix only. Individual sheets of the report are available for \$.30 and individual maps of the appendix may be purchased for \$2.50. Five percent (5%) should be added for sales tax. Department policy requires prepayment so when ordering please remit the cost to Permits Division, Texas Department of Water Resources at the above address.

The hearings are part of a one-time statewide evaluation and inventory of water rights required by the Water Rights Adjudication Act which became law in 1967. The Act required recordation by 1969 of all unrecorded claims of water

rights, investigations by the agency staff and hearings to receive evidence of past water use to support all water right claims, including permits and certified filings.

At the initial hearing on Sept. 8, at Borger City Hall, 113 East Sixth Street, Borger, Texas, jurisdiction will be considered and the adjudication process will be explained, with time set aside for questions. After all hearings are completed, the Commission will enter an order determining water rights in the basin based upon the evidence received at the hearings. The determination will later be filed in a district court in the basin for court approval.

Swine Need To Keep Their Cool In Summer

Keeping hogs cool during hot summer months is more than just a matter of comfort for the pigs. It is a matter of maintaining the pigs' reproductive ability, and that's a matter of cold cash for pork producers.

Unless producers take steps to reduce high summer temperatures around their pigs, reproductive efficiency can drop drastically, points out Layton Barton County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

High summer temperatures will cause some sows to fail to

exhibit estrus and may cause boars to become infertile for up to six weeks. The problem isn't easily recognized in boars, says Barton. Reproductive failure doesn't become obvious until three to four weeks after exposure to high temperatures.

Failure of sows to come into estrus can cause a drop of 10 to 20 percent in the conception rate on a whole herd basis.

Reproductive failure in the boar can be devastating to the swine producer, resulting in no sows conceiving.

To guard against reproductive failure, Barton recommends keeping boars in shade and

under sprinklers whenever temperatures go above 80 degrees F. In addition, farmers should be especially sure to keep sows cool just prior to, during and up to 30 days after breeding.

Shade can come from nearby trees, brush arbors or metal-roof buildings with high ceilings. An intermittent sprinkler system should be available to wet boars and sows. Sprinklers should be placed over concrete; if over dirt, they should be in the sun.

Barton suggests an intermittent sprinkler system operation on a cycle of one-and-a-half to two minutes on and eight to eight-and-a-half minutes off.

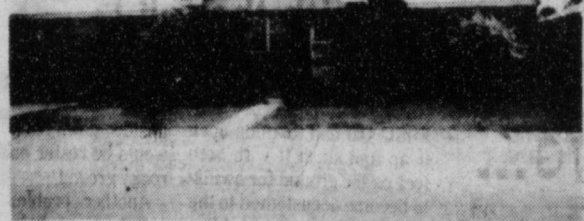

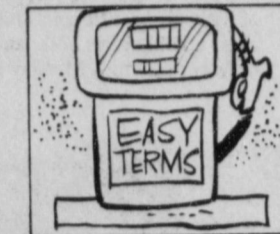
"Ride For Life" Benefit Planned

Census Takers Urgently Needed

Census takers are urgently needed in this county to assist in completing follow-up operations for the 1980 Census.

Bill Soule, district office manager for the Census Bureau in this area, says that work is available immediately for all interested persons who qualify for the positions. Anyone over the age of 18 is eligible to be a census taker. Applicants must pass a written test on such basic skills as ability to follow printed instructions, do simple arithmetic and read maps.

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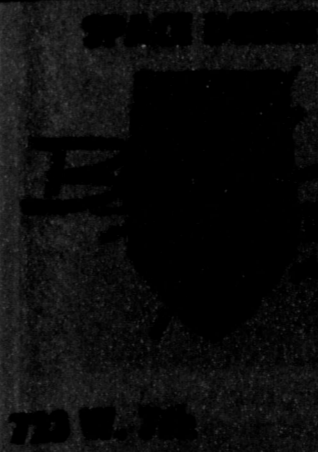
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
